Choral Club Concert

The final concert of the Choral Club will be held on Tuesday evening May 11th in the Rink. In addition to the program of local talent will have the assistance of Mr. J. C. Lougheed, whistler and trombone player, of the 91st Band, Hamilton. Mr. Lougheed is declared by those who have heard him, to be marvelous in his imitations, and he also has the rare ability of double stopping on the trombone, something exceedingly difficult, so that an unusual treat is being offered by the Choral club.

The choral numbers include a splendid patriotic number "Sailors of the Sea" by Jackson. "The Ninety and Nine" a very lovely arrangement of the well known hymn, in chant form, by Wheeler; also a requiem by the same composer, particularly appropriate at this time. "Sing of Our Fallen Brave" the words by the well known author Marion Keith. An arrangement of "Sweet and Low" by Mason, and a humorous Round complete the choral part. There will also be other special features of which further particulars next week.

School Gardening

Gardening is systematically carried on by the public schools in many of the Canadian cities as a part of the educational course. Dr. J. H. Putman, Senior Inspector for Ottawa public schools, in the March number of the Agricultural Gazette published by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, describes the system under which this work is done in the Capital City.

The school garden is referred to as a big class room for outdoor instruction in plants and plant life. It has many of the possibilities in miniature of an experimental farm. It has to do with the composition and fertility of soils, with drainage, with seed germination and with insect enemies of plant life. It shows in a way that cannot be questioned the effect upon plants of too much or too little sunshine or moisture and the bad effects of weeds and the necessity of giving a plant plenty of room if we wish to secure a high state of development. Dr. Putman points out that these things would mean nothing to children if recited from books or told by teachers. These things taught through a garden where the children prepare the soil, sow the seeds, and care for the plants cannot be without good results.

In addition to a central garden of one acre the plan involves the organization of home garden clubs, each representing a school. In the three years 1917-18 and 19 about 1,000 pupils from second and third book classes received gardening instruction. The school board paid forty dollars to each teacher who managed a club garden. Every pupil member was required to keep an accurate record of planting, cultivating and other activities. The aim is to grow every thing possible from seed. Cold frames are found to be a valuable addition to the equipment. In the central garden instead of giving pupils very small individual plots, a plot 32 by 43 feet for vegetables and 16 by 20 feet for flowers is given to each class. This garden is having a permanent perennial border established which will give a succession of bloom as well as an opportunity to show the children what they may have in their own home gardens.

The By-Election

The By-election last Monday made necessary by the resignation of councillor J. V. Markle, was a keenly contested affair, a very large vote for a by-election being polled. As in most elections something must be brought out as an issue, and in this case the Memorial hall was made the target. While neither of the candidates are opposed to the building of the hall, never the less it was made the bone of contention. J. W. Griffin the successful candidate received 92 votes and Mr. Stan. Sawell 67. Mr. Griffin served in the council last year but declined to run again when the new council was elected, and only decided to enter the by-election after considerable persuasion by friends. Mr. Griffin is efficient and no doubt will serve the people to the best of his ability. Mr. Sawell is one of our returned men who has a military record to be proud of, and had he been elected would have made a capable councillor.

Peterson-Flatt Wedding

A very pretty but quite wedding was solemnized Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Flatt when their eldest daughter, Margaret Eleanor, was united in marriage to Mr. Elmer F. Peterson of Youngsville, Pa. Rev. R. A. Facey officiating. The bride was prettily gowned in white and carried a bouquet of roses and sweet peas. The bridesmaid was Miss Elva Foster of Bradford, Pa., cousin of the bride, while the groom was ably supported by Mr. Wilbur Eckbeck of Jamestown, Pa.

After the ceremony a bounteous wedding dinner was served, the young couple leaving shortly afterwards on the evening train for Toronto and other eastern points before proceeding to their new home in Youngsville Pa. The bride is one of Waterdowns popular young ladies, and many hearty good wishes follow her to her new home.

Strip Tickets Canceled

On and after May 1, the ten-trip commutation tickets to any point on the G. T. R., C. P. R. and T. H. & B. will not be honored for passage, according to a notice sent out yesterday to the railway ticket offices. The notice is signed by G. H. Webster, secretary of the Canadian Passenger Association, but is not considered an official order, but merely an advance notice that the commutation tickets are to be either canceled or the price increased.

According to ticket agents, the notice is not accepted officially by them, and they will continue to sell commutation tickets until they are officially advised of a new tariff.

Some time ago the C. P. R. endeavored to raise the commutation ticket prices to Waterdown from 85c for ten trips to \$2, but this order never went into effect. The railway board also, some time ago, ordered that commutation tickets could not be canceled, but later permitted an increase in the rates to be made.

At a special meeting of the village council last night it was decided that the council go to Toronto to-day and endeavor to have the railway company reconsider the new rates so far as Waterdown is concerned. While in Toronto the council will attend the Hydro Radial meeting which is being held there to-day.

FARM CONDITIONS

Keen Weather Did Some Harm to Wheat.

The following is a summary of reports made by agricultural representatives to the Ontario Department of Agriculture:

The keen weather of the past week did harm to some fall wheat and clover fields, but the extent of the injury will not be known until spring growth is more advanced. Snow flurries, however, were sufficiently frequent and heavy in most localities to

Prices run all the way from \$25 to \$35 a ton. Straw is very scarce all over the province. Ensilage is holding out well in most localities.

Labor is hard to secure, and prices are keeping up. Wentworth reports that from \$60 to \$75 a month is being offered married men. Ontario states that fit workers will have no difficulty in getting \$60 a month and board for a season of eight months. Since quotes as high as \$100 a month for first-class men, but another representative quotes rates as low as \$40 for ordinary help. Middlesex reports that some men are offering for farm work for the sake of gaining experience with a view to getting farms of their own.

Prices for dairy cows vary greatly. A number of cheese factories have started making, and are getting a considerable quantity of milk for the time

Sheep are returning to favor. Hay is scarce on some farms, but in most cases there is a sufficiency.

To Preserve Your Woollens

With the first of April comes the end of winter. It is safe to put away our costly woollen wear and blankets. At present prices no one can afford to cast aside a garment that can be made of further use. Pack away everything clean. Moths prefer soiled garments. Two things to guard against in washing woollens are shrinkage and stiffening. It is best to use medium hot water and use water of the same temperature for all rinsings. For the first water dissolve a tablespoonful of borax in every twelve quarts of water. Use neither soap nor scrub brush, but agitate the woollen article in this solution. Then prepare a second water of the same temperature in which a plentiful amount of pure soap has been dissolved. Never use soap directly on the wool, but agitate the garments in the suds until they are clean. Never

wring them violently in the hands or in the clothes wringer. Squeeze the water gently from them. Then put them in a third water, slightly soapy and blued. Rinse thoroughly in this water, fold carefully and put them through the wringer. Dry in the shade. Washed and dried this way the garments are sure to be soft. Blankets should be stretched and folded several times during the drying process.

A PUDDING FOR KIDDIES.

Of Rice, It is Nice When Eaten With Stewed Fruit.

One-half pound of rice, one quart of boiling water, or half milk and water, half a teaspoonful of salt, vanilla essence, or a strip of lemon rind. Wash the rice in two or three waters. Put the water salt into a pan, bring to the boil; sprinkle in the rice, add the lemon peel and cook gently over a slow fire until the rice has absorbed all the water and become soft. Stir often. Rinse out some small tea-cups with cold water and press the rice into them. If vanilla is used, add it when the rice is cooked.

Turn them out onto a dish and pour round custard made of jam sauce. These are nice eaten with stewed fruit. Can be eaten hot or cold.

If the rice is not stirred often while cooking, it may stick to the bottom of the pan and burn. It is best to cook it in a double saucepan, or in a jar standing in a saucepan of boiling water.

Comma Once "Killed" a Bishop.

A Kent (England) urban council, it is believed, has about reached the limit of "war economy" by forbidding the use of punctuation marks in all official documents, with the result that reports of its proceedings are published without even a comma. In Canadian Rail Accidents
in Nine Months.

Auto Mishaps at Crossings Increase.

Ottawa report says: There were 137 railway accidents during the nine months ending December 31, 1919 according to the report of the Board of Railway Commissioners, covering that period, which is tabulated in the Commons to-day. In these accidents there were 223 persons killed and 1,502 injured. The Board in its report notes that only the nine-months period can be covered in this report, as the amendments to the Railway Act require that the report be presented on December 31 each year, instead of at the end of the fiscal year as formerly. The number of trespassers killed during the nine months was 64, and 68 trespassers were injured.

Automobile accidents at highway crossings were on the increase. In the four years and nine months previous to December 31, 1919, there were 231 such accidents. By periods they were as follows: 1916, 15; 1917, 36; 1918, 54; 1919, 66 and 60 in the nine months ending December 31 last year. Derailments and the deadly unexpected crossing accounted for more victims than any other class of accident during the period of 1919. In the former class of accidents there were 13 people killed and 247 injured. At crossings there were 38 killed and 138 injured.

The Board deals briefly with the matter of daylight saving, and remarks that in view of the decision of the Government not to carry the daylight saving law any longer than the end of 1918, it is inadvisable that the Board should take any action.

Fire damage in the neighborhood of railway tracks shows an increase over the previous year, according to the report. There were in 1919 1,328 fires from 11 causes, within 300 feet of railway lines in the forest sections of Canada. This was an increase of 184 fires over the total of the preceding year, 504 of these fires were incipient, causing no damage. The fires attributed to railways numbered 76.3 per cent of the total, 4.4 per cent were from other known causes, and 19.2 per cent were from unknown causes. The total damage estimated at \$400,547.

Railways were charged with 56.2 per cent of this damage. The aggregate money damage showed an increase of \$298,131 over the preceding year.

SAY TURKS TO KEEP CAPITAL

Supreme Council Said to
Have Finally Decided.

San Remo cable: The Supreme Council, at to-day's meeting here, put its final sanction upon the Franco-British proposal to allow the Turks to retain Constantinople as their capital.

The council decided to insert a clause in the Turkish treaty, making Batua a free port for the Republic of Azerbaijan, Georgia, and Armenia. The council spent considerable time considering the protection of minorities in Anatolia.

Much of the day was taken up with deliberations on the German problems, but no decision was reached and as the week wears on through endless arguments and counter-arguments it is becoming doubtful whether this question will be settled at the conference here. Premiers Millerand and Nitti expected to leave Saturday. It can be said with a considerable degree of certainty that no far no definite solution of the Ruhr problem is in sight.

Britain and Italy, morally backed by the United States, continue to insist that if France allows herself to be rushed into the course of action mapped out by her military chiefs, she will endanger the Versailles treaty, and undermine, if not rupture, Allied unity. France is opposed by all other powers in her alleged desire for absorbing the Ruhr coal district, and her known plan to extract from Germany by force the coal due the French under the treaty. The other Allies are convinced such "strong-arm" measures would invite the economic collapse of Germany.

Italy constituted the censorship on outgoing news despatches to-day calling forth strong protests from the British and American newspapermen, who sent their complaints formally to the Supreme Council.

As regards the differences between Italy and Jugoslavia about the Adriatic settlement, it is learned that little if any headway has been made in the efforts to get together on that problem, the viewpoints of the two Governments still being wide apart.

The Communique issued after adjournment of the afternoon session of the Council, says: "The Supreme Council met at four o'clock this afternoon and discussed certain military questions connected with execution of the Turkish peace treaty, and heard M. Venizelos, the Greek Premier. It then continued its consideration of the Armenian question."

OVER 140 KNOWN KILLED INTORNADO DOWN SOUTH

And Millions of Damage Done in Three Different States

In One Instance the Wind Wiped Out an Entire Town

Birmingham, Ala., report says: A death list which to-night stood at more than 140 and a property loss of many millions of dollars, was the toll exacted by a tornado which to-day swept a score of towns, villages and isolated farms in Eastern Mississippi, Northwestern Alabama and the southern counties of Tennessee.

Communication with many of the stricken districts is difficult, but fragmentary reports agreed that the tornado swept down with deadly suddenness, obliterating everything that lay in its path. In at least one case—that of Rose Hill, Miss.—practically the entire town is believed to have been destroyed, and in several instances all members of a family were reported to have been killed.

Striking first, apparently in Lauderdale County, Miss., about 10 o'clock this morning, the storm swept a narrow path across the state, carrying destruction to a dozen or more communities. About the same time death and damage from the same or a similar disturbance was reported from counties in the northwestern corner of Alabama, the extreme force of the wind being expended before the Tennessee line was reached, in Williamson and Maury counties.

Meridian, Miss., the heart of a rich farming district, suffered heaviest, according to late reports, with a

known death list of 21. The village of Glen, Alcorn county, numbered its dead at ten, Aberdeen, ten, Ingomar six, Egypt, five, Baker five, and Bay Spring seven. A lumber camp near Pataola, Nesbita county, lost twelve workers killed, and thirty injured, several probably fatally.

In Alabama, the rural districts around Sheffield, Garley, Little Cove and Waco felt the full force of the storm, and with some sections still cut off, a score of bodies have been recovered.

Across the Tennessee line, 160 miles from Meridian, near where it originated, the storm still had force sufficient to wreck homes and farm buildings, and to cut a swath through forest and field. Only three deaths are known to have occurred in the state, however.

The width covered by the tornado led to a belief to-night that there was more than one atmospheric disturbance. Reports to-day describe the local destruction as having been confined to a path measuring from 100 to 500 yards wide, within which the cyclonic wind, when at its height, left nothing but the most solid structures standing.

Twenty-one persons were killed on a single plantation near Aberdeen, Miss. Harold's hog ranch near there, one of the largest in the south, was wiped out, 500 of the stock being killed.

ITALY SPONSORS SOVIET RUSSIA

Paris cable says: Although Soviet Russia is not officially participating in the conference at San Remo, it is virtually represented by Italy, who will take up the charges for the Soviets before her Allies.

France is understood to be altogether opposed to recognition of the Bolshevik Government until the latter has given ironclad assurances that it will pay the debt contracted by the Czarist regime.

The French representative who talked with the Soviet commissary, Kraevskia, at Copenhagen, returned empty-handed, while the Italian delegates actually closed an agreement whereby an Italo-Russian commercial treaty was practically stipulated, giving the Soviets the right to establish a regular bureau at Rome.

REVOLT HERE?

Britain to Inquire Into
Stories of Plots.

London, April 20.—Constantly reiterated reports that a plot having as its purpose simultaneous uprisings in Canada, Egypt, Ireland, and India, in June is being fomented in New York, have impressed British officials to the extent of setting on foot an investigation. The reports received here have gone so far as to say that Irish sympathizers have left the United States for Canada, Egypt and India to plan a revolt in those countries. In this connection British officials have taken cognizance of a statement of a member of Parliament that he can prove that a Soviet Committee has been set up in South Wales and is awaiting the time of "the great revolution," when it hopes to assume power.

ALLIES STILL ARE DIVIDED

London cable says: Indications are multiplying that differences of opinion among the Allies as to the policy to be pursued toward Germany are becoming accentuated. The special correspondent of the Daily News at San Remo telegraphs that the views of the military party, headed by Marshal Foch, appear to be obtaining supremacy in France, with the result that the question of military occupation of the Ruhr District is once more at the front.

It is to be seen whether it will be formally proposed by France's representatives at the Peace Conference. In such an event, a critical situation would arise, as neither Britain nor Italy could be identified with such a policy.

THE HOLY LAND.

Britain's Policy Still That
of Jewish State.

London cable: Recent rumors of an alleged change in the policy of the British Government, regarding the Jews in Palestine, gave rise to another question in the House of Commons to-day, when the Foreign Secretary was asked to define the Government's exact policy with respect to the future position of the Jews in Palestine. Cecil Harmsworth, Under Secretary, replied: "The policy of the Government remains as defined in Mr. Balfour's declaration on November 2, 1917."

It will be recalled that Mr. Balfour's declaration on that occasion was to the effect that Great Britain was in accord with the Jewish aspirations for the establishment of a national home in Palestine and would give its support to this project.

BRITAIN BUILDS MYSTERY VESSELS

Gigantic Flying Boats of
Steel.

Supremacy on Seas More
Than Ever.

London cable says: The greatest secrecy attends the construction by Britain of gigantic eight-engined flying boats of steel and airplane, each of six thousand horsepower and able to light on land or sea.

Colonel Alan H. Burgoyne, M.P., editor of the Navy League Annual, has just revealed the fact that these mystery vessels are building, but all details are naturally guarded by the naval authorities.

Britain is engaged in strenuous efforts to speed the improvement of her aerial armament, Mr. Burgoyne said to-day.

"Britain's supremacy on the seas is to-day more complete than ever before. The Hood is the most powerful and fastest fighting unit ever produced. We have a submarine of 26 knots speed and ten thousand horsepower. Others carrying 12-inch guns, and still others fitted with armored protection, capable of coping with the seas as long as the large surface fighting ships."

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use **Form T 1.**

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use **Form T 1A.**

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use **Form T 2.**

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions or Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

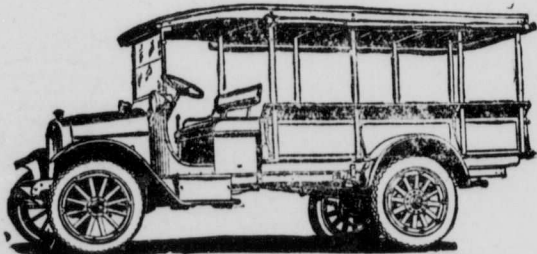

Sunday School Lesson V., May 2, 1920 THE BOY SAMUEL

Commentary—1. Samuel dedicated to the Lord (1: 24-28). When Hannah prayed to the Lord that she might have a son, she promised that she would lend him to the Lord for the days of his life; accordingly she took him to the house of the Lord when he was weaned that he might remain there in the service of Jehovah. At what age he began this service we are not told. He must have been at least two or three years of age and possibly five or six, for Oriental scholars tell us that it is not uncommon for a mother in that country to nurse her child up to the age of five or six years. When Hannah went to the house of the Lord at Shiloh, a place about twenty miles north of Jerusalem to dedicate her son to the Lord, she took as an offering three bullocks, a half bushel of more of flour and a skin-bottle of wine. It had been suggested that one bullock was for a burnt-offering, one for a "sacrifice in performing a vow" and one for a peace-offering (Num. 15: 9).

2. The Call of Samuel (3: 1-10). 1. Samuel.—The name means, "Asked of God." Ministered unto the Lord before Eli.—A minister is a servant. Samuel, was according to the opinion of Josephus twelve years old at this time. He had duties to perform about the tabernacle, pertaining to the light (v. 3) and the doors (v. 15). He was also the personal attendant of Eli, who was aged and partially blind. Word of the Lord was precious.—The word was rare, as the moral and spiritual condition of Israel was not favorable to frequent messages from God to the people. Priests and people had departed from the Lord. No open vision—"No frequent vision."—R.V. 2. At that time.—It was during the period of the scarcity of revelation. It was a memorable time in the lives of Eli and Samuel. Eli was laid down in his place. He probably slept in one of the buildings surrounding the tabernacle erected for the accommodation of the priests and other attendants. Samuel slept near by. 3. Ere the lamp of God went out. This was the golden lamp which stood before the most holy place. It was lighted at sunset and burned until morning. Where the ark of God was.—This was the most holy place. The ark was the symbol of God's presence.

4. The Lord called Samuel.—The boy was awakened by the call, "and he answered, Here am I." Samuel was attentive to his duties. The voice must have sounded to him like that of Eli, but being awakened from sleep by the call, he would not be likely to judge clearly when it came. 5. He ran unto Eli.—Inasmuch as he was accustomed to wait upon Eli, it was entirely natural that he should suppose that Eli had called him, thinking he needed some attention. I called not.—Samuel must have been surprised at Eli's answer, but he took it that he himself might have been mistaken. At Eli's direction he obediently lay down again. 6. Thou didst call me.—Samuel's readiness and attention afford an excellent example of the virtue of obedience. 7. Samuel did not yet know of the Lord.—Samuel knew not the Lord in the way of receiving divine communications from him, for, as already stated such communications were at that time rare.—Whedon. The second part of the verse explains the first. 8. Eli perceived that the Lord had called the child.—If Samuel had come to him but once or even twice, thinking that he had called him, he would probably have thought the boy was dreaming; but when he came the third time, positive that Eli had called him, the priest was convinced that the Lord was speaking to him. 9. Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth.—No wiser advice could have been given than this. When God calls,

and he calls all, this is a most fitting response to make. 10. The Lord came, and stood and called.—God not only spoke to Samuel, but he also appeared to him in some visible form. He calls all children by his Spirit.

III. The Lord's Message to Eli (3: 11-18). 11. The Lord said to Samuel.—God did not at this time speak directly to Eli. He had previously sent a prophet to him, as regarded in the preceding chapter. He speaks to Samuel now, in calling him to the prophetic office, and for the purpose of preparing him for receiving and delivering other messages from himself. Ears . . . shall tingle.—As a loud, sharp, discordant note thrills one's ears with pain, so the bitter tidings of Israel's woe in the judgment about to fall on Eli's house would shock all Israel. Reference is made to the coming defeat of Israel by the Philistines, in which the ark of the covenant would be captured, Eli's sons would lose their lives and Eli himself would die as a consequence of the defeat. 12. What I have spoken.—By the prophet, as recorded in 1 Sam. 2: 27-36. Make an end.—The Lord would complete the work which he had threatened by His prophet. 13. His sons made themselves vile.—They were greedy and licentious. Restrained them not.—Eli contended himself with gentle exhortation (1 Sam. 2: 23), instead of thrusting them out of the sacred office they had so grossly abused. By this weak indulgence he became partaker of their sins. 14-18. Samuel lay until morning, then opened the doors of the house of the Lord as usual. Eli had to press the boy strongly for a report of what God had said to him. When he heard the message, he quietly acknowledged the justice of it all.

IV. Samuel recognized as a prophet (3: 19-21). 19. The Lord was with him.—God's presence affords comfort, strength and guidance. God was with Abraham (Gen. 21: 22), Jacob (Gen. 28: 15), Joseph (Gen. 39: 2), Moses (Exod. 3: 12), Joshua (Josh. 1: 5), Gideon (Judges 6: 16), David (1 Sam. 16: 18) and others. Let none of His words fall to the ground.—What Samuel said under divine inspiration came to pass. He was a true prophet. 20. From Dan even to Beer-sheba.—This phrase denotes the total extent of Israel. Dan was at the extreme north and Beer-sheba at the extreme south. 21. The visible abode of Jehovah was in Shiloh and there he revealed himself to his prophet.

Questions.—Who were Elkanaah and Hannah? What was the burden of Hannah's prayer at the house of the Lord? To whom did Hannah "lend" Samuel and for how long? Where did Samuel live? What were some of the boy Samuel's duties? What did he hear one night? How many times was he called? What message did the Lord give Samuel for Eli? How did Eli receive the message? Tell how Samuel became established as a prophet in Israel.

PRACTICAL SURVEY.

Topic.—Religious training of children.

I. Samuel, a child of prayer and promise. II. Religious training of children. The record of Samuel takes up the thread of Israel's history where the Book of Judges leaves it, toward the close of the forty years of Philistine oppression. The events recorded embrace a period of about one hundred twenty-five years. It is the record of a great epoch in the history of the Jewish nation, and indirectly of the kingdom of God on earth. The Book of Samuel has a special value as revealing the kingdom of Christ, as king, and first announces that the kingdom founded in him will be universal and everlasting; (2 Sam. 7: 12-16).

I. Samuel, a child of prayer and promise. The name Samuel, "the asked of God," is significant. In the account of his birth attention is chiefly fixed upon his mother. She was a woman of keen spiritual sensibilities, was almost a Nazirite in practice and possessed prophetic gifts (2: 1). She sought from God the gift of the child with a passionate devotion of prayer, of which there is no example in the Old Testament. In keeping with the age of vows in which she lived, she dedicated him before his birth to the calling of a Nazirite. When weaned, he was brought to the tabernacle at Shiloh, where he was solemnly consecrated (1: 24). The prayer hymn which follows has both an historic and prophetic significance. A pious and ancestry bestows great privileges, and imposes corresponding responsibilities. Paul reminds Timothy of the pious generations preceding him (2 Tim. 1: 5), and Peter asserts that "the promise is unto you, and to your children" (Acts 2: 39). Paul declares, however, most emphatically that piety is not hereditary (Phil. 3: 4-8). The Baptist warned his auditors against building any moral expectations on ancestry (Matt. 3: 9). Eugenics can not eliminate the universal moral necessity of being "born again."

II. Religious training of children. "Samuel ministered before the Lord," under the direction and training of Eli. From his very early years Samuel dwelt in the sanctuary and was daily in attendance upon its services. In this ministry he was prepared for the sterner service he was later to render outside its courts in a more public capacity. The instruction and influences of his early life fitted him to fulfill the arduous mission to which he was later called in judging the nation, and strengthened him to execute the divine commands, even to the terrific one of hewing "Agag in pieces before the Lord." 1 Sam. 15: 23. Religious training, too generally neglected, will not make any one a Christian, but will place assets of tremendous value on that side. Submission to rightful authority is one of the first, most important and most neglected

elements of Christian training. Disregard for parental authority is the foundation of defiance of divine and civil obligations. The prompt obedience of Samuel to the supposed call of Eli prepared him to receive and transmit the message of God. Religious training should embrace familiarity with Christian doctrine. Read Deut. 4: 9; 2 Tim. 3: 14, 15. Truths that are true for ourselves are as imperatively true for our children. Religious training should embrace the observance of religious duties.

FATS TO SAVE THE CHILDREN

In a recent interview with the Daily Mail, Dr. Addison, the British Minister of Public Health, in discussing the Select Committee's report on the work of the Army Medical Board, refers to it as the most astounding medical document ever compiled. One man in every three men of military age is unfit.

We are enormously handicapped as a nation by poor health. The Lord Mayor of London has been asked to call a conference to discuss plans for arresting the physical decay in London. What are the causes leading to the present state of national ill-health?

There is a disease called rickets which is rife throughout Great Britain. It begins in early childhood and always leaves its effect upon an adult, man or woman.

Spinal curvature and other bone deformities, defective teeth, with consequent poorly developed bodies, result from this widely prevalent disease. Many pale, anaemic, stunted men and women frequently seen among the poor and middle classes, owe their present physical condition to this disease contracted during the first and second years of life.

The Medical Research Committee have recently published the results of the investigations which have been carried on during the past three years at the Lister Institute, London, and at Cambridge. These research workers have discovered the cause of this disease, which is undermining the health of the nation. This great discovery has resulted from actual experiments on mice, guinea-pigs and puppies.

Briefly the results of the investigations are these: Rickets is a deficiency disease. A deficiency disease is one which is caused by the lack of something in the food supply necessary for the proper development and functioning of the body.

Certain foods fail to support nutrition—disease follows because there is absent in these foods minute amounts of certain constituents which are called vitamins. The disease as seen in human beings can be reproduced in animals fed on certain foods which are lacking in certain fats—the so-called animal fats, of which the best examples are milk, butter and cod-liver oil.

Puppies with artificially produced rickets can be cured when animal fats are added to their diet. The treatment given to puppies with rickets, if applied to children, should lead to equally beneficial results, unless the damage to the bones and other tissues of the bodies has advanced too far.

Milk and butter are the best articles of diet for young and growing children. If there is a shortage of butter, butter should be reserved for children; if it is totally lacking, the deficiency can be replaced by margarine made from animal fats, by cod-liver oil and by the fish-oils, and by eggs. The margarines made from vegetable oils are to be condemned.

When there are already signs of rickets a daily dose of cod-liver oil is essential to all other proceedings. Thousands of infants are being deprived of an adequate supply of this essential constituent of their diet. A large proportion of these will grow up and become our future men and women, and many will die, as the infant mortality is high in children with rickets.

Japanese Proverbs.

Salto-man, a well-known Japanese journalist, writes as follows in the London Daily Mail:

Many countries have been pleased to call our country the land of proverbs. A large percentage of our proverbs, it is needless to say, concern women.

Most of the old wives' tales have been freely translated, or stolen, by foreign writers. But we are not worried. New and clever proverbs are fast being created by the new generation of men and women.

I translate below some of the gems which have recently come under my notice. They do not necessarily represent the opinion of the present day Japanese people, but they are at any rate a contribution to the abundant world wisdom on the immortal proverb:

"Tender and hard woman's heart."

"Get you want to love women begin by spending money."

"Women who remember shop signs and trademarks make good wives."

"Very jealous women are easy to control."

"Pride goes before a fall, especially in beautiful women."

"Women and mountains should be looked on at a distance."

"Men who can neither brag nor flatter need not fear being loved by women."

When Most Accidents Occur.

Some interesting facts in regard to safety work have been gleaned from the Safety Committee's experience in connection with the large plants of the General Electric Company industries on the other side of the line. The tabulated data shows that more accidents occur on Monday than on any other day of the week and that the most careful age is found to be 37. Other striking incidents are that the ages showing most accidents in proportion to the number of employees are between 22 and 26, and 50 years and over. The hour showing most accidents is from 9 to 10 a. m. Fifty per cent. of the accidents occur to new employees or those who have less than six months in one position. Contrary to general belief, the foreign-born employees are quick in acquiring the safety habit, if taught.

TWO GREAT DAYS.

Ecuador Twice a Year Celebrates Freedom From the Spaniard.

The Republic of Ecuador celebrates two national holidays, and, strange to say, both are "independence days." Both are observed with the same enthusiastic and patriotic fervor that is displayed in the United States on the anniversary of the adoption of the immortal declaration, according to the Pan-American Union.

The liberty-loving patriots had to shoot two bolts at Spanish domination before they succeeded in gaining permanent independence. The first time they had a quiet but determined revolution in Quito, the present capital of the republic, the patriots assembled at the house of Manuela Canizares, a brave and beautiful woman, on August 5, 1809, when they prepared their declaration of independence and chose the provisional government.

That night the conspirators gathered their forces in different parts of the city, and Captain Salinas, who commanded the two companies of regular troops and guarded the city, went to their barracks, read to them the declaration and won them over to the cause of the patriots. They overpowered the bodyguard of Ruiz de Castilla, the Spanish governor, early on the morning of August 10 and thus established the first republic without shedding a drop of blood. It lasted only about a year, when Castilla succeeded in overthrowing the patriotic government and again brought the country under Spanish dominion.

The fires of liberty had been kindled, however, and the Ecuadorians kept up their heroic struggle, notwithstanding many reverses, until in 1820 the people of Guayaquil, the leading seaport of the country, succeeded in rebelling on the 9th of October. With the aid of Gen. Simon Bolivar, the great Venezuelan emancipator, and his compatriot, Gen. Antonio Jose Sucre, the Frusudoreans after many bloody battles succeeded in completely annihilating the Spanish forces and established freedom in Ecuador for ever. Therefore it is that the Ecuadorians celebrate two "independence days," the 10th of August and the 9th of October.

A Whale Worth \$15,000.

A full-grown bowhead whale is today worth \$15,000 merely for the whalebone it carries in its mouth.

This is the species that furnishes the bulk of the commercial supply of whalebone, which is now worth \$7.50 a pound. It is a denizen of Arctic seas.

The bowhead, like other whalebone whales, has no teeth. Instead, its jaws are furnished with a series of long, tapering slabs of a horny substance fringed with hair. Of these slabs, which are the whalebone of commerce, there may be as many as 600.

The biggest of them are ten or twelve feet long and they are inserted in the gum of the upper jaw, from which they hang. They serve as a sieve to strain out the whale's food.

Swimming along, it takes huge mouthfuls of squid and other pelagic small fry. Then the huge trap is closed, and the slabs entering and fitting into grooves in the lower jaw, the water is expelled.

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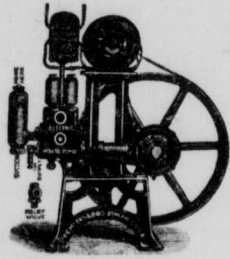
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
