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# THE BOARD OF TRADE

Of the City of Toronto.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT, 1893.

The year 1893 will long be referred to as "Annus Mirabilis" in the financial history of the world. The panics and crises that have followed one another in sharp succession during that period, uprooting credit, sweeping before them one industry after another, destroying confidence, bringing hundreds of thousands to poverty, attacking Australia and its antipodes irrespective of soil or flag, and, finally, settling down upon our nearest neighbors with dire results, are an object lesson to Canada to avoid public and personal extravagance, to avoid the borrowing of foreign capital for use in non-productive investments, to avoid fostering illegitimate enterprises for the benefit of the few, and to depend for success and fortune upon the gradual but sure development of her own resources, upon straight economic lines.

We have much to be thankful for—we have escaped the torrent of bankruptcy that has washed in vain against our borders, and to-day Canada stands eminent for its financial soundness amongst the nations of the earth.

## IMPERIAL COMMERCIAL UNITY.

I sympathize most heartily with the hopes expressed by my two immediate predecessors in office, that the Mother country and her Colonies will be drawn closer together by the bonds of an Imperial Trade policy. Our own Parliament has echoed that sentiment. It is unfortunate, however, that the legislatures of Great Britain and Ireland have not yet given the great living question of an Imperial Commercial Union the consideration it deserves. Canada was never so prosperous as it was during the existence of a preferential tariff in Great Britain in favor of her Colonies. The re-imposition of such a tariff would afford the Colonies the advantages in the markets of Great Britain over foreign rivals to which

we think they are entitled, without pressing upon the consumer, would ultimately compel the revision of tariffs at present hostile to the Empire, would conduce to the rapid settlement of our North-West, and would give the manufacturers of Great Britain an equivalent in the shape of an enlarged market for their products, without the cost to the nation of endless sacrifices of blood and treasure.

#### RECIPROCITY.

There is a fair prospect that our trade relations with the United States will be improved, as the result of the recent outburst of public opinion in the United States against McKinleyism and prohibitive tariffs. It is not to be expected that any other-than a policy that is intended to benefit their own country will be adopted; at the same time it is satisfactory to know that whatever tariff is approved of by Congress, there has been so far, during the discussion on the subject, an absence of those unfriendly sentiments towards Canada, which, during the previous Administration, too often controlled public policy, regardless of public interests. Canada is ready for Reciprocity on a fair, if not upon a wide, basis, but the movement has been delayed by the contentions of political parties in Canada, and by the writings of a few irresponsible outsiders, some of them actuated by personal, some by selfish motives, who have led United States statesmen to hold out for a basis of reciprocity which could not end otherwise than in political union. Canada will never consent to barter her national and political individuality for any commercial consideration.

#### CHICAGO FAIR.

The success of Canada in competing with the World at Chicago has gone far to elevate our country in the estimation of strangers and to create confidence in ourselves. Although our dairy and farm products, our horses and cattle attracted most attention and gained much favor, our exhibits of minerals, of machinery, of textile and other manufactures, our timber—our educational system and art exhibits—all pointed to a country rich in resources, being developed by a hardy, skilful, enterprising, ambitious, yet thrifty and cultured people.

#### INSOLVENT ACT.

It is gratifying to know that the confusion that has existed since the repeal of the Insolvent Act of 1875 in dealing with insolvent debtors and

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with their estates is about at an end, and that the efforts of this and other Boards of Trade to obtain a Dominion Insolvent Act are likely to be crowned with success. The absence of such an Act has worked great loss and hardship upon debtors and creditors alike. There are thousands hopelessly involved to-day who should be active, money-making, business men, doing their share in building up the Dominion, if it were not for the heavy chains of bankruptcy with which they are fettered. On the other hand, trade and commerce, represented by the creditor, are impeded by the uncertainties of the laws governing bankruptcy, credit is withheld, buyer and seller are held apart, and the "sauve qui peut" signal is ever at the masthead, to the serious hindrance of business relations, and to the degradation of public morals.

#### CHEAPER POSTAGE.

It is to be hoped that the Dominion Parliament will, at an early date, take action in the line, on several occasions suggested by this Board, of reducing inland postage to two cents per oz. To-day Canada occupies the anomalous position of granting the people of the United States the use of her postal service at a cost to them 33 per cent. less than what is charged her own people, to the detriment not only of domestic and social ties amongst us, but to the advantage of the merchants of New York, Buffalo, San Francisco, over their rivals of Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver and Halifax. As a consequence of this policy, work for the printer and engraver which should be executed by our classes is sent elsewhere; and correspondence, written in and for Canada, is taken to U.S. frontier towns for mailing.

The annual deficit of the Post Office Department is, to a great extent, controllable, being in a measure due to the free carriage of tons upon tons of pamphlets, blue books, and correspondence for different departments of the Government, the cost of which should be taken into consideration and be a charge upon the various departments for which the service is performed; and of the free carriage of newspapers, a concession intended, in the first place, to benefit publisher and subscriber, but which has been taken advantage of to flood the country with the organs of gift enterprises and with bogus news-sheets, to the great loss of the respectable and enterprising publisher.

It is, moreover, reasonable to expect, judging by the experience of Great Britain, that a reduced rate of postage will tend to encourage the

use of the mails to an extent more than sufficient to compensate the Government for any temporary falling off of revenue which may result from such reduction.

#### FAST ATLANTIC SERVICE.

This Board has put itself on record more than once in favor of a high class steam-ship service to and from Great Britain—it is no exaggeration to say that the present service is slow and inefficient, and has had the effect of driving Canadians to foreign ports and foreign lines of steamers.

It is humiliating for us as Canadians to consider that in a voyage to England, unless we are prepared to lose from three to five days of time, we are compelled to take ships from a foreign port and travel over a route 430 miles longer than *via* Quebec.

#### PACIFIC TELEGRAPH.

The influence of the Board has been exercised in favor of the establishment of direct telegraph communication, *via* the Pacific Ocean, between Canada and Australia. It is to be regretted that there has been much delay, as the attempt to develop trade and commerce between the two countries is already felt to be almost hopelessly handicapped without the telegraph. As a single illustration of the necessity of a Pacific Cable, I have only to mention the stranding of the "Miowera" a few months since, and the long suspense and anxiety as to the fate of the steamer, passengers and crew. We have now, however, the best reason to believe that our brother colonists in the southern hemisphere, as well as the Home authorities, are fully awakened to the absolute necessity of this line of telegraphic communication, and that we may confidently look forward to arrangements being made for its immediate establishment at the coming conference of delegates from the Australasian Governments in Ottawa.

#### IRON AND NICKEL INDUSTRIES.

Of all our possible, and yet almost wholly undeveloped, resources, our mineral ores stand foremost. Could we get these into the market, they would probably bring more money into the country, give employment to a greater number of people, and provide more freight to our railways and vessels than any other raw industry. Were our iron ores smelted and manufactured into steel, etc., in Canada, a large amount of capital

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now expended in paying for a foreign article, the raw material for the production of which we have in abundance, would be kept in the country.

The Dominion Government have essayed to foster the iron industry by a bounty upon native pig iron of \$2.00 per ton and by admitting mining machinery free of duty, but this is not sufficient encouragement. Smelting machinery, coke (if not coal) for smelting and manufacturing purposes should also be free of duty. The duty upon scrap iron should be placed at the same figure as the duty upon pig iron and the bounty upon native pig iron should be enhanced.

Our nickel miners now import over 9,000 tons of coke, upon which duty is levied amounting to \$4,500—a heavy burden upon a new and struggling industry. It is not, I should say, in the lines of a true protective policy to burden a struggling industry with taxation.

The Local Government of our Province is particularly interested in the development of the iron industry; the Province is the owner of a vast extent of mineral lands, containing unlimited supplies of iron and of other ores of superior quality; if these same lands were the property of individuals controlling the necessary financial resources, no time would be lost in the establishment of smelting works and in the manufacture of steel.

The Local Government should not only abandon the principle of "royalties," but would be justified in setting aside a considerable sum to be disbursed by way of bounty upon pig iron smelted in Ontario from Ontario ores.

Could we get iron smelting and the manufacture of steel successfully carried on in the Province, there is little doubt that the refining of nickel and its manufacture would quickly follow. The monopoly of nickel ore, which Ontario virtually possesses, makes it difficult to forecast the brilliant future in store for this Province which would follow upon development and manufacture of that metal.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH.

The Province, in spite of the dark outlook in the beginning of 1893, has to congratulate itself, along with the rest of the Continent, on escaping the threatened outbreak of Cholera. Excepting an outbreak of smallpox at several points, due to immigrants, the Province has been wholly free from that class of diseases which, from time to time in the past, have proved so disturbing to commerce, both owing to local panic,



and to the fear that contagion may be disseminated by means of various classes of manufactured goods.

With the general organization of Health Departments, from that of the Federal Government down to the smallest municipality, whose efficiency yearly increases as the scientific measures for combating epidemics become better understood, commerce may be expected to pursue her operations largely unimpeded, if steamship and railroad companies, realizing how intimately their interests, and those of the trade, are associated with the work of the Health Department, lend their active co-operation and assistance to our Health officers. Probably nothing, however, has so greatly stimulated sanitary progress as commercial competition between countries, and the business rivalry of different cities. Our towns in Ontario have rapidly developed in the work of constructing public water supplies and sewerage systems within the last ten years.

According to the Report of the Provincial Board of Health, there were in 1890, 53 public water supplies, whilst in 1882, only 9 of these were in operation; in 1882 there were but 9 partially constructed systems of sewerage, now there are 25 systems, more or less complete.

So rapidly indeed has the public health sentiment grown in Ontario, that no town ambitious to progress, either as a centre of manufactures or of residence, can afford to delay supplying these two desiderata necessary to urban population.

In the Report of the Provincial Board of Health for 1892, the Secretary, Dr. Bryce, to whom I am much indebted for information and assistance, amplifies by illustration, the economic value of sanitation. In diagrams showing the death-rate for various lakeside cities, Chicago and Toronto in 1890 are compared with Detroit. At a moderate computation, Chicago, from typhoid, lost in labor alone over \$1,000,000, Toronto nearly \$200,000, whilst Detroit, with a very slight death-rate, lost less than \$25,000. The whole question was one of purity or impurity of water supplies. Other losses, such as those created by diphtheria outbreaks disseminated through the public schools, and the spread of tuberculosis through overcrowded work-rooms in cities, are similarly illustrated.

#### HEALTH ON THE FARM.

Remembering, however, the incalculable importance of agricultural industries in Ontario, whether in general farming, cattle-raising, or cheese-making and dairying, I would especially draw attention to the import-

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ance of good health on the farm, whether in man or in the cattle. Whilst I find that the Public Health Act applies equally to rural municipalities as to cities, yet I fear the limited amounts paid for carrying out its provisions in rural municipalities prevents much good from resulting. Supposing, what so frequently happens, that in the harvest season one farmer's son is attacked with typhoid, due to a polluted well, either too near the kitchen door or the barnyard, we can see that, with his time lost for two or three months, the mother's or sister's time taken up in nursing, and the daily visits of the physician: driving four or five miles, an actual outlay of \$100 as a result would be very small indeed, to which must be added a loss of labor of a value of at least as much more, and often subsequent ill health. This simply means, in many instances, a falling behind, which prevents necessary improvements, perhaps the necessity of a small mortgage, ending ultimately, in not a few cases, in financial disaster. Similarly, the loss of a few good cattle from contagious disease, as tuberculosis, may mean that the narrow boundary between profit and loss has been crossed; whilst, as we understand it, these diseases, unless eradicated in first cases, are sure to cause further trouble. With the agricultural population of the Province barely holding its own in numbers, owing to the movement to the cities, and with the low prices of grain and other farm products, and the necessarily small margin of individual profit, I cannot conceive any way in which the Government of the Province can so well serve the public welfare as by conserving, in the highest degree possible, the health of the agriculturist and his stock. I am not aware how much or how little of such work is being prosecuted; but it would seem that nothing less than compulsory and thorough district inspection of the farm house and its water supply by competent officials, with plenary powers, as well as the dissemination of health literature of every kind, will in any degree adequately supply the needs I have indicated.

#### COURTS OF ARBITRATION.

The establishment in London, Eng., of a Court of Arbitration, under the auspices and control of the London County Council and the London Chamber of Commerce, has proved of the greatest service in the settlement of commercial disputes upon a speedy, economical, and otherwise satisfactory basis. Our own Arbitration Board, with its powers to enforce the settlement of disputes between our own members, has done much service during past years. Could we not enlarge our usefulness and in-



fluence by obtaining, in conjunction with our own municipal Council, similar powers to those entrusted to representative bodies of the great metropolis.

#### BANKING.

It is gratifying to reflect that notwithstanding the great pressure that was placed upon all financial institutions during the past year by the collapse of credit in the United States and in Australia, and by the want of confidence engendered thereby, the banking institutions of Canada, with an insignificant exception, have come out of the crisis with unimpaired credit. I am satisfied that a banking system such as we enjoy, affording as it does, a flexible, and, at the same time, secure currency, is essential to the due development of the agricultural and other resources of the Dominion.

#### CONDITION OF TRADE.

I shall not venture to report upon the course of the trade industries during the past year. Each member of the Board should be familiar with the ups and downs of his own line of business, but I may be allowed to state that in my opinion the misfortunes which have overtaken many during the year are traceable, not so much to dulness in trade as they are due to too extended efforts and to outside investments. The business man who has been content to confine his operations within legitimate bounds should have no difficulty in overcoming the effects of a temporary depression, but if to the effects of commercial depression are added the losses incident to the collapse of a "land boom" or of the stock market it is not the condition of trade that is answerable for his misfortunes.

We are too apt, in Canada, to be carried away in our ambitions by the mad rush and excitement which are to be witnessed in two or three of the largest cities of the American Union, and by the immense fortunes which are realized from time to time by reckless speculation; but we must not forget the absconding official, the disgraced director, or the bankrupt merchant. If we could only bring home to ourselves an appreciation of the misery and wretchedness entailed upon thousands as the result of what is commonly known as "dealing in margins," I am certain that there would be fewer complaints, fewer failures, and many more happy homes.

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## FINANCES OF THE BOARD.

By a resolution of the Board, passed 5th April, 1893, a scheme of Life Membership, on a basis actuarially sound, was adopted, with the result, I am happy to say, that 93 members have availed themselves of the opportunity to commute their annual dues on terms favorable to the Board. With the moneys received from that source, the floating debt of the Board, which amounted to about \$13,000, has been liquidated, and its finances have been placed on a good footing.

The ordinary revenue of the Board during the past year has been sufficient to meet all expenses and interest charges for that period, but without the life members' fees would not have provided the annual contribution of \$5,000 to the Sinking Fund, called for under the terms of the first mortgage, and I should be failing in my duty did I not inform the Board that the active assistance and co-operation of every member, whether office-bearer or not, is needed to keep up and add to our membership and to our revenues and to enable the Board to meet its obligations in the future.

Since this building was commenced other large buildings have been erected in the business portion of the city which offer every inducement to tenants that faultless construction can provide; at the same time, the tenants of this elegant and substantial fire-proof building enjoy special privileges in the comfort of their surroundings and in the ease with which they can, without loss of time, keep in touch with the markets of the world. The Grain and Flour section have done much for the Board. I beg of them to use their influence to bring others of their calling under this magnificent canopy.

In addition to the insurance upon this building against loss by fire to the extent of \$275,000, a policy has been taken out covering loss by way of suspended rentals, occasioned by fire, at a cost of \$105 for three years.

## GRATUITY FUND.

This fund amounts to over \$90,000.00, and is invested in high class mortgages and debentures or is on deposit with the trustees' bankers at interest. The Fund has been the means of binding our membership together, whilst its distributions from time to time have helped to soften the blow which has fallen upon the families of deceased members. The changes that have been made during the past year in the By-laws gov-

erning the Fund are in the direction of facilitating the admission to the Board, as members, of those who are not eligible for participation in the Gratuity Fund, owing to physical infirmity or who have passed the age of fifty years. The door has been widened without in any way impairing the basis of the Fund. The further amendment, which to-day is before you for consideration, involves an immediate settlement with members, who are in the non-participating class, of assessments which, under present regulations, would be ultimately repayable to their representatives with interest at 4 per cent., per annum. I recommend it to your favorable judgment.

## VALEDICTORY.

In bidding farewell to the Board as their presiding officer, I do so with feelings of pride and gratitude that I have had the honor of occupying the highest position in your gift, a position of responsibility and importance that perhaps only the initiated can appreciate. I am thankful to the Council and to the Board for the forbearance and indulgence they have extended to me during my term of office. I take particular pleasure in testifying to the zeal, the enthusiasm, in fact, at all times exhibited by Mr. Wills in the discharge of his responsible, onerous, and multitudinous duties. I leave you, confident in my mind that the Board will grow in usefulness, and will continue to exercise a beneficent influence and a watchful care over the commercial interests of this Dominion and of the City of Toronto in particular.

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# SECRETARY'S REPORT.

TORONTO, 31st December, 1893.

GENTLEMEN,—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the official proceedings of the Board for the past year. The Exchange of the Board was opened for business 304 days, and closed 61, viz., 53 Sundays, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Dominion Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

During the year, 499 meetings have been held in the rooms of the Board, as follows:—

During the year, 43 members have been elected, qualifying by the transfer to themselves of outstanding certificates.

14 members have died, all of whom were members of the Gratuity Fund.

## SYNOPSIS OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL AND BOARD FOR 1893.

Thirty meetings of the Council and seven of the Board have been held during the year.

Report was made to the Council that the resolution of the General Board *re* the establishment of a fast Atlantic line has been heartily endorsed by the Boards of Trade of Hamilton, London, Goderich, Winnipeg, Galt, Calgary, Brandon, Nanaimo, Vancouver.

## POSTAL RATES.

A memorial was prepared and forwarded to the Dominion Government praying for the adoption of a uniform postal rate, in accordance with the instructions of the General Board.

## RE DUTY ON IRON.

A resolution was adopted to the effect that the present duties on Bar, Hoop and Sheet Iron should be modified and adjusted so as to enable manufacturers who use iron as a raw material to cheapen the cost of production, and put them in a better position to meet foreign competition, and extend their foreign trade. A committee was appointed to bring this resolution to the attention of the Government.

## DIRECT, TELEGRAPH COMMUNICATION THROUGHOUT THE EMPIRE.

A resolution adopted that the subject should, without delay, receive the earnest consideration of the Home and Colonial Governments, and that steps be at once taken jointly by the Governments to obtain the fullest

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information with a view to such action as may best conserve and promote the common interests.

## RE TRUNK SEWER.

Early in the year a deputation of the Council waited upon the Mayor to urge that the construction of a trunk sewer receive the earliest consideration of the City Council.

RE MAIL SERVICE TO ENGLAND, AND BETTER COMMUNICATION  
BETWEEN BUFFALO AND TORONTO.

After many conferences with the authorities, and much correspondence, the Council have been partially successful, through the hearty co-operation of T. C. Patteson, Esq., P.M., and G. R. R. Cockburn, Esq., M.P., in bringing about a betterment in the postal service to England and the Continent via New York from Toronto, but, while the Grand Trunk R'y Co. have made a slight improvement in their service between Toronto and Buffalo, the connection is not by any means what it should be.

## RE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SMELTER AT SUDBURY.

A deputation of the Council waited upon the Local Government for the purpose of assisting the efforts of the Company seeking to establish a smelter at Sudbury.

## AN ACT TO AMEND THE ASSESSMENT ACT.

A general meeting of the Board, held on the 8th May, for the purpose of particularly discussing a Bill before the Ontario Legislature to amend the inequality of personal taxation and to tax all capital on net income derived therefrom. A resolution was adopted approving of the principle laid down in the Bill, and praying that the Bill may become law.

## TARIFF ADJUSTMENT AND REFORM.

On the 3rd, 4th and 5th of May, the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and the Hon. Geo. Foster, Minister of Finance, met for conference with the various trade interests of the city, in the Council Chamber, and at the conclusion of their labors the Council waited upon these gentlemen and laid before them some of the most important questions which the Board had discussed, such as, the Judge's salaries,



Fast Atlantic Service, Iron Duties, Postal Arrangements and the Insolvency Bill.

RE DIRECT STEAMSHIP SERVICE TO AUSTRALIA.

The resolution of the British Columbia Board of Trade, reading as follows:—

“That in view of the inauguration of a direct steamship service between Australia and Canada, it is desirable in the opinion of this Board in every way to promote and foster our trade relations with the Australasian Colonies, and that the Dominion Government be moved to take into consideration with the respective Governments of the Australasian Colonies, the customs tariffs in force on both sides, and so arrange such alterations thereto as will encourage the development of reciprocal trade between the Dominion of Canada and Australia.”

was concurred in, and the attention of exporters was also particularly directed to the recent circular issued by the Department of Trade and Commerce, re the trade of the Dominion with the Australasian Colonies.

RE TRADE WITH THE WEST INDIES.

Messrs. McKay, of Demerara, and Spurr, of Halifax, addressed the Council with reference to the development of trade relations between Canada and the West Indies. At the conclusion of the conference the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

“That the Council having listened with pleasure to the able and interesting address of Messrs. McKay and Spurr, so replete with valuable information touching the extension of trade between the Dominion and the West Indies, assures these gentlemen of its sympathy with them in their efforts to promote this feature of commerce the object of which is to draw these two parts of the British Empire into closer trade relations with each other.”

During the month of June the Canadian Bankers' Association held their annual Meeting in the Rotunda of the Board. This meeting was of the most interesting character, and was well attended.

RE STREET RAILWAY AGREEMENT.

A resolution in connection with this agreement was prepared by a Committee of the Council. Being approved, copies were forwarded to the Mayor and City Council.

NAVIGATION OF THE KAMINISTQUIA RIVER.

At the request of the Fort William, Ont. Board of Trade, the Council petitioned the Government to take steps to remove the obstructions at

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the mouth of the Kaministiquia River, and also that the work on the harbor pier there be continued in a substantial manner. The Government's reply was very satisfactory, for it stated, "that immediately upon its attention being called to the needs of the river in question, the Department set to work to dredge a channel one hundred feet wide to a depth of sixteen feet."

## AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS TO THE BY-LAWS.

On the 5th of April the By-Laws were amended by sundry additions and alterations, the chief features of which, briefly summarized, are :

1st. That date for payment of the annual dues has been changed so that the dues become payable on the 1st of December in each year, and must be paid, to qualify for members' privileges on or before January 2nd, in each year.

2nd. The period for the operation of the penalty claims for non-payment of dues and gratuity assessments has been reduced from 6 months to 3 months.

3rd. Life membership by purchase.

(b) Any member who desires on or before the 1st of July, 1893, may become a life member, and thereafter not be subject to any annual dues during his life, on payment of \$200 and the fees for the current year, and after the 1st of July, 1893, on payment of \$225 and the fees of the current year, but such life membership, in case of participants in the Gratuity Fund, shall in no way be relieved from compliance with the Rules relating to the payment of fees in the Gratuity Fund, and in case of the death, or resignation, or other cause, of a life certificated member, the party who becomes entitled to his certificate shall immediately thereafter become subject to the general Rules relating to certified members.

4th. Membership without Gratuity.

(f) On and after this date, any person described in this By-law as admissible as a member and who is over the age of fifty years, or declared ineligible by the Trustees of the Gratuity Fund, may be elected a member of the Board on the payment of an entrance fee of \$25, together with the fees of the then current year, such membership not to

be transferable, and to lapse at death, or resignation, or non-payment of the fees as provided for ordinary members other than fees to the Gratuity Fund, and such person not to be entitled to vote on any question pertaining to the Gratuity Fund.

A very interesting meeting of the Council was held, at which addresses were delivered by Messrs. Jas. Huddart, managing partner of the Canadian Steamship Company, and F. W. Ward, Editor of the *Sydney Daily Telegraph*, on the subject of increasing trade between the Dominion and the Antipodes. The following motion was unanimously adopted:—

“This Council desires to record its feelings of pleasure in being honored with a visit from Messrs. Huddart and Ward, who represent the Australian and Canadian Steamship Co., and is gratified at the important information given by these gentlemen touching the question of steam navigation and trade relations between these two parts of the British Empire. The Council hails with pleasure the fact that arrangements have been perfected to maintain a monthly steamship service between these countries, and also recognizes the advantage that will flow therefrom, both to Australia and to the Dominion, by stimulating commerce, and promoting passenger traffic on the Pacific.

“The Council is fully alive to the great importance of the Canadian route becoming the highway from Australia to England, and are encouraged to believe that with swift steamers on the Pacific, although the Suez steamers may improve their speed, that Canada will still have the advantage.

“The Council assures these two gentlemen of its profound sympathy with this and all undertakings aiming to promote closer trade relations and mutual sympathy between the different parts of the British Empire, with which we rejoice to be connected, and under whose flag our protection and prosperity is assured.

“And further, this Council is of opinion that the appointment of a commercial agent to Australia by the Dominion Government, with a view to open up and develop an exchange of products between the two countries, would go far to build up a successful intercolonial trade, and assist materially a line of steamers between Canada and Australia.”

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## RE GRAIN STANDARDS EAST AND WEST OF PORT ARTHUR.

## RE INSOLVENCY BILL.

In November a joint deputation of the Toronto, Montreal and Hamilton Boards of Trade waited upon the Ministers of Justice and Finance at Ottawa, to urge the introduction by the Government, at the ensuing session of Parliament, of an Act to provide for the equitable distribution of Insolvent Estates for the Dominion. The delegation were encouraged by the statement made to them by the Ministers, that a Bill was in course of preparation by the Crown officials. A copy of that Bill has recently been received, and is now under the consideration of the Council's committee on Insolvency Legislation.

## RE FLOUR STANDARDS.

Messrs. W. Galbraith, Toronto, and A. McFall of Bolton, were nominated as competent persons for the selection of the Flour Standards for 1893-4 (held Dec. 7th).

## SHIP CANAL AND WATER GRAVITATION.

A general meeting of the Board was held on the 15th November, to consider certain clauses in a proposed agreement, sought to be made with the City by the promoters of this scheme. A resolution was passed to the effect that the scheme was unworthy of support, etc.

## FREE COKE FOR MANUFACTURING PURPOSES.

"Resolved that inasmuch as it would largely encourage the development of the Iron Manufacturing Industries of this Province,

"And whereas it has come to the knowledge of this Council that there is about to be established in Hamilton, Smelting Works, which must be largely dependent upon free coke for its success, this Council would strongly recommend that the Dominion Government admit free of duty all coke required for manufacturing purposes,

"And they would further recommend that whatever machinery is required for the establishment and development of Smelting Works, which cannot be produced in this country, should also be admitted free of duty."

#### VISIT OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

On the 4th January, 1894, His Excellency, the Governor-General, met the Board in the Rotunda, at 12.30 noon, when the following address of welcome, suitably engrossed, was presented to him :

*To His Excellency the Right Honorable Sir John Campbell Hamilton Gordon, P. C., Earl of Aberdeen, etc., Governor-General of Canada.*

May it please Your Excellency—The Board of Trade of the city of Toronto rejoices at the present opportunity of expressing, through Your Excellency, the sincere and continued loyalty and attachment of its members to the person and throne of their Most Gracious Sovereign Queen Victoria, and to the Empire in which Canadians, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, take the greatest pride.

We are grateful for Your Excellency for your attendance in Toronto at a season of the year when important social and other duties call for your presence elsewhere. We desire to congratulate you upon your appointment as Governor-General, and to welcome you to our midst.

This Board of Trade is the recognized mouth-piece of the commercial interests of Toronto and of a considerable portion of the Province of Ontario, and as such craves permission to inform Your Excellency of the fact that resolutions have been passed by the Board on more than one occasion, in favor of closer trade relations within the Empire, and begs of Your Excellency such assistance and encouragement as Your Excellency's exalted position and opportunities afford, in the attainment of an object which we consider will inure to the lasting material and social advantages as well of the United Kingdom as of its Colonies and Dependencies.

We are gratified in knowing that prior to the bestowal upon Your Excellency of the most recent mark of Her Majesty's favor, not only did you take the greatest interest in our country, but you exhibited confidence in its future by investing largely of your means in its industries.

The success of Canadian exhibitors at the Chicago Fair in competition with the world, has not only tended to create increased confidence amongst ourselves, but should be convincing evidence to others of the substantial progress and prosperity of Canada, and of the comfort and contentment of its people.

The freedom of Canada from political and financial disturbances, with which so many portions of the world have been afflicted within the past few years, and the stability of

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its financial institutions are, no doubt, attributable to our excellent system of constitutional Government, to our wise legislation, and to the loyalty, the thriftiness, and the energy of our people.

We have every reason to believe that the sojourn of Your Excellency in our midst will assist materially in the development of the Dominion, and hope that your term of office having expired, you will always be able to look back upon your residence in Canada with pleasure and satisfaction.

We desire to express our regrets that circumstances have prevented the Countess of Aberdeen from accompanying Your Excellency on this occasion, and beg of you to convey to Her Excellency our heartfelt appreciation of her continuous efforts on behalf of the needy and of the afflicted, and our best wishes for her health and happiness.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

In reply, His Excellency returned thanks for the beautiful address which had been presented to him, which he would certainly always regard as a token of a most interesting occasion. He need scarcely tell them his gratification with the expressions of loyalty which the address contained, although they were nothing new, especially when coming from an important and representative body like the Board of Trade. But although not new these expressions were none the less to be valued and estimated as a real and practical token of what is the prevalent and evinced sentiment of the country at large. He was not surprised that the Toronto Board of Trade spoke of their body as the recognized mouthpiece of the commercial interests not only of Toronto, but in a large sense of the great territory of which Toronto was the capital. He had become aware that not only was Toronto the focus of commercial transactions and interests of the provincial capital, but that indirectly their influence was of no small value. There was, for instance, the provision for the settlement of trade disputes by means of arbitration, the indirect influence of which, as an example, was beyond all question. They must not suppose he failed to recognize the importance of the statement that they had more than once passed resolutions in favor of closer trade relations within the British Empire. (Applause.) Before coming to Canada he fully recognized the great difficulties, which, it must be admitted, existed before a practical solution of this problem could be arrived at. But none the less did he appreciate the opportunity of learning once more the definite conviction and recorded opinion of their body. (Applause.) Such records were calculated to inform public opinion, not only in this country, but on the other side of the Atlantic, and were, therefore, valuable contributions towards what he ventured to describe as the solution of the problem—a solution which was so much to be desired, and which ought to be kept constantly in view. (Applause.) It was impossible to over-rate the importance and advantage from such a straight object lesson as the brilliant success of exhibitors from the Dominion at the great exhibition at Chicago, nor could they fail to appreciate the fact that, during a period of financial disturbance and depression in the United States, Canada had enjoyed remarkable immunity from similar panic and similar troubles. (Applause.) They might allude to



this in no boastful spirit, but rather in the manner indicated in the address, viz.: Thoughtful recognition of the benefits Canada enjoyed under the present system of Government and Administration in this country, and especially the commercial relations, which have been tested and not found wanting. (Loud applause.)

On the invitation of President Wilkie, cheers were most heartily given for the Queen and for His Excellency. Afterwards His Excellency held a reception, the gentlemen present being introduced by President Wilkie. The address to the Governor-General is most beautifully illuminated and bound in morocco.

#### ANNUAL DINNER.

His Excellency, with other distinguished guests, honored the Board by their presence at the fifth annual dinner, which was held in the Pavilion, Horticultural Gardens. The occasion will long be remembered as one of the most satisfactory gatherings of the character in the annals of the Board.

During the last few years death has been busy in your ranks. Many of the strong, vigorous, capable, honorable men, who laid the foundations and built the early superstructure of this institution, have finished their course, leaving to you and me the care of this great work of their hands.

No body of men ever had a more sacred or responsible commercial trust, for an institution of this kind does not rise above its membership, nor can it remain greater or more powerful, than the aspirations of those who constitute it. The most sanguine man has not measured the possibilities of this city and country, but the largest attainment will only come through the business men of the country with their great capabilities, identifying themselves intimately with the machinery of government whatever personal sacrifice it may cost. That which we do for the sake of duty should not be regarded as a hardship. Are all our merchants, manufacturers and public men giving the Board that loyal support to which it is justly entitled? I should be false to you and to myself if I did not add, what I believe, that the business men of this city must recognize the value of such an institution as this more in the future than they have in the past. I am as much impressed with this as I am with anything connected with the duties of citizenship. The Hon. Geo. Raines well said at the recent banquet that,

"What the church is to religious life, the school to intellectual development, organizations of this character are to the activities of business life. They develop the hand, brain and conscience of commercial life; they are

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sensitive to immorality and profligacy in business and political life, and ultimately stand for the integrity and conservatism of a community."

In conclusion I respectfully call on the individual members for their active personal co-operation in not only maintaining and increasing the numerical strength of the Board, but in everything that shall tend to its growing usefulness.

## GRATUITY FUND.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

TORONTO, July 3rd, 1893.

To the Council of the Board of Trade, Toronto:

GENTLEMEN,

The Trustees of the Gratuity Fund herewith present their Seventh Annual Report as required by the By-laws.

The personnel of the Board of Trustees was changed in January last by the election of Mr J. L. Spink, Treasurer of the Board, in place of Mr. G. M. Rose, as Trustee. By the election of Mr. D. R. Wilkie (who was elected a Trustee for three years at the last Annual Meeting) as President of the Board, a temporary vacancy was created, and in accordance with the provisions of the By-laws, the Trustees filled same by the election of Mr. H. N. Baird as Trustee for the balance of the year.

During the past year one name has been added to the membership, thus making the total of subscribing members 851. There have been 44 transfers made this year, the average age of those relinquishing their interest being 43, and of the new participants, 39.

There have been fifteen deaths during the year, which have been duly assessed upon the subscribing members. The average age of those who died was 50 years, and, whilst the death rate for the seventh year has been rather large, it will be seen that for the past seven years it has only reached a fraction over the expectancy of one per cent.

There have been 21 meetings of the Trustees during the past year.

The amount on Mortgage is \$52,250.00, invested on property appraised at \$118,000.00. The amount in Bonds is \$23,000.00. The average rate of interest is a fraction over 5%.

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## Order of Distribution of the Gratuity Fund.



(a) If the deceased member shall leave surviving him a widow and no children, the whole is to be payable to the widow.

(b) If the deceased leave a child or children and no widow surviving, the whole is payable to such child or children in equal shares.

(c) If the deceased member leave a widow and a child or children surviving, one half shall be payable to the widow and half to the child or children in equal shares.

(d) In any case under which any child or the children of a deceased member would, if surviving him, be entitled to the gratuity payable on his death or a share therein under any of the foregoing clauses, and such child or children do not survive him but leave (surviving him) more remote descendants they shall take (in equal shares, per stirpes) the gratuity or share therein to which their parent or parents respectively, if surviving, would have been entitled.

(e) If the deceased member leave no widow or children or more remote descendants surviving him, the gratuity shall be payable:—

(f) If the deceased leave father and mother, or either surviving him, then to the father and mother in equal shares, or to the one if only one surviving.

(g) If the deceased leave no father or mother surviving him and leave brothers and sisters, or both, the gratuity shall be paid to the brothers and sisters in equal shares, and if there be also children of any deceased brother or sister, such children shall take in equal shares the share which the deceased parent if surviving would have taken; relatives of half-blood to take equally with those of whole blood.

(h) The shares of minors to be paid to the legal guardians of their personal estate.

(i) If there be no person entitled to the gratuity under any of the foregoing clauses, the same may be disposed of and paid to any person or persons whom the trustees of the Gratuity Fund in their uncontrolled discretion shall deem to have been wholly or partly dependent upon the deceased member or reasonably entitled to the benefit of the gratuity, or if the same be not so disposed of by the trustees it shall go to and form part of the Gratuity Fund.

(j) The shares of minors for whom no guardians shall be appointed, may be paid into a legal depository of trust funds, subject to the order of such minors when they shall arrive at full age, or to the order of their guardians when appointed.

(k) All guardians must accept the guardianship in writing.
