STREET RAILWAY SITUATION STILL HANGING FIRE

If Men Go Out On Strike May 1. Other Unions May Follow Suit.

New developments in the street railway situation hinge on the action of the men when their agreement expires April 31. They have asked an increase of 21 cents an hour, but active negotiations are not likely to be commenced

The fact that the company last year refused a 9-cent increase to the men until an increase in fares was granted by the city council, is taken as an inuntil an increase in fares was granted by the city council, is taken as an indication that they will refuse to meet this further demand. If this is so the men are almost certain to strike.

The city will then be in a difficult situation, and it is not known yet just what action would be taken. The appeal division of the Ontario high court has ruled that the city council has power to grant higher fares. On this ground the company may make an appower to grant higher fares. NO REDUCTION IN MILK PRICES HERE MINIMUM WAGE OF

Toronto Consumers To Pay **Less During Summer** Months.

"Haven't heard about it." was the reply of London retail milk dealers when asked today if there would be any reduction in the price of milk in London for the summer months, as is being made in Torento and other cities. The milk condenseries, which set the wholesale price of milk in Western Ontario, have reduced the price paid to the farmer from \$3.10 to \$2.75 per hundredweight.

Similar wholesale reduction in other districts have been followed by slight reductions in the retail price. Toronto consumers, where the wholesale price is \$2.60 per eight-gallon can, will during May, June, July and August, get 14 pints of milk for \$1, instead of 13 pints, as at present. Apparently there is to be no reduction in the local retail prices.

Levi Thomson (Qu'Appelle) said the apparent intention of requiring incorporation was to insure publicity, and to that end he proposed that any association organized for political purposes should file a memorandum of its places of business and its officers, and that particulars of their contributions for election purposes should be filed with the chief electoral officer, and be compelled to publish such contributions in the newspapers or elsewhere.

Mr. McMaster (Brome). who said that Parliament had been lowered in the eyes of the public owing to the belief that members were elected by funds supplied by their friends, and that the big interests had a hand in their election, introduced an amendment which would forbid any incorporated or unincorporated company or firm contributing to campaign funds. Subscriptions by individuals should be permitted, but with requirement of the fullest possible publicity.

Mr. Gould (Assiniboia) said the people in the West were sick of machine politics. They felt that the big interests were behind the governments. He described the action of the electors of the western provinces in subscribing small amounts—50 cents to \$1—to support their candidates as purity in politics, which drew derisive laughter from the Government benches.

Do not allow the eggs to become chilled before being set, Give the hens or incubators a fair chance with good, hatchable eggs, and under most conditions they will produce good, healthy, chicks.


