CANADA'S NAVAL EMERGENCY GIFT

Three Super-Dreadnoughts to
Cost 35 Million
Dollars.

BRITISH BUILT

In the House of Commons yester-
day the Government introduced
their emergency naval policy. The
main proposals are:

That Canada shall contribute
three battleships to the Imperial
Navy, at a cost of thirty-five million
dollars, for Canadian participation
in the defence of the Empire. That
these ships would be at the disposal
of His Majesty the King for the
common defence of the Empire, to
be maintained and controlled as
part of the Royal Navy. That they
had the assurance of the Imperial
Government that if at any time in
the future it should be the will of
the Canadian people to establish a
Canadian unit of the British navy,
these vessels can be recalled by the
Canadian Government to form part
of that navy, in which case they
would be maintained by Canada
and not by Great Britain.

In the meantime, Canadians will
be given special opportunities to
serve as officers on board these
ships; and that this policy was
meant only to deal with the emer-
gency revealed in the statement
from the Admiralty, which was pre-
sented to the House.

so powerful a contingent from any
important theatre in which the na-
val forces of the Empire might be
exposed to severe and sudden attack.
In the meantime, I am assured that
special arrangements will be made
to give Canadians the opportunity
of serving as officers on these ships.

These ships will be built under
Admiralty supervision in the United
Kingdom for the reason that at
present there are no adequate facil-
ities for constructing them in Can-
ada. The plant required for the
construction of a Dreadnought
battleship is enormous and it would
be impossible at present to main-
tain shipbuilding in this country on
such a scale. In any case only the
hull could be built in Canada be-
cause the machinery, the armour
and the guns would necessarily be
constructed or manufactured in the
United Kingdom. The additional
cost of construction in Canada
would be about twelve million dol-
lars for the three and it would be
impossible to estimate the delay.
No one is more eager than myself
for the development of shipbuilding
industries in Canada but we cannot
on any business or economic consid-
erations begin with the construction
of Dreadnoughts, and especial-
ly we could not do so when these
ships are urgently required with-
in two or three years at the outside
for rendering aid upon which may
depend the Empire's future exist-
ence.

FOR THE WOMAN WHO CAN CROCHET.

Christmas Gifts That May Be Fashioned by Her Needle.

The girl who crochets has a great opportunity to display her skill, especially in this day of beautiful hand work.

A young girl will be delighted to receive a crochet party bag for Christmas. The one illustrated is crocheted of rather heavy cotton and finished at the corners with hand made balls of the cotton.

The bag may be mounted over a lining of silk or satin in any color that is preferred. It is made to accommodate the fan, buttonbook and other dainty trifles that a girl is likely to require at a party or at the dancing class.

Charming For a Young Girl. In crocheting a bag on this order it is not necessary to adhere to this pattern. Any motif used in Irish crochet may be substituted for the rose shown here. By the use of judiciously adjusted chains re-enforced with rows of double or triple crochet made to look like scallops it may be worked out to form an oblong piece of crochet. This supplies one side of the bag.

Rows of chains or scallops are run around the edge when the two sides have been drawn together with the crocheting needle in a row of single crochet.

To Keep Handkerchiefs Neat. This little handkerchief case may be made in a short time and will prove a most acceptable gift to any friend, man or woman. It is fashioned of coarse crochet silk. The pattern is a diamond achieved by crocheting a chain of seven and catching it in the center of the chain beneath it.

A square is first crocheted of these chains, and then the sides of the bag are crocheted around and around that. A piece of cardboard padded and covered with silk is tacked to the bottom of the bag. This square is scented and made the same size as a folded handkerchief.

Ribbons are run through the top of the bag so that it may be drawn to

gether. Then the handkerchiefs placed inside will be held firmly in place.

Such a bag is a great convenience for the traveler, for the handkerchiefs may be thus compressed into the smallest possible amount of space, and there will be no danger of their wrinkling.

Useful Crochet Gifts. Irish crochet belts lined with a soft white ribbons are pretty accessories to a white toilet. Buckles to finish off a pretty neckpiece can also be crocheted. Handkerchief bags to match the Irish belt are also charming, and open bags are made of lace.

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FLITTING IN CANADA

Some Curious Mis-statements in an English Journal

Some curious statements about the habits and customs of one country are sometimes published in the newspapers of another. An English publication, "Ideas," has an article about "flitting," or moving, in Canada. The readers of that journal are informed that in Canada we do not flit, we do not move from one home to another, do not engage in househunting, furniture packing, and that we do not employ furniture removers. The way we do it in Canada is thus described: "When a householder decides to remove to another locality, if it is within a reasonable distance, he locks his door, puts the key in his pocket, and walks or drives to the spot he has chosen for his future home, and leaves the house to be brought after him." This is made possible, it is explained, because the houses are of wood. Everything is left in a house just as it was occupied. It is hoisted on jacks, moved on rollers, and is taken to its new site without cracking the plaster or shaking the pictures from the walls. All this is very interesting, and no doubt some frame houses and shacks are moved from one site to another in this way. But one is as likely to see the residences of London or Liverpool on skids as those of a Canadian city.

MASTEDON SKELETON FOUND. Tusk Measures Seven Feet in Length, Weighs 175 Pounds.

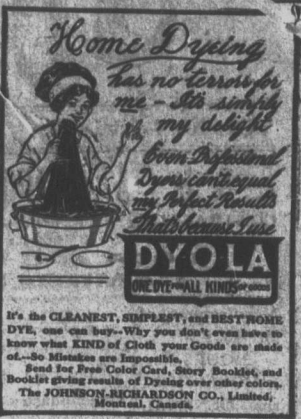
The skeleton of a mastodon was found by Mr. Leaman Hawley on the second concession of Malahide, near Laymer, Ont. A tusk was uncovered which measures seven feet in length by eight inches in circumference, and weighs about 175 pounds. The ribs measure five feet in length, the vertebral joints are as big as a small-sized frying-pan. The upright bones from the vertebrae joints measure from eight inches to sixteen inches in length. One tooth was unearthed which weighs four pounds, and is fourteen inches around. The skeleton was found on the banks of a ravine.

A CHANCE

Some time ago there was a little talk of resurrecting the Y. M. C. A. scheme which has been hanging fire for a few years.

As the fact remains that the proposition of building and furnishing is to large to tackle at the present time could not the original committee get together and rent the building lately occupied by the Windsor Hotel.

This building surely could be rented at a fairly reasonable figure and there is sufficient funds on hand to furnish it out and make a start.

A rented place could do us for a number of years and preparations could be made for an aggressive campaign for funds.

This is worth looking into as the building is centrally located and being at present empty and liable to be so for some time it is not probable that rent would be exorbitant.

The promoters of the Y. M. C. A. are all agreed upon the necessity of such an institution, and if we are unable to finance the larger proposition we might begin with the lesser and grow.

UNJUST

The Moncton Transcript says:—The Halifax Chronicle, in discussing the advent of the C. P. R. with running rights over the Intercolonial Railway into Halifax, is scarcely to be congratulated when it uses the expression respecting the outlay on the Intercolonial Railway that "our good money has been sunk in the wastes of Northern New Brunswick and Eastern Quebec." As a matter of fact no good money has been sunk in the wilds of Northern New Brunswick by the Intercolonial Railway or in Eastern Quebec. Probably no section of the route served by the Intercolonial Railway has yielded in recent years with one exception, so much local freight out of all proportion to population as the very section of the Intercolonial Railway which The Chronicle seems to regard as waste. Between Campbellton and Metis, little towns have sprung into existence, whose stores with large plate glass windows, lighted by acetylene gas or electricity, show a bustle of prosperity, which other and more pretentious portions of the Dominion might well envy. There is scarcely a section of the Intercol-

onial Railway outside possibly of the Cape Breton district, which has shown so satisfactory a development in business as the very section of Eastern Quebec and Northern New Brunswick, which The Chronicle criticizes. Our contemporary, of course, is excusable for making the mistake, because it is basing its assertion upon conditions, which existed prior to 1896, but it should remember that the Liberal party with its progressive policy was in power for fifteen years up to a year or so since, and that has made all the difference. The Chronicle should correct its information respecting the Intercolonial Railway in Northern New Brunswick and Eastern Quebec.

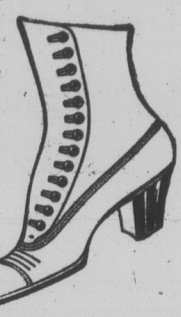

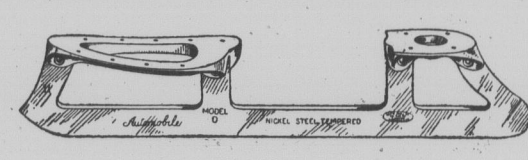

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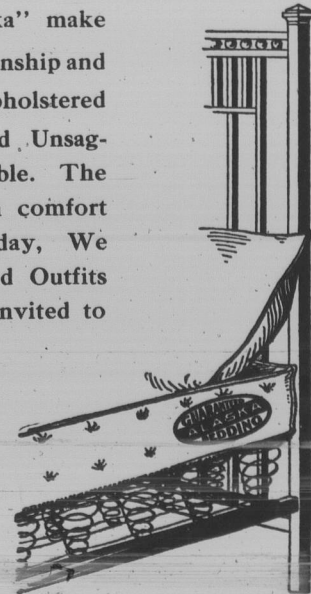

COINS OF LONG AGO

Workmen Find 500 Silver Pennies Beneath Church Floor

On behalf of the Crown claim was laid to some 500 silver pennies of the reign of Henry III, found by workmen employed in removing Stagglesby Church, on the Duke of Bedford's Woburn estate.
The coins, which are dated between 1248 and 1273, were concealed five feet below the present chancel floor and one foot below the ancient floor. WAS DUKE'S ORDERLY

Fifty-Two Years Spent as Soldier and Gatekeeper of Park

Gatekeeper John Burrows, one of the best-known of the Royal Park keepers, who is retiring after having served his country as soldier and park-keeper for fifty-two years, was practically the whole of his 106 days' foreign service the selected orderly of the Duke of Connaught, who was commanding the Brigade of Guards in Egypt.

Mr. Burrows is the possessor of the Egyptian medal, with a bar for Tel-el-Kebir, the Khedive's star for the same campaign, the medal for long service and good conduct, and the Coronation medal of King George. He had been a soldier for twenty-two years before he saw active service, having volunteered for the Egyptian campaign at the opening of the war in 1882.

"On arrival at Alexandria," he said in an interview, "I was appointed the Duke of Connaught's orderly, an appointment I held all through the campaign. When Sir Garnet Wolseley came out to Alexandria he found that Arabi Pasha had some troops near Ismailia, and we were re-embarked at Alexandria for that town, which was on the Suez Canal, and went up the desert after him.

"I was on the field with a Royal Highness during the battle of Tel-el-Kebir, but was never able to get into the fighting line. Next day we went to Cairo, and there the cavalry captured Arabi.
"We returned home in December, 1882. Without any loss of time I obtained my discharge and received the appointment of park-keeper at Regent's Park in 1883. After a time I was sent to Kensington Gardens; from there I went to Queen Anne's Gate, and finally they transferred me to Buckingham Palace, giving me the Prince of Wales's Gate lodge, at Hyde Park, for a residence." Mr. Burrows intends to spend the remainder of his life with his sister near Nottingham.

ARRESTED A LORD

Constable and Baron Act Unwittingly in Jasper Park

AFRICAN FOLK TAKE WOOD ASH BATHS

Britain at War in a Savage Country Whose People Have Queen Customs

London, Dec. 2.—With the object of making peace between two strange African tribes about which little or nothing was previously known, Great Britain embarked upon a "little war" which may drag on for months—perhaps years.

The two tribes are the Annaks and the Nuers, who live near the border line between Abyssinia and the Sudan, and who have been quarrelling for years. The Nuers, it was explained by an official at the Colonial Office are entitled to British protection, but up to now, they have not needed it. In fact, so long as they fought the Annaks with shield and spear against similar weapons, and this was so until quite recently, the Nuers, easily beat their adversaries, but sometime ago the Annaks began to get hold of rifles and ammunition which has been discarded by the Abyssinian army, and learned how to use them.

Thus armed the Annaks made a series of murderous raids on the Nuers, driving their old conquerors northward and carrying off their cattle and women. The British, as rulers, of the Sudan, let the two tribes fight for a while, but as it began to look as if the Nuers would be wiped out altogether, an expedition, numbering 350 men with seven officers, was sent against the Annaks. In a pitched battle, the native force was killed off practically to a man, but the British losses numbered 43, including three natives and two white officers.

The advance on the Annaks was made through the country of the Nuers, who are a strong, wiry race, and wear very few clothes. At first sight of the strange thing about the Nuers is the fact that though they naturally are very dark brown in color they appear to be white.

This illusion is the result of about the strangest "baths" on record. In front of every hut is a pit with white wood ash, and in this every day first the men and then the women roll, covering themselves with a coating of white dust which acts as a protection against flies and other insects. On great occasions, the ash, by the addition of an evil-smelling sticky substance is made into a paste, with which the Nuers smear themselves—having then the appearance of being painted with white enamel. They also dye their hair red and wearing it sticking out straight behind, where it is kept in place with mud.

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, declared to-day that he would marry Lucille Cameron, the 19-year-old Minneapolis girl, whose mother caused his arrest on a serious charge, to-night. The impending marriage will not affect his case before the federal court, according to Johnson's attorneys. The prize fighter said a moving picture concern has agreed to pay him \$5,000 to make a film of the wedding, which is scheduled to take place at the home of his aged mother on the South side, the ceremony to be performed by the pastor of St. Mark's African Methodist Episcopal church.

"I had a long talk with Miss Cameron yesterday," said Johnson. "I explained that I had been blamed for ill-treating her and that we might as well be married right away. She is alone in the world now. Her mother has left her and her stepfather is quoted as saying that he wants to have nothing more to do with her."

PHANTOM SHIPS

The number of phantom ships is legion. Several of the vessels which were wrecked in close proximity to the scene of the Titanic disaster are even said to reappear in the same spot on certain occasions. The Packet Light is one of these, and the story runs that whenever a storm is threatened a ball of fire emerges from the spot where the ship sank, which presently forms itself into the shape of a vessel, and then sinks and disappears.

King George V. and his brother, the late Duke of Clarence, when on their cruise in the Bacchante from 1879 to 1883 are stated to have seen the phantom of the Flying Dutchman, and the Duke mentioned the fact in his diary under date of July 11, 1881. A three-masted frigate is said to haunt the English channel in the vicinity of the Ower Lightship whenever a gale or snowstorm is threatened. Hundreds of people have declared that they have seen the apparition and heard the cries of the shortly passengers. It is sometimes said to be the phantom of the training ship Eurydice, which went down off the Isle of Wight March 24, 1878, involving the loss of about 200 lives.

There are a host of vessels which have not been heard of since they sailed, but one of the most marvelous stories concerns the Marie Celeste, a French passenger sailing ship. She was sighted by the British ship Highlander October 4, 1871, and in reply to the signals gave the answer "All's well." Two days later when sighted she did not reply. She was boarded, but not a living or dead person was found on board.

Everything was in perfect order. Luncheon was laid, the saloon, the personal belongings of the passengers and crew were intact and a bottle of medicine was found upright on the captain's locker. The log had been kept down to the previous day, but there was no entry to account for the mysterious disappearance of all on board. Nothing was heard afterward of any of the passengers and crew.

SNAKE IN THE MILK

One of the Horse Hair Variety and of Obscure Origin

Magame Rosalie Lamothe, a Montreal woman, opened a bottle of milk and poured some of it into a tumbler to take a drink. To her horror she saw a small snake swimming around in the glass, and apparently looking at her. Mr. L. J. E. Leduc, city milk inspector, went to her house and took possession of the milk and the snake, which he killed. It proved to be what is commonly called a "horse hair" or "milk" snake. It was about six inches long, and had a well defined head and tail visible to the naked eye. Some of the health officers pulled off a part from the body and said its composition was like rubber. Some persons tried to revive the theory that this snake was derived from a horse hair. But as no cases of spontaneous generation are on record this is unbelievable, said medical men.

JACK RECORDS BURIED 250 YEARS

Historical Documents Found When Little Church in Montreal Was Demolished

After having lain untouched and buried from the light of day for nearly 250 years, two ancient glass bottles, musty and damp inside and out, but still containing what are now undecipherable copies of the records of the church and four religious medals of the period, were discovered when workmen engaged in the task of demolishing the little church of Notre Dame de Pitie, at Montreal, located the foundation stone of the old building, every stone of which teems with historical recollection.

Through all the long years, during which time there have lived and died twelve British sovereigns, Time has left his mark on the documents which, when they were buried, were believed to be hermetically sealed, since the belief then was that glass was not porous.

Just a wad of decayed parchment containing the names of who knows how many makers of early Canadian history, perhaps, even the actual signatures of those who were among the original founders of the City of Montreal.

But if the papers are faded and unreadable, the four ancient medals found in the smaller of the two glass jars are in a very good state of preservation, though covered with a green deposit which prevents the inscriptions on the coins from being easily read.

Two of the medals bear images of the Blessed Virgin, while a third, on its obverse, bears the image of Blessed St. Anne, the Mother of the Blessed Virgin. The impressions on the other medal are undecipherable.

The relics will be handed over to the Sisters of the Congregation, who sold the church property to the City to permit of the extension of a street.

VALUE OF ONIONS

"Onions are worth their weight in gold" from a health point of view. Such was the statement of Herman Senn, lecturer for the board of education in an address at London, England.

Onions, continued the lecturer, possessed an important medicinal value which could not be overlooked. They were considered a cure for skin diseases, and when eaten late at night are the finest form of antidote for sleeplessness.

Mr. Senn had a good deal to say on the subject of potatoes. Although there were known to be no more than 200 methods of cooking potatoes, the only methods practiced in English homes were boiling and baking and frying.

The main nutritive qualities of potatoes existed immediately under the skin and were often lost by careless peeling.

HAS MONEY TO BURN

Canadian Government Destroying Millions of Dollars in Old Bills

The Canadian Government has money to burn. During the past few months the stokers of the furnaces in the Finance Department have burned four and a half million dollars' worth of one-dollar bills, and over three million dollars' worth of two-dollar bills. And in eighteen months some twenty-seven and a half millions in small bills went up in smoke.

It may be explained, however, that this has nothing to do with the Government's attitude for "reckless expenditure." The money burned consisted of worn or dirty Dominion notes and they were replaced with crisp, new, clean sanitary bills. The Treasury really lost nothing except the small expense of printing the new bills. But in a figurative sense the Government may be truly said to have "money to burn."

BIG DEAL IN GASPE PROPERTY

Holdings of English Owner Sold for a Quarter of a Million.

An echo of the famous Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway case came up at Montreal with the completion of an agreement by which Mr. H. Hilyard, of Dalhousie, N. B., acting on behalf of the St. Maurice Lumber Co., acquired all the properties of A. W. Carpenter, of London, England, formerly carrying on business at Gaspé Basin, under the title of the Gaspé Lumber Company. The purchase price is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$250,000.

Mr. Hilyard will immediately proceed to develop the property at Gaspé, and it is understood the construction of a large sulphite pulp plant will be commenced. Included in the property acquired are the wharves of the Gaspé Lumber and Trading Company, which command the best situation in Gaspé harbor. The Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway, which Mr. Carpenter started, is now running in Gaspé Basin, and in a short time the Matane Railway will also reach the town. Mr. Meunier, Anticosti, is also arranging to build deep water wharves at the Basin to connect his steamers with the A. Q. and W.

NUMEROUS ATROCITIES IN MACEDONIA

Mohammedan Bands Take Part in the General Destruction Large numbers Slain.

Lon, 4th Dec.—A Saloniki despatch to The Times says:—"Macedonia is being drenched with blood as result of atrocities committed by Bulgarian irregulars. It is lamentable that responsibility for so many of these atrocities lie at the door of a Christian race."

"The Bulgarians, needing the regulars in Thrace, practically left Macedonia in the care of the irregulars. Beside the massacres already reported at Kavala and Serres, there has been an enormous amount of killing in the district of Arrethissar, where scarcely a single Moslem has been left alive."

"Mohammedan bands are adding their quota to the general destruction. Whole villages have been depopulated, as a result of their savagery. Turco-Albanian bands are also taking part. The Servians have a better record."

Apart from the slaughter of a number of Moslems, principally by irregulars at Uskup, little complaint has been made against them.

"I have been unable to trace any massacres to the Greeks, but it is stated that their bands are getting into action. The army up to the present, has been able to control the auxiliaries, and there is reason to believe that strong measures will be taken to check the movement before it has been given chance to make progress. Further light on the Kavala massacres: Armenians who joined the Bulgarian army as volunteers committed them; being led by a man whose family was killed in the Adana massacre."

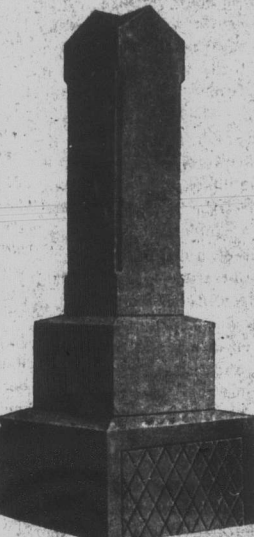

BAGGED A HUGE LION

Member of British Parliament Had
Close Call During African Hunt

Captain P. K. Glazebrook, M.P. for
South Manchester, had a thrilling es-
cape from a lion whilst shooting in
the wilds of Somaliland.

The story centres round the lion's
fight against the rifles of Captain
Glazebrook and his companion, Lieut.
George Wilbraham. The lion's ul-
timate rested with the sportsmen,
and, as the fier of the first shot,
Lieut. Wilbraham was able to bring
home the largest lion that has fallen
to the gun of a modern sportsman.

The lion made a night attack upon
a donkey that had been used for bag-
gage purposes by the travellers. Lieut.
Wilbraham was in waiting in the sa-
vanna, and, seizing his heavy rifle,
which was lying handy, he sent three
shots into the beast. There was a
terrible roar, followed by silence.

Captain Glazebrook and his compan-
ion approached cautiously to where
they believed the brute to be hiding.
When five yards distant they halted,
and the Somali attendants, from be-
hind the sportsmen, tried the effect
of throwing stones at the lion, but
it was too cunning. It still made no
move.

Thereupon Captain Glaze-
brook, believing that it was dead, ap-
proached still nearer.

The lion saw his opportunity, and
leaped. The sportsman, however, main-
tained an admirable nerve. Both em-
ptied a rifle into the angry beast, with
the result that it rolled dead six in-
ches from the foot of the member for
South Manchester. Lieut. Wilbra-
ham's shot pierced the heart, whilst
Captain Glazebrook's entered the
mouth, and passed through the head,
amazing the skull into five pieces.

The total length of the lion before
skinning was 10 feet 6 inches, or an
inch longer than the previous record
lion.

In accordance with the recognised
rule amongst sportsmen, Lieut. Wil-
braham became the possessor of the
skin.

CANADA'S NEW FUEL—PEAT

The coal problem has so long been
a vexed question in Canada that the
success of the Dominion Government's
experiments in peat-production is of
timely interest. Last winter this fuel
was sold to housewives in Ottawa at
\$3.50 a ton, says J. J. Larkin, writing
in December CANADA MONTHLY,
and his account of the method used is
worth reading. He says:

"There is little about the operation
that would excite the curiosity of the
ordinary sight-seer. A treeless, stump-
less bog there is: stretching generally
for miles with a gang of men at work,
for all the world like a number of
workmen engaged in excavating for
building purposes—an aspect that is
intensified by the fact that the ground
has been carefully cleared of all under-
brush, pieces of wood and rubbish.

"At the Government peat plant
there are many trenches; cables run-
ning everywhere; truck-cars standing
on an almost circular stretch of track
and an engine—everything with that
make shift appearance that character-
izes construction equipment, as though
it might be moved at any moment.
And it frequently is.

"But a closer view reveals a perfect
method of operation. Down into this
bog, which has been carefully drained,
dig a number of men who deposit the
soft peat into iron boxes linked to-
gether in an endless chain in the fash-
ion of a treadmill, and which reach
from the bottom of this trench into the
open side of a caboose on wheels
above. Drawn into this caboose,
these buckets of peat are overturned
around a wheel when returning to re-
volve back to the bottom of the ditch
and the peat is thus thrown into a
larger receptacle. The latter is then
drawn out on a cable from another
side of the caboose at right angles to

the chain of buckets and it deposits its
contents into a small truck car waiting
on the tracks beneath.

"The moment this car is filled it is
sent away along the semi-circular rails
for perhaps two hundred yard. When
it arrives where it is wanted, a lever
on the side of the car is pulled and the
wet peat is automatically dumped up-
on a platform where a number of men
await it. Here it is thoroughly mixed
and then spread out at uniform depth
to dry. This is one of the most im-
portant features of peat protection—
air-drying, the absence of which has
meant failure to many of these enter-
prises.

"This completed, the peat, without
being moved, is cut into blocks on the
ground and when sufficiently dry, is
hailed to the storage shed. It is now
ready for use. The latest excavator
produces from sixty to eighty tons
daily.

"In order to manufacture peat on a
commercial scale, hand-digging or ex-
cavating must be replaced by mechan-
ical excavators and the labor cost in
general reduced as much as possible.

"Under the conditions at the Gov-
ernment peat bog, peat cannot be
manufactured, including all expenses,
for less than two dollars per ton stacked
on the field but when mechanical
excavators are employed and the out-
put is reasonably large the above fig-
ure will be materially reduced, allow-
ing the peat to be sold at a moderate
figure and still allowing good profits
for those manufacturing and handling it.

"Peat powder is the latest develop-
ment in the industry and it is not un-
likely that the Government may be-
fore long start experiments in this con-
nection. An extensive plant has been
erected at the backpeat bog near
Ljängley, Sweden, for the manufacture
of this powder for heating purposes.

TO REDUCE THE CAR SHORTAGE

Railway Commission Makes
Important Ruling

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The Dominion
Railway Commission this afternoon is-
sued an order granting the application
of the Canadian Pacific Railway,
Grand Trunk Railway, Canadian Nor-
thern Railway and Michigan Central
Railroad to increase their demurrage
on freight cars from \$1 per day to \$2
and \$3. The increased rates, however,
will be allowed only from December
15 of this year, to March 31 of next
year. The railways asked for \$2, \$3
and \$4 for the first, second and third
day respectively, after the free time
allowed, but the \$4 charge was not
sanctioned by the board, henceforth
\$2 will be assessed by the railways for
the first twenty-four hours after free
time, and \$3 for each succeeding day.

The order, however, is not to apply to
cars held in transit at stop-over points
under published tariffs which have
been filed with the board.

Assistant Commissioner D'Arcy
Scott, who heard this case in the
absence of the Chairman, H. L. Dray-
ton, K. C., in the west issued the judg-
ment and order.

The inventor states that the cost of
manufacture will not exceed \$2.10 a
ton and that the cost of a complete
plant with a capacity of 20,000 tons
annually will be about \$100,000 (not
including a bog and the transportation
of peat.)

MEETING OF THE PREBBTORY

Rev. J. M. McLeod, of New Mills, Accepts Call to P.E.I. Church—Other Business

Newcastle, Dec. 4.—The Presbytery of Miramichi met here yesterday forenoon, Rev. W. B. McCallum, of New Richmond (P. Q.), being appointed moderator. Others present were: Revs. T. P. Drumm, Campbellton; C. A. Hardy, Tide Head; J. H. Kirk, Dalhousie; S. J. Macarthur, Newcastle; T. S. Simpson, Douglastown; J. F. M. McCurdy, Redbank; I. Beaton, Blackville; A. Rettie, Millerton; George Wood, Chatham (St. Andrews); J. M. McLean, Chatham (St. John's); A. D. Archibald, Rexton; R. H. Stavert, Herculot; J. R. Miller, Matapedia; J. M. McLeod, New Mills, clerk. The laymen present were Joseph Henderson, Bathurst; W. R. MacMillan, New Mills, and P. A. Forsythe, Redbank.

Rev. J. M. McLeod intimated his acceptance of a call from St. Peter's congregation, Prince Edward Island. His translation will take place after the 8th instant. A committee, consisting of Revs. Drumm, Macarthur and Archibald, were appointed to draw up a suitable resolution respecting Mr. McLeod's services in the New Mills congregation for the past seventeen years and his tenure of the clerkship for the last ten years. Deep appreciation of Mr. McLeod's and profound regret at his departure was expressed by all the members present.

Rev. J. M. McLean, of Chatham, was appointed clerk of the Presbytery vice Rev. Mr. McLeod, who is removing from the Presbytery.

Grover Livingstone, student of Pine Hill College, Halifax, who has been supplying the pulpit at Millbank, was certified to the college for the continuation of his studies.

Congregation giving less than \$900 a year stipend were strongly urged to come up to the required standard.

A letter was read from the hymn-at committee of the general assembly suggesting the establishment of a suitable memorial to the late Dr. Robert Murray, editor of the Presbyterian Witness and author of some of the best hymns in the Book of Praise. The idea is to have a sum of money collected sufficient to provide an annual interest capable of paying for prizes for essays on the service of song.

It was agreed to give three bursaries of \$50 each to William Tweedie, of Kouchibouguac; Chester A. Richy, of New Bandon; and Robert Scott, of Rexton, who are students in arts in Dalhousie University preparing for the ministry.

Rev. J. M. McLean presented the home mission report, showing excellent work being done in the various home mission fields, by student missionaries during the summer months. Five of the mission stations paid the expenses in full.

The annual budget for the Presbytery amount to \$8,323, distributed as follows: college, \$776; home missions, \$1,412; augmentation, \$900; foreign missions, \$3,173; widows' and orphans' fund, \$355; assembly fund, \$56 (general) and \$272 (travelling expenses); French evangelization, \$130; Point aux Temble school, \$87; social service and evangelism, \$485; bursary, \$176; Sunday schools and young people's societies, \$212; synod fund, \$156. The total 1913 budget for the Presbyterian church in Canada is about \$13,000,000, the maritime synod to raise \$116,946. It is recommended that each Presbytery arrange for a visitation of each congregation to bring this matter definitely before them.

The allotment of synod funds among the congregations of this Presbytery was fixed at 11 1/2 per cent. increase over that of last year. Each family's shares will still be less than \$4 a year, a little more than one cent a day.

In the evening a conference on young people's societies and Sabbath schools was held under the direction of Rev. Mr. Keigan, of St. John.

It was resolved to hold the next quarterly meeting in St. Andrew's Hall, Chatham, second Tuesday of March next.
