# **Proportioned** As an authority on cattle, Mr. Walter Robson, who conducts an extensive business in Oxford County as a shipper and exporter, is not surpassed in the Province, and what he has to say on the proposed reciprocity agreement may be accepted as coming from an unbiased expert. When asked his opinion in regard to how cattle wouldbe affected, his reply was as follows: "A few days ago I sold in Toronto six cars, containing 120 cattle, principally two-year-olds, and averaging 1,300 pounds in weight, for 6½ cents per pound. One load was selected for exhibition purposes. The cattle were slaughtered at the Harris abattoir, and afterwards placed in a glass case at the Toronto exhibition, where they can be seen by any visitor to the fair. Why I speak of these being selected for exhibition purposes is simply to remove all cause for quibbling as to their class or grade. They were clearly toppers on any market in America. The same class of cattle in Chicago today are bringing 8 cents a pound; in Buffalo, 7½ cents. But grant that there was only the difference of one cent per pound, I received \$13 a head less than I would have received in Buffalo, which, on 120 head, makes an aggregate difference of \$1,560 between the two markets on my bunch of cattle. I am not going to argue pro or con, feaving that to political experts, but these are the facts, and in view of these facts I am of the opinion that reciprocity would mean a great thing for the Canadian cattle-ralsers."




