

Stinging Reply By South Africa's Defence Minister

Beyers' Position Clearly Set Forth in Letter to Him and He is Handled Without Gloves

The action of Colonel Maritz and his command in joining forces with the Germans in the North West Cape Province of South Africa has naturally created surprise among the Boers. Doubtless Colonel Maritz's action was stimulated by the resignation of General Beyers from his position as commander general of the union defence forces.

It was with regret that I received your letter of the 15th instant tendering your resignation as the commander general of the union defence forces, and as an officer of the union.

The circumstances under which that resignation took place and the terms in which you endeavor to justify your resignation tend to leave a very painful impression. It is true that it was known to me that you entertained objections against the war operations in German South Africa, but I never received the impression that you would resign.

The principal officers were appointed on your recommendation and with your concurrence, and the plan of operations which is now being followed is largely the one recommended by yourself at a conference of officers. My last instructions to you before I left Cape Town to attend the special session of parliament were that in my absence you should visit certain regiments on the German border, and it was well understood between us that immediately after your operations were somewhat further advanced and co-operation among the various divisions would be practicable.

One would have expected approval would make the matter easier for you, but now I find that you anticipated that parliament would disapprove of the policy of the government, and that your disappointment in this became the reason for your unexpected action.

In order to make your motives clearer, the reasons for your resignation were explained in a long political argument which was immediately communicated to the press and came into the hands of the government long after publication. It need not tell you that all these circumstances in connection with your resignation have made a most unpleasant impression on my colleagues and myself.

But this unpleasant impression has even been aggravated by the allegations contained in your letter. Your bitter attack on Great Britain is of a entirely new kind, but in the more unjustifiable coming at it does in the midst of a great war from the commandant-general of British dominions. Your reference to barbarous acts during the South African war cannot justify the criminal devastation of Belgium and can only be calculated to sow hatred and even division among the people of South Africa.

You forget to mention that since the South African War the British people gave South Africa their entire freedom under a constitution which makes it possible for us to realize our national ideals along our own lines, and which, for instance, allows you to write with impunity a letter for which you would without a doubt be liable in the German Empire to the extreme penalty.

As regards your other statements, they have been answered and disposed of in the House of Commons. From these discussions it will be apparent that neither the British Empire nor South Africa was the aggressor in this struggle. War was in the first instance declared by Austria-Hungary and thereafter by Germany under circumstances in which the British government employed its utmost power to maintain peace in Europe and to safeguard the neutrality of Belgium.

So far as we ourselves are concerned, our coast is threatened, our mail boats are arrested, and our borders are invaded by the enemy. This letter does not occur as you say, in an involuntary manner, and with an apology which later, at any rate, was never tendered to the government. Under those circumstances it is absurd to speak about the aggressive action on the part of the British Empire. We have been drawn against our will and entirely in self-defence into this war.

As regards your insinuation concerning the loan of \$7,000,000 which the British government was kind enough to grant us and for which the public of the union as evidenced recently in parliament, are most grateful, it was of such a deplorable nature that there was no necessity to make any comment thereon. It only shows to what extent your mind has been obscured by political bias.

You speak about duty and honor; my conviction is that the people of South Africa will in these dark days when the government as well as the people of South Africa are put to the supreme test, have a clearer conception of duty and honor than you. The Dutch speaking section, in particular, I cannot conceive anything more fatal and humiliating than a policy of lip loyalty in fair weather and a policy of treachery in storm and stress. It may be that our peculiar internal circumstances and our backward condition after the great war will place a limit on what we can do, but nevertheless I am convinced that we will support the government in carrying out the mandate of parliament in this manner, which is the only legitimate one, full their duty to South Africa and to the empire, and to the government which has entrusted them with the task.

Genera, Oct. 17.—From the beginning of the war, the Swiss authorities knew that a small army of German spies had entered the country. Recently these spies began to abuse Swiss neutrality. Under Swiss names they started publishing one page newspapers in several towns, printed in German, giving only Wolf reports, receiving all news by special cables and great expense from Berlin, and offering news for nothing to Swiss papers. The Swiss papers declined unambiguously.

Severe measures have been taken during the last few days against these spies. They have been escorted across the German frontier and firmly requested not to return. Others received notice to leave the country, while their papers have been suppressed. Switzerland is determined to remain neutral.

Death of Maine Editor. Augusta, Oct. 17.—Samuel Lane Boardman, long one of the prominent newspaper men of Maine and a former editor of the Bangor Commercial, is dead here following a long illness. He resigned as editor of the Commercial in 1899 and had since lived here.

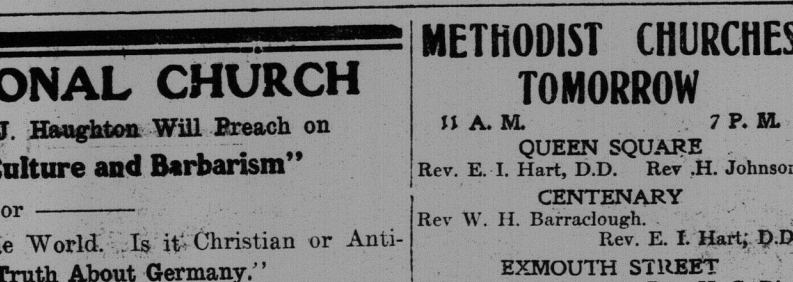

THE WAR NEWS.

The end of another week has come without news of the hoped for victory by the allied armies, which would have afforded ground for hope of an early expulsion of the Germans from French and Belgian soil.

The war has entered upon a new phase. The battle-line in France extends practically from the Swiss border to the North Sea, and there can be no further attempts by either side to outflank the other.

There is a general feeling of disappointment that the Russian armies which set out with apparently so much success have not been able to pursue their victorious course toward Berlin.

The operations in France will continue to be the centre of interest, however, since it is there Germany has attempted her master-stroke and has thus far failed.

The spirit of the English poet—and of Britons everywhere—is well expressed by the military correspondent of The London Times, who points out that Britain has already raised an army of 1,200,000 men, in addition to the expeditionary force now in the field and the hundreds of thousands forming up in India, Canada, Australia and elsewhere.

The rumors which have been set afloat at a federal general election might be recaptured at this time, are surely to be deprecated. We do not believe for a moment that the government have any such intention in mind. The whole nation is today acting under a party truce, reached deliberately and with patriotic unanimity in order that Canadians might move as a unit against by far the most menacing danger which has ever threatened our country or our empire.

A general election could not be called off without causing a fierce renewal of party strife—without dividing our people into two hostile camps—without saving the Liberals under a bitter sense of betrayal, after having been led into the "ambush" of patriotic co-operation, it would be like approaching a foe with flag of truce and then opening fire on him. As we have said, we have not the slightest notion that the government intend any such treacherous intention. Another very mischievous result might ensue. It would be impossible for the government to order an election at this time without bringing their policy of assistance to the forces of the empire under review. While the opposition have scarcely approved of the principle of their action, and have loyally abstained from criticizing details, still it would be difficult to prevent a defeat for the government—should it come—from being interpreted as a condemnation by the Canadian people of their action in support of the empire. That would be the most unfortunate thing to happen just at this time. It would weaken our enemies and dismay our friends. It is earnestly to be hoped that we will hear no more of this nonsense about an appeal to the people at this most inopportune moment.

The skirt is one of the new tunic effects with a hip-yoke, and the simple waist is trimmed with braid and white linen collar and cuffs.

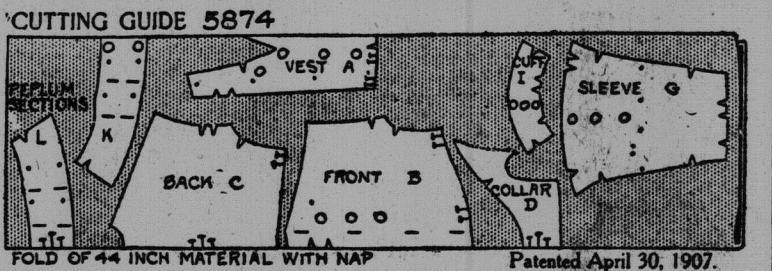
As it is an unusual model, the blouse deserves a special lesson in its construction. The entire costume requires 6 yards of 44-inch material, but the waist alone may be made from 2 1/2 yards of goods.

After cutting it out from a fold of the serge, proceed with the construction by first hemming the waist as notched. Watch for large "O" perforations to determine the center of the front. Now turn under front edge of front on slot perforations; lap on vest to small "O" perforations, notches even, and stitch. Close under-arm seams as notched. Gather lower edge of front, back and vest between dots and lines. Adjust stay to position under-edge. Fine soutache braid makes the most acceptable trimming for the front of the waist.

Here join sections of the bodice according to notches; then pleat, creating on slot perforations; bring folded edges to corresponding lines of small "O" perforations and press. Center-front indicated by large "O" perforations. Sew to lower edge of waist, center of waist.

Close the sleeve seams, also those of the cuffs. Sew lower cuff to long edge of sleeve. Press. Finally, sew sleeve in armholes as notched.

Close the skirt seams, also those of the waist. Sew to lower edge of waist, center of waist.

FOR BETTER FARMING

Business Men of Manitoba to Take up Movement—The North Dakota Plan.

The Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, Limited, of Winnipeg sends out the following circular to its members:

September 23, 1914.

Those of our members who attended the meeting at the Royal Alexandra hotel on the 15th inst., heard a suggestion made by Mr. Vere Brown relative to action being taken by this association to start a campaign for better farming throughout the west.

Information has been sought with regard to the movement in North Dakota and the following is a copy of a letter just received which briefly outlines the plan adopted by the St. Paul and Minneapolis financial and commercial men: "Answering your letter of the 19th instant, in re the better farming movement in North Dakota, it gives me pleasure to be able to answer your enquiries in this matter, especially so since the results that have been attained are exceedingly encouraging, and the same plan pursued in your territory would no doubt prove as beneficial.

"The movement seems to have been conceived by A. R. C. Brown, who has extensive interests in Canada, and P. L. Howe, both of Minneapolis, some time ago in 1912. The North Dakota Better Farming Association was organized with an executive committee consisting of the above mentioned together with E. J. Weiser, C. B. McMillan, R. C. Kittle, C. W. Kelly, E. Y. Serles, and other more or less prominent North Dakota business men.

"Aided by the Northern Pacific and Great Northern railways this executive committee raised a fund of \$45,000 to be contributed each year for a period of three years. A manager for the association was found in the person of Thomas P. Cooper, who formerly had been in charge of the statistical work of the Minnesota Agricultural College. Mr. Cooper at once secured as assistants twenty of the more capable men, of both practical and scientific agricultural training, that could be found.

"The avowed object of the association was to bring the school to the farmer. Taking the county as a unit, one or more workers are employed. To secure the assistance of the state association, the people of the county must contribute to a general fund as much cash as the association puts up—this usually amounts to \$2,500 to \$3,000 per annum. A local agricultural expert or adviser is then assigned to the county; he is furnished with an auto and spends his time traveling from one farm to another, wherever his advice or counsel is needed or desired.

"By December, 1912, the association was operating a few demonstration farms, rather supervising the operation of same, the farmer supplying his farm for a period of five years and taking up the work outlined for him by the association. The principal work so far has been systematic rotation of crops.

"In addition to the demonstration farms, there were about 120 plots, ranging from twenty to 150 acres, under supervision, divided into three, five and six year rotations, depending on prevailing conditions.

"Bulletins are issued at intervals, usually covering specific instructions on some point of interest, such as the formation of farmers' clubs, selection of seed, corn, etc.

"Interest in corn growing was stimu-

lated by establishing corn contests, for which substantial prizes were offered."

A meeting of the board has been held and it has been decided to call a monster meeting of the business and financial men of this province to discuss the whole proposition. Notice of this meeting will be given when arrangements are completed.

In order, however, that the very fullest information shall be laid before our members and the public generally it has been suggested that a representative from the various bodies be asked to proceed to North Dakota and obtain by going over the ground information concerning the modus operandi and the results already obtained up to the present.

This information will then be laid before the meeting in question for their decision.

NEW YORK GUNMEN GET ANOTHER ONE

Gang Outbreak Near Broadway; Victim Keeps Silence HENNESSY DYING Two Men Held But He Refuses to Identify Them - Police Believe Woman Led Him to His Fate (New York American) "The gangsters of New York have already forgotten 'Lefty Louis,' 'Gyp the Blood,' 'Dago Frank' and 'Whitney Louie' said Captain of Detectives Gildea yesterday after trying vainly to drag from William Murray Hennessy, dying in the Policlinic Hospital, the name of a man who shot him a little after midnight yesterday morning in the vestibule of Arthur Poppers cafe, Seventh avenue and Fifth street. "Hennessy is a true gangster," continued Gildea. "He knows who shot him and why, but he is going to keep quiet. Hennessy, loyal to the law of gangland which decrees that the wages of the 'squealer' is death, was shot twice after being lured out of the 'ladies' cafe' in Poppers place, where he was 'bounced' it occurred within a short block of Broadway and within hearing of the orchestras of the garish Broadway tango restaurants. Hennessy was shot as was Herman Rosenthal—lured to his death—and, in a place almost prominent, declared Gildea. "If Hennessy had been forty-second in rear of Broadway, some one fired a gun to get him, and the gunman got him." Two Men Held Arthur Lawrence, of No. 248 West Thirty-eighth street, and George Gordon, who said he lived in Pittsburgh, were held without bail in the West Side Court by Magistrate Harris for a further examination charged with the shooting. There was a hole in Lawrence's coat pocket which looked as though it had been bored by a bullet and it was surrounded by powder. In the hospital Hennessy admitted that he knew them, but that he did not know who shot him. Inspector Farrot, pointing to the hole and powder burns, fluted accused Lawrence of doing the shooting. Lawrence's reply was a grin and a shrug. "Some wise guy," sneered Lawrence. "Well, I ain't going to say nothing. Get me a lawyer."

CAPTURING GERMANY'S TRADE IS A QUESTION OF PRICES, SAYS A CORRESPONDENT

To the Editor Evening Times-Star:—There has been an awful lot of newspaper talk just lately about grabbing Germany's trade getting into communication with buyers of German goods, &c., &c. If Canada wants to capture all Germany's custom, we can easily do so by selling goods to those customers—at Germany's prices.

There is the whole question in a nutshell, and if Canada won't do it, you may be quite sure that some one else will. Just one case as an illustration. The English buyers of pit props for coal mines, as soon as they came here, picked the bubble-made newspaper talk, and the trumpet blowing of the board of trade, by the simple statement of actual prices now being paid to continental firms, for the same article, as against Canadian prices.

Naturally enough buyers will buy in the cheapest market, and it is up to our merchants to make some sacrifice to secure the trade, which they must remember, will be permanent, and also that this opportunity may never occur again. We Canadians are so used to paying high prices for everything, that we are inclined to think all other goods at a cheaper rate must be no good, either inferior in quality or workmanship.

We are apt to forget that included in the Canadian price, is the price of the political pull of the manufacturers on the government to keep up the tariff, and hold off all outside competition. These plausible gentlemen tell us that unless the tariff is kept up, wages would be lowered, and the prosperity of the country would be gone for ever. It is the combination of the workers that will regulate the wages, assisted by that law of demand and supply, which is as old as the pyramids of Egypt. Just one case in point. The masses get the highest wages in Canada. Why? Because they have a strong trade union to protect their interests. No tariff there, my friends. No political pull.

England built up the greatest trade the world has ever seen. But she built it on free trade, sell to all comers, under sell other nations in order to get the trade, and incidentally, fight to corner to retain the trade after she had got it.

A small profit on orders extending over long periods, will pay better than large profits for a short period, so that Canadian merchants had better abandon the idea of making Germany's customers in their hour of need, as they seek us here in Canada. Let them get right down to business, and offer their goods at prices that will induce people to buy them. The little island of Guernsey, in the English Channel, between England and France, governs itself, just the same as Canada, but is a free port, no tariff there. But you can buy cigars—and a good one too—for one cent and a bottle of French brandy, or port wine for a quarter, and there is not a hobo to be found on the island. Ask your political boss to explain that.

Don't take my word for the above statement, but write for information to the postmaster at St. Peter's Port, Guernsey, as to prices there.

Who is it that gets all the benefit of the tariff? The manufacturer, or the retailer, or the worker who has to pay

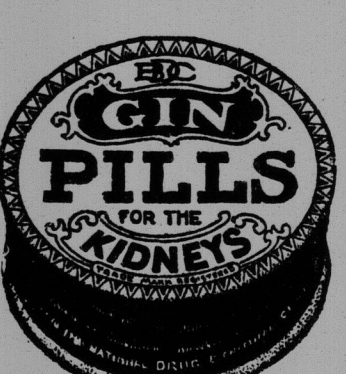

AMHERST WOMAN WITNESSED SOME GERMAN OUTRAGES

German savagery is all that is charged to it, and more. Ghastly testimony to the barbaric cruelty practiced on the innocents of poor Belgium was revealed to the horrified gaze of an Amherst woman, and she brings home her own experience of the sufferings of these fatal people. Mrs. Jas. Murray, of 6 Palmer street, saw Belgians maimed and crippled for life, helpless victims struck down to satisfy the blood lust of treacherous tyrants.

Says The Amherst News:—Standing in a London railway station, Mrs. Murray saw "ever so many" women and children, their lives blighted by the brutality of the invaders.

"They came in with other refugees," Mrs. Murray declared today, "women and little children, all cut up dreadfully. The little ones had their feet and hands severed, hundreds of them. It was mostly the boys between four and five years old, because the Germans said they did not want them to grow up and fight like their fathers. There was one woman with a bandage over her face; we asked what for and were told her nose was chopped off by a bayonet. Another had her ear off, and then there was another who had one of her breasts cut off.

Had to Leave At Behind.

"Oh, it was frightful, and there were so many of them all so helpless just the way they escaped, half dressed, no hats or belongings, wearing blood-soaked bandages. One had to take pity on them. Many were adopted right there. Some Scotch farmers I know sent down to take care of them for life, even though they would never be able to do much for themselves.

"Mrs. Murray offered these words for the benefit of those who refuse to believe stories of German atrocities. It is such spectacles, she said, that brought out the wish that they had taken the lives of the Belgian mites rather than have them always helpless and dependent on charity.

Mrs. Murray was in the old country for five months. Staying there, she says, she was anxious to get away from home. London is darkened at night and the sky whirled continually by searchlights on the watch for bomb-dropping Zeppelins and at least one airship is kept flying on guard. One of these machines was wrecked near where Mrs. Murray stayed in London, the aeronaut being killed on striking the aerodrome on a misjudged descent.

While at Fort George on the coast, Mrs. Murray saw ninety Germans captured while laying mines. Their ship had just been struck by a shell and the commander handed over his flag.

NO AID FROM LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR N. B. REGIMENT

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 16.—Following advice from the militia department the provincial government has decided to make no grant for a New Brunswick regiment for foreign services. This was decided today at a meeting of the local government.

Regarding the Dugal report and the findings of the court of enquiry into St. John police conditions, it was said that they would not be made public for a time.

For Belgian relief purposes 15,000 bushels of potatoes were voted.

DOMINION ELECTION PLANS CANCELLED?

In spite of the insistence of the Rogers wing of the Dominion government, it now appears that common sense has prevailed in the councils of the Conservative party to the extent, at least, of deferring indefinitely the proposed election. Protests from financiers, manufacturers and business men against the proposal, when the semi-official announcement of an election was made, have convinced the leaders that the time for a political contest has not arrived. Another reason for the delay is the difficulty which has been experienced in effecting the changes in the cabinet to retire the Nationalist element. It is intimated now that Hon. Mr. Crothers, also, is willing to retire and that he will go out at the same time as Messrs. Pelletier and Nantel.

DEATH OF FOREIGN MINISTER WILL NOT AFFECT ITALY'S POLICY

It is authoritatively stated in Italy that the death of Marquis Giuliano, foreign minister, which occurred yesterday, will not affect the foreign policy of the government. He had been friendly to Germany, and had frowned at demonstrations of sympathy towards the allies. Premier Salandra will assume the foreign portfolio temporarily.

OLD HYMNS, NEW TUNES

American Bishop Condemns Present-Day Irreverence

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 17.—Setting the old-time hymns to tunes that savor of the modern music hall or of "Yankee Doodle" was deplored by Bishop Edward Osburn, of Springfield, Ill., at a meeting of the Synod of the Fifth Province of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States. The remarks of Bishop Osburn occurred during a debate on the adoption of the report of a committee appointed to prepare the publication of an inexpensive selection of Sunday school hymns.

"I want to be assured that none of these hymns will have irreverent tunes," said Bishop Osburn. "I notice that 'Jerusalem the Golden' is among the hymns listed. I have heard that hymn sung to a tune that is most irreverent, that sounded like 'Yankee Doodle.' The latter is all right in its place but its place is not in the church of God."

Katherine Rober, who played to popular favor in St. John some years ago opened this week in vaudeville in Keith's Theatre, Lowell, Mass. Miss Rober is appearing in Una Clayton's playlet "What Would You Do?" She is supported by Leander Blandon and a company of two and her tour is under the direction of Alf T. Wilson.

Rose Melville has "Sis Hopkins" out again this season. It is interesting to recall that when she played her famous piece in St. John some years ago, Lyman R. Abbe, now playing characters with the Thompson-Woods Co. here was in her support.

The intention of raising the historic Boston theatre in about a year for the purpose of erecting a new hotel for commercial purposes involving an investment of approximately \$2,000,000, was followed by an announcement that William H. Leahy, the present lessee of the Boston, is planning to jump to the National, a Keith controlled house, built about three years ago, and which has a seating capacity of 3,800. The National has been dark since last spring. Any immediate intention of taking the National is denied by Leahy, who says that his lease of the Boston holds until Sept. 1, 1915.

AUSTRALIA TO SEND TWO THOUSAND EACH MONTH TO THE ARMY

Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 17.—The 20,000 men forming the first contingent to the British army have all been collected and have gone to the front. The men have got the right spirit, for they feel they are going to join a great army, whose feats of arms will live long in history, and whose success will be glorious.

Now that the first contingent has been got away, what of the others? At headquarters there is no doubt that men will come forward in plenty. The first 20,000 were raised without any outward show of organized recruiting, and the government have no fears of getting other men to respond.

Kitchener's appeal has been taken to heart here in Australia. The government has stated that it will send as many men as possible, so long as they are required. As they become incapacitated, will replace them at its own expense. She could put into the field now a full 100,000 men, providing they could be drilled at all.

The government has laid it down that whatever else happens, Australia is to send 2,000 men monthly to the front to maintain the first army at more than its war strength. She is also to send a further contingent of 20,000 in addition to this regular shipment.

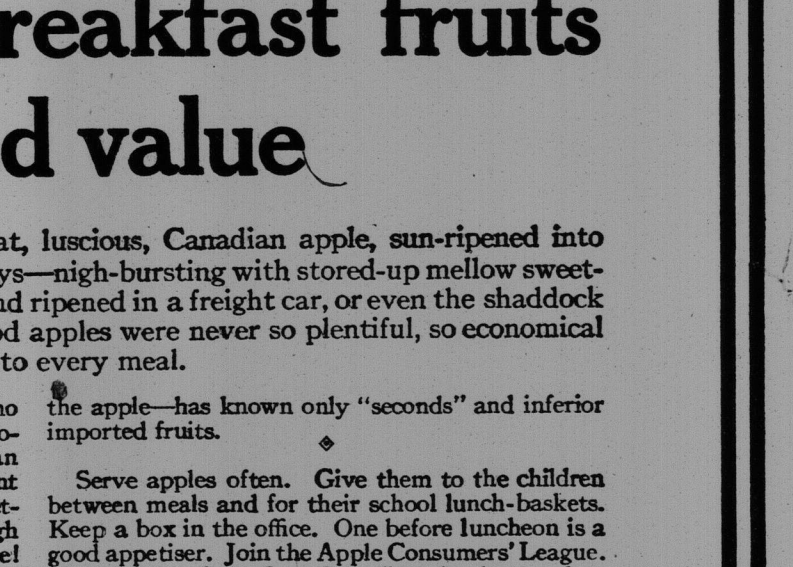

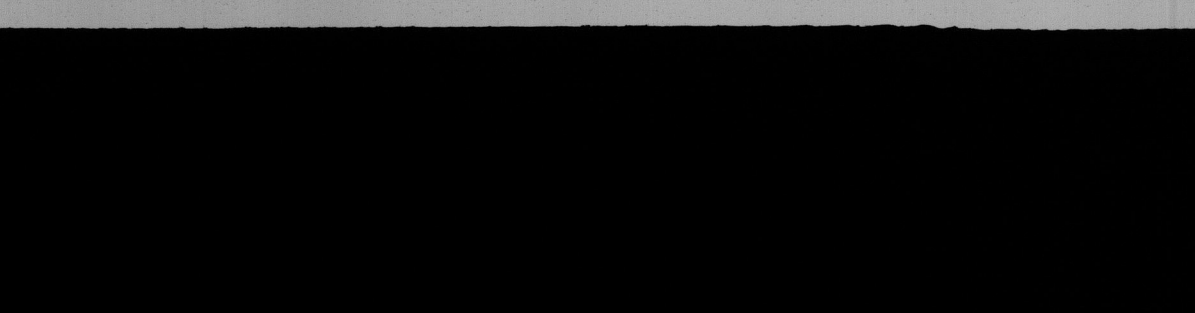

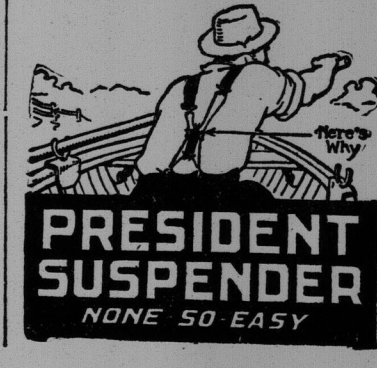

An incident in the Work of The Daughters of the Empire

CONSECRATION OF ST. LUKE'S

Ceremony To Be Performed By Bishop Tomorrow

HISTORY OF THE CHURCH

Property Free From Debt and Much New Building Work Done—The Rector and the Officers of St. Luke's

An interesting ceremony will take place at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning in St. Luke's church when the building, which was dedicated to the service of Almighty God thirty-four years ago will be consecrated by His Lordship Bishop Richardson as a place of public worship as it is now free from any worldly debt or encumbrance.

The present St. Luke's was built in 1880, during the time when Rev. L. G. Stevens was rector of the parish. The building was designed originally by the late D. E. Dunham but since undergoing many alterations to meet the needs of a growing congregation. Rev. E. L. Silbald succeeded Mr. Stevens as rector in 1889. Rev. Mr. McKim came from St. John's church, West Toronto, to become rector of the Parish of Portland at that time the parish was \$5,000 in debt and not only has this been wiped out but many improvements have been made to the church, besides the building of the rectory last year and a total sum of more than \$25,000 has been expended on repairs and new buildings.

The debt of \$5,000 which was on the church when Rev. Mr. McKim assumed the rectorship was wiped out ten or twelve years ago when all mortgages and other documents signifying any indebtedness were voluntarily burned. The church could then have been consecrated according to the letter of the canon law, but that was still a floating indebtedness and until that had all been cleared up, the congregation felt that they would rather wait before they could feel that they were free to ask the bishop to consecrate the church.

At the service tomorrow Bishop Richardson will be assisted by the rector and Rev. J. L. Cotton, who has been curate of St. Luke's for nearly two years and by D. H. Nae and W. F. Cronk, church wardens. Rev. W. B. Armstrong, a former curate of St. Luke's, now residing in the city, has also been invited to take part in the service.

A petition signed by the church wardens and others will be presented to the bishop in the church hall immediately before the service, praying His Lordship to consecrate the church and certifying that the church is free from all encumbrance as set out in a deed between the corporation of St. Luke's church. The bishop will then proceed to consecrate the church, after which the Communion Service will be said during which the holy table and the vessels and books will be consecrated.

The Parish of Portland is the oldest in the diocese and the first service of which there is any record in the Province of New Brunswick was held by Rev. Thomas Wood on July 2, 1769, the time when missionaries sent out from England visited from house to house holding services intermittently. The first church built in the parish was on Portland Point in 1829 and was known as Grace church. This was afterwards moved on rollers near to the site of the present St. Paul's church and in 1888 the first St. Luke's church was built. It was destroyed by fire in 1875 and was rebuilt about five years later; this is the church now to be consecrated.

The present officers of the church are Rev. R. P. McKim, rector; Rev. J. L. Cotton, curate; D. H. Nae and W. F. Cronk, wardens; W. A. Smith, J. K. Scammell, W. A. Steiper, G. C. Jordan, G. B. Taylor, J. A. Warwick, John McKim, A. L. Mowry, G. T. Martin, W. E. Craft, H. A. Miller and C. Harrison, vestrymen.

The rector and congregation of St. Luke's are being heartily congratulated on the prosperity of the church and the day of consecration will be one of great rejoicing to all.

REPORT SAFE ARRIVAL OF ALL CANADIAN SIGNALERS

A cablegram received today by Mr. and Mrs. John LeLachur will bring rejoicing to many homes in the city where sons have gone forth in the empire's service with the first overseas Canadian force. It was from their son, Lewis, a corporal in the Canadian Signaling Section under Major T. E. Powers, and told of his safe arrival, with a word or two to the effect that "all the signalers had crossed safely."

In view of the announcement from England that two of Canada's brave young men had been lost overboard en route, the situation pretty closely, "the Russians claim they have won while the Germans say they have beaten the Russians but you know, Alie," he said, "those Germans are such awful liars that I guess the Russians must have beat them."

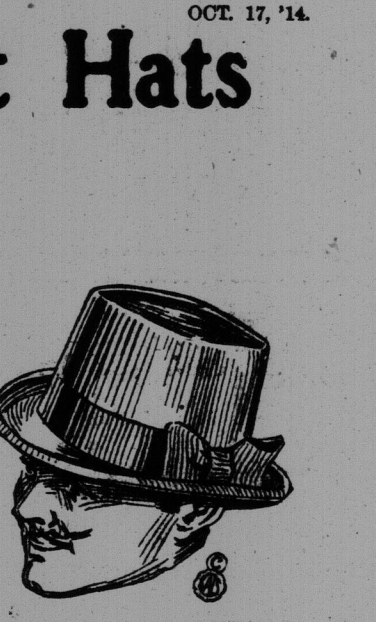

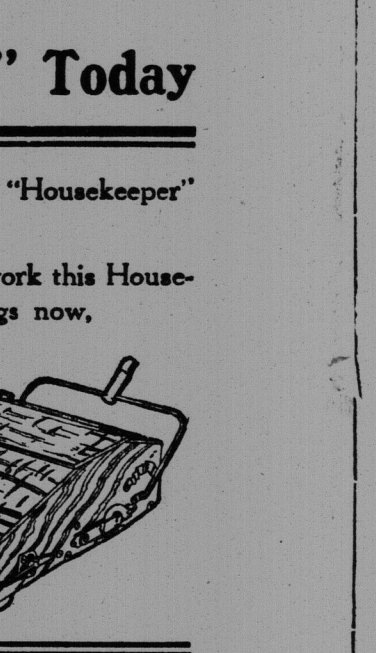
