THE LION AROUSED

Britain Only Beginning; Even If Her Allies Were Obliterated, England Would Fight On

Six Caught In Fire Trap And Two Burn To Death

Babe and Brother Die Despite Heroic Efforts of Elder Boy — Grim Tragedy in Maine

Calais, Oct. 17—News of the saddest happening of the year hereabouts comes in the report of a tragedy which occurred at North Perry on Thursday, in which two young children of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Eaton lost their lives in a fire which consumed their home, a fair-sized frame dwelling situated a short ligance from the Murchie mill.

According to William Flagg, who was caused by the bursting of the chimney which was located in the centre of the building while the accumulated soot in the chimney was burning. So rapid was 'he spread of the flames in the upper tory of the dwelling, which was petisioned off and covered only with sheathing paper; that the six occupants of the sleeping rooms were caught in a trapfrom which only four out of the six escaped.

Mr. Flagg went to work about halfpast six o'clock, leaving Mrs. Eaton and her sister in the living-room of the board to feed the hens. She had been there but a few minutes when she heard cries of distress from the dwelling and saw smoke pouring out.

The upper floor of the house was a mass of flames. Mrs. Eaton was unable to do son George succeeded in reaching the window with his 11-year-old sister, Doris, and his brother, Lee, aged seven, and bravely attempted to save his baby brother, William, but was unable to do so. He was himself obliged to leap from the window after his gallant attempt at rescue.

David, aged eight years, who was leeping with George was, it is thought, struck and stunned as the chimney fell, as he made no effort to get out of the burning building, and the charred remains of William and David were afterwards found in the ruins of the home, the body of the smaller child being almost wholly consumed.

Mrs. Eaton's sister was badly burned but the head and arms before escaping from the building, and her condition is said to be serious. Doris and Lee were badly injured by their fall from the window, and George was also injured in leaping from the second floor. Mr. Eaton was absent from home, and is understood to be living in Boston. Russians Use Mines

Petrogad, Oct. 17—The Russian government announces that, because of the presence of German submarines in the Gulf of Finland and the sowing of mines in Russian waters by the enemy, it has been compelled to have recourse to similar measures. Consequently, certain zones of Russian waters, especially those near the Gulfs of Riga and Finland, and the Littoral Archipelago, must be considered as dangerous.

In order that non-combatants shall not run risks, the entrances and exits of the gulf of Riga and Finland, it is stated, are considered closed from the moment of the publication of this notice.

A BUSINESS COSTUME.



This model is admirably suited to the needs of the business woman, for it consists of a blouse and skirt which are both sufficiently distinctive to give it a dressy effect, while they are at the same time eminently practicable. Lightweight French serge is used to develop the costume; color, Dauphin blue. The skirt is one of the new tunic effects with a hip-yoke, and the simple waist is trimmed with braid and white linen collar and cuffs.



As it is an unusual model, the blouse deserves a special lesson in its construction. The entire costume requires 6 yards of 44-inch material, but the waist alone may be made from 2½ yards of goods.

After cutting it out from a fold of the serge, proceed with the construction by first hemming the vest as notched. Watch for large "O" perforations to determine the center of the front. Now turn under front edge of front on slot perforations; lap on vest to small "o" perforations, notches even, and stitch. Close under-arm seam as notched. Gather lower edge of front, back and vest between double "TT" perforations and 2 inches above lower edge. Adjust stay to position underneath gathers, centers and lower edges perforations and 2 inches above lower edge. Adjust stay to position underneath gathers, centers and lower edges even, small "o" perforation at lower edge of stay at under-arm seam. Sew large collar to neck as notched. Sew standing collar to shield as notched; adjust to position, bringing single large "O" perforations in shield and in vest together.

Here join sections of the peplum according to notches; then pleat, creasing on slot perforations; bring folded edges to corresponding lines of small "o" perforations and press, Centerfront-indicated by large "O" perforations. Sew to lower edge of waist, centers even.

Close the sleeve seams, also those of the cuffs. Sew lower cuff to long sleeve. This may be lined with a con-trasting material, if desired. Finally, sew sleeve in armhole as notched.





Mrs. Jas. Murray, of 6 Palmer street, saw Belgians maimed and crippled for life, hapless victims struck down to satisfy the blood lust of treachers.

Many were adopted right there. Some Scotch farmers I know sent down to take are of them. He thought that while the British army was small, it was more than the equal of any army, in the world in general efficiency.

Colonel Steele said Canada had a voluntary military system that was a farce. Nearly every regiment had to take 50 per cent, of new recruits each year, which was unfortunate in the highest degree. Canadians in time of peace seemed to prefer baseball to rifle practice.
