None Thought To Search the House, Even After Doctor Disappeared.

TO SCOUR CONTINENT

Authorities Will Conduct Wide Search For Man Who Left After Girl Was Missed.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Tamworth, July 29 .- The revolting crime that culminated in the finding of the body of Blanche York in the cellar of Dr. C. K. Robinson, holds this district in a suspense of horror. The entire community knew and admired the young woman and has been keyed to a high pitch since her disappearance. The theories of suicide, kidnapping and foul play have each been taken up, and while there has been much suspicion, until yesterday no one took the initiative in searching the house of the physician, where she was last seen.

All Over Europe Armies Are Massing In Strategic Positions

ARE ON HIM NOW Report Says That Belgrade Is Under Bombardment and River Bridge Has Been Blown Up. Premier Asquith Says Situation Is "Of Extreme Gravity"---Diplomats Trying

St. Petersburg, July 29 .- A dispatch from Belgrade says the Servian capital has been bombarded, and the bridge over the river Save blown up.

To Circumscribe Area of Conflict.

(Canadian Press.)

London, July 29.—Reports of the massing of armies in strategic positions came from all points of Europe today, but no actual clash of the opposing forces was registered.

Diplomats concentrated their attention on efforts to confine the war to Austria-Hungary and Servia, the two nations immediately concerned in the quarrel, and the attitude of the German and Russian emperors was closely watched, owing to their near relations to the countries engaged.

It was learned that telegrams had been exchanged between the imperial rulers in Berlin and St. Petersburg, and attention was strained to obtain a hint of the nature of the contents, as it was the general conviction that the salvation of Europe from a great and calamitous war was in the hands of these two powerful monarchs.

PREMIER ASQUITH'S STATEMENT.

Premier Asquith referred to the international situation in the House of Commons, but all the information that he was able to impart was contained in a few words. He said:

The situation at this moment is one of extreme gravity, and I can only usefully say that the British Government is not relaxing its efforts to do everything in its power to circumscribe the area of conflict."

The British Premier, then, in reply to a question, said:

"The British Government has received no information as to an alleged revolutionary outbreak in Russian Poland."

He telephoned to the local telephone office here, where he is employed as wire chief, and asked that some one be sent out to bring him into Owen Sound. Dr. Gaviller and some others at once went out and brought the unfortunate man into the hospital here.

As far as ean be learned Fraser dived from his canoe, and in doing so struck his head on a log or some other substance on the bottom. In some manner he managed to reach shore, but his mind was a blank, and he lost his identity completely. Memory a Blank.

Where he went afterwards, and where he has been during the last five days, neither he nor anyone else knows. His evidently did not return to him until today, and he can give no account of his wanderings. To him it seems if it were only last evening that he went out in the canoe, and cannot realize it was last Thursday night. As to what happened during the intervening five days Fraser has no idea. His clothes bear evidence of rough usage and hardship.

The case is the most peculiar that has occurred here for some time, and has aroused interest. Fraser, now in the hospital, appears to be in a dazed condition and refuses to talk very much.



A WAR OF RACE AND GREED USTRIA'S declaration of war with German backing is a piece of the most brutal and undisguised violence. It is an assault by a glant upon an annoying but petty neighbor; it is also an outrage upon the peace and pocketbooks of the world. Austria professes

to be a very Christian country! The case is somewhat similar to that of Great Britain and the Boers fifteen years ago, though the differences are in Great Britain's favor. Like the Boers, the Serbs are a simple, hardy, rustic people. Most of them seem to keep pigs and saw timber. They are, like the Boers, rather ignorant, bumptious, and as the Boers had their cousins in the Dutch farmers within old Cape Colony, so the Serbs have their race-brothers and potential sympathizers in the neighboring Austrian province of Bosnia, and in the "South

Slavs" of the Dual Empire. Why this attack from Vienna? The Serb political agitation conducted from Belgrade and culminating, it seems, in the recent assassination of the archduke, is the cause alleged. Ever since 1908, when Austria annexed Bosnia after an occupation and development of 30 years, the Serbs have cherished illwill towards the neighboring empire, fested a growing suspicion of the Serbs. It is estimated that there are about six million race-brothers of the Servians in race has a natural aspiration after political unity. Intrigues have been prosecuted by clubs and societies, but more has been imagined than has been. or could be, actually effected. It was much the same with the Boer intrigues and dreams of driving Britain from South Africa.

The great differences between the at Austrians living in Servia have no vances like those of the Uitlanders. and second, that whereas the Dutch in Cape Colony were well treated, the "South Slavs" in Austria (Serbs, etc.) have been outrageously trampled down, especially in the Hungarian provinces. This is all to Great Britain's advantage in a comparison.

racial disaffection within her own borders, viz., "South Slav" sympathy with Servia, is, then, a leading motive of Austria, as it was Chamberlain's motive to suppress Dutch feeling against Great Britain within Cape Colony by attacking the source of trouble in Pretoria. 




