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LORD STANLEY.

Right Hon. Frederick Arthur Stanley, 1st Baron (created 1886)—Youngest son of the 14th Earl of Derby; born 1841; was educated at Eton; entered the Grenadier Guards in 1858, and was appointed lieutenant and captain in 1860; retired from the army and entered Parliament as member for Preston, in 1865; was a Lord of the Admiralty from Aug. to Dec. 1868; elected member for North Lancashire at the general election of 1868, and again in 1874, 1880, and 1885; was Financial Secretary for War from Feb., 1874, to Aug., 1877, when he was appointed Financial Secretary to the Treasury, Mar., 1878; Secretary of State for War, which office he held till the retirement of Lord Beaconsfield's Administration in 1880; on the formation of Lord Salisbury's Administration, June, 1885, Secretary of State for the Colonies; resigned Feb. 1886; President of the Board of Trade in Lord Salisbury's second Administration, Aug. 1886; became Governor-General of Canada, 11th June, 1888; married on 31st May, 1864, Lady Constance Villiers, eldest daughter to George, 4th Earl of Clarendon.

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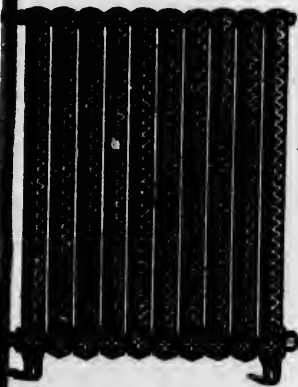
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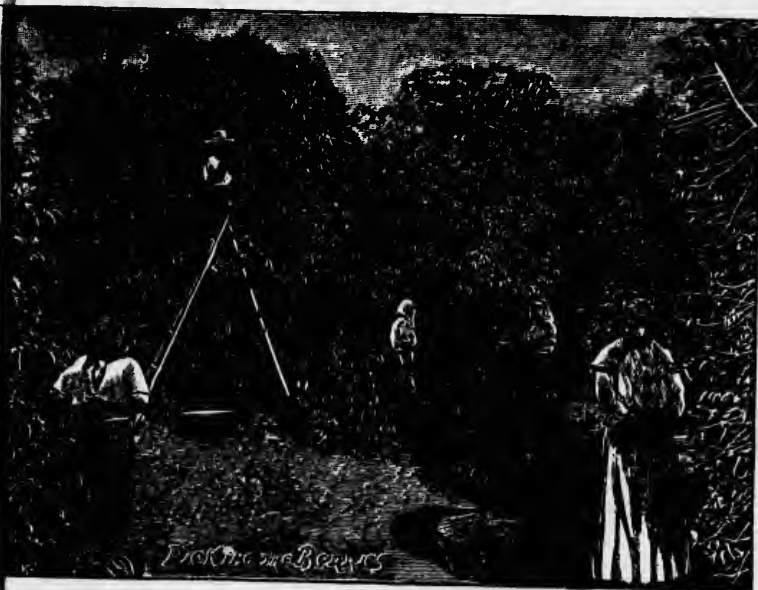

Captain Clapham has been connected with several of the past carnivals, and in 1887 appointed the General Secretary. He is a well-known citizen and one of Montreal's enthusiastic volunteer officers. His military service dates from 1859, when he joined one of the volunteer regiments in England. He had the honor of being appointed Staff-Trumpeter to the National Rifle Association, London, and did duty at Wimbledon for eleven years as such. Captain Clapham joined the Montreal Cavalry some seventeen years ago, since which time he has acted as Staff-Trumpeter to Their Excellencies Lord Dufferin and Lord Lorne when visiting Montreal. He received the appointment as Captain and Paymaster of the 6th Regiment of Cavalry in 1881, and has since served in several important positions—being General's Orderly Officer on Brigade Review Days, as also during the small-pox troubles. He was Commissariat or Supply Officer with the 1st Prince of Wales Rifles when called out for service in the North-west, and Supply Officer on the Staff at the Brigade Camps for five years.

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History of Montreal.

MONTREAL'S title to the metropolis of British North America comes to her by inheritance. Her right to that title is old much older—than Queen Victoria's title to the succession of British Crown. History tells us that Jacques Cartier, who discovered Montreal, found in 1535, when he landed at Quebec, that Montreal, called Hochelaga, was at that early age the metropolis of the savage and the capital city of the Indian tribes. His own narrative of the discovery has the charm of romance that surrounds all North American stories. He found Quebec on the 15th of August, 1535, and met Donacona, the Sagoyewew or King of Quebec, then called Stadacona. He could not be dissuaded from a visit to Montreal, and from the 19th of September to the 28th he was engaged in sailing as far as Lake St. Peter where he was compelled by shoal water to leave his ships and take to the boats. He reached his destination on the 2nd of October, having landed at the foot of the island. Having arrayed himself in the most gorgeous finery, he left his boats, and, accompanied by twenty mariners and four gentlemen, sailed for Hochelaga. He was guided by three Indians, and says, in his description of the journey, that "all along he found the way as well beaten and frequented as can be, the fairest and best country that could possibly

seen, full of goodly great oaks, as any in the woods in France, under which the ground was all covered with acorns." After he had gone about four miles, he was met by one of the principal chiefs, who paid him some honor, made a speech to him, and insisted upon him taking a rest before he presented him to their great King. This King had no throne but the brawny arms of his braves; and, supported on the shoulders of several of these, he received the first Christian.

Cartier had taken thirteen days from Quebec to Montreal, which nowadays can be encompassed in five hours by train. He thus described the town:—

"It is placed near, and, as it were, joined to a big mountain, fertile on the top, from which you may see very far. The town is roundly encompassed about with timber, with three rampires, one within another, framed like a sharp spire, but laid across above. The middle-most of these is made and built in a direct line, but perpendicular. The rampires are framed and fashioned with pieces of timber, laid along the ground very well and cunningly joined after their fashion. This enclosure is of height about two rods. It hath but one gate or entry thereat, which is shut with piles, stakes and bars. Over it and also in many parts of the wall, there be places to run along, and ladders to get up, all full of stores for the defence of it."

"There are in the town about fifty houses, each fifty paces long and fifteen or twenty broad, built all of wood, covered over with the bark of the wood, as broad as any board, and cunningly joined together." Cartier ascended the mountain near by, which he called "Mount Royal." It was no wonder the sight of the surrounding country "filled him

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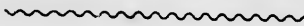

feelings of joy and gratification." To-day, the fashionable tourist views the same scene, altered by civilization, will say that it is greater beauty, even after four centuries have stamped it with the iron hand of commerce and garnished it with the golden sheen of agriculture. The first Cartier saw the broad St. Lawrence and the sombre Ottawa, encircling the Island of Montreal. Looking southward, he beheld the foam of the Lachine Rapids, dashing over the leaps in the rocks, and beyond the mountain ranges known as the Adirondacks. Westward, up the Ottawa Valley, a vista of forest glade and the waters of the Lake of Two Mountains shining in the distance. Northward, a succession of forest ranges denoting a well watered country, and a range of hills beyond. Eastward the Town and Bay of Hochelaga, the St. Lawrence hurrying past Helen's Island and Boucherville, and Belœil Mountains beyond all. The forest luxuriance was upon every hand, and those lovely tints of Autumn had overspread the whole country. Cartier had never seen its like before. He never came back to see it again. The scene has changed. Now, the gazer looks from Mount Royal as Cartier did; but takes a different view from a high tower that overlooks the homes of over three hundred thousand people, the spires of a hundred churches, most of them in Montreal, but spires that gleam in the sun wherever the eye turns. Bridges span the St. Lawrence and the Ottawa Rivers. Steamers ply the rushing waters, and the shriek of the locomotive resounds where Cartier heard only the rippling current. Huge ocean steamers in dozens fringe the masts of heavy ocean sailing vessels fringe the river, where Cartier saw the rushes and the waving shrubbery, tall grain elevators, smoking chimneys, dense blocks of limestone warehouses, miles of streets,

houses and public buildings to the value of over one hundred and millions of dollars, exclusive of their contents, public schools and universities, convents and hospitals, princely emporiums and palatial hotels. Cartier would to-day have seen all this. He would not have been compelled to hurry away on the same day he came. He would have seen, too, how an artificial river—the Lachine Canal—enabled ships could carry his entire fleet on the deck of any one of them, to go around the Lachine Rapids, and the water turning the machinery of scores of mills upon its banks. Instead of the barter for beads and furs in the Mount Royal he saw then, he would find to-day banks in Montreal, with a capital of forty-six millions of dollars, merchants worth millions of dollars to their credit, factories by the score, employing two hundred to fifteen thousand workmen, and valued at more than fifty million dollars, hotels, some of which could house the then whole population of Hochelaga.

The Montreal of to-day is to Canada what London is to Great Britain, and New York to the United States. Montreal occupies a special and advantageous position at the head of oceanic navigation and at the commencement of lake and river navigation, having direct railway communication with all parts of Canada and the United States. In order to accommodate the magnificent fleet of ships that come to her port from all lands, the ship channel of the river St. Lawrence has been deepened to twenty-seven feet at the lowest condition of the river and a further deepening is now in progress; in order to achieve this, she had to borrow some three million dollars, and the removal of this debt by the Dominion Government has lifted from her shoulders the last and greatest burden she has had to bear.

In consequence of this debt the scale of harbor dues imposed was severely heavy, giving smaller and in other respects less convenient port an unfair advantage over Montreal. In compliance, however, with urgent representations, the Federal Government has assumed the responsibility of this debt. The city is the terminus of one of the most complete railway systems in the world. Two divisions of the Grand Trunk railway, and various lines run in connection with its magnificent system, afford easy access to the United States and the principal cities of Canada, while that marvellous monument of national enterprise and engineering skill, the Canadian Pacific Railway traverses the continent from sea to sea, opening up magnificent tracts of fertile country and developing sources of wealth hitherto unknown, while it is becoming the great highway of intercourse between the eastern and western limits of the old world. In addition to its great importance as the chief port and forwarding station of Canada, Montreal is also the largest manufacturing centre in the Dominion. Among its industries are foundries, sugar refineries, breweries, silk mills, manufactories of hardware, carriage and sleighs, brooms, woodenware, glass, paints and drugs, edge tools, locomotives, steam engines, boilers, india-rubber goods, printing presses, agricultural implements, musical instruments, paper rope, sewing machines, tin pins, tobacco, woolen and cotton goods, boots and shoes, and many smaller industries. There are besides saw and flour mills, rolling mills, lead works, brass foundries, and many other industrial establishments. The educational means of the city comprise the University of Montreal with faculties of law, science, art and medicine, a branch of the University with faculties of divinity, law, medicine and arts. The

cal colleges belonging to Roman Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian and Methodist bodies, a Jesuit College, a high school, two Normal Schools and several classical and scientific academies. The elementary schools are under the control respectively of the Catholic and Protestant School Commissioners, and there are also two affiliated medical colleges one at Bishop's College, Lennoxville, the other to Victoria College, Cobourg. As a sign of the business transactions carried on by the community may be noted that there are no fewer than sixteen banking establishments, twenty-six Fire and sixteen Life Insurance offices located in the city. There are thirteen public markets, whose total sales of farm produce amount yearly to some \$650,000. In order to facilitate the intercourse with foreign countries, the following nations are represented in the city by Consuls and Vice-Consuls, viz.: the Argentine Confederation, Austro-Hungary, Belgium, Chili and Peru, Denmark, France, German Empire, the kingdom of Hawaii, the Netherlands, Sweden and Norway, the Republic of Uruguay, Spain, Switzerland and the United States. Montreal is the centre of a judicial district presided over by seven judges. The Court of Queen's Bench also hold sittings in the months of February, May, October and December. The section of the Bar of the Province of Quebec located in Montreal numbers about 300 members. The city is the seat of a Roman Catholic Archbishop and an Anglican Bishop.

Montreal claims and certainly deserves the title of the "City of Churches," and as Mark Twain observes, "is the only city on the Continent where you cannot throw a brick without breaking a church window." It contains some seventy-five churches of all denominations.

many of which are magnificent edifices. Among the finest and largest buildings erected of late years may be mentioned the Post Office on St. James Street, erected in 1876, at the cost of \$400,000. The new Court House, which cost close on \$120,000. The majestic Cathedral of St. Peter upon Dominion Square, is to cost when completed \$500,000. The Windsor Hotel, built in 1878, at a cost of \$1,100,000, and having 1,000 rooms, and accommodation for 750 guests, is hardly inferior to any establishment of the kind on the Continent. The Bank of Montreal is one of the finest buildings in America, and there have been recently erected two magnificent Railway Depots for the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways, a spacious and handsome new Gothic church for the Methodists, and several splendid blocks or buildings for offices, including new offices for two Life Insurance Companies, the New York and Imperial; while a new building for the law courts, nearly opposite the present building, which has become too small for present requirements, is soon to be erected. Montreal has at present about 145 miles of streets. Between the years 1878 and 1886, no less than fifteen miles of sewers were laid down by the city, making a total of ninety miles of sewers existing. One of the most important acquisitions for the city, was the purchase by the Corporation, between the years 1872 and 1875, of Mount Royal, and laying it out with drives as a public park, the cost to date being \$622,337. The Mountain, which stands alone in the wide river plain, is some 550 feet in height. It is ascended by a winding carriage road, by a series of about 427 steps for foot passengers, and also by an elevator. The winding road opens up to the public two very beautiful vistas, one looking down the valley of the St. Lawrence with its mountains

islands, and the other giving a view of the Lake of Two Mountains, in the far distance, the Green Mountains of Vermont and the Adirondacks are plainly discernible on a clear day. This drive is acknowledged by visitors to be by far the most beautiful of any park on this Continent.

The latter figures are very much underdrawn and do not include several large suburban districts which will likely be added to Montreal before the Government takes the census of 1891. The closest estimate of the city's population to-day puts it at 200,000.

THE PRESS.

The Montreal Press has grown with, if not in advance of the times, and has led in enterprises, especially during the later years, of a progressive character. Twenty-five years ago, the press was very often influenced by private opinion, and was nothing if not political. Now there are five English and five French newspapers, the work on either of which

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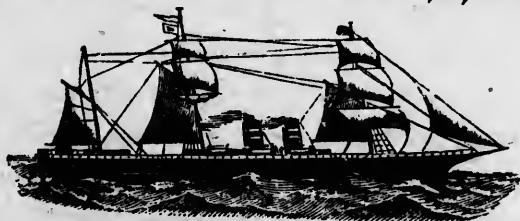

greater to-day than was that on all put together twenty years ago. Montreal *Witness* is religious, prohibition, moral and fearless, under the control and management of its proprietor, Mr. J. R. Dougall. The paper was started by Marshall, Langevin & Co., and now the sole property of Hugh Graham; its price is one cent, and its success has been phenomenal. The *Gazette*, the leading Conservative newspaper, is owned by a stock company, but the stock is principally held by Mr. Richard V. White and the heirs of the late Mr. Thomas White, whose son, Mr. R. S. White, is its able editor. The *Herald*, is the organ of the Reform or Liberal party, is edited by Mr. St. John, an able journalist, and is owned by Hon. Peter Mitchell, who inspires its tone, and manages it. All these papers are thriving commercially and otherwise.

The strides made by the French press is even greater, by comparison than that of the English, as they were much more backward until the last ten years, when a spirit of emulation has produced among them a revolution. The newspapers are *La Minerve*, conservative, edited by Mr. J. Tassé; *La Patrie*, owned and edited by Mr. H. Beaugrand; *Le Monde*, Independent, owned by Mr. F. Vanasse; *La Presse*, Independent, owned by Messrs. Wurtele & Co., edited by Mr. G. A. Nantel; *L'Etendard*, Ultramontane and National in politics, edited by F. Trudel. There is also published in Montreal, a weekly illustrated English paper, the *Dominion Illustrated*, and a French weekly, *Le Monde Illustré*. There are the *Trade Bulletin* of Mr. Henri Mason, *The Journal of Commerce* of Mr. Foley, and a number of other English weekly, and French weekly newspapers of more or less importance.

BY THE HOUR.

For the first hour: 1 or 2 persons, 75 cents; 3 or 4 persons, 1.00.

For every subsequent hour: 1 or 2 persons, 60 cents; 3 or 4 persons, 75 cents.

TWO HORSE VEHICLES.

From any place to any other, provided the time occupied do not exceed fifteen minutes: 1 or 2 persons, 50 cents; 3 or 4 persons, 65 cents.

From any place to any other, provided the time occupied do not exceed half an hour: 1 or 2 persons, 65 cents; 3 or 4 persons, 75 cents.

When the drive exceeds the time limited as aforesaid, hour rate to be charged.

BY THE HOUR.

1 or 2 persons, \$1.00; 3 or 4 persons, \$1.25.

Fractions of hours to be charged *pro rata* hour rates—but not less than one quarter of an hour shall be charged when the time exceeds one hour.

Fifty per cent. to be added to the tariff rates for rides from two o'clock midnight, to four a.m.

The tariff by the hour shall apply to all rides extending beyond city limits where the engagement is made in the city.

BAGGAGE.—For each trunk or box carried in any vehicle, 10 cents. But no charge shall be made for travelling bags, valises, boxes or packages which passengers carry in the hand.

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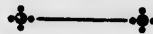

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MANUFACTURES, &c.

MONTREAL is not only a centre of commerce, but the most important manufacturing city in the Dominion. The manufacture of Boots and Shoes employs about 3,000 hands, the product of the numerous factories is enormous. The largest Sugar Refineries in Canada are at Montreal. The largest Cotton Mill in the country is that of the Hochelaga Cotton Company, Hochelaga. There are two Silk Factories, a large Rubber Factory, many large Clothing Factories, employing in the aggregate, 2,000 hands; and factories for the manufacture of Cards, Boxes, Paper, Soaps, Cements, Drugs, &c., &c. On the canal are Saw-mills, Nail Edge Tool Works, Engine and Machine Works, and Rolling Mills.

There are five establishments for making Sewing Machines, the machine shops of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific railways, everything connected with railway machinery is manufactured here. There are Carpet Factories, Rope Factories, large Binderies, Printing Offices. Over 2,500 hands are employed in the Tobacco Factories, over 300 in the Breweries. To give an account of all the various manufacturing industries of the city, would require more space than can be afforded in a guide book.

The establishment of many important industries in the city is mainly due to the impulse given to manufacturing by the national policy, which was adopted by the Government in 1878.

Montreal possesses many interesting buildings. In proportion to the size of the city, the private residences are unsurpassed by any other city on the continent for comfort and elegance.

Educational matters in the city are well looked after under the direction of Protestant and Roman Catholic School Commissioners. Visitors will find a collection of pictures worthy of inspection in the Art Gallery on Phillips Square. Many private galleries contain works of art of high value; the celebrated picture by Jules Breton, "The Communicants," which was recently purchased in New York for the sum of \$45,500.00, being in the possession of Sir Donald A. Smith.

Featherbone Corset Co., 260 St. James Street. C. H. Martin, Representative.

These are the days of improvements and discoveries, and the product of the birds of air and the fowls of the farmyard is during the past few years rapidly taking the place of an article which it was previously thought could only be obtained from the monster of the "mighty deep," or, in other words, featherbone is taking the place of whalebone, and is being largely used for making corsets, dress stays, whips, and many other articles for which the latter was formerly thought to be the only proper material. The bone, or quill portion of feathers is cut out, split into strands, woven, and made up into different colours and in different widths for stiffening for ladies' dresses, corsets, etc. Whips are also made from it, which is far superior to the whalebone, being far more durable and pliable, and not injured by extremes of heat or cold.
