Situation in France and Belgium Growing Tenser Each Day.

British Headquarters in France, July 28—(By the Associated Press).—The German and British fighting lines in France and Belgium, which have been comparatively dormant for several weeks, so far as any large offensive is concerned, have tensed perceptibly in the last few days. Out of the stiffening have grown numerous fierce artillery the last few days. Out of the stiffening have grown numerous fierce artillery duels, especially in Flanders. The Germans have developed what is known among the British as "nerves"; that is, they have become exceptionally sensitive to any movement of their opponents which deviates from the routine, and give evidence of this condition in furious bombardments at suspected points. From this the conclusion is drawn that for reasons of their own the Germans may be fearing that trouble is impending in some section, and are not certain where to look for its appearance. Says Official Report Subs Fail in Six Attempts To Lens and Hill 70 have been under heavy and almost continuous gunfire. Even the battle-scarred and barren Vimy Ridge, which overlooks the valley of Lens, has been the object of vigorous shelling, which has accomplished nothing except to add still more shell craters on the already badly punished hill. British and French guns and British armored cars were added to the unprecedented technical strength of the Russians themselves to make this particular front equal to anything. However, the time had arrived, he said, when Canada must resort to this measure of direct taxation, and he was confident that the people would, in the light of the conditions which call for it, cheerfully accept the burden and the conditions. fully accept the burden and the sacrifice.

It had also been thought advisable to adopt the principle of a graduated tax. Within certain limits of income it was proper that an income tax should be uniform, but when higher salaries were reached it was just and proper that the rate of taxation should increase as the scale of income increased.

Exemptions Stand.

Sir Thomas explained that the exemptions of \$3,000 and \$2,000 would be carried out throughout. Thus in the case of a married man with a salary of \$11,000 the tax would be upon \$7,006. 

There are those who are willing to shoulder all the burden and contribute their cars, while hundreds of others prefer to be slackers. Has interest in the returned men died down merely because their presence on the city streets has become familiar to the citizens?"

Residents of Dutton will suffer a considerable loss through the cancellation. Preparations to entertain the men and provide a supper for them had been made to the extent of hundreds of dollars.


