BOTH GERMAN AND FRENCH PENETRATE LINES

FRENCH BREAK GERMAN LINES; Foe RETALIATES

Both Succeed in Penetrating at Different Points — Enemy Suffers Tremendous Losses On the Aisne Front, East of Hurtebise.

Paris, July 26.—German assaults were reopened last night along a front of about two miles on the Aisne front, from a point east of Hurtebise to La Foyelle. The French statement issued this afternoon says that, at the cost of tremendous losses, the Germans were able to penetrate into certain elements of the French first-line trenches. North of Aisne, in the Champagne, the French penetrated the German trenches, the statement says, and inflicted heavy losses on the Germans. On the other parts of the Champagne front the artillery bombardment was intense. Fighting lasted all night, the French repelling every attack made by the Germans.

The Germans also renewed their assault on the French positions at Hurtebise Farm, but the attack broke down under the trench fire of the French. The reciprocal artillery fire on the left bank of the River Meuse, in the Verdun region, was maintained with the usual violence.

Canning Vegetables.
Dear Miss Grey—Have any of the readers tried canning green peas and beans? I would like to get a recipe for both. I am sending a recipe for corned corn, which we found very good.

How to Can Green Corn.—Cut ripe sweet corn from the cobs and pack in glass jars, pressing the corn down as tightly as possible. (A 16-ounce wooden mallet that exactly fits the jar is useful to press it down with.) To each quart can add 1 teaspoon salt. Place the cans in washbowl, on the bottom of which has been placed a thick, old cotton cloth. Have the covers of cans screwed down very tightly. Fill the washbowl to the necks of the cans with cold water, and let boil three hours and a half. Take cans out and screw down airtight. When cool set sweet corn all winter.

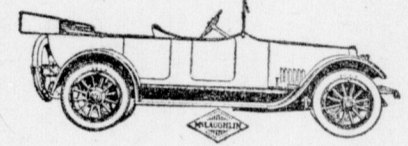

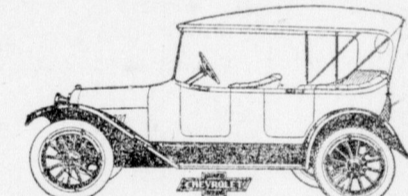

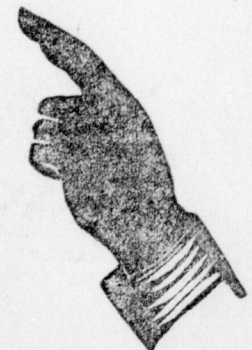

GOVERNMENT FORCED TO CURB WEALTH; SANCTIONS INCOME TAX

Sir Thomas White Introduces New Measure and Statute Authorized.

OPPOSE HIGH EXEMPTION Liberals Declare the Measure Should Have Been Introduced Long Ago.

OTTAWA, July 25.—Canada is now under income taxation. The measure was brought over by Parliament today, and the Commons adopted, without serious objection, a resolution authorizing the enactment of a statute taxing salaries from \$2,000 upward.

The measure was brought in by Finance Minister White, who has insisted, up to today, that it would be impossible to support this form of taxation in Canada. The introduction of the measure was met with a strong reluctance, and is taken as a concession forced from the Government by repeated demands of the country for a description of wealth.

The chief criticism from the Opposition is that the measure is a tax on income, and that the income tax step should have been taken first. The measure is a tax on income, and the income tax step should have been taken first.

For corporation and joint stock companies, the tax is four per cent on incomes above \$2,000. The super-tax is collected on incomes above \$2,000, but substantially less on incomes above \$3,000.

Patriotic Contribution Exempt. Municipal and provincial taxes, as well as contributions to the patriotic fund, are exempt from the tax.

As to the duration of the measure, the Finance Minister stated that the measure would expire at the end of the next session of Parliament.

Cost Will Be High. Canada was not a country of concentrated wealth, it was a country of scattered wealth, and the cost of administering the measure would be substantial.

Exemptions Stand. The \$2,000 income would pay \$20 and \$30; \$7,000 would pay \$100 and \$150; \$10,000 would pay \$150 and \$200.

Super-Tax, Too. As to joint stock companies and corporations which are to be subject to a super-tax, Sir Thomas said that he had not time to discuss them.

Homogeneous potatoes were offered in greater plenty today than at any time this year, the imported variety not being so plentiful as usual.

According to farmers, corn is growing very well and promises to become the best crop in many years.

SOLDIERS' OUTING TO DUTTON CANCELLED; NOT ENOUGH AUTOS

Committee Is Indignant at Indifference of Car Owners.

Because it was impossible to borrow thirty of the 500 motor cars in London, a pleasure trip to Dutton planned for convalescent soldiers Wednesday afternoon had to be cancelled. Only about half a dozen motorists offered their cars. Members of the Soldiers' Aid Commission are highly indignant. They make no criticism of the citizens who have been offering their cars for the past three or four trips, as they do not expect them to turn out every week. "We thought it possible to get at least thirty cars every week in a city this size without calling upon the same persons every time," said one of the automobile committee to The Advertiser. "It appears that this plan to help the returned men and give them a bit of enjoyment is working the same way as voluntary enlistment. There are those who are willing to shoulder all the burden and contribute their cars, while hundreds of others prefer to be sick-ers. Has interest in the returned men died down merely because their presence on the city streets has become familiar to the citizens?" Residents of Dutton will suffer a considerable loss through the cancellation. Preparations to entertain the men and provide a supper for them had been made to the extent of hundreds of dollars. The afternoon as far as the convalescent men were concerned was not entirely spoiled. Through the kindness of J. E. Moore, two open street cars were obtained and a trip was made over several of the city lines and later to Springbank, where refreshments were served.
