He said in part: "The Negrgo of today is facing an even larger and worse crisis than he has ever faced in other years and if we, the older people, do not alter it the condition will be worse for the next generation. We do not work for our own good alone but for the little ones that are to come and who will follow in our footsteps, and as long as we have the backing of the men that we have our organization will grow, because when they see the importance others will."

His address breathed the spirit of altruism. It will be remembered that Mr. Montgomery has not been blessed wth any children. Another thing we might mention is that he is one of the few of our group who has a position which is both dignifying and remunerative, and thus it seems that he has no ulterior motive. seeking no personal gain.

As it is with the president, so is is with the other officers and members of the organization. A careful survey of the official staff will reveal the fact that it is made up of men and women who have risen beyond the mediocre stage, of men and women who are attempting big things. So far our membership comprises men and women who own their own homes the guests of Miss Selina Smith. and who are taxpayers. We mention these facts in order to emphasize the fact that the aims and objects of the organization are worthy.

That there will be critics who will accuse us of having eslfish aims we are certain. That there will be others who will acuse us of being a band of agitators we know full well. Still we shall go forward, doing our work with spirits and head held high and undaunted. We shall do much to improve conditions of all the people and some of the very ones who knock us most shall be helped most, for it is they who need help most. To those who are already beginning to knock we would say this much. We need your help and co-operation if you are inclined to give it, still if you had rather knock than boost, very well, we shall proceed and succeed without you and in spite of you. 


