### The Great Earthquake.

hastened from Constantinople to Chios as oon as he received news of the recent earthquake there writes as follows:--I find a picture of desolation such as is rarely beheld. The town looks as if it had been terribly bombarded. Hundreds of houses are transformed into a shapeless mass of ruins, under which lie buried an unknown number of victims. A majority of the remaining houses are already orack-ed rootless and may fall at any moment. Nearly every building in the town has suffered more or less. The inhabitants wander about, anxious to search for mis ing relatives or lost property, but are afraid to risk their lives in the perilous work of clearing away the rubbish. Many 000. 




