Of late he has become restive under the Conservative domination which a number of both sides received black eyes and numerous bruises. The trouble arose from the French wanting to take bait out of the Newfoundlanders' nets. his consistent opposition to the Govern-ment's compensation scheme, should secure to him the undivided Gladstonian vote in

The idea is to admit sugar, wool and other products free and to make a considerable cut on lumber, in return for which our products are to be admitted free in the ports of the countries so tayored by us."

THE POSSESSION OF \$130,000. To thoroughly understand the dispute as to the disposal of the \$130,000 which the Legislature at its last session authorized the City Council to borrow, it is well to read the clause in the act regarding the matter., The terms of clause 17 are as fol-

lows:

Notwithstanding the provisions of any act or law, the said last mentioned corporation may borrow for any period not exceeding 3150,000 as the Council thereof may deem meet, and the moneys so borrowed shall form a fun for any period in extending on the control of any period in extending on the control of any period in extending on the same for that purpose, the said Water Commissioners shall pay the same over to the Treasurer of the said city to be applied for the general purposes thereof; but such last mentioned application shall not be made to any greater extent than 380,000, which represents the amounts paid by said Commissioners on capital accounts out of the revenues of the said waterworks.

Nothing, to our mind, could be plainer than this statement. The \$130,000 is for the purpose of extending the waterworks, in accordance with the needs of the city as a whole, but with special regard for the agreement of the corporation with the taxpayers of South London, now Ward 6. The money remaining, after the needed works have been accomplished, is to be devoted to city purposes, but only to the exent of the \$60,000 set forth. It is explained, on behalf of the City

Council, that the Water Commissioners said they would only require \$70,000 for the ew works, and that therefore the \$60,000 should be handed over to the Council as soon as the debentures are is-sued. The reply of the Water Commissioners is that they mean to stick by the act. 


