FRIGHTFUL DEATH IN CHATHAM MILL

Henry Dumont, Met Instant Death in The Miramichi Roscing Mill.

WAS CAUGHT IN LARGE FLY WHEEL

Chatham, N. B., June 15—Henry Dumont, aged about 30, met a frightful death about 2.15 this afternoon, being hurled around in the fly wheel at the Miramichi Roscing mill, and having his brains dashed out. Dumont was in the employ of Wm. Groat, as a teamster, and had backed up his team to the door of the mill. As the tail board would not work properly he went back to fix it and in some manner fell into the machinery and was caught in the large fly wheel.

He was carried around at a terrific rate finally striking his head on the roof and dashing out his brains. He had been married only a short time.

MR. W. S. LOGGIE WAS NOMINATED

Our Popular Representative of Parliament is Again the Choice.

MEETING WAS LARGELY ATTENDED

At the Convention of the Northumberland County Liberal Association held at Chatham Thursday afternoon. M. W. S. Loggie, M. P., was nominated to contest Northumberland in the Liberal interests at the next federal election. There was a large attendance of delegates. Hon. John Burchill, president was in the chair. There was no opposition to Mr. Loggie and consequently the motion was made unanimous. Forceful addresses were made.

Liberals Carry Nova Scotia Again

Complete returns of the provincial elections show that the Murray government is sustained with a majority of sixteen members in the new assembly. The parties now stand twenty-seven to eleven.

The opposition gained eight seats as there were only five Liberal Conservatives in the old House, but they lost two, giving them a net gain of six seats. Three other seats were won by the government with a very small majority.
