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### HILLCREST CONVALESCENT HOME

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### The Fourth Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this Institution was held in Association Hall, Yonge St., on Tuesday, October 13th, at 3.30 p.m. Many of the friends and well-wishers of the Institution attended.

Mr. W. H. Howland was present and took the chair. The Rev. John Pearson opened the meeting by prayer.

Letters were read from Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, Dr. Hoskin, the Mayor of Toronto, Dr. Potts, Mr. W. B. Mc Murrich, Dr. Thomas and others, regretting that they were not able to be present at the meeting.

Mr. J. I. Davidson then read the Secretary's Report and moved that it be adopted.

It is as follows.:—

### Fourth Annual Report.

N presenting this, the fourth Annual Report to the friends and supporters of Hillcrest Convalescent Home, the Board of Managers would desire first of all to express their thanks and gratitude to Almighty God who has in an especial manner blessed us and has given us "good success" in in what we have undertaken.

This has been a year of great progress with us. During it we have undertaken and carried through successfully three important improvements, by which we have almost doubled our accommodation for patients and greatly added to the efficiency of our Home. These alterations were rendered necessary by the very large increase in the number of our patients at Hillcrest. We did not undertake them too soon.

The first of these was the building of a roadway. When the late Mr. Wm. Gooderham so generously gave an acre of land for the site of Hillcrest, he promised the Institution an entrance into the Home when the adjoining land should be laid out into building lots; unhappily no right of way was secured by the deed. When after his death the property passed into other hands, we found ourselves closed in without any entrance of our own to the Home. The Company, however, to whom the land belongs very kindly allowed us to use a road through their land to the back. This arrangement was of course only temporary and in January last we became convinced that we must have our own entrance to the Home whatever it might cost; and we knew that owing to the position of Hillcrest which stands right on the brow of Well's Hill, it could not fail to be expensive. Many were the consultations as to what was best to be done, but finally we were obliged to give up all thought of purchasing more land and it was decided to build a road curving in from the Vaughan plank road at the back. This has been done, and we have now a good durable road; but it has cost us altogether seven hundred and seventy dollars.

Our next consideration was putting in a water supply Hitherto we had been dependent on a well and pump only, and the labor of carrying water up and down through the house to supply so many was excessive. It was decided that a wind-mill should be erected, with two tanks, one in the house to supply it, the other on the tower for the garden, with a hose attachment for use in case of fire. The digging of the new well and the cost of putting up the wind-mill was \$320.00 and this large expense also has fallen on us this year.

Owing to the very large increase in the number of our inmates,

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and also to the fact that the new improvements in putting in water into the Home, would take up two of the rooms hitherto available for patients, the Committee decided to build a new wing for the use of the male patients exclusively. When we remember that the Home has only been in operation for four years, for it was only regularly opened for the admission of cases on March 1st., 1887, it will be seen how great has been the growth of the work, and how the public are realizing more and more the necessity of a Convalescent Home.

As the Committee after their four years experience in managing Hillcrest, had gained a clear idea of what was actually needed; we decided to manage without an architect. Mr. Darragh drew the plans for the new wing, and Mr. Dudley was our builder.

The New Wing which was formally opened on Thursday Oct, 22nd., is built to the north-west corner of the former building, and is 48 ft. 4 in. in length by 28 feet in width. It will accommodate 27 men. Great care was taken in building it to match the first house. It is of red brick, roofed with slate and is comfortable and commodious in every respect; for while it was our endeavor to avoid all unnecessary expense, we had determined that everything should be solid and substantial. The walls are of an extra thickness ensuring warmth and quiet, and are finished with adamant plaster; the floors are of hardwood throughout, except the top flat, where the traffic will be less; the woodwork is plain and good. Great pains have been taken to secure the most satisfactory system of water supply, and our baths, etc. have the newest sanitary arrangements, approved by hospitals. verandahs which have given so much comfort to the patients have not been omitted. In short every one who has seen the wing will acknowledge that it is a great improvement and an ornament to the Home.

Like the home the wing has four floors in all. The lowest or basement contains;—a furnace room, coal, storage, and vegetable cellar. The ground floor;—an entrance hall, the dining-room and sitting-room, (divided by folding doors) 46 ft. 6 in. long, by 17 feet in width; both rooms well lighted and furnished with grates. The first floor;—a bath-room, and two wards to hold five and six beds respectively, both with grates in addition to the registers for hot air. The second floor;—one large ward capable of accommodating ten beds; two small wards for special cases, and a room for the man-servant.

It will be seen that the new wing is complete in itself. With the exception of a door on the ground floor it is entirely shut off from the first house. The Committee has thus ensured what it has long aimed at, the complete separation of the male and female patients.

The alterations in the former house, include the division of the large ward downstairs formerly occupied by men, into three rooms for the use of private patients. A bright sitting-room has also been set apart for these and every provision has been made for their comfort.

The Home will now hold in all 54 patients; 23 women, 27 men in the public wards, and 4 private patients.

The total liabilities assumed by the Committee for the new building, alterations to house etc., were \$5710.75, of which \$3,644 has already been paid off leaving \$2066.75 still to be met by the Committee. Besides which we still owe \$110 for the roadway, so that there remains \$2,176.75 still to be raised. Besides this we have nothing in hand wherewith to furnish the new wing; the private wards too will require extra furniture, and many a gap

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will have to be filled before all departments are in perfect running order. We wish to furnish as gradually as may be, but with every care we must incur heavy expenses on this account during the coming year. We confidently appeal to the liberality of our friends, and ask the public to give us a sufficient sum for this purpose before the winter. We do not feel justified in borrowing money for furnishing and if we cannot get it, we shall be obliged I fear to refuse applications for want of it.

During the year 321 patients have been admitted to Hillcrest. This is an increase of 80 overthe numbers of last year. An especially large increase when we consider how much the building operations of the last several months have interfered with the ordinary work of the Home. Of these 321 patients, 14 were children under twelve years of age; while of the adults 170 were women and 137 were men. Of this number the great majority have been sent from the General Hospital, or have been paid for by the city only forty having been sent by friends, or paid for themselves.

It is very gratifying to testify to the good behaviour of the patients. As a general thing each one who remains there tries to contribute their share toward the general good, and it is quite touching to find how after being there, perhaps only three or four weeks some of them look back on it as a home. "Indeed it is a home, and Miss Law is like a mother to us," said one. "I never felt any place so much like home since mother died," said another, "I only wish I could stay here always." That last indeed is the universal cry. "That Home would be perfect if the people did not have to leave it," says one of our workers, "it is such a heartbreak for some of them to go." No doubt many shrink from going back to the old struggles and trials which must be faced. It is the aim of Hillcrest in offering to such, rest, bodily and mental, and

by turning their thoughts to higher things, to fit them for this battle.

The Committee would again acknowledge the valuable services of Miss Law, the Matron, and Miss Keith, the Assistant Matron. Their hearts are wholly in the work, and with tenderness and faithfulness they discharge their varied duties. With unfailing kindness each new patient is welcomed, and made to feel at once that Hillcrest is a home. Each new demand, and there are so many, upon their sympathy and kindness is met ungrudgingly and freely.

Very few even of the unthankful and chronically discontented, fail to be won by such goodness. In many hearts the long-dormant desire to live for someone, something, but self, has been awakened, and among the patients, gratitude has been the rule—discontent decidedly the exception.

Our thanks are also due to the Medical Staff. The public are apt to take the kindness of medical men too much as a matter of course. It is well to remember that in giving freely of their time and skill in the service of the poor they are generous benefactors.

We would also gratefully remember those Clergymen who have from time to time held services at Hillcrest; the students of Knox, Trinity, and Wycliffe Colleges, and McMaster Hall who have given services in turn on Sunday afternoons; and the friends who have, by reading and talking to the patients, made many a dull hour pass pleasantly.

Our thanks are due to those who have subscribed to our funds—to whose liberality we owe the New Wing,—to the friends who remembered us at Christmas; to those who have sent books, cast-off clothing, etc.; and to all who have helped us in any way.

The Treasurer's report which appears elsewhere, was then read by Mr. Hoyles, who moved that it be adopted, which motion was seconded by Mr. Henry O'Brien.

The medical report was read by Dr. Spencer, who moved that it be accepted, Dr. Wishart seconded this.

The names of the members of the Board of Management for the ensuing year were read by Rev. Dr. Parsons and their nomination was seconded by Mr. Cecil Gibson.

Rev. Mr. Wrong, seconded by Dr. Spencer, moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Howland for his services as chairman, while Dr. Wishart seconded by Dr. Parsons, voted thanks to the Board of Management. After which the Benediction was pronounced and the meeting adjourned.

### Medical Report.

To the President and Board of Managers of Hillcrest Convalescent Home:

MESDAMES.-

I beg to present the medical report for the year now ended, which is as follows:—

During the year there have been admitted to the Home 137 males, and 170 females besides 14 children, giving a total of 321.

Of these, by far the larger number have come to us from the Toronto General Hospital, no less than 214 having been admitted from that Institution; 6 from the Homœpathic Hospital; 3 from St. John's Hospital; and the remainder 98, from outside sources.

It has not been found possible to classify the diseases for which these have been admitted in every case; but from the records at our disposal, it appears that by far the larger number have been convalescents from typhoid fever, showing a marked contrast in this respect to last year, when so many of our inmates were recovering from epidemic influenza. Next in order come, Rheumatism; then Pleurisy, Anæmia, General debility, Phthisis, and Ulcers.

In the typhoid cases especially the benefits of the Home have been very markedly shewn.

Under the influence of fresh air and good food, wan faces have disappeared, hollow cheeks have filled out, and in a few weeks we have been enabled to discharge every one of these cases, in a fit condition to follow their daily employment.

In the Rheumatic cases, although most of our patients showed a temporary improvement; the well-known tendency to relapses, and for this disease to become chronic, prevents our showing quite so good a report as that of our typhoid convalescents.

Again those patients chiefly females, who were admitted with anæmia and nervous-prostration, diseases in which rest, fresh air, and good food, seem more efficacious than drugs alone, have shown beyond a doubt, the great benefit of the Home to this class of inmates.

We are pleased to be able to report that no deaths have occurred in the Home during the past year.

We wish to congratulate the Board, upon the completion of the new wing, and the many sanitary improvements connected with it, which will, we have no doubt, add greatly to the comfort and health of the patients.

Again we have to thank our kind and efficient matrons Miss Law, and Miss Keith, for their valuable help and willing co-operation, during the year just closed.

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### Rooms for Private Patients.

In building the new wing special arrangements have been made by the Board for the reception of private patients. Three airy and prettily furnished bed-rooms have been set apart for their use. They will have a separate dining-room and parlor, a separate bath-room, and two verandahs on the west and on the south for their exclusive use. All bedding, linen, china, etc, will be kept separate and there will be good attendance.

The charges for these rooms will be from \$8.00 to \$12.00 per week according to accommodation.

### Constitution

I.—This Institution is to be known as "Hillcrest," and is intended for the benefit of Convalescents leaving hospitals or living in homes where their recovery is retarded by the want of needed rest and change.

II.—It is to be managed by a Committee of not more than thirty (30) ladies to be elected annually. The Board will nominate its successors in office and send the names of half the number so nominated to the Trustees, and half to the Mission Union for approval, as provided by the Deed.

III.—The said Committee shall elect by ballot out of its number a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and a Secretary.

IV.—The President shall preside at all meetings at which she is present, or in case of her absence, then one of the Vice-Presidents; in case of their absence, such other person as the meeting may select.

V.—Five members of the said Committee shall form a quorum.

VI.—The regular weekly meetings shall be held on Friday of each week. The regular monthly meetings shall be held on the first Friday of each month, unless some other day is fixed upon at a previous regular meeting.

VII.—The funds necessary for supporting this Institution shall consist of fees, voluntary subscriptions, donations, bequests, etc.

VIII.—All monies received shall go to the Treasurer who shall keep an account of the same and pay out same on the order of the said Committee.

IX.—Changes can be made in the Constitution, subject to the approval of the Trustees, at any regular monthly meeting of the Committee, notice having been given in writing of the intended change at a previous regular monthly meeting.

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### Rules and Regulations

#### ARTICLE I.

The Board of Managers shall hold its monthly meetings on the first Friday of the month at 11 a.m., at such place as it shall appoint. Five members shall constitute a quorum. Weekly meetings shall be held each Friday morning at the same time and place.

#### ARTICLE II.

The President shall have general supervision of the work. She shall preside at all meetings of the Society, or of the Board of Managers, and shall perform such other duties as are incident to the office. She shall sign all drafts upon the Treasury before they are paid.

### ARTICLE III.

The Treasurer shall receive and keep in some chartered bank all the monies collected, and shall disburse them as the Board of Managers shall direct. Her annual report shall be examined by auditors appointed by the Board of Management.

### ARTICLE IV.

The Secretary shall give notice of stated and special meetings keep the minutes of the same, and prepare the Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

#### ARTICLE V.

Anyone desiring to obtain a city order for a patient must send to the City Health Officer: (I) A medical certificate either from or confirmed by one of the medical staff, stating that the applicant is a fit subject for admission to the home: (2) A recommendation showing that the applicant cannot pay the ordinary charges.

#### ARTICLE VI.

Any person desiring admission to the Home able to defray his or her own expenses, or paid for by friends, must present to the Superintendent of the Home a medical certificate either from or confirmed by one of the medical staff stating that the applicant is a fit subject for admission; and must pay in advance for one week's board, \$2.40.

### ARTICLE VII.

Infectious or contagious cases cannot be admitted to the Home.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Unmarried women with infants cannot be admitted, nor any man or woman known to be leading an immoral life.

### ARTICLE IX.

A small quantity of alcoholic liquor for use in extreme cases or by medical order may be kept in the Home, but must be in charge of the Matron under lock and key, and only administered by the Matron, and if under medical order, in quantities to be prescribed by the medical attendant ordering same.

#### ARTICLE X.

Members of the Board are expected to visit the Home weekly in rotation, and will be notified by the Secretary a week before to that effect.

#### ARTICLE XI.

The visitor for the week must visit herself or provide a substitute from the members of the Board, or notify the Secretary in time for her to appoint another visitor in her place.

#### ARTICLE XII.

The visitor must enquire whether the Matron has an order for every patient. In case of any patient remaining in the Home for more than four weeks, the visitor must make full inquiries as to the

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to the reason of such stay, and lay the case before the Board at the first meeting after her visit.

### ARTICLE XIII.

The visitor must visit every part of the Home and report personally or fully in writing on the condition of the Home and patients at the first weekly meeting after her visit.

### ARTICLE XIV.

Each member of the Board must notify the Secretary before leaving town for a length of time.

#### ARTICLE XV.

The Managers may appoint from time to time Committees from among themselves to attend to any special duties. As a rule such Committees shall consist of not less than three, and not less than two shall be considered a quorum to act. These Committees, for the sake of regularity and for future reference, shall as a rule, report to the Board in writing.

### RULES FOR INMATES.

I.—The Inmates shall attend Morning and Evening Prayers, Conducted by the Matron.

2.—All Inmates must in all respects conform to the orders of the Matron, must be punctual at the hours of meals and must not absent themselves from the table without permission from the Matron.

3.—Patients, able in the opinion of the Physician, shall assist in any work that the Matron may require.

4.—No Patient will at any time be allowed to leave the grounds without special leave from the Matron. No Patient shall be absent from the Home later than 5 o'clock, p.m. Each Patient shall be allowed to leave the grounds once only during a stay of two weeks.

5.—Patients shall confine themselves to the part of the house assigned to them. No male Patient shall enter the Female wards, nor any Female Patient the Male wards.

6.—The Patients shall keep their clothes in the places provided for them, and shall on no account leave them about their rooms or on their beds.

7.—No trunks or unnecessary clothes are to be sent with Patients. All clothing must be delivered into the charge of the Matron on arrival at the Home who will only allow one change of clothing in the wards. At the discretion of the Matron each Patient may have six pieces washed at the Home every week free of charge.

8.—On entering the Home patients are requested to hand to the Matron for safe-keeping any money or valuables brought with them.

9.—Patients are not allowed to carry lighted lamps through the house.

10.—Such Patients as are well enough are expected to attend Divine Service on Sundays.

11.-Patients must be quiet and exemplary in their behaviour

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and conform strictly to the Rules and Regulations of the Home, and carry out all the orders and prescriptions of the various officers of the Home.

12.—Patients may be visited by their friends on Thursdays, between the hours of 2 and 5 p. m., and on any evening, Sundays excepted, from 7 to 8 p. m.

13.—Any Patient bringing liquor into the Home, or found intoxicated will be discharged.

14.—After nine o'clock lights must be out and perfect quiet must be observed in the wards.

15.—Whenever Patients misbehave or violate any of the Rules of the Home, the Matron may at once discharge them.

16.—No smoking or chewing will be allowed in the building or on the verandahs.

17.—The Board of Management will not allow any nails to be put into either walls or woodwork in any part of the house. No pictures or mottoes are to be hung or pasted on the walls in any part of the house, and patients who in any way disfigure or destroy the Home will be subject to dismissal.
