TERRIBLE FLOOD

Another devastating flood, attended with loss of lives and property said to equal the Johnstown horror, occurred in Virginia Saturday. An awful cloud burst and flood swept over the Elkhorn coal region, swelling rivers to raging torrents, and sweeping everything movable, to death and destruction. It is estimated 500 to 600 persons perished, while the property destroyed is beyond estimation.

Railroad ties, small buildings of all descriptions, telegraph poles, huge boulders and every imaginable movable thing that came within the sweep of this mighty torrent's maddened waters, went down the mountainous debris. Dead bodies could be seen floating along the valley.

Passenger train No. 4, of the Norfolk and Western, reached Vivian about 8.30 A. M., met the flood and was unable to proceed further. The water reached a depth that the passengers being rescued by means of ropes strung from the windows of coaches to the tops of remaining trestles over some distance away. Between Elkhorn and Vivian yard, a distance of ten miles, one hundred cars are said to be washed from the tracks and many of them were carried down the streams.

A Trip Through Hants Co.

Alexander Robertson, blacksmith, in same building, does Mr. Parker's iron work and also general blacksmith. G. L. Gibson keeps a fine general store. He has recently added another story to his already large shop, where, I am informed, he will carry a line of dry goods. An addition is also being built on the rear of the building by Messrs Harvey and others.

Mr. McMullin's well equipped saw mill manufactures immense quantities of lumber. The new Midland railway runs directly past the mill and when the latter begins operations, will facilitate the transportation of lumber. 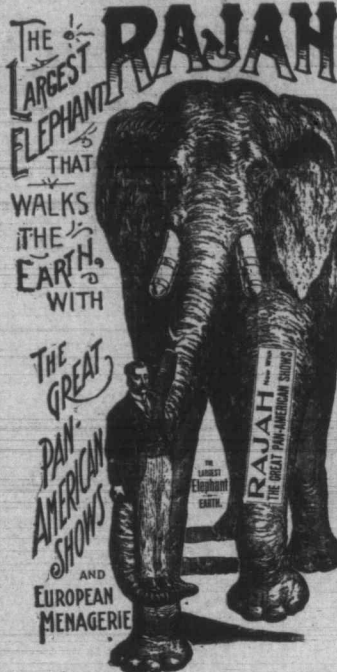
