

My dear Johnny:-

I suppose we shall be seeing you in Montreal some of these days. In the meanwhile I might say that the Dean of the Faculty of Arts is favourably disposed to let Donald start his third year in Arts with ^{out} any additional examinations, on the completion of his course at the Royal Military College. Normally he would be obliged to pass an examination in Latin, and I need hardly tell you that if he is going to take up Law at Oxford, Latin will be an absolute necessity.

I should suggest that without worrying about any other Arts subjects he take up such a study of Latin as will not interfere with his satisfactory completion of the work with the R.M.C. 




