## CONFIRMATION

The Bishop will hold a Confirmation in St George's Church on Sunday cvening, May $23^{-}$ The number of candidates will be about 50 . The classes are held on Thursday afternoon, at 4.30 . and Friday cevning, at $S$ p.m. In addition to these classes, the Rector began last Sunday to give Confirmation Addresses at 415 , after the Children's Service. On these occasions all the candidates are expected to attend, bringing their Bibles with them.

## HELPS TO PRAYER.

The Rector has lately reprinted some Helps to Prayer, originally prepared for Canon Wilkinson's Parish, St Petcr's, Eaton Squarc. These Helps are intended to suggest subjects of intercession, and to aid Communicants in the use of this most valuable privilege-a privilege in which Christ calls upon us to join Him-a privilege, whereby we participate in the very work of Christ upon His mediatorial thronc, for "He ever liveth to make intercession for those who come unto God by Him." By virtue of this participation it is a work full of power. If the power of intercession were more fully realized it would not be so little attended to. How could we weary in intercession, if we had faith? How could we ever feel that too much time was given to it, if we remembered that it is the one work in which Christ is unccasingly occupicd?

How vast a change would be wrought in the Christian world, if there were a more carnest practice of intercession! There is nothing which we can do to work so great a change in others, as is produced by intercessory prayer. If but two or thrce carnest Communicants in each Parish were to join in intercessory prayer, there would soon be a revival of spiritual life throughout the whole Church! The power of God in answer to prayer is without limit.

If time were taken from social engagements to spend in praycr for the Church and Parish, what an abundant blessing would be showered down on both, for we know that such prayer is "according to His Will." Great also shall be the personal blessedness of those who thus seek to "strengthen their brethren."

The Clergy will be glad to supply the "Helps to Praycr' to all who ask for them. Copics are kept in the Vestry.

## THE MISSION.

The services at the Mission Hall on Thursday evenings have been so well attended since the opening of the Mission last October, that the Clergy feel encouraged to make a special effort of an cvangelistic character at the beginning of Lent. A band of visitors was organized to make a systematic visitation in the district surrounding the Mission Hall. Tracts were distributed, and invitations to "Come to the Mission," were frecly circulated. These, with carnest intercessions on its behalf, completed the preparation for the Mission.

The first Service was held by the Rector on Sunday evening, the 14th ult., with a fair attendance, which increased each evening. The interest secmed to grow as the ween went on, until the final Service on Sunday, the 21st. As the people became familiar with the hymns, the Services became more hearty than many long established Services in our Parish Churches.

It is impossible to forecast the results of the Mission, but this at least may be said: the Gospel has gained a hearing among many who never attend church; more than nincty families have been affected by it; many have been led to make resolution to lead a new life; to pray morning and evening ; and to attend Church as frequently as they can. These results may not seem large, but they are sufficient to call for thanksgivings from all true Christians, and they will become larger in proportion as earnest prayer is offered up. Indeed there is abundant need that earnest Communicants should be "instant in prayer" for the conversion of the careless, the indifferent, and the godless.

## THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND WORKINGMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

The qualifications for this Association are: that members shall be workingmen who are regular Communicants of the Church of England, and workers for Christ and his Church. Associates are workingmen who are members of the Church of England, but who have no vote in the management, and Honorary Members those who are Communicants, and subscribe not less than \$1 a ycar, and have no vote in the management. Members and Associates pay 25c. per annum. The Central Society mects every Monday at S , p.m., at the Mission Room, Phœbe Street.

The Association had their first corporatc Communion inthe Parish Church on the first Sunday of last month. The members met at the Mission Hall, thirty in number, and marched to the Church. The Sermon preached by the Rector, was most suitable, the subject being: "Our warfare with spiritual focs."

## PARISH NOTES.

Offertory.-March jth, $\$ 50.96$; i4th, $\$ 50.23$, and for Church of England Temperance Society, $\$ 20.59$; 2 ist, $\$ 56.84$; 2Sth, $\$ 50$ U.59. Total parochial, \$218.62; corresponding period last year, \$214.43.

On Sunday, 7 th March, the Irfantry School Cores, about 120 strong, were present at the Morning Scrvice in St. Gcorge's.

Mr. Schuch has been appointed Choir Master of the Church of the Redecmer. It will, no doubt, be difficult to find a successor of adequate vocal powers to take his place in our Choir.

The Church of St. George the Martyr, Magantattawan, which received from us a considerable sum for its building fund, and the most of its equipment, in commemoration of which it was named, has lately been consecrated.

We have to record the departure from our midst of Mr. Robarts, the Superintendent of the Mission School. Much of the success of the school is due to his uuwearied eforts. Zealous, firm, yet kind, he proved a most efficient head.

The loss is a sad onc, but must not cast us down. It is a call to all-to be up and doing; to those who are doing nothing, no longer to stand idle; to those who are at work, to work the more fuitlifuliy in "the fields white already to harvest."
We are glad to learn that Mr. David Burns has undertaken to supply Mr. Robarts's place.

## COSTUME CONCERT.

The gross reccipts from the Concert to date are $\$ 108$. The expenses are $\$ 12$. There are still 29 members of the Congregation who have not made any returns. The value of 104 tickets is in their hands. It is confidently expected that most of these will be heard from before Christmas, and the rest early in 1887. The Concert was held on February 25.

## A TENTH.

Systematic giving is enjoincd upon the Christi:n. I Cor. xvi. I.

The only rule by which this duty is to be measured, which we find in the Bible, is the tithe or tenth of income as the minimum amount for systematic giving-that which God claims as a debt due to Him , which must be paid before our gifts can be regarded as frecwill or thank-offerings.
The common crror that this proportion applies to Jews only, is disproved by Holy Scripture, and also by secular history.

The Revenue of this Parish is derived from the Offertory and Pew Rents, of which the former is relied upon as the principal source of income.

Offertory Envelopes will be supplied to those who are willing to contribute in this way to the maintenance of the Church and Ministry.

Parochial Needs.-Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure-

1. Debt, $\$ 3.500$ should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The completion of improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. $\$ 2,000$ is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. $\$ 650$ to pay for the new roof of the Church. The School House roof must also soon be renewed.
4. $\$ 800$ for the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
5. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$295 only.

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
