THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
TORONTO MAGDALENE ASYLUM,
OR
FEMALE HOUSE OF REFUGE,

JANUARY 1st, 1868.

At the beginning of another year we come before our friends and the public in this our thirteenth report, to give an account of our labor during the past year; and while our hearts rise in thankfulness to the Great Parent and Author of all good, for the measure in which he has blessed these labors, we bespeak for the facts contained in it, earnest attention and thought.

The class for whose benefit this Institution exists, must be attended to. We may attempt to put the care of them from us, and determinately shut our eyes and ears to their misery, but we cannot, we think, thus get rid of our responsibilities.

Sooner or later perhaps, some case in which we ourselves or some one dear to us may be deeply interested, will rouse us—when too late—to a sense of the fearful extent of the evil, and to our own indifference in the matter. As far as pecuniary means are concerned, the public have supported this Institution liberally; but we urge and look for a deeper interest—a *giving of time* as well as means. To be of any lasting benefit to these poor outcasts, it must be shewn that we *really* and *truly* care for them; that they need no longer be outcasts; but may become not only respectable members of society, but a blessing to their friends instead of a curse. Such a result has actually occurred several times in the experience of the Managers. And who can measure the relief to friends who have been mourning, perhaps for years, over

the vicious course of some near relative, when such an one is restored to them "clothed and in her right mind." During the past year we sent two sisters, of the ages of 18 and 19, to their parents. They had been leading an abandoned life for three years, ending at length in the jail, where they were met by our Treasurer; and when asked if they would not like to have an opportunity of reforming, eagerly accepted the offer, and during the twelve months they were in the Institution, no girls could have behaved better. They were of the number mentioned in our last report, in whom we believed (and have still reason to believe) a real and saving change of heart had taken place. They left us six months ago, and are faithfully persevering in the right path, and industriously earning a living for themselves; one residing with her mother, and another with a married sister. Another young girl who came to the Institution at the same time, and also from the jail, has been four months in a family as general servant, and gives so much satisfaction, that her mistress sent to see if we could send her such another for a friend. These are not isolated cases by any means, as many pleasing letters will shew. But, that they may be multiplied sevenfold, we require another and a larger building and a larger number of earnest, patient, and persevering workers on our committee, who will encourage and strengthen each other. We are apt to feel disheartened with the failures, the ingratitude, duplicity and great waywardness of many of those for whom we are labouring; but surely this should not be. Cases such as we have just mentioned ought to be sufficient, were there no other, to stir us up to renewed activity and earnestness of purpose. Of those sent to service, one half are doing well and giving satisfaction.

The Institution has like other charities, been deprived of the Government Grant this last year, yet we have labored to sustain its efficiency under this difficulty. As to its moral and industrious aspects, it is pleasing to report that at no period of its existence, has it shewn a more orderly, comfortable and satisfactory result, arising in a great measure, from the good management of our present matron. During the year the premises have been thoroughly drained; and thanks to the liberality of the City Council, we will be enabled early in spring to surround them with a suitable fence. We are also much indebted to G. L. Beardmore, Esq., who not only presented a bath to the Institution, but paid the whole expense of fitting it up and enclosing it. At one time during the past year the Committee found it necessary to send an explanatory statement to the daily papers, and they now think it well to embody it in this Report. It is as follows:—

“The attention of the managers of the Magdalene Asylum and Industrial House of Refuge having been called to several statements that have appeared in the daily newspapers, and which they consider tend to convey a false and injurious impression of that Institution to the public, think it advisable to take this method of making known the principles that govern them in dealing with the class of women for whose benefit the Institution is intended. When application for admission is made, the one making it is asked as to her motive, her country, parents or friends, age, and the length of time she has been leading an abandoned or dissipated life. She is then told the rules of the ‘Home,’ viz.:—That she must remain twelve months, be obedient, industrious, clean and tidy, refraining from all bad language, and improper conduct. Also, that during that time she will not be allowed to leave the premises, or to have any intercourse with her former companions, and be allowed no stimulants, but that at the end of that time, if her conduct has been good, we will find her a suitable situation, give her comfortable clothing, and send her to it with our recommendation and under our protection. If she says her motive is to reform, and she consents to submit to these rules, she is at once received and attended to with all necessary care, both religiously and otherwise. Neither age, length of time she has been leading her degraded life, country, nor sect, is allowed to weigh against her admission, if she only is anxious to reform, and comes to us voluntarily. One of the statements to which we allude, and made to a public meeting in St. Lawrence Hall, viz.:—‘That they would not take them in if they had been two or three years on the street,’ is a decided mistake, and probably arose from the fact of our refusing admission to some of those who had been sent to us by the Police Magistrate. But the reason will be readily seen. These did not come voluntarily. They only came to us, rather than go to jail, and with the secret purpose, we have reason to believe, of escaping as soon as possible. To escape is comparatively easy, as the fencing is low and insecure. Besides, our institution is

not a jail. We never force any one to remain there. They must be willing. The work in which they are employed consists in washing and ironing, shirt making, plain sewing, embroidery, knitting and quilting (they earned last year nine hundred dollars). Besides this, they do all the house work, a little gardening, and saw the wood necessary. This last we do not consider too hard work, where there are so many to assist. We have every year quite a number who, having remained the allotted time, are sent to situations. Many of them are doing well, and showing their gratitude by contributing to the funds of the Institution."

Without the usual government grant we have only been able to pay our current expenses, and must again appeal to the generosity of the public—a generosity which has hitherto never failed us. We would be glad, too, if our friends would *visit* the Institution, and satisfy themselves as to the desirability of such a place.

Our thanks are again due to the managers of the Book and Tract Society for a donation of seasonable books; also to Mr. Cumberland for the freight of a supply of cordwood at a reduced rate. And also to those newspapers who have published notices for us free of charge.

To our unwearied kind medical attendant, Dr. Robinson; our thanks are particularly due, as also to the many kind friends, both clerical and lay, who so earnestly and unselfishly labour to impart religious instruction to the inmates. One member of committee also devotes two hours every week to teaching them writing and arithmetic.

Mr. Severn has also most generously continued the supply of water to the Institution free of charge.
