Swiftness of Russian Stroke Takes Teutons by Surprise --- Capture of Great Railway Junction of Brody Threatens Lemberg---Enemy's Whole Line of Communications from North to South Menaced by General ENEMY IN LONGUEVAL Sackaroff's Forces.

LLOYD GEORGE 9,000 PRISONERS AND 46 GUNS TAKEN BY STILL HOPEFUL THE RUSSIANS WEST OF LUTSK JF SETTLEMEN

Petrograd, July 28, via London, July 29 .- The Russians have occupied the important railroad junction of Brody, 58 miles northeast of Lemberg, in Galicia, broken through the entire first line of the Teutonic allies west of Lutsk, and driven the Austro-German forces from the line of the rivers Slonevka and Boldurovka, Southern Volhynia, according to the official communication issued tonight by the war office. Heavy casualties were inflicted on the Austro-Germans. Over 9,000 men were made prisoner and a large number of guns were captured.

The communication says:

"West of Lutsk (Volhynia) we took the offensive and broke through the whole first line of the enemy, inflicting severe losses. Our troops are now advancing, and the cavalry is pursuing the fleeing enemy.

Enemy Fleeing in Southern Volhynia.

"In this district we captured 46 guns, including six mortars and six machine guns, and fifty officers, including two generals and two commanders of regiments and over 9,000 men.

"In the valley of the rivers Slonevka and Boldurovka (Southern Volhynia) the enemy has been defeated along the whole line and is now being pursued in the direction of Brody. Explosions were heard in Brody and fires were observed. Dense columns of goods trains were seen moving from there."

The communication adds, later:

"At 8.30 Friday morning Brody was captured by our troops. The number of prisopers and the amount of booty captured is not yet known.

SWIFTNESS OF RUSSIAN STROKE SURPRISED ENEMY. London, July 28-While the battle of the Somme is continuing with methodical success for the British forces, the Russians are able to announce another important victory in the capture of Brody. This Galician town, fifty-eight miles northeast of Lemberg, is a great railway Junction, and it had been expected the Austrians would retain it at all The swiftness of the new Russian stroke was unexpected, and may lead to the capture of Lemberg itself.

The Russians, according to a report from Petrograd, also have broken the whole Austro-German front west of Lutsk. In this success they are reported to have captured two generals, 9,000 prisoners and orty-six guns.

"Continuing their success of yesterday our troops have captured the last enemy strongholds in Longueval, together with a number of prisoners. Berlin, July 28 .- Captain Charles Fryatt, of the Great Eastern Railway steamship Brussels, which was captured by German destroyers last month and taken into Zeebrugge, has been executed by shooting after trial before a German naval court martial.



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

SIR PIERRE A. LANDRY. Sir Pierre had reached his 70th year and had made what can be term ed an illustrious record; was entitled to a foremost position among his Canadian fellow citizens. He practiced law in the shiretown and enjoyed the reputation of being a barrister of very unusual ability. He entered politics in early manhood and filled the position of Minister of Public Works in the provincial cabinet in the Hanington government. At a later period he was elected a member of the federal house for Kent county in the Sir John A. MacDonald government, and was subse quently appointed fudge of the Westmorland County Court, being later promoted to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, and on the death of Sir Fred. Barker, becoming Chief Justice of the Kings Bench Division. The deceased, as is known, was mentioned in the birth.ay honors of

years later, Rene Landry and his fam-ily—there were now two children— made their way to St. Pierre, Miquelon, with other Acadian families, and from St. Pierre the Landrys went to Pigi-guit, (Windsor), where a great num-ber of Acadians were held captive by the English in Fort Arthur. In 1767 Rene Landry and his family, with other families, moved to Memramcook, N. B., where Rene died at an advanced age, leaving a numerous family: among

From the marriage of Allain Landry and Mary Depuis was born Amand Landry, the first Acadian mem-ber of the New Brunswick Legislature, Amand Landry married Pelegi Caser, and Sir Pierre A. Landry was one of the fruits of that union. Amand Landry died in 1877. Mr. Gaudet points out that Charles Amador de La Tour was originally of Champagne, France, and was con-nected with the noble house of Bou-tillon, whose head was Godfrey, first King of Jerusalem. (Godfrey was a son of Eustache II., Count of Boulogne, was born probably at Boulogne-sur-Mer. in 1060, and died at Jerusalem about 1100.) La Tour came to Acadia in 1610 or 1616, with his father.
