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LATEST FROM TURKEY

GREAT NAVAL ENGAGEMENT!!

21 Vessels of War Destroyed.

We stop the press in order to give a slight notice of the thrilling news brought by the "Pacific."

Particulars are these—On 30th Nov. entire Russian fleet from Sebastopol under Admiral Machinoff twenty-eight sail, appeared off the Turkish harbour of Sinope, where Vice Admiral Osman Bey lay with 14 Turkish sail. Battle immediately commenced, and shore batteries being in force, Russians forced the harbour.

Each of the Turkish ships had twelve crews, eight hundred troops on board of their way to Caramania, also a quantity of money to pay the fleet—all lost.

The Turks burned or sunk seven Russian ships, namely—two line of battle ships, three frigates, and two steamers.

The battle lasted only one hour.

The remainder of the Russian fleet was so shattered that it could scarcely reach Sebastopol.

All Europe is an excitement at this desperate disaster to the brave Turks.

The opinion is that a European war can no longer be avoided with honor.

Where are the French and English Fleets? giving dancing parties in the Bosphorus—The Turks continued to gain advantages on land in Asia. On line of Danube no movement.

THE HURON JUDGSHIP

I beg to offer a few remarks relative to a correspondence which appeared in the last issue of the Weekly Canadian, signed "Rusticus." From that correspondence it is shown that the good people of London, C. W., have at a contemplation to petition the Legislature at its next sitting for a Charter to build a Railroad from that Town to some Port on Lake Huron, at or near to Goderich, and the project has been favourably received by the good people of Canada West. Now, as "Rusticus" justly observes, such a line to the Buffalo, Brantford and Goderich Railroad at Clinton, thence North through the Crown Lands to Owen Sound, or even Saugeais, would open up one of the best blocks of land in Canada. Our mines, fishery, agriculture and mercantile pursuits, as well our Lake and River navigation, would each and all be promoted with energy and success, providing this line was constructed. The project is worthy the attention of the Government and the people; and the Counties of Huron, Perth, Bruce and Grey ought to take a special interest in it. Such a line with branches to Bayfield Saugeais or other eligible Ports as required, would at least leave us on a par with our energetic B. Jonathan.
