THE PATENT OFFICE. During the year ending Sept. 30, there were 12,323 applications for patents, 223 extensions, and 690 certificates of registry of trade marks.

THE INDIAN POLICY. The policy which was adopted at the beginning of the Administration, in regard to the management of the Indians has been successful in its most arduous parts.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM. During my term of office, I shall be my best endeavor to apply the rules as to secure the greatest possible reform in the management of the Civil Service.

AMERICAN ANTI-SLAVERY. The beginning of the Government has wisely made provision for the relief of the distressed women and children of the South.

THE TREASURY. The money received and conveyed into the Treasury during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878, were: From customs, \$2,575,714.18; from internal revenue, \$1,940,477.78; from sales of public lands, \$6,223,206.20; from Pacific Railway Company, \$748,861.57; from miscellaneous sources, \$2,281,495.92.

REDUCTION OF THE DEBT.
