NO MORE POACHING. RESERVE ACTION ON THE SEAL QUESTION.

Agreement concluded on the Behring Sea. Proclamation issued by President Harrison. Washington, June 15.—The President today issued the following proclamation: Whereas, an agreement for a modus vivendi between the government of the United States and the government of the British Majesty in relation to the seal fisheries in the Behring sea, was concluded June 15, 1891, word for word, as follows: 'The purpose of avoiding irritating differences with a view to promote the friendly settlement of the questions pending between the two governments in relation to the seal fisheries in the Behring sea, and for the preservation of the seal species, the following agreement is made without prejudice to the rights of either party: (1) Her Majesty's government will prohibit the killing for the same purpose of the seal in the Behring sea, and on the shores and islands thereof, the property of the United States (in respect of 1891) between the United States and Russia, and will promptly use its best efforts to insure the observance of this prohibition by British subjects and vessels. (2) The United States government will prohibit the killing for the same purpose of the seal in the Behring sea, and on the shores and islands thereof, the property of the United States (in respect of 1891) between the United States and Russia, and will promptly use its best efforts to insure the observance of this prohibition by the United States and vessels. (3) Every vessel or person offending against this prohibition in the said waters of Behring sea, outside of the ordinary territorial limits of the United States, may be seized and detained by the naval or other duly commissioned officers of either of the high contracting parties, who shall also have authority to try the offender and impose the penalties for the same. The witnesses and jury shall also be selected from the officers and crew of the vessel so seized. (4) In order to facilitate such prosecutions, her Majesty's government may be authorized to make with view to the prosecution of that government before arbitration, and in accordance with an agreement for arbitration, may be arrived at, it is agreed that suitable persons designated by Great Britain will be permitted at any time upon application, to visit or to remain upon the seal during the present sealing season for that purpose. (5) Signed and sealed in duplicate at Washington this 15th day of June, 1891, on behalf of their respective governments, by William F.
