

## ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL.

**T**HE Rev. Benjn. Cronyn, M. A. came to London in the year 1832, a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, he was sent out under the auspices of the Society for the propagation of the Gospel, and was appointed to the charge of London Township, and resided where the site of the Ladies' Hellmuth College now is. At that time London was only a small village and was called "The Forks," being the junction of the north and south branches of the river Thames. The Rev Mr. Cronyn saw that London was likely to become a considerable town and removed there, having obtained from the English Government a large allotment of land as an endowment for a church and a few acres in the town as a site for the church. He erected the first St. Pauls in 1838, it was a wooden building, and was destroyed by fire on Ash Wednesday the year after.

In 1842 the present church was erected on the same site. When the Diocese was set apart from that of Toronto, the rector was then

elected as the first bishop, and St. Pauls then became the Cathedral Church. The Right Rev. Bishop Cronyn continued for some years, to hold the Rectorship, and resigned in 1868, when the Rev Isaac Hellmuth, D. D. who was principal of Huron College, was appointed rector, and subsequently elected Coadjutor Bishop in the early part of 1871. At the end of that year Bishop Cronyn died, and Bishop Hellmuth succeeded to the full charge of the Diocese, appointing the Rev Geo. M. Innes, M. A. to the rectory. Bishop Hellmuth resigned in 1883, and the Dean of Montreal, the very Rev. Maurice Scollard Baldwin, D. D. was elected as third bishop of Huron, appointing the rector of St. Pauls, Dean, in 1888.

Vast improvements have been made on the original church, at a cost of about \$60,000, the galleries removed, transepts and a new chancel built, and a large addition connected with the chancel on the north side. The accomodation afforded by this addition has enabled the Bishop to concentrate all the Diocesan work around the Cathedral, it consists of a large hall, seating six hundred which is used as a Synod Hall, and also for the Cathedral Sunday School, a large Committee room, offices for the Bishop, the Synod Secretary, the Wardens' vestry, the Clergy and Choir vestries besides a room as a book depository; altogether it is a most complete arrangement for uniting diocesan and parochial work. The Cathedral seats 1350, the choir, of 60 surpliced members, is second to none in Canada. Various organizations are connected with the church, St. Andrews Brotherhood, Senior and Junior, Mothers' Meeting, Church Workers' Association, the Guild, Several Bible Classes, the Christian Endeavor Society.

In 1862 St. Paul's Cathedral was the only Church of England in London, and it was felt that in consequence of the increase of popul-

Christ Church was built and opened for service in 1863, and the present Dean of Huron and Rector of the Cathedral was appointed the first incumbent. The growth af the city has been so rapid that new Churches have been erected, the "Memorial Church," All Saints and St. Matthews in the east, St. Georges in the the west, St. James in the south and St. John the Evangelist, in the north, thus London with a population of 40,000, has now eight Churches of England.

The Very Rev. Dean Innes came to St Paul's in 1868 as Curate to the then Dean Isaac Hellmuth, and since 1871 has presided over the congregation, altogether a period of thirty-two years.

## MEMORIAL CHURCH.

**T**HE Cronyn Memorial Church was erected in memory of the late Right Rev. Benjamin Cronyn, D. D., first Bishop of Huron, by the members of his family.

It was opened for Divine Service and consecrated on Sunday, 14th December, 1873, by the Right Rev Isaac Hellmuth, D. D., then Bishop of Huron.

It is a condition of the deed of the Church that all pews and sittings

therein shall be free and never subject to rent or assessment of any kind.

The congregation provided the Schoolhouse, Rectory and an organ. The first cost of these, together with the Church site and building, amounted to \$28,500.

In 1879, Mr. V. Cronyn added transepts and gallery to the Church, thus bringing the seating capacity up to 720.

In 1882 the interior of the church was improved and renovated, and the walls and ceiling frescoed.

In 1884 further adjoining land was purchased, a new Rectory erected thereon, Schoolhouse enlarged, with sexton's residence attached.

In 1898 the present fine organ was obtained, from R. S. Williams & Co., Toronto, for \$3,000.

In 1900, under the auspices of the Rector, the Rev. C. C. Owen, a Century Fund was inaugurated for the renovation and improvement of the Church buildings, to increase the accomodation of the Schoolhouse, and to provide a contribution towards the Mission Fund of the Diocese of Huron, and pay existing debt on the organ, which resulted in money and subscriptions to \$6,318.

Accordingly the roof of both Church and Schoolhouse have been reshingled, the interior of the Church thoroughly renovated and improved in many respects, particularly in new windows of stained glass, new gasoliers, refrescoing the walls, reflooring and reseating the Chancel in hard wood, and new ceiling for the same, new side-walks and steps; an entire new system of heating for both Church and Schoolhouse, and the Schoolhouse completely remodeled and its accomodation about doubled, including fourteen classrooms with folding doors.

The estimated value of the whole Church property is now at least \$45,000.



## ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

SERVICES were held in the old public school house on the south side of Askin Street, by the late Rev. James Smythe, M. A. in about the year 1868. Some time after this the Rev. Canon Innes, now Dean of Huron, conducted the service in the same place. In the year 1873 the little band of faithful workers encouraged by Mrs. Cronyn, wife of the first Bishop of Huron, then residing in the neighborhood, undertook to put up a little church. It was intended that Bishop Cronyn should conduct services in this proposed church, but he died in the Summer of 1871. However the work went on, and the church was opened for Divine Service in November, 1873, costing about \$2,500 The present Dean and the Rev. J. G. Baylis, now of Montreal, conducted the services. A Sunday School was organized with Mr. John Pope as Superintendent, who still holds that position. In the month of February, 1874, Bishop Hellmuth appointed the Rev. E. Davis of Bayfield to this charge, making a new parish of St. James and Petersville. Mr Davis entered upon his work in this new field on the 23rd day of March 1874. The two first wardens of St. James were Mr. John Beattie and Mr. John Pope. He continued the work in the two places for some three years. At that time a lot was secured and the brick on the ground for a new church in Petersville. Mr. Davis then gave up to the rector of the Cathedral that part of the work and confined his energies to St. James'. The congregation in the little church increased so that the adjoining lot was purchased at a cost of \$1000 and a new church

erected thereon, which was opened November 18th, 1877. The little church was used for Sunday school purposes, and a few years later an addition was put to it costing over \$1000.

In the year 1893 this Schoolhouse was pulled down and the present one erected on the same lot at a cost of over \$5000. It was opened in the month of October, and was pronounced to be one of the best and with its many classrooms, one of the most suitable and up-to-date Schoolhouses in Western Ontario. The last changes were made in the year 1897, when the Church was enlarged and remodeled as it now stands, and is considered one of the most Ecclesiastical and handsomest churches in the Diocese. It was opened October 24th.




## ST. JOHN'S CHURCH.

THE present Church, St. John the Evangelist London, had as its origin the old Chapel of St. John's which formerly stood in the grounds now occupied by the Western University, or as better known Huron College. This Chapel was consecrated October 18th, 1863, and owed its erection mainly to Mrs. Hellmuth, the wife of the late Bishop, and to Major R. L. Evans who erected it in memory of their father, Lieut. General Evans. After many years of worship there the members of this chapel moved to the Chapter House which was then a part of St. Paul's Parish, and which was opened for Divine Service on November 2nd. 1873, the preachers on this occasion being the Lord Bishop of Quebec and Ontario. Here the congregation was faithfully served under the charge of the Very Rev. Dean Boomer, and after his death, the many changes which followed a movement was set on foot to erect the present church, St. John the Evangelist. By the indefatigable efforts of the late Rev. G. Fowell and the members, thoughts were soon put into action.

The Ladies' Aid, a parish organization bought and paid for the site; a subscription list was started, to which the members and many kind friends elsewhere generously responded, and on November 11th, 1888, the Church was opened, the sermons on that occasion being preached by the Bishop of the Diocese, and the Very Rev. the Dean. Many handsome gifts at that time were made to the church, among others, the east window in memory of the late Dean Boomer, erected by the efforts of the ladies; lectern and brass standards, by the Rev. S. Fowell; a stone Font by the family in memory of Gabriel Mani-

Hill, a Credence Table by the Rev. S. Archer, now of the Diocese of Niagara: a Reredos erected by Mrs. Cox in memory of her husband; a stained glass window given by the members in memory of Dr. Jones, a faithful and devoted member: a Prayer Desk, by the Bible Class and Sunday School, on the day of the Queen's Jubilee, and a Spire erected by Mr. J. Kent, in memory of Mrs. Isabella Kent, and adding very much to the beauty and completion of the sacred edifice. The Church of St. John the Evangelist is a spacious building, seating about 450, with central and side aisles, connected with a good school house of two rooms occupied as vestry and Bible class room.

Besides the service on Sundays, all Saints' days and Festivals are observed. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is celebrated every Sunday morning at 8.30, and on the 1st and 3rd Sundays, and all Saints' Days at midday. The present Rector is the Rev. W. T. Hill, M. C., Durham University England, who has been in residence since the opening of the church on November 11th, 1888.

## ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH.

**S**T. George's Church, West London is situated on the Wharncliffe Road, north of Empress Avenue and south of St. Patrick Street, the property consists of nearly two acres, being part of the Peter's estate, primarily owned by the Kent family. In addition to the church there are a rectory and Sunday school buildings.

In the year 1876 a small and neat brick church was built where the Sunday School now stands. This edifice was enlarged about seven or eight years later. The present church in which the congregation worships was erected in 1890. Through the munificence of a few members of the congregation a rectory was added in 1893.

The earliest religious services held in St. George's Church were in charge of St. Paul's Cathedral. The first incumbent who gave his sole care to the requirements of the Parish was the Rev. E. E. Newman, Canon of the Diocese of Huron, being appointed Rector in the year 1881. After a revered and successful ministry of seven years he retired from active service. For a portion of this time he was ably assisted by the Rev. Wm. Lowe, now Rector of Wingham. The present Rector, the Rev. G. B. Sage, was chosen to succeed the Rev. Canon Newman in June, 1888.

The following gentlemen have had the office of Churchwarden for longer or shorter periods: Mr. Samuel Gibson, Col. Peters, Messrs. E. Edmonds, Ald. Jolly, J. H. Lings, J. E. Snow, Dr. Kingsmill, Messrs R. A. Jones and R. F. Kingsmill.

Kingsmill, Macdonald and Peters.

A Parish register has been kept since 1881, consequently there are no parochial records of baptisms, marriages or burials prior to that date.

## CHRIST CHURCH.

CHRIST Church, London, Ontario, corner of Wellington and Hill Streets, was erected in the year 1862, and was the second English Church established in the city. Many of those who took an active part in the building thereof have long since passed away, including the late Messrs Graydon, Ferguson, Whitehead, Robinson, Col. Taylor and others, and many prominent ladies including Mrs. Cronyn, wife of the then Bishop of the Diocese of Huron. The first Rector to be appointed was the Reverend G. M. Innes, M. A., by whom services had previously been held in the open air on the spot where the Church now stands. After a short Pastorate of about a year, he removed to Quebec, but subsequently returned to the City and now for many years has held the position as Rector of the Cathedral, and Dean of Huron. His successor at Christ Church was the late Reverend Jas. Smythe, M. A., who remained in charge for a period of eleven years and then removed to Strathroy. He was succeeded by the Reverend Canon Smith, Rural Dean of Middlesex in the year 1875, and who continued in that position for nearly 20 years, during which time the congregation made many improvements to the buildings at a cost of over \$2000, and also erected a School House, placing the sum of \$878, on the offertory plate on the opening day, February 14, 1892, as the united offerings of the GUILD, LADIES' AID, SUNDAY SCHOOL, and private members and friends. The Sunday School became the second largest in the City, and the number of families on the list largely increased. The various Paro-

chial associations, including the W. A. M. A., and Mission Bands, the King's Daughters and Christian Endeavor, and the Band of Hope and Mercy, became so many centres of Church life, and very helpful in their several spheres.

In 1894 the Rev. Canon Smith was superannuated on account of his health having failed. He was succeeded by the present Rector, the Rev. J. H. Moorhouse, who removed from Ingersoll in September. The late Mr. Wm. Robinson, for many years City Engineer, was a staunch friend of this church, and through his kind bequest of \$800 the debt was reduced by that amount near the close of 1894. Since then the sum of about \$1800, including a kind donation of \$150 from Mr. Thos. Kent, has been raised for church renovation, debt, etc., and besides meeting all its current expenses, the church has substantially increased its contributions to the Diocesan Funds and to Mission Work. A Century Fund is being raised, and to this appeal there has been a general and kindly response, \$1,025.00 having been already subscribed. Since 1894 over one hundred have been confirmed, and in addition to the active church organizations above mentioned, a Church-women's Guild has been formed which has done excellent work. The present Churchwardens are Messrs. R. H. Cullis and J. Molland, and the Lay Representatives to Synod, Messrs. R. M. McElheran and A. E. Welch.

Christ Church has always been the home especially of the Railway men and their families. There is a comfortable brick Rectory, with ample grounds close at hand. The church has a seating capacity of 500, and the sittings being free, the humblest as well as the wealthier may find here a hearty welcome.

## ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH.

THE present Church of St. Matthew's may be said to be an outcome of the Congregation that formerly worshipped at St. Luke's Church on the Hamilton Road until 1881 when Divine service began in St. Matthew's church on Rectory Street.

A Preacher's book kept by the Rev. F. Fletcher contains the following entry at the time of opening St. Matthew's church:—

“This church was opened for Divine Service on the 21st. Sunday after Trinity, November 6th., 1881. This church is the continuation of St. Luke's Parish Church.” This book has entries of Divine Service for several years before St. Matthew's was opened (as above).

Both St. Luke's and its successor St. Matthew's were frame buildings, the latter was the Mortuary Chapel of the Cemetery of St. Paul's in London E., it was removed to the South side of Landas Street, near the present limits of the City and enlarged and in it many of the families of East London have worshipped from year to year.

The preacher's book recalls names well known in the past to Londoners. The opening sermons in St. Matthew's in 1881 were preached by the Bishop of Huron, and the Rev. W. H. Ramsay, M. A. The bishop's text was St. John XIII, 38.

The Rev. W. Minter Seaborne took charge of St. Matthew's and of Emmanuel Church, London Township in 1883.

In January 18,— the Rev. Geo. M. Cox succeeded him. This church is in an important Railway and Manufacturing District.

The present handsome brick church was erected and opened for Divine service on the 25th July 1895. The design is very tasteful and it is elegantly furnished and lighted. It will no doubt form a very important Anglican centre. The cost of the church approximated \$8000.

The building Committee at the time of opening were Messrs. A. Cook, Harry Stratfold, George Axton, Richard P. Wright, John R. Isaac, H. Brown, Secretary, and John Chadwick, Chairman.

Churchwardens were Messrs John Phillips and the late R. Chadwick. Mr. H. Brown was Sunday School Superintendent then.

The present Bishop of Huron, the Right Rev. Maurice S. Baldwin, D. D., preached at the opening service and the Dean of Huron and many of the Clergy assisted thereat.

Emmanuel Church was united to St. John's London Township in Easter 1899.

The Present Churchwardens are Messrs R. P. Wright and R. Farrell. Organist, Mr. Fred Fitzgerald, Sexton, M. Bruin, Sunday School Superintendent, Mr. Joseph Ward.

And that spirit needs to be manifested toward masses of adults who are still children in moral attainment.

Good counsels observed are chains to grace, which, neglected, prove halters to undutiful children.

DIFFIDENCE.—A man is generally most conscious of failure in what he does best. The impulse to do the best is the vision of the ideal, and the real in ordinary human affairs always falls below that. It is not the feeble and the ineffectual in the art of doing good who most feel their imperfection. It is the man who has given his life and spent his strength who most feels himself to be an unprofitable servant. There is encouragement here for the disheartened and warning for the self-satisfied.



Over Sensitiveness.—Of all disagreeable people, the "abused" are the most trying, and the lot of one doomed to associate with them is anything but enviable. Always on the alert for slights or neglects, so very sensitive as to imagine the condemnation of any act or circumstance an indirect thrust at themselves, crushed if their friends presume to look through other spectacles than theirs, they are jealous if their full confidence is not in all instances bestowed, although they think nothing of betraying that confidence.

Tares.—"I have noticed," remarks an American writer, "that when I fill my garden with strong healthy plants I have comparatively little trouble with weeds; but if there is much unoccupied space I am kept constantly fighting the persistent chickweed, the coarse dock, the valiant plantain. In a shady corner of my yard, which, notwithstanding my efforts, used to be an unsightly spot, I have found that the introduction of vigorous woodland ferns has greatly disheartened the weeds. In a sunny bed, which early in the season calls for a good deal of labor, after many nasturtiums are well grown, with their great shield-shaped leaves and brilliant blossoms, the weeds are generally crowded out, and give up the struggle for existence. So I am led to hope that in my moral garden a constant strengthening of the virtues will in time completely discourage the vices."

If you have felt left out of a conversation because you did not know about the subjects being discussed, and the talker turned to someone who did know, do not draw away and feel hurt; forget yourself and show an interest by attentive listening, or asking sensible questions—there is nothing a talker likes better than an interested listener. Putting yourself in somebody else's place is a good antidote against the heaviness which comes when you allow yourself to think you have been neglected.

Getting and Giving.—The truly noble life, the one highest in aim and purpose, is the life of giving. This does not exclude gratification and getting, but ennobles and sanctifies them. All the good inherent in the life of getting continues in the life of giving; for to give one must have. The pursuit of wealth and knowledge still remains. Its joy and happiness are in nowise diminished, but increased, since possession now becomes of real worth, for the old adage is true what we gave we have. "Money hoarded or spent upon ourselves may prove a millstone about our neck, that spent upon others may lift us up with wings like eagles."


