



HRISH BANK CLERKES TO STREAM Bank clerks throughout Ireland will strike on December 31 unless the directors of banks consent to recognize their union, an action which they have hitherto refused to take. This was decided upon at a conference of the Frigh Bank Clerks Union at Dublin last week. Fifty-six delegates at the meeting voted unanimously in favor of the strike, which will affect 3,000 out of a total of 3,700 bank clerks in Ireland.

LABORITE WINS.






