





Montreal's New Terminal.

(Philadelphia Ledger.) Montreal is to have new terminal and rapid transit facilities at a cost of \$52,-000,000, this great outlay by the Canadian Northern Railway being justified by an adroit land venture which is expected to more than recoup the company. The plan involves a tunnel under Mount Royal, to the north of the city, at obstruction which has heretofore blocked expansion and retarded the improvement of terminal facilities.
