Lacre Are Now 322,000 Bicycles in Use in the French Republic on Which annon a Taxes Are Paid. New York, June 18.—A London special says: Recent facts and figures from all parts of Europe prove that the bike craze has now become universal. The increase in France, where exact re-turns are collected, is typical. Three years ago, when the tax on cycles was first levied, the number in the coun-try was 120,000. Last year the total had exactly doubled. When the es-timates for 1896 were drawn up the financial officials deemed justified the calculation that there would be 40,000 additional bicycles.
