



Then a white flag appeared, and it was believ-ed that the rebels were ready to sur-render, but they only asked for an armistice. The bombardment of the island ceased for half an hour, and was renewed at 11 o'clock. Two land batteries and two loyal warships took part in the bombardment, and the ar-tillery duel continued with great vio-lence until half past three o'clock this afternoon. 
SHORT LIVED MINISTRY.
