FREDERICTON, Jan. 22. — The operation of the Antimony Mine at Lake George is being carried on steadily. The output of ore known as stibnite is being shipped by C. N. R. from Burden to New Brunswick, N. J. where it is reduced in smelting work. Additional machinery is to be secured and after its arrival the operation of the mine will be carried on more extensively. A recent rise in the price of antimony caused a resumption of operations.

There was a long delay while one of the shafts was being pumped out, water having filled it since suspension of previous operations.





### Large Increase in Number of Steamships Here in 1925

There was big increase in the num- The increase in steamships is de-per of ocean going steamships in the clared to be in large measure accounted port of Saint John for the calendar year 1925, as compared with 1924 but a falling off in the number of sailing vessels.

For 1925 the number of ocean steamships in port was 413 with a total tonnage of 1,207,805. For 1924 the number was 299 and the tonnage was 787, 301. The number of sailing vessels for 1925 was 71 as compared with 95 for 1924.

Clared to be in large measure accounted for by the increased shipments of sugar and potatoes last year.

Nine ships have so far loaded potatoes from the frost proof potato shed on the east side of the harbor. ## Chief of Police at Shediac, Once Seaman, Declined Job On Ship That Sank With Eight

SHEDIAC, Jan. 21-William E. Gunn, Chief of Police of Shediac, has had a long career at sea, having sailed on numerous New Brunswick square riggers out of Saint John, but he escaped one experience which would undoubtedly have been his last. Twenty years ago the large three-masted schooner Island City, formerly a barkentine, and at one time partly owned by E. C. Elkin, of Saint John, was lost at sea with all on board numbering eight men, most of whom were shipped by Daniel Hanley, of that city.

The Island City, while bound from Chatham, N. B., to New York with a cargo of laths, ran ashore in 1905 near Cape Bauld, east of Shediac, the crew escaping. The wreck was purchased by R. C. Tait and Capt. Bray, of this town, the schooner was refloated and transferred to F. W. Sumner and William Edgett, of Moncton.

Be sure and keep ball far enough away from body as you prepare to fire. If you don't it may brush against you, losing all sense of direction. A "brushed" ball is one of the biggest alibis I know.

Little or no follow through is necessary. A quick snap of the wrist is all that's required. It may look a bit jerky. But is isn't, unless, of course, you make it so.

Watch your wrist movement especially. An improper turn of that member and direction is lost. Be sure to have the proper foot forward as you let go. McCORMICK'S STORY.

THE SKATES HAGEN USED.

"This is the kind of a skate they use in Norway," said Hugh, holding up one of peculiar make. The skate is fastened to a light leather shoe which is tightly laced to the boot. The sole of the shoe is of light steel construction and also forms the body of the skate. Beneath this the blade is fastened. A light, hollow, metal tube is part of this blade, its position being halfway between the sole of the shoe and the edge of the blade. The latter is very much, thinner than the steel of a Long Reach skate, but the polished tube prevents it from cutting too deeply into the ice. The skate is about 16 inches in length and is very light and handsome.

THE RACES.






