TRY MOVIES TO CURE INSANE

Promoter Will Experiment on
Atlantic County Asylum Inmates.

Atlantic City, N. J. March 20—Believing that many cases of mental disorder can be corrected through the medium of comedy "movies", Henry Wink, a motion picture magazine of New York and London, will conduct a series of experiments at the Atlantic City County Asylum for the insane.

Mr. Wink has already worked marvels among the crippled children at the Children's Seashore Home here by changing their dejected frame of mind to a brighter one. The "movie" physician holds that a great many cases can be materially aided by arousing the "Polyanna" spirit. Charlie Chaplin, Harold Lloyd and other screen comedians will disport on a specially constructed silver sheet at the asylum, in the belief that if the inmates can be interested in the pictures they will for that length of time at least, be normal and that a permanent normal condition can gradually be built up through a system of pictures which will slowly move from slapstick comedy to plays of the work-a-day world.

HARKINS ACADEMY ITEMS OF INTEREST

GEORGE STOTHART, Editor

Let us take a ramble through the "Old" Academy. We will start on the ground floor for the benefit of those who cannot ramble with us and we will attempt to describe what we see on our trip to the roof.

The basement is divided into four parts. On both the boys' and girl's sections the equipment is practically perfect. The furnace room contains the two furnaces which were installed last fall by expert workmen from Johnson & Co. Ltd. Moncton; and

the coal bins which are kept well stocked by the Trustees. The Manual training room which is fully equipped but, which, as yet has not been used because of the lack of an instructor, adjoins the boy's basement.

Let us ascend to the first floor through the plate glass swing doors with which the landings are equipped. There are seven rooms on this floor. One of them is used as a school library and laboratory. The Primary grades and advanced High School are taught in the other six rooms. This floor is heated by 32 steam radiators. The wire cage clock room on both this and the second floor prove a great convenience.

Let us go one higher. We may do this by one of three stairways. In six of the rooms on this floor the junior, intermediate, and Junior high school grades are taught. The other room is used as a Teachers' Library and is fitted out with a first Aid chest and beautiful furniture. This room is in the east or front of the Academy. There are thirty radiators on this floor. Both the first and second floors are supplied with sanitary bubblers and lavatories. There are two spacious stairways by which we ascend to the 3rd floor which has been finished recently. Here we find the Assembly Hall with Domestic Science room adjoining, which is well equipped, but which cannot be used for want of an instructress. The Assembly Hall has a splendid stage

CANADA GOING THROUGH TRANSITION PERIOD

Will Emerge With Its Usual Sane Method of Dealing With Affairs.

Addressing the Canadian Club in Montreal John W. Dafeo, editor of the Manitoba Free Press, argued that Canada, like the rest of the world, was in a state of change, with a readjustment of parties and the development of political groups, into a new parliamentary system. This was divided between the extremes of ultraconservatism, determined to hold on to existing conditions; and the opposite extreme of the Reds, determined to upset the existing order of things, while, between these there was the great mass of the people, who had no violent tendencies either way. In face of these conditions, Mr. Dafeo argued that the only thing to do was to face things as they were, permit full and free discussion by all concerned, no matter what their views, and, eventually, work out a re-orientation of public opinion so that gradually the country would emerge from this transition stage with its usual safe and sane method of dealing with affairs.

JAPANESE ARE PENETRATING THE PHILIPPINES

Working for Acquisition of Property Rights in Lieu of Immigration to U. S.

Baron General Tanaka's visit to the Philippines will end Tuesday, and upon his report to Tokio, coupled with Governor Woods report to Washington, is believed to hinge the future of American and Japanese relations concerning the Philippines. The Japanese seem to be working for the acquisition of property rights in the Philippines with, it is understood, an agreement to abandon further efforts towards immigration to the United States. That is something more than a surmise, but is wholly unofficial, as nothing is being given out. It is positively learned, however that Japanese capitalists, desiring to invest in a sugar plantation here await the outcome of the negotiations. They refer to their virtually forced leaving the Payatas estate last year after purchasing the same in good faith. They also are deterred by the killing of nearly fifty Japanese planters and laborers in the Davao gulf region during the last few years. The Japanese have endeavored, with indifferent success, to establish profitable hemp projects there in the world's premier hemp region. Governor Wood left Manila last night for a trip including Davao, in tending to make a two weeks' voyage but Mayor Peter Bowditch, of his confidential staff, has been in Davao for three weeks, going into every phase of the situation.

Baron Tanaka will leave the island prior to Wood's return to Manila, but the Governor pinned a medal on Tanaka's breast on the eve of his departure to Davao. Baron Tanaka has been Governor Wood's official guest here ostensibly returning Wood's official visit to Japan last October. The Governor's being in Baguio when Tanaka arrived and leaving Manila before his departure is variously weighed, according to students of

opinion here but nothing but apparent cordialities have been noticeable on the surface. The visit has been accompanied by series of formal and informal banquets, dinners lunches and speeches and the whole gamut of statecraft etiquette.

The under-surface opinion is that Washington will reply absolutely on Governor Wood's recommendations. It is also believed that Japanese seek chiefly trading opportunities for the purpose of making the Philippines a profitable midway station between Japan and Australia, but they also undoubtedly desire their old and new land purchases and plantation projects protected, especially the lives of the planters and laborers as fifty killings have rancored them more than is generally supposed.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK

A former mayor was heard to remark last week: "This will be the best summer that Canada has ever had, Nobody has any money and everybody will have to work."

There is more truth than poetry in the remark. Up to the present time the condition has been: A couple of dozen millionaires have controlled manufacturing in Canada and have been charging three prices for their goods; a fairly large section in the unions forced up the trammen's wages under the McAdoo scale, and the railways increased the passenger and freight rates. Some 90 per cent of the people of Canada suffered patiently for years the theft of their money. People act in masses. They were slow to resist the rising tide of prices, but when the idea of the buyers strike did take root, it grew and bore fruit rapidly. With the refusal of the people to buy and a prospect of a lower tariff with the United States the manufacturers have been brought to their knees; the freight rates have been materially reduced because the railways wish to have freight to carry, and the workman must give an honest day's work for a good living wage.

The spring has opened with trade conditions very much improved, but if the former mayor correctly reports it, "nobody has any money and everybody will have to work" The watch word should be courage, says the Manitoba Free Press, rather than hope. No miracles are going to happen. The clouds are not going to disappear in a moment letting the sun shine with all his old-time splendor and setting the birds a-singing. People are not going to get anywhere in 1922 by speculation or by sitting about waiting for something favorable to happen; but it would not be surprising if it were to turn out to be a fairly good year for men of our age—men who are not afraid of the future, who are not afraid to take legitimate business risks, and above all who are not afraid to work in the good old fashioned way that has gone somewhat out of style in recent years—Exchange.

Children grow up with the idea of becoming bigger, and as all singers are children once, they naturally transfer the desire to get bigger over to the voice. Those singers who consider themselves of much greater importance than they actually are, usually go in for voice straining as well.

Teachers of voice straining perfectly understand the method employed by the prophet Elijah in dealing with the priests of Baal. All he said was "Call him louder." This is one of the earliest recorded cases of voice straining.

Another useful method of voice straining is to force the vocal range upwards. Many a man, who might have served his fellow-citizens nobly by hawking oranges and bananas, is compelled to become a lyrical tenor by the heartless voice strainers, and many a heaven-born auctioneer is pushed up into a basso cantante, or even into a baritone.

Less conspicuous because less loud is the gentle voice of the little man whom voice strainers have induced to imitate a basso profundo. He can touch low C with a tone resembling the distant humming of a bumble bee. The natural tone of a cooling dove would likewise be lost in any attempt

to snort like a rhinoceros. Women too, are victims of voice strainers. They are not less free than men from the weakness of desiring power. They often strain a beautiful small tone into a strident harsh one, and pay a voice-strainer to show them how to do it. PHONOGRAPH AS EDUCATIONAL FACTOR

Sir Edward Elgar, the noted British composer, in referring to the educational possibilities of the phonograph, said in an instructive address on one occasion: "The days when the phonograph could be regarded as a toy have passed. Many of the greatest musicians now recognize its enormous value to the composer who wanted listeners. In music, the amateur was usually anxious to do something brutal, to do it himself, and as a rule took to a violent form of piano playing. However, the phonograph made it possible for him to dispense with this, since it educates the listener to an art and uplifts his taste. Thus an entirely new public takes to listening to music and understanding it in a way that books on harmony can not convey."

During the war Sir Edward said he sent a number of records to a friend in France. One day his friend's section was bombarded and driven back and the men had to flee for their lives. But the section's conception of music had so greatly improved under the phonograph's influence that the records had become prime favorites.

Sir Edward declared it was his wish to see the phonograph installed in every school and educational centre, and school teachers instructed in the difference between good and bad music.

PROHIBITION NOT A FAILURE

Major Roy A. Haynes, Federal Prohibition Commissioner, in an address before the Law Enforcement League of Chicago on the 7th inst. is reported to have declared Prohibition is not a failure. Liquor propagandists assert the Prohibition law is being violated and therefore is a failure. There is not a law on any statute book anywhere that is not violated. If the liquor logic is valid, all of these laws are failures. But whatever failure their may be in Prohibition it is due to the courts imposing penalties on dry law violators utterly inadequate to the gravity of the offense, or to the

MAKING FEDERAL TAXATION RETURNS

Some Papers Are Due Last of This Month.

A considerable number of returns of all classes have been filed with the inspector of federal taxation, N. P. McLeod, but owing to the fact that there is some misunderstanding about the dates on which the period for filing expires, it is again pointed out that the returns of employers, estates and for dividends must be filed not later than March 31. Further, employers of chauffeurs, gardeners, etc., must file a statement where the rate of pay is \$1,000 a year and where more than \$500 has been paid in the year. It is also pointed out that insurance agents are required to make returns on commissions paid to sub-agents, otherwise the agents will have to pay on the amounts reported against them by head office.

The income returns are due not later than April 30, and arrangements have been made by the inspector of taxation, whereby members of his staff will assist taxpayers in checking up their returns, provided the taxpayers call at the inspector's office not later than April 15 for such assistance.

Regarding returns which are mailed taxpayers are cautioned to affix sufficient postage; otherwise, non-delivery of their return may be charged. In Montreal, communications without sufficient postage are not taken from the post office.

The forms for tax returns have been in the various post offices of the province since March 1st, and it may be news to citizens here to learn that there are more than 1,100 post offices in New Brunswick.

dereliction of enforcement officers.

Both of these abuses are being corrected. The advent of National Prohibition was followed with the closing of multitudes of jails, workhouses and the like. The liquor interests, seeing the effectiveness of this crime reduction as a Prohibition argument, deliberately set about to increase the commission of crime. This they sought to accomplish through plying of old saloon-produced with liquor. Their tools in this scheme were the old saloon keepers now known as "bootleggers." Eliminating this forced increment of crime, together with the crimes of the bootleggers, the commission of crime has steadily decreased under Prohibition in the United States.

All the hubdub about Prohibition being a failure comes from a noisy wet minority. At least 75 per cent of their number is increasing daily, are in favor of Prohibition; but they are not employing publicity men to constantly ding this fact into the ears of the public.

HEAR SUBMARINE BELL FIFTY MILES

New Device to be of Great Aid to Mariners.

Sounding tests just completed will enable incoming navigators to hear and locate the submarine bell on the Ambrose Channel Lightship vessel when fifty miles out at sea. These tests, completed by the battleship Ohio, will add forty-five miles to the sounding distance, it having been but five miles heretofore.

A special submarine listening device has been in operation there during foggy weather. For the purpose of the new tests the Bureau of Light houses arranged for the equipment of the Ambrose Channel Lightship vessel with a special receiving device for signals sent from the channel on the oscillator. This receiver was especially developed by the Navy Department for such use and showed that with the new equipment it was possible to pick up the Ambrose Channel Lightship when fifty miles out.

The tests were for the purpose of comparing distances at which signals sent by an oscillator and by bell transmitters could be heard. Several types of navy receivers were used, and in each case the reliable ranges obtained from the oscillator signals were more than double those from the bell.





MONCTON PARTIES BID IN THE BIG SEVOGLE RIVER

Lively Bidding for This Famous Salmon and Trout Stream and Finally Knocked Down to F. W. Winter.

A large and representative gathering of guides, sportsmen and others from all parts of the province were present Wednesday morning at the sale of fishing leases, which was held at the Crown Land office, when \$22,665.00 worth of fishing rights were bid in.

The keenest competition developed in the bidding for the Big SevoGLE River rights for salmon and trout fishing, formerly held for \$150 by H. A. Caesar. These rights, with a few changes which had been made in the lease offered for sale were finally knocked down to F. W. Winter, of Moncton, representing a group of Moncton sportsmen and others, for \$1,700, the bidding having started at \$150. It was said that this group of sportsmen were prepared to go as high as \$3,500 for these rights if necessary.

The leases which were sold were for 5 and 10 years, the five year leases applying to the Restigouche River waters, which were taken up chiefly by the Restigouche Salmon Club, the former lessees. The total amount paid for these rights being \$5,500.

The provincial public accounts show that receipts from fishing licenses last year reached \$32,006.58.

"DUMMY" HELPS

"When a young man, I was boarding at a hotel in H—, while teaching music there in the public schools, and had a set of dumb organ pedals under my bed", said a school music supervisor recently in reminiscing to a friend. INSTRUCTION IN PIANO GIVES POOR A CHANCE

A little investigation into the possibilities of teaching school children piano in classes the same as any other subject soon leaves no doubt in the minds of the investigator. In one school forty children are studying piano in classes. In this group nine nationalities are represented. To six of the homes represented, Santa brought pianos at Christmas time as rewards for work well done in the classes. Three children from one Hungarian family have been in the class from the beginning. All their practice is done under the close supervision of their father. A little Italian girl was wont to have washing the floors as her Saturday morning's work. In order that she may now take her piano lesson on Saturday morning, she washes the floors after the family has retired on Friday night. She had no piano, but begged so hard that she was taken into the class.

The piano classes have seemed to exist for two classes of people—those who are too poor to pay the private teacher's fee, especially does this apply when there are several children from the same family all studying at the same time—and those who are willing to do so until they "find out whether Mary is going to do anything with it or not." In the majority of cases Mary does "do something with it" and goes on to a private teacher. This coming and going lends a lack of stability to the classes, which is amply compensated for in the knowledge that one more youngster has been helped to find himself, and that the children of lesser financial resources are, to some extent at least, having their "chance".
 The attitude of the piano teacher is found to be one of approval; that of the parents, gratitude; a blind man could read it in their kind faces when they come to the little recital programs to hear their children play.

600,000 MEN WILL BE AFFECTED BY STRIKE ORDER

Suspension Of Work By All Of Union Coal Miners Scheduled for April 1st.

DOES NOT APPLY TO NOVA SCOTIA

Includes, However, About 6,350 Union Men in the Western Canada Coal Area.

Indianapolis, Ind. March 21—Suspension of work by all union coal miners at midnight March 31st, was ordered today by officers of the United Mine Workers of America, the call being the first ever issued for both bituminous and anthracite workers to walk out simultaneously. Six hundred thousand men will be directly affected by the order, it was estimated officially. The suspension the order provided for will continue until stopped by union officials.

The order which was sent to the 3,000 local unions, directed the miners to give the operators their fullest co-operation in the protection of mine property, and counselled against violence and violation of the law.

In addition to affecting all union miners in the United States, the order also directed approximately 6,350 union men in Western Canada to join in the walkout, but did not apply to 14,000 miners in Nova Scotia. Never before in the history of the coal industry has a suspension or strike order called for cessation of work by all union miners in the United States. In the past, wage contracts in the bituminous and anthracite fields have not expired at the same time, but a complete tieup in union fields was considered during the great anthracite strike in 1902. A sympathetic strike by the bituminous miners at that time was rejected by the union's convention, it being argued that the soft coal workers were bound by a contract.

The issuance of the call came with the recent strike vote of soft coal miners not completely tabulated but it was said officially that the work of the union's board of tellers had progressed to such a point as to show every field voting overwhelmingly in favor of suspension. Indications were that nine-tenths favored the walk out. Cessation or the suspension in whole or part is left to the unions' policy committee, composed of more than 100 union officials, which will meet in Cleveland on Friday to consider plans for conducting the strike.



SEVERAL OFFICERS WILL BE RETIRED
 Creation of Dept. of National Defense Cuts Jobs From Under Many.
 When the bill for the creation of the Department of National Defence, of which notice has been given in the Commons, is brought down and its contents made public, it is expected that it will provide for the retirement of several higher officers, and, also, that the working out of its provisions will result in a large decrease in the staffs at present employed in the four departments which will be amalgamated under it. One or two flames of militia department high officials are being mentioned as among those likely to be retired as a result of the amalgamation and consequent reorganization. Among these are Sir Willoughby Gwatkin, inspector general of the air force, and

Brig-General Sir Henry Burstall. Some 300 or so civil servants, employed in the special war-time branches of the Militia Department, were notified some time ago that their duties would end with the end of the fiscal year, March 31, by which time the bill providing for the amalgamation is expected to have become law.

BABE RUTH AND BOB MEUSEL

MUST SERVE SUSPENSIONS

New Orleans, March 23—Babe Ruth and Bob Meusel, outfielders of the New York American League Club, must serve out the suspensions placed on them last fall by Judge K. M. Landis for disobeying the rules of baseball. Judge Landis gathered visiting newspapermen around him today during a game between New York and the New Orleans Club and in the presence of Colonel Jacob Rupert, of the New York Club, said: "There is nothing more to add."

Does the suspension of last fall stand as it is?" he was asked. "Nothing more to add," said the Judge, as he returned to watch the game.

Ruth and Meusel are suspended until May 20 for having violated a rule of organized baseball which prohibited them from participating in exhibition games of outside teams.

THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE

Mr. Raymond, sitting member of Brantford, Ont. in the House of Commons, had this to say on the floors of the House the other day.

"Now it is not in the hands of anybody, even if he is the Prime Minister or the whole Government of this country, to say whom a constituency shall send to Parliament. I say that that would be absolutely reversing the whole of our democratic institutions. Any man, whether he be the Prime Minister of this country or anybody else, who will come and tell the free people of any electoral district in this country whom they should send to Parliament, or whom they should not send, is arrogating to himself something that belongs to no man in this country, because under our Constitution it is for the people themselves to select their representative. It has been tried time and again in the Old Country, and invariably the will of the people in the selection of their candidates is what regulates their parliamentary representation."

JOHN D. PALMER HEADS THE N. B. OPPOSITION

Fredericton, March 24—John D. Palmer, of Fredericton, was selected as provincial leader by the convention of the Conservative party in New Brunswick, which was held here this afternoon in the G. W. V. A. hall, York street. Three names went before the convention, those of Mr. Palmer, Charles D. Richards, M. P. P., of Fredericton and H. A. Powell, former M. P. of St. John. The convention with a registration of 134 delegates on the first vote eliminated Mr. Powell and tied on the other candidates. On a revote Mr. Palmer received a majority of four. Mr. Richards at once moved for a unanimous vote, which was given.

W. S. Sutton, former M. P. P. of Woodstock, was elected chairman and Raleigh Trites, of Sackville, secretary. Addresses were delivered in the course of the convention by the chairman, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Richards and Hon. J. B. Baxter, M. P., of St. John. Mr. Powell was not present. Mr. Richards, who represents York in the house of assembly, will continue as leader of the Conservative opposition. Whether Mr. Palmer will obtain a seat in the house is not known.

The newly chosen provincial leader of the Conservative party is a native of Richibucto. In early life he was in the wholesale grocery business in both St. John and Fredericton. Several years ago, with John A. Reid the present Mayor of Fredericton, he obtained control of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company, Limited, of Fredericton, and is now its president. He has been an officer of the organization for some time.

He has been prominent in the Conservative party in York county since taking up his residence in Fredericton. Last autumn his name was placed in nomination at the convention called to select a Conservative federal candidate. R. B. Hanson, K. C., M. P., now representing York-Sunbury at Ottawa, obtained the nomination, but a substantial vote was given Mr. Palmer.
