


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
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

## NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.
4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. A Fund to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.

6. To provide Bibles, Prayer Books and religious publica-

tions, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Churchwardens, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of elergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust, (e) the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund.

## ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Church Society was held at the Cathedral Church Hall, on Wednesday, the 3rd February, at two P.M.

Present, the Lord Bishop of Quebec in the chair, the Lord Bishop of Niagara, the Very Rev. the Dean of Quebec, the Revs. Canon Von Ifland, L. W. Williams, T. A. Williams, A. J. Balfour, H. J. Petry, T. W. Noble, Messrs. E. Pope, W. G. Wurtele, E. J. Hale, C. Judge, J. C. More, W. H. Carter, Robert Hamilton, John Hamilton, G. R. White, James Dunbar, Mrs. John Hamilton, Mrs. C. Sewell, Miss Montizambert, and the Secretary.

The Lord Bishop of Niagara was invited to take a seat on the platform.

After prayers, the minutes of the last meeting were then read and confirmed.

The report of the Central Board, Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Committee, were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

The report of the Deanery of St. Francis was also read, received and ordered to be printed in the annual report. The financial accounts of the Church Society, Diocesan Board, Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund and Local Endowment Fund, were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed. The Lord Bishop presented the report of the Committee appointed to consider the best and most suitable manner of commemorating the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Church Society.

One hundred and thirty-seven new members were then elected.

The thanks of the Society were then given to the Hon. Counsel, Hon. Geo. Irvine, Q.C., James Dunbar, Esq., Q.C., and Geo. Lampson, Esq., for their services in the past year. The thanks of the Society were also given to the Auditors for their services during the past year.

The following alteration to Article V, of the By-Laws, agreed to for the first time at the last meeting of the Church Society was then finally adopted:

In section 3, in the 1th line, instead of the words "constitution of the Society," insert the words, "Act incorporating the Society."

The following alterations in Article XIII, were then read for the first time and await final adoption:

That after the word "Of," fourth line from bottom of page 53, the words, "the elected members," be added.

After the word "Diocese" in line 5 of section 5, add the following, "and the ministrations of the Church in the poorer districts."

On the motion of Mr. John Hamilton, seconded by Capt. Carter, the following resolution was passed:

That the Church Society welcomes with gladness the establishment of a new Society, the Association of Church Helpers, to aid in furthering the work of the Church in this Diocese and especially to open a channel through which the sympathy of the women of the Church may flow to our Home Missions, as it has already so freely flowed through the Woman's Auxiliary to the wider fields of Missionnary labour, and that the thanks of the Society are due and are hereby tendered to the Association of Church Helpers for their valuable labours in collecting for the funds of the Church Society in the City and District of Quebec, during the past year.

The meeting was then closed with the Benediction.

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#### 45 VICT., CHAP. 89.

An Act to authorize the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, to consolidate certain Endowment Funds.

[Assented to 27th May, 1882.]

Preamble.

WHEREAS the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec has, by its petition, represented that it is in charge of certain endowment funds for the support of various parishes and missions within the Diocese of Quebec, and has prayed that the said Church Society should be authorized so to distribute any losses which may occur, through failure in investments, as to make them fall proportionately over the whole of such endowments held by the society; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petitioners; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

Consolidation of endowment funds of society for certain purposes.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec is authorized, so far, to consolidate the said endowment funds, so placed and hereafter to be placed in the hands of the said society, under deeds of trust for investment, as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur through failure in investments proportionately over, the whole.

Consolidation limited. 2. The said consolidation of the said intrusted endowment funds shall extend, only so far as to enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur, through failure in investments proportionately over the whole, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Note.—The following parishes or missions have agreed to the by law on the consolidation of endowments, viz:—Barford and Hereford, Cape Cove and Percé, Cookshire, Dudswell, Gaspé Basin, Ireland and South Inverness, Levis, Malbaic, Inverness, Riviere-du-Loup, Bourg Louis, Kingsey, Magog and Georgeville, Stanstead, Durham, Leeds, Brompton and Windsor, Sandy Beach, Hatley, Coaticook, Melbourne and Richmond, Frampton East and West, Compton, St. Sylvester, Portneuf, Three-Rivers.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1891.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 3rd, 1892.)

The Central Board in presenting their Fiftieth Annual Report to the Church Society are convinced that a few words of special thankfulness may naturally be expected from them. To have existed for so long a period under the difficulties which actively or passively impede the work of our Church in this Diocese, is itself a cause for gratitude. But we are able to say that we not only exist but that our work has thriven and developed, and that the stream has ever flowed on, with a deeper and broader current, and the truth of this remark the following report will testify.

Our first and most obvious duty is, with all earnestness and devotion, to return our thanks to the Author and Giver of all good, for the abundant blessing which he has vouch-safed to our imperfect efforts during the last half century, they could never have witnessed such fruits of labour if His Holy Spirit had not prompted the good desire in the hearts of many, and fanned it into a vigorous flame. We also most gladly take this opportunity of acknowledging with sincere gratitude, the very efficient help which the Society has always received from our brethren the laity of this Diocese. They are fellow workers with us and with our common master. They have not only contributed largely of their substance, but have also with a ready and willing mind bestowed much valuable time, thought and experience upon the various objects embraced within the administration of the Church Society.

Their cordial co-operation has been invaluable and has materially contributed to the happy and encouraging result which we can lay before our church members at this time.

Your Board has much pleasure in announcing that the various sums contributed to the Church Society in the year 1891, show an increase over the previous year of more than eight hundred dollars, as will be seen by the following comparative statement:—

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools, in the promotion of Local Endowments, in the Education of the children of the Clergy, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

During the past year, the following sums have been paid from this Fund:—

\$300 Outfits for three clergymen.

\$50 for the Church at Lake Megantic.

#### MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in connection with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts: Assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the interest of the Invested Capital of the Mission Fund, administered by the Diocesan Board.

Your Board has much pleasure in announcing an increase in the amount contributed to this Fund during the past year, over the previous year of six hundred and nineteen dollars and sixty-four cents.

This Fund we need hardly remind the members of the Church Society aids in supporting missionaries in the poor country districts, in places, where from the scattered nature of the population and their want of means, they are totally unable to support a clergyman themselves.

The Reports of the Clergy, the Report of the S. Fraucis District Association, and the Report of the Diocesan Board, all give valuable and interesting information of the labours of the country clergy, who are indeed deserving of all honour and praise, as must be admitted by all who will only bear in mind what those labours consist of. How the several missions are faithfully served year by year, in the face of many difficulties and discouragments, with three and in some cases four Services on a Sunday, entailing a journey of from 25 to 30 miles, and in addition to this numerous services in the week.

The missionary living, it may be, several miles from a clerical neighbour, and with little congenial Society around him, and yet expected to be always bright and cheerful, the centre of every good influence in his mission, these men are indeed examples of self denial and devotion to all, and it is only right that we should show our appreciation of their faithful labours in a practical way, by subscribing liberally to the Mission Fund of the Church Society, with a view to the more effectual carrying out of the Missionary work of the Diocese, and to the hastening of the day, when the lot of the Mission Clergy can be made more free from worldly cares by an increased scale of Stipend.

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#### PENSION FUND.

(For the support of aged and infirm Clergy)

Pensions to the amount of two thousand four hundred and fifty dollars and thirty-four cents, have been paid during the year to six elergymen.

The Rev. F. A. Smith, who, after more than forty years of active service in this Diocese, has felt compelled from increasing years and failing health to relinquish his labours,

is now aided in his retirement from this Fund.

This is a Fund that speaks for itself and must appeal to the sympathy of every member of our Church, and we feel sure, when attention is again called to the fact, that almost the whole revenue, from the Invested Capital of the Fund, from which alone Pensions can be paid, is now absorbed, that generous help so much needed will not be withheld.

#### WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Annuities to the amount of \$2625 have been paid during the past year, to 9 widows and 8 children of clergymen, who, at the time of their decease, were connected with this Diocease

By the death of the widow of the late Rev. J. S. Sykes, an

annuity of three hundred dollars lapses to the Fund.

#### OBITUARY.

We have to report with deep regret the loss of some old friends and supporters who have been removed by death during the past year, among whom we may mention the Rev. A. Balfour, the veteran Missionary of this Province.

Ordained in the year 1832, Mr. Balfour was old enough to have been the father of most of the Clergy in the Diocese, and yet, up to within a short period of his death, he was active and ready for work. His Biography, if written, would give an interesting account of the growth of the Church, and the resources of this Province, for the greater part of this Century.

We have also to record the death of our former efficient Treasurer, Mr. Alexander Pope, who died in the Hospital in New York, on the tenth day of March last, to the great

sorrow of a large number of friends and admirers.

At a meeting of the Central Board, held on the 17th day of March last, the following resolution was passed:—

"The members of the Central Board wish to place on record their sense of the great loss which the Church Society has sustained through the death of its late Treasurer, Mr. Alexander Pope, who by his very excellent business qualities was eminently fitted for such a responsible position, and who by his kindness and courtesy endeared himself to all who knew him, and they would take this opportunity of expressing their sympathy with his widow and family in their great affliction."

And then, Mr. P. A. Shaw, a life member of the Society and one ever ready to give it a helping hand, was suddenly

called to his rest in the early part of the year.

#### CHURCH HELPERS.

TO THE

#### Diocesan Church Society for 1891.

The following is the abstract of the Revenue Account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1891:—

A gratifying feature in the above statement is the increase of \$619.64 in the Mission Fund contributions over those for the previous year, which it is sincerely hoped may be taken as an earnest of much larger additions to that Fund in the future.

Your Board on other occasions has drawn the attention of members of the Church to the great need of generously supporting the Mission Fund of the Church Society; and it would be a failure of duty on its part if it did not make use of every opportunity to urge upon them the ever increasing necessity of affording still greater assistance to this fund.

The Church Extension Fund raised some years ago for the purpose of opening three new Missions was exhausted during the past year, and it is needless to say that, whilst they are answering all reasonable expectations, these Missions will not be able for many a year to relieve the Board of their maintenance.

Upon the Mission Fund then must actually devolve this charge, the Diocesan Board having no other source of income from which any increase can be looked for. ONS

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devolve source of It is also to be noticed that during the past year a very considerable expense, not likely to diminish in the future, has been incurred for special Missionary work.

As charged with the duty of extending the Church's teaching and ministration in every part of the Diocese from whence the appeal for aid reaches it, your Board readily recognizes its responsibility to further such work wherever the need exists, and its resources will permit. No one, it may be confidently asserted, will affirm of this expenditure that it is an injudicious outlay, who takes the trouble to read the details of that work in the Archdeacon's report on Scottstown and Lake Megantic or the accounts furnished in the reports of the Rev. W. T. Forsythe and the Rev. G. H. A. Murray.

But all this additional work calls for increased resources to carry it on, which simply means larger contributions to the Mission Fund of the Church Seciety.

In order to make more effectual provision for the maintenance of Divine Service during the period of temporary vacancy in any Mission. In order also to secure the personal and pastoral supervision of outlying districts unconnected with any settled charge, as well as to afford aid, in co-operation with the Clergy, in those parts of their Missions beyond their own individual reach. And with the view of having a representative to negotiate with the various congregations on the question of assessments and awaken, as the opportunity occurs, an interest in Missionary work and in the work of the Church Society, your Board has appointed the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, D.D., as General Missionary Agent to the Diocesan Board for a period of three years from 1st July last.

The expectations formed of the value of such work—grounded upon the great experience, undoubted ability and untiring energy of the Archdeacon—have been amply realized, and the account of his labours, from time to time laid before the Board, are full of valuable information as to the condition and needs of our Diocesan Missionary field.

The attention of members of the Church is drawn to the reports of the Clergy and the resume of the work done in the St. Francis District. From these accounts, which in great part are of more than usual interest, your Board is convinced that no small cause exists for thankfulness to Almighty God who has blessed His Church in this Diocese with a large measure of success in the past, and gives us good reason to hope well of the future.

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:, ident. Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society for the year 1891.

The reports from the various Parishes and Missions of the District of St. Francis for the year just past are very encouraging, not to say inspiring. It is quite evident that the Church in the District is alive and that hearty earnest work is being done, in various directions, by both clergy

and laity.

"Progress in every station;" "Zeal and activity manifest spiritually and financially;" New work opened;" "Assessments promptly paid;" "Church property improved;" "Attendance increased;" "Evidences not wanting of steady growth;" "A year of effort;" "The Church gradually becoming more and more settled;" such are a few of the cheering expressions gathered at random from the pages of the reports, some of them repeated again and again. And the notes of discouragement to be set against these are very few indeed.

Something of the spirit animating the Clergy may be shown by a quotation from the report of one of the younger men:—"The 13th September was one of the happiest days of my ministerial life, for on that day I admitted into Christ's Church, through the gate of Holy Baptism, five adults, two of whom drove a distance of fourteen miles through the

rain."

While the old Missions are, with few exceptions, holding their own, and in many cases, growing stronger and extending their area of work; the new ones are rapidly developing into settled spheres of labour. To take a few instances out of many: The new work at Scotstown and Lake Megantic,—served chiefly by the students of Lennoxville, but supervised and reported by the Ven. Archdeacon Roe, D.D. whose Missionary zeal has made itself felt throughout the District,—is a fair sample of what is being done in a few places and of what might be done in many yet neglected quarters of the District if only the men and the means were forthcoming. In these Mission Stations not only have several congregations been formed, two Churches built, and the children brought under regular religious and Churchly instruc-

tion but, by this work, members of 46 families have been led to acknowledge the Church as their spiritual mother who would in all probability have been lost to her but for the devoted efforts of our Missionaries. Again the statistics of Barnston show that this new field has developed into a thriving and substantial Mission under the faithful supervision of the Rev. Joseph Eames, B.A., whose removal to New Hampshire was this year deplored. In Fitch Bay too the Church is slowly but not less surely spreading and rooting itself. And though the signs of progress may not be so apparent, yet, to an appreciable extent, the same is true of Waterville under the care of that experienced and devoted Missionary the Rev. Isaac M. Thompson; and of Newport, which is now under the charge of the Rev. H. A. Dickson, B.A.

To illustrate the new work being opened up by old parishes the case of Barford may be selected as showing singular promise. With the assistance of two members of Bishop's College Brotherhood of Readers, the Incumbent, Rev. G. H. A. Murray, has been able to keep open seven stations, three or four of them in entirely new fields and two across the Province Line. "All these stations," he writes, "show signs of progress;" the prejudice against the Church is breaking down, and the interest in her work rapidly increasing. Mr. Murray has a Church ready for consecration, and a people hungering for more ministrations than he is at present able to give them.

Stanstead should also be mentioned where the Rev. W. T. Forsythe, with the aid of Readers from Lennoxville, has successfully opened, in spite of great opposition, three very encouraging outposts in populous parts of his extend charge. "I am convinced," he writes, "that the Church has a great future before it in this section of country if only we have faith in her Divine Mission and patience to wait for re-

sults."

But not least in prominence, among the signs of the Church's progress in the District, may be noted: 1st. The increasing interest of woman in the Missionary work of the Church emphasized recently by the re-union of the Woman's Auxiliary in Lennoxville. 2nd, the growing observance of the Church's special seasons and Holy Days and the maintenance in several Churches of Daily Morning and Evening Prayer. 3rd. The readiness with which lay help, especially in the form of lay reading, is given and received—(in men-

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tioning which it is worth while stating that the Readers of the Lennoxville Brotherhood, who have this year found employment in thirteen different Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, have done no inconsiderable part of the year's purely Missionary work in the District.) — 4th. The reviving appreciation of catechising as the best of all means for conveying systematic and accurate instruction to the young.

The educational work of the Church in the District has

been much the same as in former years.

The destruction by fire of the school buildings and chapel at Lennoxville has been a serious inconvenience to both College and School, but will eventually result in the providing of more ample and convenient accommodation. Both School and College have continued in active operation throughout the year. It is felt to be of the highest importance that the re-building of the Chapel be not needlessly delayed.

Compton Ladies' College continues to prosper and is, there is reason to believe, increasing in efficiency and growing in the confidence of our people. At the present time there are

in all thirty pupils in attendance.

We still have to deplore the almost total lack of Church Schools of a lower grade throughout the District; Stanstead being the only Parish in which such a school exists. It is hard to see what can be done in the matter, but it is certainly encouraging to read in the report of the Rev. H. A. Dickson "I spend three hours every week in the District School."

The total amount reported or raised for Church purposes by twenty-one Parishes and Missions during the year is \$28,164.18 as compared with \$22,893.58 reported by the same number of Parishes last year. This does not include the sum of \$4,500 raised towards the new buildings at Lennoxville.

It is to be regretted that notwithstanding this increase in the grand total, the total amount raised for extra Parochial objects is smaller than last year's by \$384.12.

#### ACTON.

The Rev. Louis C. Wurtele reports :-

In this Mission, the Sunday duties of the Clergyman are distributed as follows: Morning Service in St. Mark's Church, Acton, and Evening Service or Litany with the two lessons at 7 o'clock.

On the last Sunday of the month, Divine Service is held in a school-house at West Wickham at 3 o'clock, P.M., and on the other Sundays at the same hour in the Danby Church. The attendance has been good in St. Mark's Church, taking everything into consideration, the average being thirty-four in the forenoon and twenty in the evening.

Of Wickham and Danby little can be said, as in the former place there are only four English families and in latter but

nine, of which only four belong to the Church.

There being so few English families in this Mission, it is difficult to start and keep up anything like a guild; however, to interest the young, we have a temperance band, meeting every second Tuesday evening, and in the alternate week we have on the Thursday evening a meeting of a branch of the Agassiz Association which elicits much interest.

We are sorry to have to chronicle the death of Mrs. Thomas Brown, which took place on November the 3rd; she was an accomplished and very estimable lady, beloved and respected by every one. For over twenty years she was our organist, and mostly through her instrumentality, the choir acquired great efficiency. She arrived in Acton in 1863 and has resided here ever since. Of her eleven children three now minister in the Church, and one, Owen C. Brown, M.D., has been our Church-Warden for the last seven years. Having done much good in her generation, she has passed away at the ripe old age of 79 years. Her death is a loss to the Church in this locality, to be felt for years.

With respect to myself; through exposure to an unexpected rain storm in returning from Wickham on the Sunday before last Christmas, I had a severe attack of pneumonia with pleurisy, which for a few days kept me in the balance between life and death; however, with thankfulness I can say that my usual health and strength have been restored to me. At the visitation of the Lord Bishop this

Summer eight candidates received the Holy rite of confirmation.

Ten Baptisms; four Marriages and five Burials.

Parochial Expenditure: Diocesan Board, \$270.00; Interest on Parsonage Loan, \$71.55; Wood and sundries, \$23.00; Easter Offering, \$9.00; Total, \$374.55. Extra Parochial: Church Society, \$19.75; Foreign Missions, \$4.50; Domestic Missions, \$2.50; Total, \$26.75; Grand Total, \$401.30.

## ASCOT CORNER AND WESTBURY.

The Rev. H. E. Wright, reports:-

In making my report for this Mission I can only give an account of the work done during the latter part of the year,

my appointment dating only from the first of July.

During the first half of the year the Mission was under the charge of the Rev. R. W. Colston, who removed to Marbleton about the 1st of May. Since then I have held Services regularly in the three Churches of this Mission, for the first two months of that period as Reader from Bishop's College Brotherhood of Readers, and from that time to the present as Incumbent.

The spiritual condition of the Mission as a whole is far from satisfactory, though I am happy to be able to state that

I think I see signs of improvement.

Our financial condition, which was stated in last year's report to be as bad as possible, has very much improved,

as will appear from the statement below.

Angus.—At Angus the work is encouraging. Our numbers are not very large but they are increasing and are thoroughly in earnest, working heartily in the interest of the Church.

The Royal Pulp and Paper Company are erecting a large paper mill here and expect to have it in operation next Spring. We hope to derive considerable strength from this as the increase in population will be large.

The Ladies' Guild has been organized here and is doing

much good and faithful work.

A Sunday-School has also been opened, and though the attendance is not large, yet it is increasing. We commenced with ten scholars and now we have nearly double that number.

In teaching I am much indebted to Mr. Bottome, who takes charge of the school whenever I am absent, which is just half the time. I also have the assistance of Mr. Arthur

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Evans, who is now with me preparing for matriculation with a view to Holy Orders. When I arrived in Angus in May last I found a debt of \$1,300.00 upon the Parsonage, which was payable in five annual instalments. It being utterly impossible to meet these, 1, at the suggestion of the Church-Wardens, made a report to the Archdeacon of Quebec to this effect, and also that we should offer to exchange the l'arsonage for a smaller house and have the debt cancelled. The Archdeacon made this proposition to the Royal Pulp and Paper Co., which held the mortgage upon the Parsonage, and they agreed on condition that we paid them \$200.00 in exchange. This we accepted and immediately raised in Angus \$106.00 toward this amount. The result of the whole is that we have a house and lot adjoining the Church, less valuable than the other, but yet our own and a burden of \$1200.00 removed from the congregation.

All engagements with the Board have been promply met. The sound financial basis upon which this congregation now stands is in great measure due to the able and efficient wardens, Messrs. Charnock and Hillman, who have greatly

assisted me in all Church work.

Mrs. Wright and myself are also very much indebted to our kind friends of Angus and Westbury for the gift of a valuable sleigh which awaited us upon our arrival in

Angus.

As a sign of the spirit in which our people are now working, I may state that the young girls of my Sunday School have of their own accord organized a Guild among themselves and are working with all their young strength for the good of the Church.

Westbury.—St. Thomas' Church, Westbury, is situated about 1½ miles from the village of Angus. It was built before the village and Church of Angus were in existence

and hence their nearness to each other.

It would, however, be an immense advantage to the Church in this Mission if the two congregations were brought into one. Now both are weak and struggling; then we should have one Church well filled and well attended, we should also have the means necessary for its support. It would, too, give the incumbent time to do work which must now be left undone.

The interest in the Church's work is increasing and our congregation larger and more regular. All assessments

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have been promptly met, thanks to the hearty assistance

Mr. Wm. Tugman, Jr., my warden.

Ascot Corner.—Here too the work is progressing. During the Summer we have improved the appearance of our Church very much. New steps were built, the tower newly tinned, and the whole Church received two coats of paint. The money for this work was raised by the Ladies' Guild and the work done by the men of the congregation.

The assessments, though not very promptly, yet have all

been paid.

A Sunday-School has been organized here and is under the management of Mr. A. Bell and Miss I. Stacy, our organist.

Marriages, 1; Baptisms, 12; Burials, 4.

Assessment to Diocesan Board, \$180.00; Church and Parsonage improvements, \$169.00; Other Church purposes, \$17.00; Total, \$383.00.

## BARFORD.

The Rev. G. H. A. Murray reports:-

During the past year I have endeavoured, as far as lay in my power, to put the Church's teaching before the people in as plain and practical a manner as possible; and, on the whole, the results have not been unsatisfactory. It is very encouraging to see tangible proofs that the people are taking a deeper interest in the welfare of the Church. At every station in the Mission progress has been made in one way or another.

Dixville.—I have kept up Services regularly, at 10.30 A.M. and 7.30 P.M., every Sunday, also weekly Wednesday Evening Services. The congregation is slowly but steadily increasing, and the special offertories, compared with the financial condition of the congregation, have been fairly good.

The attendance at Sunday-School is small; but the scholars, especially those who study the Institute Leaflets, pay close attention to their lessons.

While on a visit to Dixville, Miss Racey gave me valuable assistance, not only in the Sunday-School, but also in other aspects of Mission work, for which she is pre-eminently adapted. Since last September I have been fortunate in securing the services of Miss Willey, teacher of the advanced grade of the village school. She does good work with the little ones.

On the 28rd of last December we had a Christmas Tree, for the entertainment of the children, in Martin's Hall. It was the means of bringing together a good number of both old and young, all of whom enjoyed themselves. A collection was taken up to form the nucleus of a Library Fund, which has since been increased by individual subscriptions, together with \$6.10 raised by Mrs. Thos. Grady, and \$2.50 raised by Messrs Henry Cowhard and Albert Damon, jr., so that, through the kindness of the Archdeacon, who added \$5 more, we have been enabled to procure a nice lot of S. P. C. K. books for the children's use.

During Holy Week I had a short Service with consecutive addresses on the last scenes in Our Lord's earthly ministry every evening, as well as Morning Service and Sermon on Wednesday—Annunciation of the B. V. M.—and Good Friday. While the attendance was not so good as it might have been, still it was better than I had expected; and the most encouraging part was, that several members of the congregation were present every evening, and

showed signs of deep reverence and devotion.

Last September, Mrs Murray got the young girls of the congregation together and formed a Guild, which is now doing good work and bids fair to be a useful adjunct in promoting among them a greater interest in Missionary work. I hope soon to be able to organize a similar society for the married women.

The Church-Wardens, Messrs. Gill and Grady, have discharged their duties faithfully; so has Miss Johnson, who has been punctual at her post as organist since last Easter.

St. Lawrence.—Services have been kept up fortnightly, at 2.30 P.M. on Sundays, in addition to which I have had two celebrations of the Holy Communion, one on Ascension, the other on St. Luke's Day. The congregation here is made up principally of Dr. Ward's household, through whose liberality the assessment is raised and the Church kept up. One side of the roof of the Church was shingled last Summer; but there is need of a good many other repairs in order to make it at all comfortable in Winter.

Stanhope.—In my last report I spoke of the desirability of having weekly instead of fortnightly Services here; and, I am thankful to say that, through the kindness of the Diocesan Board in granting \$100, and \$33 raised by the people themselves, I have been enabled to secure the services of Mr. Bishop, student of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, who,

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on account of failing eye-sight, was obliged to leave the College for a time. He began work in the Mission on March 15, from which time to the present, in addition to the usual fortnightly Service at 4 P.M., Mr. Bishop has Morning and Evening Service and Sunday-School on the alternate Sundays. I was also enabled during the Summer months to have Service with Scripture reading and instruction every Friday evening. The extra Services have been the means of keeping together the few Church people who are here, and, I trust, deepening their interest in Holy The woo !-work of the interior of the Church was varnished and the steeple was painted last October, at a cost of about \$37, which amount was promptly paid. Later on I invested \$13.50 (\$11 of which were collected last year) in two Chancel chairs, which, together with the improvement mentioned above, add much to the beauty of the little Church. Messrs. S. A. Baldwin, Nelson and Young have each taken an interest in the work; the first, though now Warden of this Church, still contributes liberally to Dixville as well. The progress of the Church in this place is much hindered, owing to the fluctuating population. To-day there is a Church family; to-morrow one is likely to find a French Roman Catholic one in its place.

There is a small settlement in Barnston, about three miles from here, where Services were kept up fortnightly on Thursday evening a good part of the Summer. I tried to start a Sunday-School, but could get no one to take charge of it. The people are poor, and some of the children are growing up in ignorance of every thing that is good. Meantime, I take advantage of every available opportunity to

instruct them.

Perryboro'.—My last year's anticipation with regard to this place has been fully realized. Now, instead of the old school-house, where for some lifteen years a hearty congregation met together for Divine worship, we have a comfortable and substantial Church, 18 x 30, ready for use, which will, I trust, be consecrated long before this Report appears in print. I cannot tell the exact cost, as I have not received all the bills, and a good deal of the work was done by the people; but it will probably be not far from \$600. When I broached the subject to the people, I was discouraged by a few; however, I called a meeting to talk the matter over, and the result was, that every one present agreed to help by contributing lumber or doing work. In

this way about \$200 were promised, nearly all of which has been paid. In addition to this amount, together with the Church Society's Grant of \$100 and the S. P. C. K. Grant of £20, kind friends of the Church in Quebec and elsewhere have contributed about \$300; so that the amount raised will cover the cost of the building and perhaps leave a little margin for necessary furnishings. The supervision of the work entailed a great deal of driving, Perryboro' being ten miles from the Parsonage; but any extra work that I have had to do has been well repaid by the zeal evinced by the people. During the six months Mr. Bishop was with me Perryboro' was served weekly instead of fortnightly.

The women of the congregation, of their own accord, have formed a flourishing Guild, which already has done

considerable work.

The 13th of September was one of the happiest days in my ministerial life; for on that day I admitted into Christ's Church, through the gate of Holy Baptism, five adults, two of whom drove from Stanhope—a distance of fourteen miles—through the rain.

There will be seven or eight candidates for confirmation when the Church is consecrated, five of whom are adults

and have been brought up outside of the Church.

Mr. Nish and Mrs. Birch conducted a Sunday-School during the Summer months; but, as the children are scattered and the roads bad, it is scarcely practicable to get them together in the Winter. Meantime, when I can spare a few minutes after the second lesson, I spend them in catechising.

Miss Bryan and Miss Walker still take charge of the

singing.

Averill, Vt.—Mr. Washer used to give the people here occasional Services; but, owing to pressure of work on Canadian soil, he was forced to discontinue them, notwith-standing the fact, that the settlement is made up principally of Canadians who obtain employment in the mills, and on account of the United States labour law are obliged to reside on that side of the line. I visited this place and held my first Service in February, and was so encouraged that I decided to carry on regular work as soon as I could get some one to assist me. Accordingly, from the time Mr. Bishop came to the Mission last March to the present, fortnightly Services have been kept up regularly on Sundays, and, with a few exceptions, on Wednesday evenings. One of the first things we did was to start a Sunday-School, which

has proved to be a great blessing to the children who, up to that time, had no public religious instruction on Sunday. Mr. Bishop takes charge of it the Sundays he is at Averill. Mrs. Holmes gave valuable assistance for a time, but illness obliged her to give it up. Her place was filled by Mrs. LaRoche, who, though not a churchwoman, still takes a great interest in the welfare of the S. S. Miss Ames has discharged her duties as teacher in an admirable manner, so did Miss Wiggett during the short time she was at home, and now Miss Smith is doing good work in her place. The people collected money and bought a new organ for use in the school-house. Mr. Wheeler got us a grant of Prayer Books and Hymnals from the American Prayer Book Society. The Services are now as hearty, and the congregation as reverent as could be reasonably expected under the circums-There are eight candidates in preparation for confirmation at an early date. I have baptized eight children, some of whom were ten or eleven years old. By means of socials from house to house about \$8 have been raised towards procuring a S. S. library.

Hereford.—Previous to last March no Church of England Services were held here for the last three or four years; the congregationalists, however, took possession of the Church

without leave during the Summer of 1890.

Mr. Bishop, acting under my instruction, commenced regular fortnightly Services on the 22nd March which were maintained till the College opened in September. The congregation was small at first, but gradually increased from ten to fifty. I reported the state of things to the Archdeacon, who made a visit through the settlement with me, and, after ascertaining the minds of the people on the subject, decided to continue the Services fortnightly from the College.

Hall's Stream and Beecher Falls, Vt.—Services began at Hall's Stream school-house on the same day as at Hereford; but owing to the increasing number of "meetings" on the same Sunday, planned with a view to disturb us, being offered the free use of a hall at Beecher Falls, I decided to hold Service there instead. On some occasions there was a fair congregation, and there are a few who now join in the Service heartily. Some of the most influential men would like to have an English Church built somewhere near the boundary line.

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One which During the year the members of the different congregations have been encouraged and edified by sermons from Ven. Archdeacon Roe, and Revds. Principal Adams, Canon Foster, Canon Thorneloe, J. M. Thompson, and A. H. Wheeler, of Island Pond, Vermont. The Archdeacon also delivered an interesting and instructive Missionary address.

Mr. Bishop's services were both helpful to me and accept-

able to the people.

I have to thank Mrs. Williams for a bag of clothing, &c.,

for the poor of the Mission.

I have also to thank Mr. George Ward for his assistance

from time to time.

# BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. Thos. Adams reports:—

The Christian year which ended November 28th, 1891, has been marked by unexpected vicissitudes, but yet we have much cause for thankfulness.

The Chapel Services were continued in their integrity until the 5th February, 1891, on which day the Chapel was destroyed by fire at the same time as the School Building and the School Rectory. No change has been made in the number and frequency of the services. Daily Morning and Evening Prayer have been continued in the College Library. Celebrations of the Holy Communion are held by the kind permission of the Rev. Professor Scarth in St. George's Church at 7½ A.M. on the 2nd, 4th and 5th Sundays of the month, and on every Saint's Day at 74 A.M. On the 1st and 3rd Sundays in the month the celebrations at the 10.45 Service have served for both Parish and College, at the Sunday Morning and Evening Prayer the College has regularly joined the Parish Congregation. Prof Scarth kindly arranged that one of the two Sunday Services should be preached by himself as Rector, the other being taken by other members of the College staff in turn. Our cordial thanks are due to Prof Scarth for his thoughtful kindness to us, so that while we long to see our own beautiful Chapel restored we have as a body been made to feel thoroughly at home in our Parish Church.

During the Michaelmas Term the boys of the school have attended a special Service in the Dining Hall every Sunday

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evening at 7 o'clock. Ordinary Evening Prayer is used with hymns and an address is given by the Principal as Chaplain of the School.

During Lent a short additional Service was held for the College in the Library at 7.45 lasting till 8 A.M. Brief meditations were read at some of these Services, especially some from Canon Newbolt's addresses on the "Fruits of the Spirit."

The meetings of the Brotherhood of Lay Readers have gone on regularly every Friday afternoon. The Warden will report the work of the brotherhood during the year.

It is the earnest wish and prayer of those in authority here that our Students may receive spiritual nourishment as well as mental training during their residence here, and that they may be duly prepared not only for the position of the special ministry of the word and sacraments but also that those who are not candidates for the sacred ministry should by their life and habits here be prepared for the position of Godly laymen, active spiritual workers in and for God's Holy Church. May we all value our frequent and regular spiritual privileges here!

The College Missionary Union has held its meetings once a Term as usual. Lent Term, on March 5th, preacher and reader the Rev. T. Blaylock, M.A. Student's paper by Mr. H. A. Brooke, B.A. Special offertory of \$4.81 taken for the Corean Mission. For the Trinity Term the day was held on May 23rd, celebration on each occasion at St. George's

Church at 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> A.M.

Preacher: The Rev. Professor Watkins, M.A. Reader: The Rev. A. H. Robertson, L. S. T., of Cookshire, who read an interesting and suggestive page on "Mackay of Uganda."

In the Michaelmas Term all arrangements are made for November 30th, St. Andrew's Day. Sermon and Paper by the Rev. George Abbott Smith, B.A., of St. James the Apostle, Montreal. On each occasion we have had the help and words of one of our old Students, who cheer as by their return and by the no uncertain sound with which they speak to us of our Missionary duties and privileges. It is our hope to send out in greater numbers men with the true Missionary spirit.

Several of our Students have been ordained during the

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The Rev. G. J. Sütherland, B.A., advanced to the priest-

hood (Dio. Quebec), working in Labrador.

To the Diaconate: D. T. Clayton, B.A., (Dio. Ontario) in charge of Bearbrook, Ont.; H. E. Wright, B.A., East Angus, (Dio. Quebec); H. Dickson, B.A., Ranborough, (Dio. Quebec); B. G. Wilkinson, B.A., spending a year at the Lincoln Theological College in preparation for a post in Bishop's College under the authority of the Bishop of Quebec; G. F. Hibbard, B.A., (Dio. Toronto), working at Port Hope, Ontario.

The school is as before divided into three classes:—

(1.) Communicants' Class.—Instruction in Prayer Book, Church Principles and the Spiritual Life, with periodic pre-

paration for Holy Communion.

(2.) Confirmation Class.—This, for the session ending June 30th, 189!, contained 23 boys, who were confirmed by the Lord Bishop in June. The Rev. Prof. Allnatt, D.D., very kindly took this class for the Rector, and gave to it a large amount of most careful attention and instruction. The preparation began in October, 1890, and was continued in classes held for the most part twice a week throughout the whole of the interval from October till June. It is wished that the time of preparation should be as ample as possible.

(3.) Preliminary Class.—Catechism with instruction on the successive spiritual lessons of the Christian year. The general interest in their Sunday-School lessons has been

very pleasing.

The Financial Report is necessarily imperfect: any amounts to Church Society are included in Lennoxville Parish returns.

Very considerable help has come to us from without during the year, viz., nearly \$2,000 for Divinity House, of which \$400 is from this Deanery; for restorations of Chapel, \$1,600; from this Deanery, \$550; for rebuilding of School about \$12,000, of which at least \$3,500 comes from this Deanery; in other words this Deanery has contributed

close on \$4,500 towards the special needs of Bishop's College, towards the total of nearly \$16,000. This, in addition to Trin. Sunday Collections. This total would make a considerable increase in the District returns for extra parochial objects.

During the year the Principal has preached in Sherbrooke, Coaticooke, Stanstead, Dixville, Compton, Richmond, Que-

bec, Montreal and Lachine.

## BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports: -

Last May we had a visit from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. I had notice some time before of his coming, and had been preparing candidates, sometimes by the help of others. It is a difficult matter to get the candidates instructed, and often we cannot go beyond the Catechism and Confirmation Service, and these become the germ of religious knowledge to which all other is added. Twenty-five candidates were confirmed. We were much encouraged by

His Lordship's visit.

The Summer brought as usual visitors to the beautiful Lake St. Joseph and soon a letter came for me to go and renew the Services there. The authorities of the Lake St. John Ry. kmdly arranged the usual facilities, and the hand car and steamboat conveyed me to and across the Lake to the place of Service. This is well attended by the visitors, who are of different denominations, but who seem to appreciate our Services. There is a piano instead of an organ, and at this Mrs. C. Scott kindly presided. When the visitors departed, they left behind them many pleasant and grateful recollections to cheer us in our work. After they had gone Mr. J. Winfield remitted to me \$16.75, the balance of the Offertory, "as a gift for my own use."

We had two musical entertainments at the Parsonage during the year in order to obtain funds for Church purposes. The first took place last Winter, the performers were residents of Bourg Louis and St Raymond, who did their parts well. At the second were two contingents, one from Bourg Louis and St. Raymond prepared by Principal Hewton, the second consisting of performers from Lake St. Joseph, who had been prepared by that efficient Church worker Mrs. J. Winfield, of Quebec. These contingents combined gave such an entertainment as Bourg Louis had not seen before

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A special train carried our kind visitors away. From this entertainment we realized \$33.50. From that of the Winter we realized \$18.00. Then Mrs. Shakespear, the Seigneuress, sent another \$20.00 when she read an account of the last. Thus altogether from these entertainments we realized \$71.50.

I have three Services each Sunday, two in the Church, and (when I do not go to Lake St. Joseph) one in the afternoon, either at St. Raymond or at Pointe Basse. These Services are well attended. The Evening Service in the Church was the poorest, but even that has been better attended lately.

We had a most pleasant visit from the Venerable Archdeacon Roe at the end of the Summer. He said he had come "to help" me. His action seconded his words, and we hope to see him again on the same cheering errand. It

does help one.

Another visitor who has been here, and whom we hope to see again, is Miss Montizambert, from the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Two branches have been inaugurated here under Mrs. Debbage. The two branches together have thirty-five members.

I am thankful to say the Parsonage is now dry and comfortable inside Thanks to Mr. T. Sissons and others

more work was done to it this Fall.

We were going to build a new fence, three acres long, in front of the Parsonage, but could not get out posts in

time. We have the boards, &c., ready.

My financial statement amounts to less this year than last, although more has been made up in the Mission this year. A large part of what was accounted for in my last report had been collected in Quebec by my predecessor the Rev. H. C. Stuart.

## WINDSOR AND BROMPTON.

The Rev. J. C. Cox reports:—

In some respects, this has been a year of more than ordinary effort and activity in this Mission. This remark applies more, perhaps, to the outward and visible, than to the in-

ward and spiritual; the former, however, is important and

necessary, as well as the latter.

The event, I may say, of chief importance, both as regards the Incumbent, and his people, is the completion of the very comfortable and substantial Parsonage House; so long talked cf in this Mission, but now, an accomplished fact. The foundation only, was completed last Autumn; and the work of building was resumed in the Spring. In the month of August, (the inside being finished) it was thought desirable that I should occupy it at once; and thus save my people any further expense, in the way of house rent.

Later on, a contract was given for the completion of the outside; the work on which, as well as that within, being

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well and thoroughly done.

Mr. N. A. Knapp, who drew the plans, and who has taken the principal oversight of the building, deserves much praise, for the interest he has taken in it, from the first; although, for a while, unable, through ill-health, to attend to it. Timber for the frame, both for the house and stable, was furnished by the Brompton people; while the people of Windsor contributed money, and some voluntary labor; the latter being given, more especially, in the construction of the stable, now in process of erection. In order to meet the cost of these buildings, it was found to be absolutely necessary, in a weak Mission like this, that considerable outside aid be obtained. The unpleasant task of soliciting this external aid, unfortunately fell, as is often the case, to the lot of the elergyman.

To this end, the cities of Sherbrooke, Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa, as well as the towns of Lennoxville and Richmond, have been successively, and, I may add for the most part, successfully canvassed; both by myself, and to some extent by my worthy predecessor, the Rev. Mr. Ball.

Though it may be considered to be a little too costly building for the Mission, yet it must be regarded, I think, as one of the most convenient and well built Parsonages in

the Diocese.

In June, the Lord Bishop came to us. During his stay, his Lordship consecrated the small Church at Hardwood Hill, confirmed seven candidates at St. George's Church, Windsor Mills, and eight at Christ Church, Brompton. The Bishop's visit was much appreciated, and it will not I am sure, be soon forgotten.

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tay, ood rch, The am For several reasons, the fortnightly Service at Brompton Falls was discontinued. Those few who attended my Service at that place, now for the most part, avail themselves of Canon Thorneloe's Services, at the Orford School-House, which is not over two miles distant.

At Christ Church, Brompton, a Service is held regularly once on each Sunday, preceded by the Sunday-School, which latter continues to prosper under the supervision of Mrs. Alfred Knapp, assisted by Mrs. Geo. Ward and Mr. Wm. Addison.

A small, though very enjoyable pic-nic, was held at Brompton this Autumn, on the summit of one of the high hills in the neighborhood; the afternoon was favorable, and from this elevation, the view of the St. Francis was charming, while the children, with their teachers, mothers and pastor, did justice to the contents of the baskets.

The ladies of this Congregation meet once a fortnight, from house to house, for a social afternoon, at which tea is served; each one contributing a small sum towards some Church object. They have also, at these meetings, done knitting for the Dorcas Department of Domestic Missions. At Christmas, the Incumbent was presented with a valuable fur coat, by the ladies of Windsor Mills. My supply of fuel for the year, has been donated by Mr. G. Stevens, the senior Church-Warden, who also furnishes the fuel, gratis, for the Church.

The St. George's Choir, though not always as harmonious as it should be, yet it has enjoyed the advantage of being instructed and trained by Mrs. James Stevens, a lady of superior musical ability and qualification.

On the 8th of October a special Thanksgiving Service was held in St. George's Church, which was very beautifully and appropriately decorated for the occasion. The subdeanery meeting being held here at the same time, gave opportunity for several of the neighboring Clergy to be present, and to participate in our delightful Service.

After the Thanksgiving Service, a good number of those present repaired to the new Parsonage near by, where a bountiful supper was in readiness.

The evening was enlivened by some good music, and by an address from one of the visiting Clergy.

On the 18th of November, a very successful musical and dramatic entertainment in aid of the Parsonage Fund was

held in the Foresters' Hall, Windsor Mills. For the getting up of this entertainment, we are indebted to a few of the ladies connected with St. George's Church, of whom Mrs. Jas. Stevens and Mrs. Porteous took a prominent part. The latter, we regret to add, has since left the place, to join her husband in New Brunswick. I must not omit to mention the gratitude we owe to our friends of Richmond and Melbourne, who, on this occasion, so ably contributed

towards making our entertainment a success.

The Lay Reader, Mr. A. A. Briggs, continues to officiate, acceptably, at St. George's Church, on each alternate Sunday morning. In addition to this duty, Mr. Briggs has been recently elected to fill the office of Church-Warden, in place of Mr. D. Kelly, who resigned his position, before leaving this place, to obtain employment in Ontario. We were very sorry to part with Mr. Kelly, whose absence, however, proved to be only temporary, having since return-This report would not, I think, be complete, without making some further allusion to those kind friends who so generously contributed towards our Parsonage Fund. Out of so large a number of contributors, outside the Mission, it must suffice to mention here, the following names: Dr. Heneker, Miss G. Shortt, M. A. Elkins and G. F. Bowen, Esquires, Sherbrooke; R. and J. Hamilton, Esquires, Miss Walker, Mrs. A. Laurie and the Lord Bishop, Quebec. Mr. Robt. Hamilton's generous subscription of fifty dollars (\$50) was a most acceptable gift. A few more such would free our Mission from debt.

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The Warden submits the following report of work done during the year 1891:—

I. The following Missions or Stations have been placed under sole charge of Readers; the Reader being in each case resident on the spot during such part of the term of service as fell in the vacation,—at other times serving the place from the College:—

Lake Megantic (with Ditchfield) was served by J. N Kerr, B.A., from November, 1890, until 21st June, 1891. From that time until the present date it has been served by Mr. N. M. Bayne, B.A.

Scotstown has been served by Mr. C. E. Bishop from December, 1890, till 8th March, 1891; and from that time successively (and continuously) by Mr. W. T. Lipton, B.A., Rev. G. J. Sutherland, Mr. W. Barton, and J. N. Kerr, B.A.

The station of *Canterbury*, in the Parish of Bury, has been served three times a month by the Reader of Scotstown.

St. Sylvester, with its various stations, was served by Mr. W. T. Lipton, B.A., from 28th June till 23rd August.

Lake Beauport was served by Mr. E. Clare Avery from 28th June till 13th September.

II. Regular assistance has been given to the Clergy, with the effect of enabling them to extend their field of operation, and increase the number of their Services, as follows:—

Stanstead (Rev. W. T. Forsyth) by Mr. H. A. Brooke, B.A., with occasional assistance from other Readers,—the work extending continuously from the beginning of February to the present date, and distributed over six different stations, not including week-day stations.

Dixville (Rev. G. H. A. Murray, B.A.,) Mr. C. E. Bishop, who was prevented from continuing his college duties by an affection of the eyes, took up his residence in this Parish from March until September, 1891, and worked regularly under Mr. Murray's direction. Resuming his residence in College this term, he still pays fortnightly visits to the Parish of Dixville; and of late Mr. Barton (another Reader) has been added to the Dixville staff, and goes there every alternative Sunday. In consequence of this aid, Mr. Murray has been enabled to re-open the Mission of Hereford, which has long been closed. Mr. Bishop has officiated (on different Sundays) at no fewer than seven stations, one of them being across the American border.

Bury (Rev. H. S. Fuller) at the station of Canterbury, as above described.

Milby (Rev. Professor Searth), served by Mr. II. A. Brooke, B.A., and other Readers.

III. Occasional aid was given at the call of Parish Clergy,

at the following places:

Sand Hill (Rev. A. H. Robertson) by Mr. N. M. Bayne, on 22nd March,—Angus (Rev. H. Wright) by Mr. W. T. Lipton on 23rd May,—Way's Mills (Rev. J. Eames) by Mr. R. H. Archer, from June 28th to July 12th, and November, 8th—Compton (Rev. G. H. Parker) by Mr. R. H. Archer, Halley (Rev. A. Stevens) by Mr. Archer, October 18th.

IV. Outside the Diocese.-Mr. J. N. Kerr officiated at Coteau Landing in place of the Rev. T. A. Young, since deceased, then in his last illness—during portion of the Assistance has also been given at Summer holidays. Beecher Falls, in the Diocese of Vermont, as described above. Through the influence of the Archdeacon the Brotherhood has enjoyed the great advantage of sending two of its members, Messrs. J. N. Kerr, B.A., and E. K. Wilson, B.A., to the Summer School of Elocution at the Thousand Islands, during the Summer holidays, with advantage to themselves, and, it The Brotherhood at is hoped, to their brethren also. present consists of the following members:—J. Barton; its numbers having been diminished by the Ordination of three of its members to the Diaconate in June last, namely, B. C. Wilkinson, B.A., H. E. Wright, B.A., and H. A. Dickson, B.A.

## CACOUNA.

The Church-Wardens report:

The Church of St. James the Apostle was opened for Divine Service on Sunday, the 28th of June, 1891, the Rev. R. H. Cole officiating. Mr. Cole kindly took charge and continued the Services until the 11th of July, when the Rev. F. G. Scott, Rector of Drummondville, the Chaplain appointed for the month of July (and who had been unable, owing to illness in his family, to arrive sooner), assumed charge.

The Rev. G. H. Parker, Rector of Compton, performed

the duties of Chaplain for the month of August.

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The Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Niagara, with his usual kindness, assisted at several Services, and Canon Mulock gave his willing help regularly throughout the season. The attendance at the daily Services was very good, the average being twenty.

The collections were: - At ordinary Services, \$303.58; For Mission Funda \$568.89; For Pension Fund, \$80.35.—Total, \$952.82.

## CAPE COVE AND PERCÉ.

The Rev. W. G. Lyster reports:—

I regret my inability to recall, for the purpose of my annual report, a single incident of exceptional interest, as having occurred during the past year, which, even for this very quiet and remote Mission, has been very specially uneventful.

It is unnecessary to say that our Sunday-Schools, with fair average attendance, were open as usual, and that the Services of the Church were regularly held and well attended

At Cape Cove, seventy-five communicants were present last Easter: fifty on Christmas day. At Percé, the largest number of communicants present at one time was twentyone.

It will be seen that contributions for Church purposes have kept up to the mark, though both congregations have lost some of their members by death and emigration, and are, in fact, numerically weaker than they have been since my arrival here, twenty-nine years ago.

Mr. Geo. Gaudin, Lay Reader at Cape Cove, and Mr. E. Tuzo, acting Lay Reader at Percé, have both officiated on several occasions, where I have been necessarily absent

from the Churches.

Their services are highly appreciated by the people as

well as by myself.

The neat little Church at Percé was tastefully decorated for Christmas by Mr. Tuzo and some other friends, who do not grudge time and trouble expended in such congenial work.

Only one of our daily schools—No. 1, under Miss Dumaresq—was qualified to apply for the Society's grant during the year, though schools Nos. 2 and 3 were also open, but

for short periods and in charge of young girls unprovided with the diploma.

Percé school was also in operation during a portion of the

year.

#### COATICOOK.

The Rev. Canon Foster reports:—

The work of the Church in this Parish had been carried on without any interruption during the current year. The usual Sunday Services with two weekly Services during Lent, and daily Service during Holy Week at both Churches, have been kept up with unfailing regularity.

I have three Services, with sermons, every Sunday, two at the Parish Church, and one at Christ Church, North Coaticook, with monthly celebrations of the Holy Commu-

nion at the Parish Church.

The Services are not so well attended, especially in the morning, as they ought to be.

The two Sunday Schools of the Parish are very well

attended.

In that of the Parish Church I teach a class myself every Sunday.

I catechise as often as possible; but I find it very difficult to conduct three Services with sermons, and to catechise for even twenty minutes on any one day.

I am thoroughly persuaded if we had more catechising and less preaching the Church would be much benefitted

by the change.

This change, however, I suppose we shall not be able to make until our people become more educated up to the conviction that worship, bright, hearty, and reverential, such as our Service is capable of, when well rendered, and not merely hearing of sermons, however eloquent, is the real object of Church going.

St. Stephen's Church was painted, and blinds placed around the bell, in the tower, during the Summer. The Ladies' Guild contributed \$70.87 towards the cost of these

necessary repairs.

<sup>\*</sup> The whole of the Cape Cove pew rent is now required to make up assessment for Diocesan Board.

A Bishop's chair and fair linen for the altar were also provided by means of subscriptions from a few friends outside of the Parish.

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The Rectory was re-shingled, and double windows were provided for the Sexton's house, during the year. Mrs. Fiske and Mrs. Fraser kindly undertook to raise the necessary funds for these repairs, which amounted to about \$184.00. These ladies made a thorough canvas of the Parish, and succeeded in collecting even a little more than the amount required. They have the best thanks of the Parish for the time and trouble they so cheerfully gave to this work.

The roof of the horse-shed at the North-End Church has been covered with felling at a cost of about \$20,00, one-half of which amount is still due, but which will be paid off during the coming season.

The Cotton factory, which is now the property of the Dominion Cotton Company, is running on full time, and gives employment to a few Church people at the North-End of the Parish.

I have to thank the Wardens of both Churches for their unvarying kindness and co-operation in all Church work.

#### COMPTON.

# The Rev. G. H. Parker reports:-

St. James.—There is little of an unusual nature to report from this Parish. The Services in the Church and Schoolhouses have been carried on as usual. The Sunday-Schools have been conducted by Mrs. Sharples, the Misses Cochrane and Miss Parker. We are unhappily about to lose Mrs. Sharples, and her departure will be sincerely regretted by the whole community, for since she came amongst us she has been active in all good works and endeared herself to all.

In Lent the Rev. I. M. Thempson conducted a series of Mission Services, which were well attended, and were, we believe, helpful to the Parish.

In June, the Bishop of the Diocese visited the Parish and confirmed sixteen candidates.

The Ladies' College continues to prosper and to gain public confidence. There are at present thirty-nine pupils, twenty-nine boarders and ten day scholars with a prospect of an increase after Christmas.

# DANVILLE.

The Rev. Thomas Blaylock reports:

The usual Church work has been kept up without intermission throughout the year. On account of the development of the Jeffrey Asbestos Mines, which now employ 125 men, I have commenced fortnightly Services, each alternate Wednesday evening, in the School-house, with fair attendance. It is too early as yet to speak of results, as the work is entirely missionary in character, yet already one young man has been come forward to be prepared for baptism. The Services seem to be appreciated. The singing and responding hearty, and I have every reason to expect good result.

At Lorne, last year, I was able to report increased attendance. This increase, I am happy to say, has proved permanent, and the congregations are now larger than ever before, the Church sometimes being inconveniently crowded. Miss Mills has continued to give her service at the organ and also collected the money for a new surplice, &c. The horseshed has also been repaired.

Good Sunday-Schools have been kept up in all three Churches; that in Troutbrook being the most flourishing under the superintendence of Mr. Jno. Wilson, who is most devoted in his work.

A good library of 100 volumes has been procured for Danville, which, we hope to increase very shortly to 500 volumes, and thus have a general library for the whole Parish.

On account of an outbreak of diphtheria, the number of deaths have been nearly double the average.

The Church of Danville has been put into thorough repair and the bricks in the tower repointed.

Galvanized iron pipes have been laid to bring water into the Parsonage at considerable expense.

The ladies of St. Augustine's Church Guild have been untiring in their devotion to the Church interests, and have

proved her efficient handmaid in all good works.

Notwithstanding the increased assessment required by the Board, the amount raised for outside objects is larger than ever before, having this year reached the sum of \$147.24, of which \$73.80 went to the Foreign and Domestic Missionary Society. All the Church-Wardens have done their duty faithfully, and have punctually remitted all assessments due the Diocesan Board.

The Rev. F. G. Scott reports.—

Thanks to the exertions of kind friends without and within the Parish, enough money has been raised to finish off the Rectory, which has been clapboarded, painted, roofed and drained, and generally put into thorough repair. Next year we hope to finish off the interior of the walls and roof of the chancel.

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#### DURHAM.

The Rev. D. Horner reports:--

I am glad to be able to report that Divine Service has been conducted on Sunday and the greater Festivals in each Church without intermission, with the usual monthly celebrations, except on two occasions at South Durham, when Holy Communion was withheld owing to lack of communicants. Most of the Saints' Days were kept in Kirkdale and Lenten Services held, but the attemps made in the latter respect at South Durham and L'Avenir were unsucessful, possibly because of the state of the roads at that season.

I must express my gratefulness for the unvarying kindness shewn to me and mine by the parishioners at Kirkdale, and also those who in this and other parts of the Parish helped me on my journeys, when "a stranger in a strange land." The following gentlemen kindly took me from place to place until about the month of March: from Kirkdale, Messrs, Stevens, Hall, Thompson, Trenholm, W. G. Lyster and W. H. Lyster; from L'Avenir, Messrs. Doyle, Atkinson and Mountain; from South Durham, Messrs. Alex. Johnston and Son, Arthur Johnston and Son and Mr. McCrae.

The Sunday-Schools have been conducted by Mrs. Trenholm and Miss Stevens at Kirkdale, Mr. Board at

L'Avenir and Mr. Ben Dowd at South Durham.

Five concerts have been held during the year: three at L'Avenir, one at Ulverton and one at Kirkdale. Although the weather in each case was unfavourable, the attendance was not small. The proceeds were devoted: two to the Parsonage, one to the Kirkdale Church, and two to pay a long standing debt of the congregation of L'Avenir.

A pretty lamp has been bought and placed in the Church

at Kirkdale.

"A Women's Auxiliary" has just been formed at South Durham. The society intend holding a Social on the 10th December, to raise funds for present needs.

I must thank the Misses Johnston, Candlish and Trenholm, for their efficient work as organists in the various Churches.

We were sorry to lose the services of our organist and Sunday-School teacher, Miss Stevens, whose very creditable help added materially to the success of the Sunday Service. A considerable number of friends and well-wishers were present at the marriage ceremony, although it was conducted at 1 pre in

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at seven o'clock in the morning, and among her wedding presents was a sum of money from some of the congregation in appreciation of her services as organist at Kirkdale.

## EATON.

The Rev. Alex. H. Robertson reports:-

My first year in this Parish has been one of quiet work

and progress.

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St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—Services have been kept up as usual. Morning and Evening Prayer on every Sunday. Holy Communion on first Sunday of every month, and on chief Festivals and all the Saints' Days throughout the year. A Bible Class was held at the Rectory last Winter, with a rather small attendance. During the Summer we had a visit from the Lord Bishop, when nine candidates were confirmed. At our Harvest Thanksgiving Service this Autumn, Rev. Canon Thorneloe kindly preached for us, and we had full Choral Service, which was very well rendered.

The Sunday-School is well carried on by a staff of five faithful efficient teachers. "The Bishop Doane series of Catechisms" have been adopted for most of the classes.

The Guild and Women's Auxiliary have met regularly during the year. There is a growing interest in Missions, which was stimulated by the W. A. Conference at Lennox-ville. Seven of our members attended the conference, which marks an era in the history of Mission work in this District.

Girls' Friendly Society.—This excellent and useful society is doing quiet but faithful work under the presidency of Mrs. Trigge. The society held its usual sale of work during the Summer, and have now about \$60 in the Bank to be applied towards a Church Hall, just as soon as that much needed addition to our Parish buildings is commenced.

Mrs. Trigge has also a Candidates' Branch of the G. F. S. for the little girls, which interests the juniors in Church work.

I would call the attention of all interested in such work to the excellent and very cheap literature published under the supervision of the G. F. Society. Better books for

Parish distribution cannot be found.

Our financial affairs are in a healthy condition. Assessments paid promptly. Various old standing debts have been paid off, and I am confident that at next Easter we shall have all debts paid and a balance in hand. Our thanks are due to Messrs. John Cook and Urquhart, the Church-Wardens. Our Church property is all in good repair, and the Parsonage is both warm and in good sanitary condition in every way. We need a good Church Hall in this Parish, and hope to begin it next Summer. Something has already been subscribed, and with the kind assistance of the Ladies' Guild and the Girls' Friendly Society, I feel sure that we will have a Hall worthy of this large and growing Parish. I regret to say that we have lost by death some of our most useful and earnest members, and their loss is severely felt by us.

St. Luke's Church, Sandhill.—The usual fortnightly Services have been carried on without interruption. The Ladies' Guild and others finished the painting of the Church,

which is now in very good order.

The Lord Bishop held a Confirmation Service here in

June, and confirmed seven candidates.

Our congregation joined with the rest of the people of the District to enlarge and improve the Cemetery, putting up an excellent fence, and improving the grounds. At the request of the Trustees, the Lord Bishop kindly consented to consecrate the ground, and the interesting Service was joined in not only by our own Church people but by those from other Christian bodies, and all were greatly impressed.

Miss Racey, who has so faithfully and earnestly helped in the Sunday-School here, is leaving, to devote herself to Missionary work, and we offer her our warmest thanks for all the good she has accomplished amongst the boys in the

Sunday-School.

Johnville.—The Service here is held fortnightly in a Hall built and used exclusively for religious purposes. The Hall is fitted up very nicely with Oxford benches, is finished in hardwood, and nicely carpeted and lighted. The Services

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here are very well attended by those who do not belong to our Church, and I wish that it were possible to give a weekly Service both here and at Sandhill. Sunday-School is held weekly in the Hall, with Mr. Oakes and his family as teachers. The Ladies' Guild here is prosperous and diligent, and are always at work to improve our Hall and help in every way.

#### FRAMPTON.

The Rev. Felix Boyle reports:-

In an old Mission like this, the ordinary routine of work is so similar day after day, month after month, and year after year, that it leaves one little new to relate; so that what I said in my last report, with regard to my several appointments, and for attendance of my people at Church, I may repeat again this year. My Church Services have been, all things considered, well attended; and I am proud again to state that I have not missed one Service. Now, no man can reasonably expect to serve these four Churches punctually, as I have done, without subjecting himself and his steed to pretty rough treatment from the weather and roads at times.

I have been carried through rough roads and weather and am grateful to say I do not feel much the worse for it to-day. But am sorry to say I cannot say the same of my once old faithful friend and horse. For in April last, after a hard drive to reach one of my most distant stations (Cranbourne), my horse took sick, and after suffering untold agony for about fourteen or fifteen hours died. I must confess that I was so much attached, perhaps sinfully attached, to the animal on account of his ability and fidelity, that I really mourned over the separation, which seemed like a part of myself gone. This grief was soon turned into joy, for it tried the hearts of my people, and that too without any hints from me, and they were not wanting, for before ten days had ended my kind Parishioners presented me with a present of over one hundred dollars to be expended towards the purchase of another horse. I will not say that I did not value the money so timely

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presented to me. I did value their liberal gift, for which I thank them again in this report. But this much I must say, the money however dear to me, sinks into nothing compared with the paramount importance of the kindly evidence evinced towards me and mine. I may here state, before closing this report, in addition to my regular Services as appointed by my Bishop, during the Summer months when it was Morning Service in Cranbourne, I had Afternoon Service at West Frampton the same day. Now, I hope that no one will gather from the above remark, that I seem to think, or imply, that West Frampton is getting as many Services as they deserve. This is the furthest from my thought, for I think to-day, and have always thought that West Frampton deserves a resident Clergyman of their own; but as this is the Venerable Archdeacon Roe's and the Bishop's business, and not mine, I will say no more.

## GEORGEVILLE AND FITCH BAY.

The Rev. W. A. Adcock reports:-

In writing out my report for the Church Society, I find grounds for encouragement in the zeal and activity which has been manifested by our congregations in the past year.

The Mission finds its centres in the villages of Fitch Bay and Georgeville, but covers a considerable area of surrounding country over which the families are scattered. Many of the people are unbaptized, many profess no creed, and only a small minority attend any place of worship.

The prejudice which in this District I found to be so strong against the Church has diminished, and the Clergyman is looked to for ministrations in every quarter. The congregation of Fitch Bay has been steadily increasing, the average Sunday attendance being much in advance of last year.

The Church is now provided with all necessary requisites, save Communion vessels and a Bell.

A very neat Font has been procured by the congregation, and the Ladies' Guild of St. Matthew's came to our assistance in furnishing us with a very good Altar cloth and fair linen at one-third the cost of material. The great work of the year has been the procuring of a Parsonage. A very suitable residence joining the Church lot has been purchased from Mr. C. E. Lee, towards which

he himself contributed \$100.

The price of the house, not including Mr. Lee's generous donation, was \$\\$1,100; of this sum the Church-Wardens and myself have undertaken to raise \$350 in the Mission, towards which sum \$155 has been paid, the balance promised. From the Summer visitors to Georgeville, I have undertaken to raise \$200 more, towards this sum at present I have \$142.50.

The Archdeacon has undertaken to provide the balance

of \$550.

The Sunday-School is progressing favourably and doing a good work.

Georgeville.—The work of Georgeville on the whole is

satisfactory:

The congregations have been well kept up, the Sunday Evening Services being very well attended. The organist, Miss Susan Wright, with the choir always making the Services bright and attractive. The Sunday-School has been progressing favourably with an efficient staff of teachers.

The year has been marked by the decease of one of the noblest and untiring workers. Mr. John Melrose, late Church-Warden, a young man full of energy and zeal for God and his Church, was called into rest after a long and painful illness, honoured and esteemed of all who knew him. The loss to the Church and his bereaved parents is very great.

The foundation of the Church has long been a cause of anxiety to the congregation, and in order to preserve the edifice, a thorough and complete restoration had to be undertaken, the cost amounting to more than \$100, which sum I am happy to say has been subscribed, the grounds enclosed with a neat fence, and the horse-shed completed.

A very sweet-toned Bell has been presented to the Church by Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Bagg, of Montreal, for which they are entitled to the gratitude of the congregation. The Clergyman was the recipient of a handsome furcoat from the congregation last Winter as a New Year's gift.

The out-stations have been well attended and Cottage Services held in different parts of the Mission during the

Winter season

The Ladies' Aid has done good work this year, having

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gaour nd undertaken to improve the interior of the Church and forming a strong financial body of workers.

The Ministering Children's League has commenced work

for the Winter and is now well under way.

# GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. John P. Richmond reports:-

Services have been held regularly in the two Churches in this Mission. During the greater part of the year a third Sunday Service has been held in the evening at St. Paul's Church, and the Holy Communion has been administered monthly in each Church.

St. Paul's Church, Gaspé Village.—The Church-Warden have been able to meet the claims of the Diocesan Board

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regularly from the offertory.

As far as providing the Church with funds necessary for assessment and running expenses, this system works well, but I am afraid there are some persons in most congregations who under this system shelter themselves and take credit for having contributed much more than they have actually given. They keep no account, and if absent from Church for several Sundays, offer no more than the customary coin, whatever that may be with them.

The Ladies' Guild is still carrying on its good work, and contemplates making several additions to Church furniture

and ornaments, which are much required.

The next call upon the Mission will be for a new Parsonage. The present building has been examined by a joint committee of the two congregations and declared to be almost past repair. The trouble is that when the house was built the back and side sills were laid upon the ground without foundation of stone or cedar. The weight of the building has of course imbedded the sills on the ground and they are now rotten, and the ends of the posts are also rotten. The repairs necessary are estimated at \$700 at least, and with even this expenditure it is not certain that the house would be worth much. I hope that as soon as the Church building is finished, the energies of the congregations will be given to this necessary work.

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St. James' Church, South-West Arm.—I must speak of this congregation in two sections, divided by the South-West Arm of Gaspé Bay. The one occupying Gaspé Bay South and having the Church and Church-yard. The other occupying the Township of York, and having acquired a Church lot and made some little progress towards building a Church.

In the first, the new Church is nearly ready for use, and the people have at all times of the year easy access to it. In the second, the people find it hard at certain seasons of the year to cross, especially during the time the ice is forming or breaking up. In this section the aforesaid difficulty has led to the idea, on the part of some of the congregation, that it would be better to join York to Sandy Beach Mission. Archdeacon Roe went over the ground last Summer and saw the position of affairs in this part of my Mission, and thought that the difficulty might be overcome by building a bridge over the river, which like almost all the Gaspé rivers, is without such a convenience, and I am afraid there is not much prospect of attaining it. I think the movement toward any such end should come from the people, by petition from them to the Bishop, and not from the Incumbent, whose duty it is to minister in the portion assigned to him, and not to originate a movement to enlarge or curtail it. I may say, however, that the difficulties met with by the York settlers in crossing the Bay to St. James' Church will also militate against the Clergyman crossing at certain times from St. James' Church to the York Church, unless the river be bridged, and even then he must drive six miles by land to compass one by water.

The Church-Wardens have met their engagements with the Board, and a considerable sum of money has been raised in this congregation towards furnishing the Church when completed.

The petroleum wave of excitement has passed over Sandy Beach and Gaspé South without permanent result. The only works now being carried on are on the York River, about eighteen miles from Gaspé Village, and about nine miles beyond the settlement.

There are six day Schools in this Mission, one of which receives aid from the Church Society. The schools in Gaspé South and York suffer very much from irregularity of attendance in the Fall of the year. During the time of the Rev. Inspector Lyster's visit it was needless to go to the schools in York, because parents and children were, for the most part, on the Blue-berry Hills, camped out in some cases, reaping the berry harvest. It is a pity that the circumstances of the people will not permit them to send their children to school regularly, but this industry, in many instances, means the Winter's flour, and all can help to earn it—young and old—as well as to consume it.

Of the marriages: two deprived this Mission of members, the bridegroom belonging to other Missions. Of the burials: two (a Presbyterian and a Methodist) sent for me "in extremis" and wished to die in communion with the Church and to be buried as her members.

#### HATLEY.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports:--

But little need be said about the working of this Mission during the past year. The usual Services have been held in the three Stations of Hatley, Massawippi and Ayer's Flat. While there is no marked increase in any of the places, yet evidences are not wanting of a quiet steady growth.

The most notable event of the year's work is the restoration of the spire in the Church at Hatley, and the gift of a

new bell.

About twenty years ago the Church was badly damaged by a high wind which took off the beautiful spire and the whole front of the Church.

At that time hopes were entertained of building a new Church in the near future, so the work of restoration did

not include a suitable spire.

Many years ago a bell was given to the Church, but the Academy close by being without a bell the generous churchmen of that day decided to put the bell, on the Academy, to be used for the school on week-days and for the Church on

Sundays and holidays. This arrangement was not very convenient so far as the Church was concerned, but it was

tolerated for nearly fifty years.

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About a year ago a devoted member of the congregation offered to give a bell whenever the spire was restored to something like its former condition. This offer was gladly taken up by the parishoners on the spot and they were generously helped in the work by several former residents of the Mission, especially by the Right Rev. W. W. Niles, Bishop of New Hampshire, and Mr. Hollis Shorey, Alderman of Montreal. When the spire was completed, and the new bell hung in it splace, there was held a Service of Benediction. The Special Service used was one compiled by the Ven. Archdeacon Roe, and was very solemn and impressive. An excellent sermon was preached by Bishop Niles and a large number of persons received the Holy Communion. the Service all repaired to the Academy Hall, where a lunch had been prepared by the ladies of the congregation. The rest of the day was spent in listening to short addresses by the Bishop and Clergy who were present. Before the assembly was dismissed, Mr. Shorey made a spirited appeal for funds to make some other necessary repairs upon the Church, and in a few minutes over one hundred dollars was pledged. All agree in saying that this was a day long to be remembered by the Church people of Hatley. The re-union of old friends, the active interest all took in seeing the Church edifice restored, and the many expressions of loyalty and devotion to the Church itself, make this a red-letter day in the history of this Mission.

#### INVERNESS.

The Rev. Peter Roe reports:—

The usual Sunday Services at St. Stephen's and Church of the Ascension, and a monthly Service, Sunday, at St. Julie, have been regularly held during the year. Holy Communion administered in both the Churches once a month; and several times to aged, sick, and dying persons at their own homes. The attendance at the Churches has

been very good, and the people seem to be taking a greater interest in spiritual matters, and I hope, growing in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

The schools have been very well attended this year, during the season from June to November, an average of 35 scholars at Church of the Ascension, and 25 at the old St. Stephen's Church. One great attraction has been the new library, a valuable collection of books from the S. F. C. K., for which our young people got up an entertainment last January, which netted \$35. Mr. Robt Hamilton added \$10. We have now a very superior collection of Sunday-School books which would do credit to a much larger Parish. Mr. Robt. Graham and his sister, and Miss Weston manage the school at the Church of the Ascension, and manage it well. Our Sunday-School pic-nic was largely attended, and rendered more than usually attractive by the young people providing a programme of music, songs, hymns, readings, &c.

Death has been unusually busy in our small Mission this year, taking from us two young women from consumption, two little girls from dyphtheria. One of our brightest and best boys, eighteen years old, died rather suddenly of some cerebral disease; he was a model boy in Sunday-School and in the choir, and we all sympathise with his bereaved family in the sudden removal of Johnny Haskett. There has been quite an epidemic of dyphtheria in these parts, and a good many deaths. The Presbyterian Minister at Inverness lost three children in a few days; we had several cases of typhoid fever also. This keeps the Missionary busy in the best and most difficult part of his work, administing instruc-

The Church of the Ascension, only erected a few years ago, had, from some fault in the foundation, got out of repair; the plaster having given way, we have been pannelling the walls and ceiling with boards, which will improve the appearance of the Church, and make it more comfortable in winter; we have also painted the outside; the work is not yet finished, but we hope the contractors will complete their work in January. This work will be paid for by the members of the Church here chiefly. I have received from the Lady Church Helpers, through their treasurer, Mrs. Sewell, Quebec, a cheque for \$20 towards this work, for which we are deeply indebted. Our former Church-Warden, Mr. John L. Brown, now of Arizona Territory, sent me \$20 towards shingling the Parsonage, and \$20 to aid in

paying arrears in the assessment of the Diocesan Board. He has not forgotten, he says, the Mission and Church he loved so well. A few bright examples such as this one in our Parishes, shew clearly the general apathy and indifference of many who profess and call themselves Churchmen. I am also very much indebted to a few personal friends, for having placed in the Parsonage, last Winter, a very fine hot air furnace of the Gurney pattern, which heats the house admirably, and has, I am sure, doubled the value of Parsonage property; the furnace, I am told, cost \$120. Dr. Holdcroft, Inverness, took a leading part in this kind act, and to the few who assisted him I tender my warmest thanks. My Church-Wardens, W. J. Smyth and W. W. Vetty, also Robert Graham, are faithful in the performance of their duties, and I am indebted to them for their assistance in forwarding the interests of the Mission. also acknowledge many personal kindnesses received from my friend, E. G. Palmer, Ste. Julie, and Mrs. Meikle, and the Johnston's, where I hold a monthly Service, and am always hospitably received.

I have to thank Miss Weston, for her very great assistance in collecting for Church Society, also Miss Hattie Watts and Judson Haskett, this duty of collecting round the Mission, one hundred square miles, in bad roads and wet, stormy weather, meeting with a cool reception often, is not a pleasant one, and only those who are desirous of doing their duty, and they are few and far between, can

be induced to do it.

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e ; The two Branches of the Women's Auxiliary for Missions, one at St. Stephen's and the other at Campbell's Corners, meet regularly every month, and although not many in numbers, are doing good, faithful work, they sent money and clothing to the North-West, to the amount of \$50, this year. These little gatherings of faithful women are a bles-

sing to the Mission.

I have driven about my Misson making some two hundred trips during the year, paid three hundred and fifty pastoral visits, walked about some three hundred miles in short walks to those near the Parsonage. I have been a good deal at the bed-side of the sickand dying, yet I confess I have nothing very particular to report outside the ordinary routine of a country Clergyman's work, and we must look to the new Missions where the ground is being only now

broken up, for more interesting sketches of the work of the Missionary.

The Rev. W. J. Faulconer reports:—

Another year has passed in the history of this Parish with its varied experiences of joy and sorrow, light and shadow.

But thanks to our Lord Jesus Christ, who has prospered us in and through them all, both outwardly in the extension of our Church, and also, as I truly believe, inwardly in our spiritual advancements. To begin with Christ's Church, Lower-Ireland the Services on the whole have been extremely well attended. The communicants have increased in number slightly, but not so much as I could wish to see. There has been however decided progress.

The Sunday-School is in a very healthy condition under the able and loving superintendence of Mrs. William Johnson, who is always full of energy for every good work in the Church. Through her efforts we had a most enjoyable evening and Christmas Tree, when all the children beamed with delight. I also received a substantial present through her kind thoughtfulness, for which I sincerely thank her.

I must not forget to mention also the self-denying work of my faithful warden, Henry Little, who is always at his post and fulfils his duties so faithfully in every Parochial calling.

The Bible Class which I began again, I trust will be a great blessing to my young people; it was always well attended when I held it before. Mrs. W. Johnson has kind-

ly let as have her dining-room to hold it in.

A Branch of the Women's Missionary Auxiliary, I am glad to say, has been established, the first of any such kind of work that has ever been done by this congregation. It is real pleasure to think how much progress it is making in their midst under the energetic Vice-Presidency of Mrs. Henry Little and the Secretary, and Assistant Secretary, Mrs. William Johnson and Miss Sarah Kerr.

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I am glad to say my congregation have raised about \$200 and put their Cemetery in a very orderly and decent condition, which shows affection for their beloved dead.

Our losses by removal have been great. Four Church families have left the country, which means a material loss to us, one of which I must mention, since it has made a gap not easily filled, I mean my faithful and kind Superintendent of the Sunday-School, Mr. Alfred Ward; we miss him in many ways as a warm friend and liberal supporter of every good work. In conclusion I have to thank my congregation at Lower Ireland very sincerely for their ever ready sympathy and great kindness to us in every way.

Trinity Church, Upper Ireland.—The Services on the average have been well attended and the communicants have also increased. I rejoice to think we are making steady progress in spiritual things.

The Sunday-Schools are doing good work, especially those in the out-lying districts under the earnest and zealous superintendence of Mr. W. G. Stewart. I am sure he is gathering in some stray lambs of the flock, which would be impossible for the Pastor of this large Parish on the Sunday to do. May God's blessing attend this faithful servant whose service is one of loving sacrifice.

My Bible Classes, which are held fortnightly at the Rectory and once a month at Mrs. John Annesley's, in the Bennett settlement, are very edifying gatherings and always crowded, many have the opportunity of hearing the word of life who could seldom get out to Church. The young men are always a great factor in our Bible Classes. I trust God will bless His Holy word to many precious souls. Mrs. Annesley is always ready to throw her house open for God's work. May His blessing descend on her house for this service of love.

Mr. Frederick Wood, my Lay Reader, has assisted me much this year in coming to my aid when pressure of work has almost overstrained me. I thank him warmly for his continued kindness in the above work.

The Women's Guild—Under the presidency of Mrs. F. Wood has done excellent work in assisting the Church, and is now striving to obtain funds for repairing and repainting it. I trust we shall see more members in the future join this branch of work, as it is like a reserve force in the Par-

ish. Miss Theresa Bennett is its valuable secretary and promises to be a very rising and faithful young woman in our future Church work.

The Women's Missionary Auxiliary has, I rejoice to say, made a fresh start under the untiring labour of its vice-president, Mrs. F. Wood. I trust there will be many more members join, who will be zealous and prayerful for the

extension of our Blessed Lord's Kingdom.

The Girls' Friendly Society has been doing great things this year and is full of promise for the future of the Parish, morally, spiritually and materially. They are now working energetically, under the president and their zealous secretary, Miss Bella Wood; that they may erect a perpetual memoria, of their handy work in re-pewing Trinity Church, Maple Grove. They seem most prosperous in all their undertakings, and I pray that God's continued blessing may rest on the labours of these young workers.

Death has been busy this year in our midst and bas taken from my flock some young, some middle aged, and aged. I trust that the many bereavements and trials may draw us as a Church nearer to our Divine Lord and Master, and mould us more and more to His likeness, who was made

perfect through suffering.

In conclusion, I am thankful to say; taking this part of my Parish in review, there are many signs of good work going on in the hearts of my people.

I have to thank them also for their kind consideration

and warm sympathy.

St. Luke's Church, Adderley.—A regular monthly Service is held here. The few families attend the Services fairly well, seem to appreciate them, and only wish they could

have them more frequently.

St. Peter's Church, Black Lake Mines.—There is held here a regular fortnightly Service, which is always well attended, and we generally enjoy a very hearty Service. We have to thank Mr. and Mrs. Penhale very sincerely for throwing open their house for our Services in the past. I am glad to say the new Church and School are now nearly completed, in the latter of which we now hold our Services. Considering the few families and individuals there are here, they are worthy of much congratulation. With regard to their great liberality in forwarding the work of the new Church, I am sure they have made sacrifices in furthering the completion of God's House, and their much needed

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School-room. All praise is due to the building committee, and especially to the energetic secretary, E. A. Evans, who has been untiring in his labours. We have also to thank the various companies who own the Black Lake Mines, for their timely aid and especially the generous friend of our Churches, Mr. Robt Hamilton, who has helped us so liberally in our pecuniary need.

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The Women's Guild has also done excellent work, it was only organised last May under the presidency of Mrs. Crabtree, and the secretaryship of Miss Ellen Prideaux. They have raised already enough to furnish their new Church, and have also placed a beautiful organ in the Church, from Mr. Wilson, of Sherbrooke, which is valued at \$150. May the Lord bless this young branch of his Church and make it fruitful in every good work.

St. John's Church, Thetford Mines.—A monthly Service has been held here during the year until the Mines closed in November, at the house of Mr. Andrew Johnson. Protestant population have attended the Services with much appreciation and seem thankful that somebody has a care for their souls. We have here also, through the efforts of the Messrs. Johnson and Wards, a beautiful little Church, almost completed for worship next season, when the Mines open and our beloved Bishop has accepted and opened it.

I must not forget to mention Mr. Thomas Porter, a member of my Church, at Maple Grove, who took the contract of our two new Churches and has finished them in such a perfect manner. All praise is due to such an honest workman, especially under such trying circumstances as sickness and death in his family has placed him.

In conclusion, when looking over the large Parish in which I am privileged to labour, I see on my own part many shortcomings, and only wish I could have served my Heavenly Master better, and I trust by His grace I may have the necessary health and strength to serve Him better this coming year.

## LEEDS.

The Rev. Joseph Rothera reports:

The Services during the last year have been kept up regularly with few exceptions. Three Services every Sunday and on the principal Festivals of the Church.

St. James'.—Two Services have been held at this Church every Sunday, through the help of the Rev. J. Kemp, who kindly takes a Service once a fortnight. The attendance at the Sunday Services have been upon the whole good,

and the offertories have increased, but at the Week-Day Services, which have been held once a week during Advent and Lent, only poor.

I am pleased to see that the attendance at the Holy Communion has improved, which is a good sign, and I hope will continue.

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There has been formed a Ladies' Aid, who meet fortnightly for the purpose of helping on the work of God both at home and abroad, whose good deeds will be recorded in the next report.

Since the last report the Church has been re-seated and the interior painted and varnished. The Church was neatly decorated with evergreen on Christmas Day. We are indebted to Mis. and Miss Marshall, for the beautiful motto over the altar: "Glory to God on High, and on earth peace, good-will to men," which is quite a relief to the bare wall, and adds much to the appearance of the Church.

The Sunday-School is carried on with the help of Mr. George Bayne, who acts as superintendent, and four teachers. The attendance of the children has been good.

On August 3rd, the teachers and scholars had their picnic at the Parsonage, when they had a most enjoyable time.

On November 6th, the Sunday-School children, teachers and parents assembled at the Church at one o'clock. After a short Service and address, rewards were given to those who had attained the number of marks required, and then adjourned to the Parsonage and had tea.

On July the 7th, we had a bee, for the clearing out the brush from the grave-yard and repairing the fence. Our thanks are due to all those who took part in it.

St. Mark's.—Divine Service is held here every Sunday with the exception of once in six weeks, when I go to Broughton. The Holy Communion is administered once a month. I hold a Bible Class and singing class once a week, which has been very encouraging, the average attendance has been over twenty-four. I hope it will continue and result in good to each member and bring glory to our Lord.

There has been a new fence placed round the grave-yard and the brush cleared out, which is a great improvement. The Church loses one good family by the removal of Mr. Duffett. It is a double loss, Miss Duffett was our organist and we have not as yet being able to get one to take her place.

Beattie's Settlement.—Divine Service is held here once a fortnight besides Week-Day Services. The attendance has been good. The contract for the new Church is nearly completed. There are many things required in the way of furniture yet. When it is finished, it will be a very pretty Church. A quarter of an acre of land has been given to the Church and deeded over to the Bishop.

Our thanks are due to Mr. Gollen, who gave the stove, and the Rev. J. Kemp, the lectern for the new Church. The plot of ground belonging to the Church has been fenced off. I hope I shall be able to give an account of it

being finished in the next report.

We had a tea and entertainment here last July. Unfortunately, the day was very wet and so prevented many from being present. The tea was served in a grove close to the Church lent for the purpose. If the weather had been fine, there is no doubt that there would have been a large gathering, but considering the circumstances, there was a good attendance which exceeded our expectations. Our thanks are due to the bakers and to all those who assisted both in the tea and entertainment,

Harvey Hill Mines.—The Mines commenced work in the Spring and closed again in November. I held service here in one of the houses while the Mines were at work, once a fortnight alternately with Beattie's, which involves a drive of about twenty-seven miles on that Sunday.

The uncertain condition of the Mines and the fluctuating character of the people makes the work very difficult and

unsatisfactory.

St. Luke's, Broughton.—Divine Service is held here once in six weeks and the Holy Communion is administered every other Service. Being a French country and consequently Roman Catholics, our people are leaving, and the French take their places.

In addition to these I hold Services at Frezzall Hill, and at Wilson's Mills and Nelson's Road School-houses once a month. The attendance at them has been very encouraging

with regard to numbers.

Thanks are due to Miss Marshall, for her able services as organist, and the Rev. J. Kemp, for his kind help, and to other members of the Mission for various kindnesses received.

## LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A C. Scarth, Rector of Lennoxville, reports:— With regard to the last item but one in the following statement, the Rector would explain that the expenditure

in connection with the Sunday-School means in detail, laid out for library, books and Catechisms, \$30; for Christmas Tree, and trip for the children to Massawippi Lake, \$40. These sums were made up of collections by the teachers

and donations to the Rector.

The moneys not yet expended consist of a gift from an old friend to the Rector, of \$70, to be laid out on improvements in the chancel end of the Church, and of a thankoffering of \$10 for the same purpose. There is also in the hands of the Treasurer of the Guild a sum of \$135, which has been voted by the members to be spent in a similar manner.

There is too a sum of \$18.23 in the hands of the Treasurer of the Women's Auxiliary, the results of offertory and collection at the gathering of members of the various branches of the Auxiliary in the District of St. Francis at Lennoxville, on the nineteenth November last. The gathering was a most successful one. The day was observed by a celebration of the Holy Communion at twelve o'clock, after which a lunch was provided in the Church Hall by the members of the St. George's Branch. At 3 p.m. there was a conference of the members of the various branches, and a Missionary meeting in the evening, at which stirring addresses were delivered by the Venerable Archdeacon Roe and the Reverend Canon Thorneloe. A most enjoyable and profitable day was spent; a prelude, it is hoped, to many a future annual gathering of a similar kind. In addition to donations already referred to, the Rector desires to acknowledge the gift of fair linen for the Altar and Credence table by a lady from New York, which has been beautifully embroidered by one of our most active Church workers.

The Rector has also to record with much thankfulness a gift of \$50, from Mrs. Phillips, to be applied in improving

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es as d to reThe Guild, though somewhat reduced in members by removals and other causes, still continues its useful labours with unabated energy. The Rector would here express his sense of obligation to the members for the assistance they have each and all rendered him in many ways, and would express the hope that the Parish may never be without such a valuable auxiliary in practical Church work.

## LEVIS.

The Rev. G. G. Nicolls reports:—

Although the year 1891 is hardly more than half spent, it becomes incumbent upon me, having resigned the charge of this Parish, to send in my report of work done, &c., in the Parish during the first half of the year.

First of all I have to acknowledge, with very hearty thanks, the gift last Winter of \$50 from the Guild of the Holy Trinity, to assist me in meeting heavy expenses,

which fell upon me at that time.

During five months of last Winter, from December to April, I resided, with the consent of his Lorship the Bishop, in the city of Quebec. I made, however, every arrangement which I could think of for facilitating communication with the Parish; and I think I can say, without fear of contradiction, that the Parish did not suffer materially during those five months by the fact of my not being resident within its borders, as I was in Levis during a part of the day almost daily during the period, and all Services, &c., were kept up as usual.

The Holy Communion was celebrated this year on the Festival of the Epiphany, for the first time I believe in the history of the Parish, with a very fair attendance of communicants. And here I may mention, with gratitude, an increase over last year of (I think) thirteen in the number of communicants on Easter Day, and gratifying above all is the fact that of these thirteen no less than eight attended the early celebration; I ought also to say that several who were present last Easter were unavoidably absent this year.

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Lal fur I cannot say positively that the figures in this report are absolutely accurate, as I have not the records by me, and am quoting from memory; but I am nearly sure that they

are quite exact.

It is with much pleasure that I have to notice an addition to the useful organization connected with the Parish, in the shape of a branch of the Ministering Children's League. The first meeting was held on St. Valentine's Day, and it has been a success from the outset, under the management of officers whose heart was in their work. It now possesses, unless I am much mistaken, nearer fifty than forty members.

An addition of sixty volumes, some of the books really quite handsome ones, was made to the Sunday-School Library in July; which, with a considerable number added about a year ago, makes a satisfactory showing in this department.

A pic-nic for the children of the Sunday-School and their friends took place at the Island of Orleans on the 30th June, the total attendance being about seventy. The weather "might have been made to order;" and a day of much happiness and enjoyment was had by all I believe.

The Guild and the Women's Auxiliary both go steadily on with their respective good works. I have not the means at hand of expressing results in tangible shape; but that will doubtless be done by others. I should not omit to say that the second public Missionary meeting under the auspices of the Women's Auxiliary took place early on the 6th of May, and resulted in a collection of five dollars and twenty-five cents for Foreign Missions, and also, I trust, in better and higher results in other directions. A paper, instructive to a degree, and if possible even more interesting and entertaining, was kindly read by Canon Von Iflland.

I regret very greatly leaving the Cemetery still unconsecrated; but the matter has not been overlooked. All arrangements were made for the consecration last year; but the weather made it necessary to postpone the ceremony, and as it was somewhat late in the season, the postponement had to be made to this year; when, up to the time of my leaving, it had not been possible to arrange things, owing to the necessity of the Bishop's visiting the Labrador coast this Summer.

The usual statistics, &c., for the year will, I suppose, be furnished by the proper authorities at the right time.

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The Reverend Josiah Ball reports:-

My report for this year will be very meagre; sickness has interrupted my work both practically and financially. During the whole of the month of June, *La Grippe* was epidemic upon the Magdalen Islands. Very few persons escaped, consequently, St. Luke's, Grindstone, was closed for four Sundays.

Three of our people died, two at Grosse Isle, and one on

Bryon Island. They were all elderly persons.

We were just getting into good trim again, when a contagious disease broke out at Grosse Isle. The children in three families were infected,—one death. The doctor pronounced it *Putrid Sore Throat*. It also appeared in the family of one of our neighbors at Grindstone, but there were no deaths, and I am thankful to say that the children are now in a fair way of recovery. The Church was again closed for four Sundays. Great fear was manifested lest we should have a contagious disease prevailing, which, with our isolation, would make a very dismal Winter.

9th December, 1891.—Particulars came last evening of the death of another child at Grosse Isle, from *Putrid Sore Throat*. The parents are also down with the same sickness.

The sum of \$9.68 is due the Missionary on the cost of the new organ placed in the Church last year. And this Winter the responsibility rests upon him for the price of a coal stove for heating the Church, as wood on the Magdaleu Islands is getting scarce, and we are obliged to use coal.

#### MAGOG.

The Rev. R. C. Tambs reports:-

The work of the Mission goes on happily. In my pastoral visits the people are everywhere pleased to have me sit down with pencil and paper, and explain to them the way of life.

The Sunday Services at St. Luke's have continued morning and evening, with fortnightly Communion, and except

in July and August, the afternoon Sunday-School, all with increased reverence and attentiveness and a more general participation in the singing and responding. The attendance, however, is affected by the discomforts of the Church in cold weather. The Ladies' Guild has raised money towards the sheathing of the walls, but it seems that the building will have to be ceiled as well, and all this, done ever so plainly, would involve an outlay which in the minds of many would hardly be wise in view of the contemplated new Church on the site near the Parsonage, donated for the purpose by the late W. Ralph Merry, and which, if not utilized within ten years, will be forfeited. To build now is seemingly beyond our ability, and to go into debt is out of the question, yet it is at once something Won't some noble benefactor or benefactors must be done. help us out of our perplexity by giving us an enthusiastic start in the form of a conditional donation.

Like last year we have had a visit from our own beloved Bishop, and one from Dr. Niles, the Bishop of New Hampshire; the latter, however, not for a second confirmation as before, as we were expecting, but for a solemn occasion, affecting deeply the hearts of the community far and wide, namely, the funeral of the late Dr. Somers. That Service, so sciemnly impressive, together with the Bishop's feeling references to his deceased friend, and his masterly sermon on the Resurrection, associated as it all was with the death of one so universally respected, valued and esteemed, produced upon the minds of all present an effect that will not

be soon effaced.

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Among other marked Services of the year not the least interesting and affecting were the two at which were

baptized four and six persons respectively.

During the past year or two earnest and well meant attempts have been made to establish in Magog religious Services of denominations other than those already represented. There is doubtless much room for good work, but it is evidently the mind of the people that that good work is likely to be retarded rather than furthered by the multiplying of Sectarian Churches. What is really needed is a more general co-operation of the faithful laity. As an effort to secure this I have inaugurated a movement in which the communicants of the Parish are invited to enrol themselves under the Clergyman, for His Sake, who has

promised His mediatorial presence to those who assemble in His name as Associated Promoters of Worship, with a view to making the Services of the Church more and more what they ought to be, and, in the spirit of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, to enlist the interests of others in the participation of the same. My Associated Promoters of Worship's list at present numbers seventy. With these devout volunteers looking to me for directive suggestions from time time, and each one doing something, if ever so little, in the way of help, week by week, such as making known to some new comer the hours of Service, showing an acquaintance how easy it is to find the places in the Prayer Book, making some stranger feel at home in our Father's House, calling my attention to some good to be done, and in other ways too numerous to mention, I feel that I have reason to be somewhat sanguine in anticipation of the results likely to be attained. Already, in the mere starting of the movement, I feel my hands and heart wonderfully strengthened.

The Ministering Children's League still carries on its beneficent operations in Magog, as already described in former reports, leavening more and more the whole community with the spirit of practical kindliness, and growing

year by year in well-merited popularity.

Alternately Church Services and Ministering Children's League meetings have continued fortnightly as last year with tolerable regularity on Tuesday evenings at the

Currier and McDermott School-houses.

Like fortnightly meetings have been held on Thursday evenings in the School-house at Cherry River, in Orford. In my last report I stated that we had just commenced operations in this locality, and I added the words: "with what success remains to be seen," for I had misgivings, owing to the roughness of the reputation that the neighbourhood bore, to the fact of its having been hitherto almost the despair of the denominations of those parts, and utterly so of the Salvation Army.

Most deeply thankful therefore am I to be able to report that the results of our efforts have already proved successful beyond anything that could have reasonably been imagined. So far from meeting with annoyance and opposition, we have experienced nothing but kindness and an evident desire on all sides to show appreciation of our endeavours. The School-house is four miles from Magog

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the wh the fin and in the neighbourhood surrounding it, and mostly within a radius of a mile or so there are about two hundred souls, nearly all of whom are not even baptized. The settlement is poor, I may say very poor, yet with the expectation of some little help from outside they are moving to build a Church. And indeed they need one, with a regular Sunday Service and a Sunday-School, for which there is grand scope, as the place is all alive with children bright and promising.

Should any one acquainted with Orford enquire whence the marked change that has come over Cherry River, the answer, that I think the people would themselves give, would be, in one word, the League. Yes, not by warning, primarily, however earnest; not by doctrine, primarily, however blessed; but by the Christ Heart, learned in the exercise of practical sympathy and the practice of loving

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In conclusion I wish to thank my many kind helpers, particularly my good wardens, Mr. H. Sweeney and Mr. Jas. Shedrick, the teachers of the Sunday-School; the members of the choir, especially the organist, Miss Gertie Lindsay, whose services received well deserved recognition from the congregation in the form of a Whitsun present of sixty-two dollars; and last, but not least, the officers of the M. C. L. in its several branches.

In appending the following statistics, I would say that water has been laid on to the Parsonage, thanks to the ladies; and a much needed horse-shed has been built at the

## MALBAIE.

The Rev. Geo. Radley Walters reports:-

It is difficult, in a quiet coast Mission such as this, where the routine of pastoral work demands no special notice, where each year's labour is seemingly but a repetition of the preceding one, with nothing to break its monotony, to find material suitable and interesting for an annual report. To report that I have been able to keep all my appointments for Service at my three stations in the Mission during the year, may seem a small thing to one who does not know the amount of driving involved in its performance.

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To say, I feel thankful, that I will have two handsome Churches completed and awaiting the act of consecration, when his Lordship the Bishop visits the coast this Summer, may seem to those not knowing us, to be but the natural results of the corpenters having finished their contracts, and conveys no idea of the amount of anxiety, and real personal labour, and zeal, the Missionary has had to perform and show.

Or to say, that I have in faith, begun a third Church in this Mission, at the Barachois River, that we have secured by purchase a piece of land, that the few families there have cut and hauled the frame from the woods, but are too poor to do more, and look now to the Missionary to do the remainder; this conveys but a poor idea of the toil and personal labour to be performed, or the anxiety as to the funds for doing this work, or who will be the friends whom God will raise up to help me in this new undertaking, for at this moment, I have not one cent in hand for this third Church, and it is absolutely necessary that it should be built, and with as little delay as possible, as I have, at this place, but one of the most wretched kind of School-rooms in which to perform Service.

It is here, with God's help, I propose building a small Church forty feet by twenty feet, with chancel sixteen by fourteen feet, and porch twelve feet by ten feet, but the greatest difficulty is, the poverty of the majority of the families living away here, they are willing to help me with lumber as far as they can, but ready cash, and in many instances even the promise of it, is truthfully out of the question.

I think we all at Malbaie, and Corner of the Beach, may justly feel proud of our two new Churches, the interior work of each is very good indeed, both in workmanship and design, the seats are all of hardwood ash and varnished, made at a factory in town, and all the windows in both Churches are of rolled Cathedral glass of proter design.

It has been no light lask the building of these two Churches in the Mission at one and the same time, and to have a third frame awaiting erection, indeed it would have nt-

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been simply impossible to have done this work, had I depended upon the aid offered me in the Mission alone. I must here thank especially the firm of Messrss. J. & E. Collas, for much substantial help, also the mercantile firms of John Fauvel & Co., Alexander & Co., and Mr. Alex. Duncan, and these, I am sure, will join me in thanking kind and generous friends in England, also the S. P. C. K., and our Church Society of this Diocese, and Robert Hamilton, Esq., for generous grants made and paid to me for my work here. In order to put this Mission on a really good basis, it is necessary to build a new Parsonage house, the present one is absolutely unfit and unsafe to inhabit; this is a work that cannot be delayed very much longer, and it is in the best interest of the Mission that it should be Last Summer we secured, by purchase undertaken soon. from a person leaving here, a strip of land, which adjoins the Parsonage Glebe, it is nine acres in depth; we paid forty dollars for it. I must thank Mr. Collas for kindly advancing the money, as at the time we had no funds at our disposal, I have this Winter had longers cut, with which to fence a part of it in. This land, as I should have before mentioned, like the piece at Barachois, has been deeded to the Bishop of the Diocese and registered in the office at Percé. In my Sunday-School, I am glad to say, I have this year had the help of Mr. John LeGros, snr., who has regularly taught a class for me, and conducted school when I would be absent at Corner of the Beach.

At the Corner of the Beach, a Sunday-School has been kept regularly during the past Summer and kindly taught by Miss Stewart and Miss Vibert, who at Christmas got up an entertainment for the children's benefit, which was much enjoyed by their parents as well. Although I cannot speak of an increase of children in our Sunday-School at Malbaie, those who do attend do so pretty regularly, considering the distance many have to come of four or live miles. In the early part of the month of August, I was cheered by a visit from the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, who spent some five days in my Mission, and preached in each station on the Sanday, and at Corner of the Beach, held two Evening Services during the week, giving stirring Missionary addresses, which were greatly appreciated by the people there, who sincerely trust that next Summer the Archdeacon will visit them again. During the Archdeacon's visit I held my Sunday-

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School Festival, some ninety children gathered at the Schoolhouse at Malbaie, and marched, carrying banners and flags, to the Church, where the Archdeacon welcomed them and their friends, and gave them a most pleasing and profitable address, after which all marched amid much festive mirth, waving of flags, and firing of guns, to a field at Point St. Peter, where tents were erected in case of rain, and swings, football, &c., indulged in, and a bountiful tea partaken of. I must thank Mr. Collas and Mr. LeMarquand, for kindly sending a liberal supply of sweets for the youngsters to race and scramble for; also for providing a bonfire and a display of skyrockets in the evening. I regret to state that Mr. James Collas has left us, to reside for the future in Jersey; his presence is much missed by all. Mr. Collas, 1 found, was ever ready to help me in my Church work, and was a generous subscriber to our new Church in Malbaie, we can ill-afford to lose generous, sympathic friends, as they number but a few in this Mission. I am glad our year's assessment has been sent in early this Fall, this will explain itself when I state I had, as Church-Wardens, Mr. Geo. Fauvel and Mr. Arthur Collas. I am very sorry, on the other hand, that pressure of business will not admit of Mr. Fauvel remaining in office, as he evidently is the person amongst us best qualified by perseverance and energy to fill the office of Church-Warden. Our Sunday and weekday Services have been all well attended, and I rejoice that the number of regular communicants monthly does not diminish. Our offeriories are small, and I am often ashamed when I receive the alms dish at the amount it contains, after traversing every pew in the Church; and more especially after asking for special alms for objects outside the Mission; but I am assured that very many of my people are unable to contribute more, from the fact that there is no other industry here than the few months of Summer fishing, which is the reason that they are so sparely supplied with cash, and accounts for the scantiness of our offerings from the poor, but does not of course cover those who can afford to give, and therefore ought to do more for the work of the

I desire to thank Mrs. Williams for kindly sending me a bale of useful articles, which were much appreciated. Also, Mr. Fauvel, for the loan of his store, in which we held a most successful tea party on behalf of our new Malbaic Church. Also would I thank Mrs. Duncan, Mrs. Ph. Var-

don and Mrs. Lucas, who nobly aided Mrs. Walters in making the evening so successful, and not forgetting the young people who entertained the audience with recitations and farces. At the Corner of the Beach, the few families there all worked with a will on behalf of their new Church during the past Summer, making suitable articles for a fancy sale and tea; their efforts were crowned with success, as they realized the handsome sum of one hundred and twenty-four dollars. I need only say, the families of Viberts, and Males, deserve all praise for their trouble in the undertaking; of course the large sums realized by our annual teas are largely augmented by the presence of numbers of our Roman Catholic neighbours who attend and subscribe to them.

#### MILBY.

The Rev. Thos. Adams reports:—

I have visited Milby generally once a month to administer the Holy Communion. The average congregation is at least thirty-five, and the average attendance of communicants from twelve to fourteen.

Extra weekly Services in Lent and Advent.

Service once every Sunday, generally in the morning. In the month of August the Rev. Prof. Scarth took the Services.

Offertories for the year, \$64.41, of which \$2.88 was for extraneous objects, viz: \$1.58 for Bishop's College and \$1.30 for Pension Fund.

The Principal of Bishop's College preached at the Thanksgiving Service November 12th, when the Church was tastefully decorated.

During the year we have lost Mrs. Bray, by the hand of death. She will be much missed. Mrs. Tambs, whose activity was of greatest service in the Sunday-School and other Church work, has been laid aside by sickness for some months.

## PORTNEUF.

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The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:—

I am glad to be able to report favourably of this Mission. It is true our numbers continue to decrease, owing to emigration, but there are evident signs of progress in those that remain.

Portneuf.—The attendance at Church has been as regular as last year. The communicants have improved in frequency of participation. Besides, seventeen new names were added to the communicants' roll by reason of the Lord Bishop's visit in September for confirmation. Up to the time of writing those newly confirmed by their conduct promise to be regular and frequent at Holy Communion. All our children who are old enough attend the Sunday-May they in later life show the good effect of their training. The scholars, by their contributions in School, have provided themselves with additional volumes to their library. I record with pleasure a ready response to an appeal to subscribe to the funds of the Church Society. The giving was cheerfully done, and the amounts in many cases have increased. We have a nice little gothic Church, thanks to the endeavours of one of my predecessors, the Rev. R. W. Colston. But many needful accessories, which cannot easily be provided at the time of building, have to wait for later effort; these we are making it our business to supply; and we have in this undertaking received much encouragement from the members of the St. Matthew's Guild and the Association of Church Helpers of Quebec.

Halesboro'.—The Services have been maintained here without a break. The congregations fluctuate. More spiritual energy is required to make them as regularly large as possible. There has been improvement in attendance at Holy Communion. Twenty-two persons were confirmed by the Bishop on his visit to this station. Most of these have taken their First Communion. The improvement in the older communicants and the addition of the new lead us to hope for even better things in the future. Our teacher of the day and Sunday-School is doing a good work; she is teaching in her second year, and is much liked. The Church here needs repair. The gradual removal of families seems to deprive the people of heart for such work.

The Wardens of both stations of the Mission have striven

to prevent our falling into arrear of assessment. Halesboro' has improved greatly in promptness. Portneuf Village has been prompt in payment of dues, but the loss of so many subscribers by removal has involved a hard struggle. We can, however, look forward to another year with thankfulness and courage. The Lord is with us of a truth. If we go on in His way and do all for His glory He will continue with us. If our population is to diminish, may those who go forth be patterns of holiness, and act as Missionaries where they are to live by commending the Gospel as received and taught by our Branch of the Catholic Church.

# RANDBORO'.

The Rev. Herbert A. Dickson, B.A., reports:—

I was appointed to the Mission of Newport last July, and was formally instituted on the filteenth of the same month by the Rev. A. H. Robertson, in St. Matthew's Church, Randboro'.

This Mission embraces the township of Newport, the first live ranges of East Clifton, and the tenth and eleventh ranges of Auckland, but in this field we are not alone, as the Roman Catholies, Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptists and Adventists, also have their Churches and regular weekly Services.

We have two Churches, one at Randboro', and the other at Island Brook, and have Services in School-houses at Learned Plain and Clifton, on alternate Sundays, having a drive of about twenty-eight miles the Sunday I go to Clifton, and about twenty on the alternate Sunday.

The attendance at Randboro' has been very good, the average being eighty-two, but I regret to say that I cannot give the same report of the congregation at Island Brook, where the average has been only forty-two, while a much larger number might reasonably be expected. The attendance at the School-houses has been very encouraging, especially at Clifton, where we have had an average of seventy; and we are in hopes that the time is not far distant when we will be able to leave the School-house with its disadvantages, to worship in a place consecrated for that purpose. At Learned Plain, though our families are few, the

average has been forty-one, and our Services are very hearty, considering the inconveniences which attend Services held in School-houses, when it is with difficulty that one can either stand or kneel, and where in consequence it is not easy to shake off the old careless habits, such as leaning instead of kneeling, and to replace them by those of reverance and devotion.

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We have Sunday-Schools at Randboro', Island Brook and Learned Plain, and I am thankful to be able to report that in Mr. A. B. Jones, Miss Wilford, who is also our faithful and efficient organist at Island Brook, Miss Dawson, Mrs. F. Bowen and Mrs. H. Stevenson, we have devout and conscientious teachers, who seem to recognize the importance of the good work they have undertaken. At Randboro', where most of the children live at some distance from the Church, I fear it will be almost impossible to continue the Sunday-School during the Winter, but that the religious instruction of the young may not be entirely neglected while we are waiting for the return of Summer roads, I spend three hours every week in the district Schools relating in order the events of Old Testament history and asking questions on the portion under consideration. And once a month have what we term the Children's Sunday, when the sermon, which has been prepared with the view of its being of special interest to the young, is somewhat shorter than usual, as it is followed by catechising for ten or fifteen minutes, and in this both old and young take a hearty interest, giving me, by their readiness to answer, much encouragement to continue this method of instructing.

Under the training of our faithful choir leader, Mr. George Hurd, and our efficient organist, Miss Alice Taylor, the choir at Randboro' adds much to the attractiveness of our Services. In addition to our regular choir practice, we have a weekly afternoon practice for the children in connection

with the Children's Sunday-Services.

Since I came to this Mission, we have had Holy Communion three times in each of the Churches, for the celebration of which, I am indebted to my predecessor, the Rev. T. R — 1, the Rev. Mr. Fuller, of Bury, the Rev. A. H. Robertson, of Cookshire, and the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, who has during the past three months favoured us with two much appreciated visits.

The Ladies' Guilds at Island Brook and Randboro' still continue their good work. Showing in many ways their

usefulness to the Mission, both financially and in their readiness to help in any undertakings.

#### RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. James Hepburn reports:-

St. Anne's.—Reviewing the work done during the past year, and contemplating our present standing, I feel abun-


dant cause for thankfulness and encouragement.

The outlook for the congregation of St. Anne's Church is quite better, the long standing difficulty of the Church suit promising a speedy and favourable termination by the appointment of three arbitrators to assess damages. We are now looking for them day by day. Relief in this matter

will affect the Parish most favourably.

Many of us were disappointed last Spring time when through lack of unanimity the offer by his son Herbert, of the homestead of the late J. K. Foster, Esq., for a Parsonage, on very generous terms, was lost. However the offer gave rise to a feeling that a Parsonage ought to be had, and the Vestry was accordingly called together, the result being that a committee of collectors was appointed to test the feeling of the Parish and report. In a month the committee reported \$838.00 available when called for. This, in addition to the \$1,700.00 on hand, showed the Vestry that they might without risk of debt undertake the work. For this purpose a building committee of six men, besides the Rector and Wardens, was appointed, and they are now engaged in the arrangement of plans, &c., in readiness for work in the opening Spring.

June 21st will be long remembered as a red letter day in the annals of this Parish. The Lord Bishop kindly consented to hold the ordination in Richmond, when three were ordained Deacons, and three were advanced to the Priesthood. The Church was more than full, the Service most impressive, and the sermon by the Archdeacon excellent. Great praise was given to the organist and choir. In the evening many had to turn away because there was no room. Twenty-one were confirmed. The occasion was unusually solemn, the words of the Bishop very sensibly affecting all. The day cannot fail to leave a mark upon the








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spiritual life of the Parish. It was a great joy to myself to have all parts of the Parish represented so fully at both Services; seldom can the extremities of a Parish have such a privilege.

The several organizations for work and assistance in this congregation are doing well, though all of us feel they may be improved and strengthened. To the officers of all I owe

many thanks.

I think the Ladies' Guild has acted wisely in giving up work for the annual sale, and resolving to appeal instead for money to pay the interest on the Church debt. And to supply every real want they invite the Parish to a monthly tea and entertainment in the basement, when an hour or more is available for conversation and to allow persons to become acquainted. In many places in the land the Church suffers not from hostility of one member to another but from utter indifference to one another. The friendliness is purely negative, and is weak and worthless. We must bring about positive good feeling. To this end we must be brought in touch together. We have no facilities for this in Divine Worship, and therefore all the more reason why we should plan for it at other times. Thus far our attempts have been successful far beyond our fondest anticipations.

The membership of the Women's Auxiliary has not increased of late; but I feel it is in a healthy condition, and is doing great good. One monthly meeting was made very interesting by a Paper read by Mrs. Robins, of Sherbrooke.

The Junior Auxiliary will lose an efficient head in the departure of Mrs. Vicat to England in a few months. The children have learned to love her for her unstinted labours in their behalf. It is rare good fortune in losing such an officer to secure the services of Mrs. Carpenter. Already she has established herself in the hearts of the little ones. The members have increased now to twenty-eight. The beneficial results are evident to all.

More than half of the members of St. Andrew's Brotherhood were lost to us by removal, but their places are taken by others, so that the interest of the movement does not

flag.

Perhaps our Sunday-School is capable of as much improvement as anything. This casts no reflection upon the earnest teachers supporting me. But we need men. My only male teacher, H. Wilcocks, has gone to England for the Winter.

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imthe My the The attempt to revive the Sub-Deanery for the mutual benefit of the elergy of this district has not been successful; but it is so much to be desired that we cannot let it go. The presence of the Archdeacon at our last meeting in Melbourne made it most interesting and profitable. Such meetings will doubtless command success.

St. John's Mission.—St. John's Church has been greatly improved by repairs to the foundation, the building of new steps, the painting of the exterior, and by new windows throughout; but especially by a very pretty stained eastern window in memory of the late Warden, John Gallup. This last is due to the activity of Major Mathias, who took it up as a labour of love in memory of one he had learned to prize. It needs but little more to make this building very neat and comfortable. There is, however, room for improvement in the furnishings of the Chancel.

The outposts of this Mission, Rockland Quarry and the Ridge, are in good state. The Services are bright and hearty, thanks to the organists, Mr. Williams and Mrs. Booth, who

take so much interest in their work.

I am pressed by many to undertake the building of a small Church at the Quarry, and D. V. next Summer we will try. To suit the two tongues, Welsh and English, and to accommodate the different denominations, the School-house is never cold on Sunday; with two, three, or four Services and two Sunday-Schools. This is not satisfactory to any body.

I feel increasingly the need of catechizing at outposts and have been experimenting either before or during the Service for some months. We Clergy must be on our guard

against working in ruts.

Instead of holding Services in Janesville, I have moved two miles farther on to Boast's S. II., where I have a very interesting Bible Class for the youths of the section.

With Mr. Rudd's kindly assistance a new Service has been opened, eight miles from Richmond, in a neglected border district far away from any centre of work. We have baptized eleven, swelling the usual number of baptisms.

The hand of death has been very heavy upon us, twenty-two burials within the year. The Christmas season was shrouded in gloom by the sudden deaths of Sheriff Webb and Registrar Cleveland. The latter was a most active member and helpful as a friend, and his loss I deeply feel. Some of our good old men linger yet, and prominent

among them stands Mr. Journeaux, for fifty years identified with every good work within the Parish and beyond. Algoma knows his name, for he has collected quarterly for fourteen years and has probably sent as much as \$1,000.00.

## RIVIÈRE-DU-LOUP.

The Rev. Edwin Weary reports:-

The past year has been, on the whole, one of steady and healthful growth, numerically and, I trust, spiritually.

Regular Services have been held in the Village Church on Sunday mornings throughout the year. The members of the congregations though few, attend very well, and do

their utmost to make the Services hearty.

I am happy to say that the new Church at the station. (the foundation stone of which was laid on the 18th day of December, 1890), was completed at Easter, and the first Services held on Easter Sunday. Three Services were heldon that day; the collection in aid of the Building Fund amounted to one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120). The total cost of the building is \$2,000. There still remains a debt of \$800. The interior was furnished by gifts from the following friends: Altar cloth and linen, Mrs. J. Hamilton, Quebee; Chancel carpet, Mrs. Jones; Kneelers, E. Jones, Esq.; Dado for chancel, Miss Jones; Reading desk and lectern, E. A. Jones, Esq.; Bell, J. A. Jarvis, Esq.; Alms dish, J. Fergusson, Esq.; Credence table, Mrs. Walker; Cushions for stalls, Mrs. Fergusson; Sanctuary chair, Mrs. LeBrock; Book-stand, Mrs. R. A. Davy; Antependium, Mrs. E. Jones; Book-markers, Miss Ross; Choir stalls, Beauport congregation; Service books, S. P. C. K.; Banner, Mrs. Weary; Collection plates, Miss Hutchins; Cushions, Miss Hill; two stained-glass windows, St. Matthew's Church, Quebec; Vestry-fittings, Miss Fergusson. The members of the Ladies' Guild contributed over three hundred dollars towards the Building Fund and gave five dozen kneelers for the use of congregation. We hope to have the debt paid off by the end of next year and the Church consecrated.

Service is held in this Church every Sunday evening, and a celebration at nine A.M. every third Sunday in the month.

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rs bt We received a very pleasant visit from our good Bishop in April last. Confirmation Service was held in the Village Church on Sunday morning, when ten candidates were presented; these, together with others, received the Holy Communion at the close of the Service. The Bishop preached in the new Church in the afternoon and also in the evening. These Services were well attended and all listened with rapt attention to the eloquent and earnest words of the preacher. The following evening the Bishop attended a social, given by the Ladies' Guild in the new Mission Hall; a very pleasant evening was spent by all present.

A large contingent of visitors spent their Summer vacation at Rivière-du-Loup. During their stay we had large congregations, some Sundays the Village Church was too small to accommodate them all. Many of these good people take a lively interest in Church work and do what they can to help our small resident congregation. At the close of the Summer season, I received a very pleasant call from two ladies, Mrs. Macdonnell, of Ottawa, and Mrs. Phillips, of Montreal, who came to present me with a purse containing the handsome sum of one hundred and sixty dollars from the visitors of St. Patrick, the Point and Notre-Damedu-Portage, as a mark of their esteem and appreciation of my services among them; for their extreme kindness, I feel very thankful, considering the little I can do for them. The Ladies' Guild held a bazaar and promenade concert during their stay and realized the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300).

The various settlements in the Saguenay have been visited twice this year. The people in Chicoutimi have now secured the services of a resident preacher.

The other places along the I.C.R. have also received my ministrations twice.

I visit Lake Beauport Mission once a month and feel very thankful to the Messrs. Davy and Fergusson, fer acting as Lay Readers here during my absence.

I must offer my sincere thanks to Edwin Jones, Esq., of Quebec, for a fine horse which he kindly gave me before he left his Summer residence here, and also to Mr. J. Jarvis for a quantity of oats.

The Women's Auxiliary are doing a good work here, and

also the Ladies' Guild; meetings are held fortnightly and are well attended by the members. A sale of work and entertainment was held by the Ladies' Guild on the 21st of

December, they netted the sum of thirty-six dollars.

In conclusion, I must tender my cordial thanks to the Church-Wardens and officers of the Church, for their kindness to myself and family during the past year. We have spent a very pleasant year together. I trust that we may all be spared during the coming year to work together with the same kindly feeling and good-will. Mention must also be made of our faithful organist, Miss Hill, for her valuable assistance, unfailingly rendered, both at the Village and Station Churches, in all kinds of weather.

## SANDY BEACH.

We have begun a good work this year connected with the temporalities of the Church, and it will be better to place it first in my report, as it is something of an exceptional character. I allude to a new Parsonage, which is

now in course of erection at Sandy Beach.

For a long time the work had been contemplated, and its necessity admitted; but great hesitation was felt about beginning it, through fear, no doubt, of not being able to finish it. Last Spring, however,—part of the material being already on the ground,—a start was made, and we have all been surprised at the marked success which has attended the enterprise. Difficulties seemed to vanish at once. members of the congregation at Sandy Beach offered willingly what they could in time, labour and material. the frame and boards were given and some of the shingles. We hired a mason who laid a good stone and mortar foundation, the people hauling the stone required. They then came together, framed the building and set it up; but what was felt to be the chief difficulty here met us, namely, to secure money enough to carry on the work; for money is hard to get in a place like Gaspé, where nearly everything is paid for in shop goods. We had a little on hand, and could get a little more, but this would not go far, and there seemed no way out of the difficulty but to ask for help from

outside, which was accordingly done. Success again attended us, and most of our difficulties are now, I am thankful to say, removed. In answer to a personal appeal made by myself, many good friends in the city of Quebec willingly contributed to our fund, so that, as a result, we secured in all—given and promised—about \$400.00, including what has been kindly granted by your Society.

I should be glad to publish the names of those who have thus aided us from outside, but suppose that space cannot be spared for this in the Sceiety's report. I beg. however, here to publicly acknowledge the kindness and courtesy of all who contributed, and to thank them collectively

on behalf of the Mission.

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Since this help was secured we have boarded and covered the building, and as soon as the Spring opens intend to carry on the work to its conclusion. We have a considerable sum of money still available for the purpose; some more will be added to this, and the remainder of the material provided by the people during the Winter. I should like to add, here, that the new Parsonage will be very commodious and thoroughly well built in every respect. Those who have worked upon it thus far seem to have done their best as conscientious Churchmen, as if remembering that they were working for the Church; so that, if the rest of the work is done in the same spirit, I should consider that Sandy Beach had provided one of the best country Parsonages in the Diocese.

In all parts of this Mission, a better state of things seems to exist regarding the payment of the Diocesan Board Assessment. For the last two years the payments have been made promptly. Only once, I think, and with regard to one congregation, during that period, have we been threatened with suspension of Services; and then, the difficulty was immediately met and overcome. Whereas, prior to that, every quarter during my incumbency, and in connection with all the congregations, the warning notice was received from the Board; and each time, it almost seemed as if the end had come. This fact, too, was constantly used as an argument, why we should not contribute to Missionary and extra parochial objects. On all sides the complaint was heard, we are too poor, and ought not to be expected to give to others, when we cannot, as is evident, raise

enough for our own needs.

Another thing to be noticed is, that our Sunday collections for general purposes are larger now than they used to be when I first came to the Mission, although we have lost many who used to contribute, and no improvement in business matters has taken place.

In Peninsula, a large parochial library, as noticed in a former report, has been secured; and, this year, a new organ was purchased, and steps have been taken to add a Chancel to the Church, which, I confidently believe, will be finished next Summer.

In Little Gaspé. too, an organ was purchased, which has contributed greatly to the improvement of the Services there; and, this year, the roof and spire of the Church were painted and the walls whitened, which gives the building quite a new and respectable appearance.

I have placed these matters first, and have dwelt at considerable length upon some of them, for a special reason. Who has done all this for us if not the Lord? Surely to Him we owe thanks: for He has blessed and prospered us. But why? Because the Mission is really trying, if only in a feeble way, to do God's work—to carry on the missionary work of His Church. Within the past three years we have steadily improved in this respect. In 1888, we collected only \$29.00 for the Church Society and \$80.00 for all extra parochial objects. Last year, the amount for the Church Society came up to \$46.00, and that for all outside objects to \$103.00, which some may have thought was the limit of our ability; but this year, the amount collected for the Church Society is \$52.42, and that for extra parochial objects, \$107.39. Besides all this, it seems to me that there is a better spirit growing with reference to such work. We hear no more the complaint: "We are too poor." None, I think, refuse to give. All seem to give willingly, and with an understanding and appreciation of the work.

Surely then from all this there is an important moral to be drawn, which it would be well for Churchmen, here and elsewhere, to note. Let us work for God and He will surely work for us. Let us think for those abroad, and God will think, and we, too, shall be able to think to better purpose for those at home.

But here I feel it incumbent upon me to acknowledge the great help and support received, this year, from the Ven.

Archdeacon Roe, who gave an eloquent Missionary Address, during the Summer, to the congregation at Sandy Beach, and one to that of Peninsula. I am confident that the better spirit manifested among us regarding missionary work is, in a great measure, due to his zealous efforts on those occasions.

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the Ten. In this collecting work great credit is due to the station of Little Gaspé. It has always, I think, led the others, and this year, I am pleased to see, has not fallen behind. But very great improvement in the matter has taken place at the Sandy Beach Station, as, also, at that of Peninsula, and I have great hopes for their future.

As regards other parts of our work, there is not much that is new to be reported. The Services, in all parts of the Mission, have been kept up as heretofore, three being held every Sunday when the Bay could be crossed, and the usual Festivals and Holy Days, with few exceptions, being observed. Special Services, too, were held in Lent at Sandy Beach Church, and at private houses in other parts of the Mission, throughout the Winter season. During the last Advent season we were indebted to the Rev. J. P. Richmond—with whom I exchanged each week—for an excellent course of four lectures on the history of the Church of England. These were well attended, and, I should think, would be productive of much good.

Bible classes were kept up as usual during last Winter, both here and at Peninsula, with the same success as recorded in former reports, though I think that some improvement in the attendance at Sandy Beach was to be observed. I frequently see good effects from the holding of these classes, and also from the catechising Service, which is still held once a month when possible at Peninsula.

I omitted to mention earlier, that the matting for the Church at Little Gaspé was the gift of Messrs. A. W. Dolbel, R. Lindsay and S. LeBoutillier, to whom our thanks are due. Also, a bale of clothing, &c., was received from Mrs. Williams, whom I here beg to thank on behalf of the Mission.

There were eighteen Baptisms and seven Burials during the year.

#### SCOTSTOWN AND LAKE MEGANTIC.

The Ven. Archdeacon Roe reports:—

The results of the Church's work at these two Mission Stations during the year afford good ground for encourage-The stations are served by Readers from Bishop's College, and are under the pastoral charge of the Archdeacon. The distances to be travelled, however, Scotstown being forty-one miles from Lennoxville, and the Lake sixtyfive, and the heavy expense entailed by it, and the time consumed, are serious drawbacks. These expenses, with the exception of \$50 a year assessment, are borne by the Diocesan Board. During term, the Readers go out on Saturday afternoon and return late in the forenoon of Monday. During vacations, they reside in the stations and give their whole time to the work. Two Services every Sunday have been held in each place unbrokenly during the year. The attendance at the Services has improved in both stations; at the Lake since the opening of the new Church in a very marked way.

At the Lake, the building and consecration of the new Church have been the great event of the year. Nothing for a long time has impressed the writer more than the effect, the building and use of this Church has had upon the life of the congregation. The interest it excited, and the way it has drawn out the people and drawn them together has been remarkable. The extent to which it has helped to promote reverence in worship is beyond expression. The Church was begun in the Autumn of 1890, finish-

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ed during the Winter, and consecrated on the 31st May last. It is a very successful building and the people are justly proud of it. The contract was for \$600, not including the furniture. Towards this the people on the spot contributed \$240. The devout women provided matting, carpet and organ. The Readers collected in Sherbrooke and Lennox-ville \$88. The Archdeacon secured the rest. The Church cost in all, not counting the Women's work, \$870. I need not say there is no debt upon it. At the Service of consecration one adult was baptized and four were confirmed.

As soon as the Church was opened, a Sunday-School, hitherto found an impossibility, was organized by Mr. Bayne, the Reader, which has now twelve children in regular attendance, besides a capital Bible class of ten adults. Nearly all our own children in the two Villages of Agnes and Lake Megantic, who before attended the Sunday-Schools of other religious bodies, are now gathered into and are undergoing a regular course of religious instruction in their own Sunday-School. The teachers have sent to England \$25, to which the S P. C. K. has added as much for a Sunday-School library, which I hope is by this time in the hands of the children.

The Readers at the Lake have been for the former half of the year, Mr. J. N. Kerr, B.A., and for the latter half, Mr. N. M. Bayne, B.A. The congregation has had the advantage of the services of Mrs. Lloyd, an accomplished musician, as organist. I cannot speak too highly of the good work done by the Church-Wardens, nor of the labours in behalf of the Church on the part of the devout women of the congregation, whose names, though not recorded here, are, I trust, in the Book of Life.

The Archdeacon visited this station four times during the year, baptized seventeen children and one adult, administered the Holy Communion to twenty-one persons, and visited in their own houses nearly every family upon whom we have any recognized claim in the entire district, most of these several times.

Besides the town Lake Village, there belong to this station the outlying hamlets of Ditchfield, Keene's Mill, Three Lakes, Spider Lake, Echo Vale, and Three Mile Lake. There are in the Lake Villages twenty-seven families who belong to us, in some cases we can only claim one side of the house; at Three Lakes distant nine miles, and on the way there, five families; at Spider Lake, three miles further,

one family; at Ditchfield, nine miles distant, five families; at Keene's Mill, three or four miles further on, three families besides several mill-hands, singlemen; and at Three Mile Lake, eleven miles from Agnes, and on the way there, five families: making in all forty-six families who now acknowledge the Church for their spiritual Mother, and who would have been in most cases practically lost to her were

it not for this Mission.

Besides the Services in Agnes twice every Sunday, Mr. Bayne has also gone out once a fortnight to Ditchfield, seven miles, generally walking one way, for a Sunday afternoon Service. The Church at Ditchfield, built just a vear before the Agnes Church, seemed for a time utterly wasted; most of the people also formed the Ditchfield settlement, having deserted their farms just about the time the Church was completed. It is very gratifying to be able now to announce that the little Church has come into very effective use this Summer. The deserted settlement has to a certain extent been repatriated, and another hamlet has sprung up around Keene's Mill, some three miles away, the people from which have walked over through the woods regularly during the Summer to the fortnightly Services at Ditchfield. On the whole, the Church, it is thought, can look back with thankfulness and hope upon the year's work at Lake Megantic.

Scotstown.—In Scotstown the Sunday-School has been in operation all the year round with an average attendance Here too the teachers have provided the School of fifteen. with a very good S. P. C. K. library. The number confirmed here has been five, the number baptized ten. The Archdeacon visited the village five times, each time celebrating the Lord's Supper, and spending his spare hours in searching out the people in their homes. The Readers have been Mr. W. Lipton, B.A., Mr. W. Barton, and Mr. J. N. Kerr, B.A. The Rev. J. G. Sutherland also, who had come up from Labrador to be ordained priest, took charge of the station during May and June, his Services being much The event, however, which excited the liveliest interest in Scotstown was the purchase, by the congregation, of a very fine bell and its dedication on the 4th The bell weighs four hundred and sixty lbs. and October. The money was collected by several zealous cost \$116. young women of the congregation, who indeed are always ready for every good work. The congregation are also indebted to Miss Bertha Weston, of Cookshire, who comes to give music lessons on Saturday, for her kindness in staying over and taking the organ at the Sunday Services.

The shutting down of the mills during the Winter is a sore trial to the operatives in Scotstown, and of course an injury to the Church's work, unsettling the people as it necessarily does, and leading some of them to move away every Winter in the hope of finding more continuous employment elsewhere. Nevertheless the Church in Scotstown is assuming more and more a settled and permanent character. Self help is developing. The finances are assuming a sounder basis. The assessment is regularly paid. Money is found to pay for the Reader's board during the vacations. The Church has been painted; the Church-yard cleared of stumps, drained, seeded down, and fenced. The congregations have been steadily good. And, what is most important of all, a serious movement has been set on foot to obtain a resident Clergyman.

The number of families in Scotstown and its vicinity acknowledging, more or less, allegeance to the Church, is twenty-six. There are others whom we visit and hope to win, but cannot yet claim. The McNamee settlement, too, containing nine families, belongs to Scotstown, distant five to seven miles in Summer, but only half as far in Winter. During the Mid-Summer vacation, Mr. Barton gave them a Service every Wednesday, which was much appreciated. Only one however of those families, and perhaps part of

another, as yet belong to us.

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The Scotstown Mission has also been extended, at the request of the Rector of Bury, to the fine thriving settlement of Canterbury, four miles from Scotstown. Canterbury is eight miles from Bury Village; the Rector gives a Sunday afternoon Service there once in four weeks. Since June last, our Reader has been driven over and given Service there on the three remaining Sunday afternoons. The Canterbury School-house is always well filled. The Scotstown project is, to detach from Bury the two outlying stations of Canterbury and Lingwick, and to form them, with Scotstown as the centre, into a permanent Mission with a resident Clergyman. There can be no doubt that if this could be carried out without financial injury to the Rector of Bury it would be quite as great a boon to him as it would be to Scotstown. No one man can satisfactorily discharge the duties now imposed upon the Rector of Bury.

Parish, even when freed from the pastoral care of Lingwick, (part of which is twenty-four miles distant from his head quarters) and Canterbury, (extending to ten miles distant), would still be one of the most populous in the diocese, and quite sufficient to task the energies of any man. It is therefore to be hoped that the finances of the Church will some day justify the carrying out of the Scotstown scheme. It must however in any case depend largely upon the willingness of the parties benefitted, Bury, Canterbury, Lingwick and Scotstown, manfully to shoulder each his part of the burden.

#### SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Canon Thorneloe reports:-

During the past year the Parish of Sherbrooke has lost very heavily by removals. The transfer of the Edison Manufacturing Company's Works to Peterborough, Ont., caused a loss to St. Peter's congregation of nearly forty people. Many others have left the Parish from ordinary causes during the year, and it is quite within the mark to say that our total losses for the year are close upon one hundred souls.

But it is comforting at all events to reflect that these removals do not represent absolute losses to the Church. Moreover we have good reason to be thankful that, notwithstanding such discouragements, we are able to look back upon a fairly prosperous year. Our gains in the form of Church people who have entered the Parish during the year have nearly counterbalanced our losses. The average attendance at the Services of our two Churches has been very much the same as that of last year. Our various Parochial Associations have received an average amount of support; while this year's total of moneys raised for all purposes, is not merely equal to but slightly in advance of last year's.

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Owing chiefly to the facts referred to above, the demand for pews at St. Peter's has not been so pressing as in previous years, and the Wardens, in consequence, have had comparatively little difficulty, at least during the latter part of the year, in finding sittings for those who have sought them; still this relief, we believe, is but temporary, and the need of increased Church accommodation yet presses. Nothing, however, has been done towards carrying into effect either of the proposed schemes (free seats or a new Church) referred to in last year's report. The only steps forward which the year has witnessed has been the employing of Mr. Taylor, architect, of Messrs. Taylor & Gordon, Montreal, to prepare a suggestion of plans to be submitted to our Committee at an early date.

As recently defined, the Parish of Sherbrooke covers an area of some fifty-four square miles extending northwards. eastwards and westwards several miles beyond the city The city itself, provided as it is with two Churches, affords ample scope for the energies of the present Clergy, who feel that care must be taken not to weaken the centre of life and activity by neglecting it in favour of outlying districts; yet it is not easy to ignore the claims of the purely country parts, whose people being too remote from Sherbrooke to avail themselves of our City Services, or perhaps grown too indifferent to care about attending them, are slowly but surely drifting away from the Church. What the Clergy can do is being done round the Mission centres of Brompton Line and Magog River School-houses. But far more than we are able to give is demanded by the outlying population, both in the way of regular Services and of house to house visitation. Some encouragement, not to say hope, is afforded in this connection by the fact that this year four gentlemen of St. Peter's have done duty as Lay

The various officers of the Parish and the large body of earnest lay workers, men and women, engaged in various departments of Church work, including those actively interested in the two out stations, are deserving of the Church's gratitude. Having served with cheerfulness and zeal, they will not fail of the blessing which follows devoted and self sacrificing labour.

The following notes may be of interest:

St. Peter's Church.—Daily morning and evening prayers

have been said here throughout the year, and never without

a congregation of two or three.

The Choir, under Mr. Dorey's able management, has greatly improved of late, and is now in a condition of thorough efficiency. As a consequence of this we have been able to brighten certain of our celebrations with more music, and to chant the Psalms at every Service on Sundays. We have also at intervals had Services of Sacred Song, which have been much appreciated and at which music of a high order has been rendered.

A quiet day, in preparation for the Trinity Sunday Ordination, was held by the Bishop's appointment in this Church on the 20th June, and did not fail, we trust, to bring a blessing not only on those who attended but upon

the Parish.

The Guild, the Women's Auxiliary, the Sunday-School and the Christmas Club again deserve special mention for the efficient work they have done. Nor can too much praise be given to the Lady Visitors, whose work has been

both faithful and blessed. We need several more.

This Church has been the recipient of beautifully embroidered Altar linen, worked and presented by a lady of the congregation; of a silver mounted Baptismal Shell, presented by Miss Wicksteed, in memory of her late sister, Mrs. Arthur Whitcher; and of a costly set of Communion Books for the Altar, presented by a faithful communicant. Much valued gifts were also presented to the Rector at Christmas by the Sunday-School and Bible Class.

Church of the Advent.—Morning and Evening Services have been held here on Sundays as usual; also a weekly Thursday evening Service. The attendance on Sunday morning is not yet as large as it should be. The Choir, the Guild, and the Sunday-School have been kept up and have done good work. Mr. Elkins still continues his self-sacrificing efforts as Sunday-School Superintendent, in which

position he is doing a noble work.

This year has witnessed the erection of the long desired and greatly needed Lecture Hall, for Sunday-School and Church purposes generally. Though it is not quite so large as many desired, it will bring no heavy burden upon the Church in the way of debt, and it is large enough for all ordinary uses at present. It is completed all but the plastering, which will be done in Spring.

To this congregation has been presented this year a pair

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of brass vases, inscribed to the memory of the late Mrs. Arthur Whitcher by her sister. To Mrs. Ives we are indebted for a generous gift, enabling us to complete the Lecture Hall.

The Church has this year lost the services of Miss M. Armstrong, now Mrs. Hutchinson, who has presided at the organ and led the Choir for the greater part of the time since the opening of the Church. Her place is filled at present by her sister, Miss L. Armstrong.

Our Sunday scholars number in all 207; Communicants on Easter Day, 359; the number Confirmed is 39.

#### STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports:—

The past year has been for several reasons an eventful one in the history of this Parish. It has seen an important improvement in the fabric of our chief Church, as well as an extension of Church work in our outlying districts. accomplish this latter the Diocesan Board kindly made a grant to pay the expenses of a Lay Reader. I happily secured the services of Mr. H. A. Brooke, of Bishop's College, who ably assisted me from the beginning of February to September, and also has consented to undertake the same work again from Advent Sunday. Of the value of his services I cannot speak too highly. By his energy, kindliness and common sense he won the esteem of all.

Christ Church, Stanstead Plain. -Mattins and Evensong have been said every Sunday; a weekly Celebration, early or mid-day, throughout the year; daily Mattins in the Summer season; Evensong every Wednesday. The attendance at the early Holy Eucharist has improved. The various fasts and festivals have been duly observed. The attendance at the special Lenten and Holy Week Services was very fair. On Good Friday afternoon we held for the first time the special Service of Meditation on the Agony of the Redeemer, the attendance at which showed the people's appreciation of it.

The financial condition of the Parish during the past year shows a decided improvement on former years. The new furnace and other repairs on the Church done last year

were paid for by last Easter.

During the Summer the interior of the Church was entirely renovated by frescoing the walls, painting and cushioning the seats, &c., a work involving upwards of \$500. Of this sum about \$225 is provided for by pledged subscriptions of the parishioners, and the residue we hope to pay off within a year.

I am glad to note a decided improvement in the numbers of the Sunday congregations, morning and evening.

Last Spring, we had the heavy misfortune of losing by death Miss Hepburn, who for nine years had zealously and faithfully taught our Church Day School. After earnest toil for Christ and His Church, despite physical infirmities, she has earned the rest of Paradise. We have fortunately secured the services of Miss Wardrop, who has commenced the work of another year with good prospects.

Our Sunday-School has somewhat improved in numbers

this year.

All Saints' Church. Beebe Plain.—Since the commencement of February two Services have been held here every Sunday. The Church in this village has during the past few years met with many drawbacks and hindrances, chiefly from removals of members—as well as from active opposition. Still I believe that with earnest faithful work the Church has a bright future before it, even here. The presence of Mr. Brooke, who boarded here last Summer, was a great benefit to the Church, and is a proof of the good advantage which Church work would derive from a resident Clergyman in this village. We have missed Mr. and Mrs. McClintock, who have been absent in Scotland since June. They were always ready to help in any Church work.

Work has been done on Church furnace, and the ladies of the congregation have bought a new Church carpet.

The thanks of the congregation are due to Mr. II. W. Elder for his munificent gift of a fine Church organ, one of the largest make of Reed organ with pedals and double manual.

Out-stations.—Griffin's Corner and Marlow.—The country between Beebe Plain and Fitch Bay has been heretofore unoccupied by the Church for want of workers. In this section are many adherents of the Church, as well as many who seem to be unaffected by the religious agencies at The natural centre for this section is Griffin's Corner, a small cluster of houses with a Union Church. This building was, however, at the time of my opening work here, occupied every Sunday by the Methodist Society. I therefore had to centralize my Services at Marlow School-house, one and a half miles distant. Various circumstances finally led me to divide these Services, and to hold them fortnightly at Marlow and the other Sunday at Griffin's Corner. This is my present arrangement. Notwithstanding many hindrances and much opposition there has been much encouragement. The average congregation at each place is about thirty, but varying considerably by reason of weather, &c. The people have contributed a small sum towards expenses of Services, &c.

Libby's Mills.—This is a small hamlet about eight miles N. W. of Stanstead, on the Passumpsic Railway. Most of the year, ours have been the only religious Services held here. At present the Service is fortnightly with an average of twenty-five attendants. The chief obstacle here is carelessness and indifference born of fanatical sectarianism rife in this district in the past. There is however a decided improvement in the interest shewn in the Services, and our work, I am convinced, has not been in vain. The work here has been mostly taken by Mr. Brooke, who has completely won the affections of the people.

The fortnigthly week-day Services at Judd's Mills have been maintained regularly with but few breaks. The congregation has maintained its average. The only difficulty is to bring the people past the door of the School-house into the Church.

I am convinced that the Church has a great future before her in this section of country, if only we have faith in her Divine Mission, and patience to wait for results. It is God

Divine Mission, and patience to wait for results. It is God who gives the increase. I sincerely hope that the Diocesan

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Board will renew a part, at least, of its grant for the coming year, that the work may still be carried on. The best method would be, to place a Clergyman at Beebe Plain as helper to the Rector of the Parish, and the country could then be fully worked. Various reasons render this a more desirable plan than forming two separate Missions.

There are no startling disclosures of accessions to the Church to chronicle as the result of our new work, but to one who knows the country there are ample reasons for continuing the work begun. The most important feature of the work is parochial visiting, which I have tried to do faithfully, but which I find a great strain upon my energy.

I need only add that by the help of Lay assistance rendered me this year, there have been held six or seven Services in the Parish every Sunday.

#### THREE RIVERS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports:-

Although Three Rivers is not connected with the Church Society as closely as many of our Missions, yet our parochial doings interest the Church at large to a certain extent, and I am glad of the opportunity of presenting them in the Annual Report, which has now become the authorized chronicle of the Diocese, where all important parochial transactions are entered, and will remain as permanent records.

During the year our energies have been chiefly directed to clearing off the Church debts, and very laborious work it has proved—no bright spot in it anywhere, except perhaps the somewhat grim satisfaction of exulting over them as foes vanquished in a desperate struggle. And so few to help! We have only twenty-five families, and nine or ten indivi-

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dual Churchmen. But happily these few are united, and union is strength in a small as in the largest community. I know that many people assert that a small Parish affords no scope for clerical energy. So many broad hints in this direction have been bestowed upon me during the past two years, that I must speak a word in defence. I maintain, as I suppose every one does, that the building up of a Parish is a Clergyman's chief work. It follows, therefore, that a tumble-down Church and Rectory, requiring a considerable outlay to make them even respectable, and with only a small number of people to do the work, present a field of operation extensive enough for the energy of any average Work of this description is indeed more difficult of accomplishment than in large and prosperous Parishes where an abundance of men and means are alway at hand. I found not only work to be done in this small Parish, but so much of it that I hardly knew where to begin—it seemed almost a hopeless task to begin at all. Long arrears of Church debts had accumulated, and as a natural consequence the credit of the Church was seriously impaired, Then the Rectory was in a terribly dilapidated condition, everything about it was conducive to discouragement; but the few Churchmen here recognised their responsibility. We encouraged one another as best we could, and began to work with a will. I should like to record one instance of a nature calculated to test devotion to a good cause. Almost under the Rectory windows there were horrible cess-pools. No workmen could be got for love or money to undertake or even assist in their removal. We then had the spectacle of gentlemen throwing off their coats and leading the way, and labouring until the work was done.

In the important task of restoring the Rectory, the amount of necessary work was almost appalling. Carpenters, masons and plumbers had to be called in before the house could be called habitable, thus entailing a fresh outlay of several hundred dollars. However, these anxieties are now mostly of the past. We have every reason to expect that next Easter will see us free from the last of these encumbrances, and entering, I hope, heart and soul into the long-needed work of making the Church more respectable, ecclesiastical and beautiful.

As we examine the style of buildings we have inherited, we perceive that the old monks had true ideas as to solidity of structure, boldness of design, beauty of outline, and

delicacy and even elegance of finish. It is much to be regretted that the various remodellings of the last one hundred and twenty years to which the Church and Rectory have been subjected, were not carried out more strictly in keeping with the character of the buildings. The result

would have been more pleasing and satisfactory.

A peculiar interest is attached to St. James' Church, which should secure the respect and even reverence of all Churchmen in the country, that is if any building in Canada is capable of inspiring one with that feeling. For this Church is the oldest Anglican place of worship in the Dominion of Canada. Here, within these walls, our Services have been conducted without interruption for one hundred and thirtytwo years. Our buildings also possess a peculiar value from an historical point of view, not only as the sole remains now standing of the earliest religious Missions in New France, but they are specially interesting to Anglicans at this time, as the Church is the only survival of the period of the erection of the See of Quebec. It is to be hoped that our friends everywhere will recognise the claims our venerable buildings have upon their consideration, and that they will strengthen our hands by valuable contributions to our restoration fund.

The Chapel for daily Services has already begun to assume the character which we hope it will bear from this time forward, a memorial of the Incumbent and Rectors of Three Rivers. A few months ago, I was so fortunate as to obtain a portrait of the first Incumbent, Rev. Legère Jean-Baptiste Aoël Veyssière, formerly Père Recollet, of the old Monastery, now our Rectory. He was Incumbent here from 1767-96. The portrait was painted in England in 1766. This historical treasure was presented by Mr. S. Grant, of Louiseville, a descendant of Mr. Veyssiere's first wife. Through the kindness of Mrs. Edward Carter, we have also been enabled to obtain a picture of the Rev. Robert Quirk Question Short, third Incumbent and first Rector. Our thanks are specially due to Mr. S. G. Wood, of Toronto, for an exquisite painting of his father, the late Rev. S. S. Wood, for forty years Rector of the Parish. It is hoped that portraits of the remaining Rectors will be presented by their friends to our Memorial Chapel. Of the olden days, I have secured but one picture, that of Frere Didace, who was buried under the old Altar in the Church in 1699, and takes rank I believe as the first Canadian Saint. I need

scarcely say that I am rather proud of our growing collection of historical portraits.

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and reed We have also undertaken the renovation of the Cemetery. Forty dollars were kindly raised in Quebec towards this work. During the Summer, all the cherry trees, bushes and weeds, which for years had overrun the ground, were rooted up, and the roads newly trimmed. Next Spring we hope to get the ground nicely levelled, and put into grass.

During the past year, the Services of the Church have been well attended. There have been three, sometimes four Services, every Sunday, besides the Sunday-School; one week-day, and thirteen Services on Holy-days. The number of celebrations in Church was thirty-four.

I regret that I have been unable to visit La Grande Mère but once. The manager of the Pulp works reads the Service every Sunday. These works are, I am informed, one of the most extensive in the world.

#### INDIAN MISSION AT LAKE ST. JOHN.

It is with much satisfaction that I present this account of our Indian Mission. Our Services have been regularly held. I have visited the Mission monthly, besides preaching the usual fortnight's Mission on the return of the hunters the beginning of the Summer. I have also made two trips to St. Prime, seven or eight miles beyond the Reserve, where Mr. Cummins, former agent at the H. B Post, resides. The Sunday Services have been ably conducted by Mr. J. A. Wilson, of the Hudson's Bay Company, of whose devotion to the Mission I cannot speak too highly. An accomplished musician, a thorough knowledge of the manner in which Services should be conducted, and many years' experience of life among the Indians; these unite to make him a valuable and desirable assistant.

As to the spiritual progress of the Indians, we can judge from outward appearances only. These certainly are as cheering as we have any right to expect. One pleasing feature of this Mission is the fact that unless prevented by sickness or some other urgent cause, all our communicants are present and communicate at every celebration of the

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Holy Communion.

Two particular cases, rather sad in their way, will give perhaps a fair idea of the pleasure these people derive from the Christian privileges we are placing within their reach. Little Peter is the first. He was the son of David Poole, a lay-reader of the Diocese of Moosonee. Everybody called him Peter Mistassini, however, after his adopted father, but this is merely the tribal name by which people are called who have no surname, an appendage possessed by few of our Indians, Little Peter missed Confirmation on the Bishop's first visit to the Reserve nearly three years ago, having arrived too late from the woods—a circumstance he never ceased to regret. A year ago, he fell into a decline whilst on the hunt, some two hundred miles north of Lake St. John. A party of Indians conveyed him to Pointe Bleue, where he was put at once into the Indian hospital. and cared for as attentively as circumstances would permit. I saw him several times before he died. I shall never forget the earnest pleading of this little soul so close to death's door, that I would give him the Bread of Life, and the pleased and contented look which spread over his black but very spiritual face, when he knew his desire was to be gratified. At every Service little Peter insisted on bring wrapped up and carried to the Post, where he was deposited on cushions and pillows; and his eyes followed every movement of the Service, and his heart was with it all. although he understood not one word of the language we used. He was enabled to attend every Service until a day or two before his death.

The other instance was Charlotte Gunner. Both she and her husband Joseph had been orphan children adopted by old Pas-che-ka-napish, the guide to Lake Mistassini. When they returned from their hunting grounds, at the north-east of that farway Lake, she was already in a decline. This was in the early Summer of 1890. Hoping she would be able to return with them, her party delayed their departure till September, but as she did not improve they were obliged to leave her behind. Quietly, patiently, and with a Christian resignation beautiful to see, she waited for death, and at the last, quaintly begged that her Confirm-

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ation Card might be buried with her. One afternoon, last June, the canoes bearing her husband and children rounded the point at the Post, and searcely waiting to land, Joseph ran to the office, where he gasped the one word "Charlotte!" No news had reached them in their distant hunting grounds, they were as completely shut off from communication with the rest of the world as if they had been in the moon. Imagine the sadness and the difficulty Mr. Wilson experienced in telling the poor fellow that his wife had been buried almost a year.

These people are indeed living witnesses of the humanising and civilising power of the Cross. They were once as savage and blood thirsty and treacherous as their neighbouring tribes. For two hundred years, we know not how much longer, they have hunted on the same grounds where their forefathers followed the chase. They still have traditions of the terrible Iroquois who hunted them like wild beasts, even to the shores of Hudson's Bay. There was recently given to me a bundle of rusty daggers and scalping knives, found one hundred and fifty miles up the Ashuapmouchouan River. There they had lain since the old Indian wars, and there they would have lain probably for ages to come, had not one of our Indians slipped on the moss-covered rock and brought them once more to light. These and similar relics of by-gone horrors point to the savage warfare once waged through all that region, and they tell us more forcibly than words that there is a wonderful power in the Cross which can transform so effectually these once savage tribes into gentle and peaceable Christians.

These Northern regions have a peculiar attractiveness for us from a Church point of view, for isolated as the trappers are on their hunting grounds, they have all been Churchmen for ages past. In their Winter cabins, during their evenings at home, they hold their religious Services, read their Bibles, sing their Hymns, and enjoy their religion.

In my last report, I mentioned the sad case of a man dying of starvation on the upper waters of one of the rivers flowing into Lake St. John. I am sorry to say that two of our Indian women, Kitty and Jane, are to-day the only representatives of a large family which succumbed in the same way a year ago. Their father Jacob was a lay-reader of the Diocese of Moosonee. No less than thirteen members

ofthis family, including the father and mother, died of

starvation during a scarcity of game.

The event of consequence to be told in this report is of course, the building of our Indian Church. I am happy to say that the Church is not only built, but it is also ready for consecration. It is a small but well-proportioned structure, capable of seating upwards of two hundred people. Built entirely of wood, open-roofed, lighted with Elizabethan windows filled with cathedral glass in amber and seagreen tints, and with the Altar sufficiently elevated, the general effect is very pleasing. Every one who has visited the Church is favourably impressed.

As very scanty particulars of the building of our Mission Churches are preserved as a rule, I shall here attempt a compact history of our Indian Mission and its Church.

The people are Mistassini Indians, whose forefathers were converted to the Church of England by agents of the Hudson's Bay Company at their Posts on James Bay. Nearly forty years ago they transferred their headquarters to Lake St. John. Three years ago Mrs. Cummins, wife of Mr. J. H. Cummins, at that time the Company's Agent at Pointe Bleue, requested me to visit them and baptise their little boy, and informing me at the same time of the existence of the Indian members of the Church.

An acre of land was given for the site by James Robertson, an enfranchised Indian. The deed of gift, sanctioned by the Indian Department, is now filed among the Diocesan records. The architect was Mr. Harry Staveley, and the Church was built last May and June by Mr. E. T. Nesbit.

The Church is insured in the Royal for \$1,000.

It must be added that about \$70 have been promised towards the purchase of a Bell, and we hope to have it in position when the Church is consecrated. To the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway Company, I am deeply indebted for many favours. To all our benefactors, the donors of splendid subscriptions, and all who have in any measure

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aided in this work, the Indians offer through me their heartiest thanks. May God bless them and theirs.

#### VALCARTIER.

The Rev. Dr. Riopel reports:-

The only noticeable occurrences this year in connection with this Mission have been:—

In July, a most delightful and successful visit for Confirmation from his Lordship.

In August, some little difficulty respecting the Assessment.

And in December, a visit of kindness and encouragement from Archdeacon Roe.

The Church still needs some outside repairs, and the want of outbuildings to the Parsonage is very much felt.

In most respects we have reason to be very well satisfied

#### WATERVILLE.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:-

There is very little in the routine of a missionary's work which calls for special mention. It is the same round of duty year by year, the same trials to meet, the same difficulties to overcome, what may be new and strange is oftentimes of such a local character that it cannot well be mentioned in a report. The Mission of Waterville has run the round of another year in peace and quietness. If there is not much to report in the way of improvement, it is comforting to be able to say, that there are no quarrels to heal. The intercourse between my people and myself has been at all times most happy, and our work, though very limited in extent, yet has been done in harmony and mutual goodwill.

Waterville.—The Services here have been regularly performed every Sunday and every Wednesday and on all principal Festivals. Holy Communion has been adminis-

tered once a month. During the Summer I took the Communion Service at 8.30 in the morning, so as not to interfere with the regular Services. It made me extra travelling, but I did not mind that, for the hearty way in which these Services were recieved more than repaid me for the extra labour, and it was equally gratifying to observe, that the good attendance at the early Service did not in the least interfere with the attendance at the regular Service held later. This was quite true of all three stations. His Lordship the Bishop paid us a visit in June and baptized two adults, and confirmed fourteen persons, twelve of whom became communicants on the following Sunday, thus raising the number of communicants for Waterville to thirty. The attendance upon Divine Service has been larger and more regular than last year. The faithful few are always in their places; but, taking the congregation as a whole, the attendance, though improved, is not yet marked with that regularity and appreciation which should characterize members of the Church of God. Out of the thirty families which make up the Waterville congregation, we should have at the least one hundred people in Church every Sunday.

The Ladies' Guild has done a good work, and not only provided for Waterville's share of the rent on the house used as a Parsonage, but has something left to meet other

demands connected with the Church.

The Sunday-School has been kept going, and on the whole it has done fairly well. For several months in the Summer and during the time that we had afternoon Services, I superintended the school myself and taught a small Bible Class. The attendance of the children was good, and all the teachers were most regular and devoted. Since we resumed Morning Services, the school has been under the charge of Capt. Parker.

The Rev. Mr. Balfour kindly gave us a Magic Lantern Exhibition, which was thoroughly enjoyed by both parents

and children.

A series of Evangelistic Services were held at Waterville during the Lenten Season, at which a kind help was given me by the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, Dr. Adams, Dr. Allnatt, Canon Thorneloe, and the Rev. A. Stevens. Both weather and roads were against us, so that the attendance was not what I had expected, but still there was good

done, and the little congregation of Waterville was strengthened by the presence, as well as by the good words of the friends who came to us.

The assessment to the Diocesan Board, and all other claims upon this congregation, have been promptly paid. Also, a substantial Christmas Offering was given to the Clergyman's family, as an expression of their appreciation

and good-will.

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North Hatley.—This station has had a Service every Sunday, usually in the afternoon, but whilst the Summer visitors were there, I gave a Morning Service, Waterville congregation kindly giving up their Morning Service for that purpose. All of the Services were well attended whilst the visitors were with us, a large proportion of whom were Church people and devout communicants. Through their kindness and liberality, we have been enabled to purchase and pay for a suitable site upon which to erect a Church, besides having on hand \$100 worth of lumber and \$70 in cash with which to begin operations. Mr. Goodhue, of Barton, an architect by profession, kindly asked us to allow him to make the plans for the proposed Church, as he wished to make a contribution towards its erection in that way. We thankfully accepted his offer, and now have plans for a pretty Church which is to cost \$1,000, exclusive of the east window. These plans have been submitted to his Lordship the Bishop and his approval obtained, so that I hope a Church will be built at North Hatley during the coming Summer. It is now beyond a doubt that North Hatley will increase in importance as a Summer resort, and as the presence of so many strangers will tend to increase business of all kinds, the place must grow—in fact is growing rapidly now—and in a short time must become a large and important centre. It is most desirable, therefore, that we should as soon as possible have a Church of our own. At present, our hold upon the people of the place is very slender indeed, very few willing to identify themselves with the Church in any way. There seems to be nothing but struggle and disappointment for our few people, who all told, only number seven families and five communicants. Of course we shall succeed if we persevere, but it will take years of hard work to build up the Church. We shall have to wait for and to educate the young. There can be no question, but that the devoted attachment of the Summer visitors to the Church—shining out year by year—will have an influence for good, and must ere long be helpful, but, at present, it is uphill work. It is true that there are some kind and devoted people living at and around North Hatley, from whom I have personally, received many kindnesses and much sympathy, but they are not Church people; still I have often been very thankful for their help and sympathy. At Christmas, this congregation kindly remembered the Clergyman and his family by a substantial proof of good-will, and already this season, Mr. McNiel has sent me a large load of oats for my horse. The Summer visitors also sent me a very handsome gift, which they asked me to accept for my personal use, as an expression of their appreciation of my labours amongst them.

The Diocesan Board Assessment and other claims have been promptly paid, and \$5.00 annually towards the rent of the Parsonage is paid by this congregation. I am now only giving North Hatley a fortnightly Service. The Universalists to whom the Church belong claim it every second Sunday at the hour we need it. The alternate

Service I give to one of the out-stations.

Eastis.—This station has had a regular Sunday Service, usually in the evening-with a Morning Service once a month for Holy Communion and occasional Cottage Services in private houses at Lower Capelton. The attendance for the year, with the exception of the Holy Communion. has not been up to the average of last year. This may be owing in part to the fact, that the men at Lower Capelton have to work at night every second week, and many of them have to work on Sundays, another reason and one that is warmly urged by the people themselves is, "that there is no Church to worship in." The place where Divine Service is held is used for a School-room, and for all kinds of gathering and entertainment during the week, and is therefore without the sacredness which should characterise the place in which Almighty God is worshipped, and His Sacraments administered. Whether these reasons—which in the main are perfectly true—will account for the irregularity of attendance, I cannot say, but this fact is apparent to all, that although tens of thousands of dollars worth of ore have been taken out of Capelton Hills, yet there is not a place specially devoted to the worship of God, at any of the Mines. There are at Eastis and Lower Capelton twentytwo families, who either in whole or in part belong to the Church, and twelve individuals not included in any family.

The Lord Bishop visited Eastis in June and confirmed six persons, all of whom become communicants, thus making sixteen communicants for this station.

The ladies have formed a Guild for the purpose of raising money to build a Church between Eastis and Lower

Capelton.

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y of entyThere are some very earnest and devoted Church people at Eastis and Lower Capelton, there are also many warm and kind friends who, as yet, do not see their way clear to be confirmed, but who attend our Services and help us in our work. I am very anxious, therefore, to see a Church built between these two places, for I feel satisfied that it would tend more than anything else to bind us together in a bond of mutual love and devoted effort, and certainly it would be very helpful in bringing in the indifferent and irregular worshippers.

The different assessments for Church-work have been promptly paid, and \$10.00 a year contributed towards the rent on the Parsonage, besides a substantial Christmas

offering to the Clergyman.

The Sunday-School has gone on successfully under the charge of Mr. Nelson Martin, and the faithful teachers associated with him. It is a matter of sincere regret to me, that I cannot do more to help in Sunday-School work, but while present arrangement of Services continues, or until we have Churches of our own, it is simply impossible.

Upper Capelton.—In this village there are nine families who claim to belong to the Church and a few individuals not included in families. With the exception of one family, none of these people ever attend Service at Eastis. For several weeks I gave a week-night Service, but after a fair trial I had to give it up, for want of an attendance. If we cannot arrange for a Sunday Service at the Albert, these people must be lost to the Church.

Thanksgiving Services for the Harvest were held at each station, and were well attended.

I desire to express my sincerest thanks to all the Church-Wardens in the Mission for their kind help and ready cooperation.






REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING COMMITTEE OF THE DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY, 1891.

The amounts contributed during the year are:—Domestic, \$1,619.96, and Foreign, \$1,706.37, making a total of \$3,326.33. Compared with the previous year, this shows a falling off of \$594.75.

It will be seen that the main decrease is in the amount for Foreign Missions, and this is owing to the fact that the subscriptions in the last few years have been increased from sources that cannot be expected to be permanent. In Domestic Missions there is, under the head of General Purposes, a falling off of \$180.76, and also of \$29.00 in the sum contributed to the Diocese of Qu'Appelle; but on the other hand there is an increase in the amounts given to each of the other N. W. Dioceses, so that when all are considered the net decrease is \$78.65. The particulars are given in the following table:—

### WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

The Annual Report of the Women's Auxiliary for the year ending May, 1891, contains the following items:—

Two new Branches have been formed, making the total number twenty Senior Branches one sub-division of a Branch and three Junior Branches, consisting of nine hundred and sixty members against seven hundred the previous year.

The sum of \$1,158.89 has been raised for Missions. The year before it was \$898.56 only, showing an increase of \$260.33.

The education of the eldest daughter of the Rev. A. Allman (Diocese of Algoma) has been undertaken by the Quebec Branch.

The sum of \$100 has been promised the Rev. W. A. Burman, for three years, to assist in paying a lady teacher at St. Paul's Industrial School, Rupert's Land, and that of \$50 to the Rev. H. T. Bourne, for the same period, for the extension of the Indian School on the Piegan Reserve.

Quebec's share of the expenses of fitting out and sending Miss Sherlock, as Medical Missionary to Japan, will be \$150 in 1891-92.

Fify members have joined the "Extra Cent-a-day-Fund;" an opportunity for self-denial in luxuries, &c., (open to men, women and children) by which \$182.50 will be contributed to Missions over and above anything that was given before.

The number of barrels, boxes, &c., of clothing has increased from thirty in 1890 to forty-seven in 1891. No money value is now placed upon these gifts of love sent by the following Branches:—Compton, one barrel Diocese Saskatchewan; Cookshire, one barrel Shingwauk Home; Inverness, one barrel Rev. M. Scott, (Diocese Athabasca); Lennoxville, two barrels Wawanosh Home, and one Rev. R.

Scott (Athabasca), Rev. J. Tims (Calgary), two boxes Rev. A Young (Algoma); St. Michael's, one box to Bishop of Algoma, Bishop of Qu'Appelle, and Sault Ste. Stocken (Calgary); Trinity, two barrels Bishop of Algoma; St. Sylvestre, one package Shingwauk Home; West Frampton, one package Rev. J. Tims (Calgary); Windsor Mills, one package Spring Hill Mines (Nova Scotia).

The Secretary's Report of the Church Helpers' Association.

During the past year there has been a greatly increased interest awakened in mission work within the Diocese.

An Association for furthering the work has been organized by the Church Women of this city: whose primary object is to aid the Church in the poorer parts of the Diocese, and improve the condition of the Clergy therein.

Circulars containing the Constitution and By-Laws, were sent to thirty-four of the clergy, only eleven of whom responded to the proffered aid.

Boxes of clothing, books, etc., have been sent to the parishes for distribution, but always with the suggestion that the clergyman's family would first take what would be of service to themselves. Labrador, Gaspé, Dixville, Maple Grove, Melbourne and Bury have been assisted in this way and most grateful letters received in reply. A Communion Service was sent to the Church at Portneuf, and a stole for the Clergyman, also a stole for the Incumbent at Dixville.

A very pleasing task was the furnishing of a Mission House at Labrador for the Rev. Mr. Sutherland. Many members contributed liberally to this, and if their energies could be enlisted as heartly in all calls upon us, the Association would have no doubts for its future prosperty.

Shortly after organizing, it was resolved that the Association should undertake the work of collecting for the Church Society. A leaflet was issued explaining the work of the Church Society, hoping that if the facts were brought before the members of the Church, they would not fail to respond with true Christian liberality. A change of collecting by streets instead of parishes as formerly, entailed some confusion this year, but the results were exceedingly satisfactory, and it is to be hoped in future the work will be more easily carried on.

The Association numbers one hundred and sixty-four members. There have been five General Meetings, with an average attendance of sixty members, also ten meetings of the Executive Committee with only a fair attendance.

Mrs. Williams having kindly given the use of her lawn, the first Annual Fair was held on the 16th of September. The arrangements were most artistic and the tables well filled, but the proceeds did not meet our expectations.

We have also to acknowledge the kindness of Mrs. Williams in giving to the Association one hundred mite boxes.

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ne ispe We are indebted to the proprietors of the *Chronicle* and *Telegraph* for their kindness in printing the Constitution and By-Laws and sundry notices in their respective issues, also to Messrs. Scott and Borland for cartage of effects to the steamer "Otter," free of charge.

We regret to have to chronicle the decease of one of our Vice-Presidents, Mrs. G. Robinson. She had attended all meetings of the Association up to the time of her death, and promised to become a most useful member by her pleasant helpful ways.

### OF THE CORPORATION.

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### FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Mission Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen

of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, called

the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the Church in the Mission of.......................(or at ....................) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and Church-Wardens of the Church in the said Mission (or at.......................)

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Or,—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday-Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the principles of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage-houses,—the setting apart of burial-grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and lifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (describe the real estate clearly) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italies insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as in No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say:—upon the trusts to hold the same for ever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England, in the Diocese of Quebec, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.
