The Art of Eating.

There is little if any doubt, says the Lancet, that cooking has been employed by man in the preparation of food from the remotest ages.

It is probable also that empirical ideas of what constitutes a healthful diet early formed the basis of a gastronomic art not without some relation to some physiological truth.

It has been reserved for later times, however, and for civilized man, to discover and formulate a regular method of dining.

By a process of natural selection, the work of elaborating this system has in a great measure passed into the hands of our French neighbors, who have thus been able to develop an art characteristically their own.

Our simpler national customs relating to the table have, in common with those of most other peoples, attracted less attention, though it is not likely that they will ever disappear.

It is needless here, however, to discuss in detail each local peculiarity. We should rather aim at understanding those principles which underlie all rightly constituted systems, and give to each its value as an aid to a wholesome nutrition.

The time of eating is a matter of no small consequence. This is to some extent subject to individual convenience, but we may take it that as a general rule not less than five hours should separate one meal from another.

The short interval of rest usual after meals will commend itself as being in strict accordance with physiological necessity. The quantity and quality of food taken also require careful attention, and these again must be regulated by reference to the work to be done by a given person.

Some difference of opinion has always existed as to the proper daily allowance of food. We shall probably do justice to the digestive powers of most persons, however, by advising that only one substantial meal be taken daily. More than this would tend, if continued, to overload the tissues with digestive products, and less would hardly suffice for full nutrition.

Drink, if alcoholic, should be sparingly taken or not used at all. Cookery has in these days been elaborated almost to excess. Variety and delicacy are carried to an extreme, and we should probably gain rather than lose if plainness combined with care were adopted as our rule of practice in such matters.

HURON SIGNAL. FRIDAY, SEPT. 13, 1888. THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

The article in THE SIGNAL a couple of weeks since about the railway question has drawn the attention of the people of the section once more to the subject, and at an early day we believe definite action will be taken on the scheme.

The Board of Trade, which, during the past year, has manifested considerable activity in public matters, has given notice of definite action, and we hope at its next meeting to learn that it has put its hand to the plow without any intention of looking back.

What is wanted now is decided action on all sides. The Board of Trade should work hand in hand with the Town Council, and the members of the Town Council should stand shoulder to shoulder with the Board of Trade.

It is claimed by some that if we wait long enough—until the projects in hand by the C. P. R. at present are completed—the line from Guelph to Goderich will be taken up voluntarily by the C. P. R. and pushed to completion.

Such may be the fact, but in the history of railway building we learn of no railway owned by a private company that was ever built to any point without the cooperation and energetic work of the people who were to be benefited by the building of the road.

THE TOWN COUNCIL.

The Minutes of Last Semi-Monthly Meeting. The council of the town of Goderich met last Friday evening, the 6th inst.

A communication from the Reliance Electric Light Co., in regard to changing the lights on the private circuit from 2,000 to 1,000 candle power, was referred to the waterworks committee to report upon at next meeting or at any special meeting.

Mayor Butler stated that he had received a proposition from P. McEwan on behalf of Thos. McLean to put down the additional hole at the pumping station at the price offered (\$2 per foot) and wait 12 months for payment.

Moved by Humber, seconded by Nicholson, that the matter of the renting of the market be left with the market committee to close.—Carried.

A petition from residents of Bruce-st., asking that the water pipes be extended a short distance along that street westward from Victoria-st., was granted on motion of Nicholson, seconded by deputy reeve Smith.

Bylaw No 8 of 1888, authorizing the issue of notes to the extent of \$10,000 for general and school purposes, was read three times and passed.

Moved by Humber, seconded by Holt, that a committee composed of the mayor, reeve and councillor Morton take into their consideration the agreement with the Grand Trunk Railway Co. in regard to the supply of water to said company, and that they be given power to make the best terms possible with the company, also, that when the agreement is completed, the mayor sign and close the contract.—Carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT. The treasurer's report for the month of August showed a balance on hand of \$2,344.31.

Kellogg & Co., Toronto, oil, \$5.49; Estate Geo. Grant, relief, \$3.75; Jas. Hillier, relief, \$9.50.

W. PROUDFOOT, Chairman pro tem. Moved by Proudfoot, seconded by Priddham, that the matter of repairing the street on Newgate and Victoria streets and Bayfield Road be referred to the chairman of the public works committee to report as to what is necessary to finish the work on the above streets.—Carried.

Moved by Nicholson, seconded by Proudfoot, that the watering cart be kept constant at work during the very dry weather.—Carried.

Correcting an Error.

DEAR SIR,—Permit me to make a slight correction through the columns of your paper. When in Dunganon and Goderich recently, I referred to the diverting of the old Chippewa road, which ran along the brow of the Niagara river bank, overlooking the Falls and rapids above.

I attributed the change to Roman Catholic influence upon the Government. Since returning I have interviewed certain gentlemen who were members of the Stamford council at the time, and am more than ever convinced that my statement was correct. I erred, however, in stating that the pressure was brought to bear upon the Local Government. I find that the aforesaid road was in the hands of the Dominion Government, consequently the favor was granted the Roman Catholics by the latter Government and not by the Provincial.

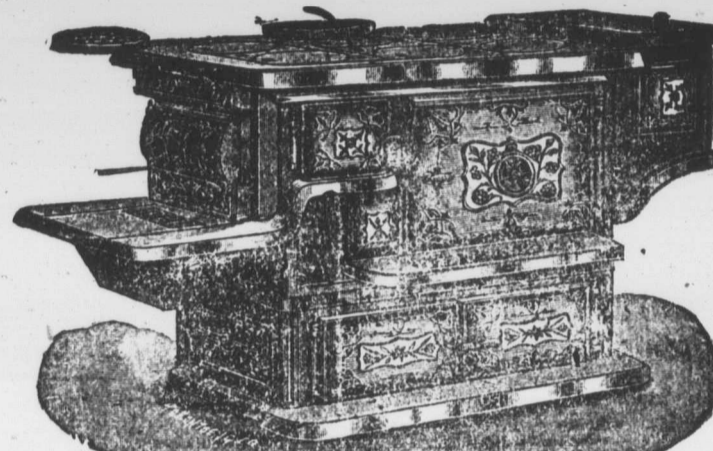

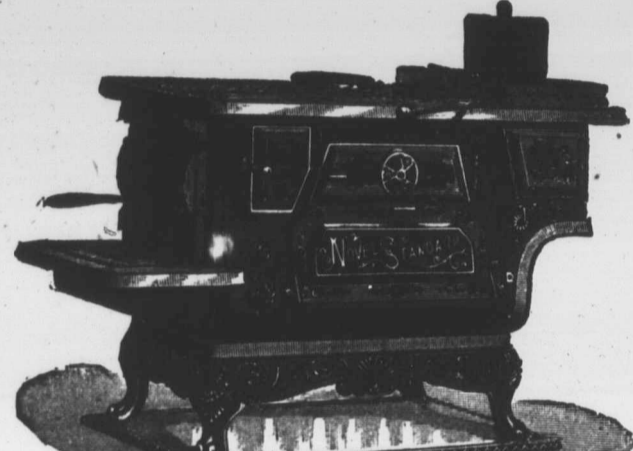

Somebody About Women.
Maria Mitchell has left a thousand dollars to Vassar College.
The Queen of Roumania (Carmen Sylva) is going to travel in Sweden. She is at work on the libretto of a Swedish opera.
The Marchioness of Duferin is going to publish extracts of her Indian journal under the title of "Our Viceregal Life in India."
Fifty thousand women are reported as having voted at the school elections just held in Kansas. Many women were elected on the school boards.
Mr Herbert D Ward, who married the poet and novelist, Elizabeth Stuart Phelps, is himself a poet. His work shows thoughtfulness and originality, and is coming more and more into notice.
Miss Kate Hubbard is an energetic young Kansas woman, who owns, edits and publishes the Globe Sun. She also manages a job printing office, and is said to be laying the foundation of a fortune.
Miss Anna Gordon is printing a new song-book for the Young Women's Christian Temperance Union. Her "Marching Songs for Young Crusaders" have been sold to the extent of 120,000 copies.
Mrs Elizabeth Liff Warren, wife of Bishop Warren, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, has given the trustees of the University of Denver, Col., \$100,000 for the endowment of a School of Theology.
Mrs Newman, wife of Bishop Newman, is in charge of a home just opened at Round Lake, N. Y., for returned women missionaries. It is called the Orient, and is an annex to the home in India, which is called the Occident.
Mrs Mary C Leavitt, the round-the-world missionary of the W.C.T.U., received a warm welcome upon her arrival in London. Mrs Lucas, the sister of John Bright, presided at the reception given to Mrs Leavitt by the British Women's Temperance Association.
Deborah Powers, the senior partner in the bank of D Powers & Sons, Lansingburg, N. Y., has just passed her 99th birthday. She is in full possession of all her faculties, and takes a lively interest in current events. She has been actively engaged in business for more than half a century.
Frances Willard urges women to read the newspapers. She says: "Women are a set of passivities on that subject, a class; and I am never more annoyed for my 'sect' than when the new-boy goes trotting through at full speed, if he finds the car contains chiefly women, never dreaming that they want a paper. I clutch his sleeve with a pin, and buy one of every variety he has, and ask him what he is thinking about to lose custom in that way. Gossip is nothing but small news—the nickels, pennies and dimes, while the newspaper deals in dollars and V's and X's; so it widens the mind more to read the newspaper than to gossip about the neighbors."

The "saminors" of the city are good examples—women of education who post society women on current topics, literary, political, and scientific, enabling them to converse intelligently. She takes the children off the parents' hands by the hour, and not only makes them happy and gives the mothers rest, but earns a good salary by it, too. A clever young girl with a camera picks up points here and there which the artists and illustrated papers buy. Another clever girl discovers that she can become a caterer; perhaps she makes only cakes, perhaps serves whole meals, and thus earns a livelihood. Another who paints on china buys a kiln and fires her own and her neighbors' wares. The sum total of the women earning comfortable incomes in these odd ways is very large.—Chatsaunquin.

The Cause of the Exodus.
The Ammonites, so Scripture says, were in the habit of sacrificing their children to the god Moloch. But the effects of their superstition were probably not more injurious as regards loss of population than the yearly sacrifice of Canadian people offer on the altar of restriction.
Every Canadian can count within his own family circle, or within the circle of his friends, a number of persons who have gone across the line to seek the employment denied them at home. The Boston Transcript has recently published some of the statistics issued by the State census bureau of Massachusetts, relative to the census of 1885. The entire population of that State is 1,942,000, and of these 40,800 are natives of Nova Scotia, 41,000 are French Canadians, and 18,500 had from other parts of Canada. That is, the Canadian element in Massachusetts numbers 103,000, or more than the combined population of Hamilton, London and Kingston, or of Thomas and Catherine, Chatham, St. Thomas and Dundas. The Transcript speaks in high terms of the intelligence and enterprise of the Nova Scotia immigrants, and adds: "Under present conditions it would appear that while Nova Scotia is a good place to be born in, if one would get ahead in the world it is a poor place to live in, unless one is already ahead." The truth about the matter is that in Nova Scotia, as in other portions of Canada, the people do not get a fair chance. It is not the fault of Nature. She has endowed Nova Scotia with far larger resources and with just as good a climate as New England. There is coal in abundance, iron deposits of unsurpassed richness, good farming land, a considerable quantity of lumber, and the finest seaboard and most prolific fisheries in the world. How is it, then, that the population is fleeing that favored region? The answer is that man instinctively leaves the spot where production is most difficult and least profitable, for lands where the conditions of production are more advantageous to him. Why are the conditions of production in Nova Scotia, with her great natural wealth and her splendid natural facilities for turning it to account, less favorable than the conditions existing in Massachusetts? Simply because legislation makes them so. What could be the use, for instance, of labor and capital undertaking to open up coal or iron mines, or to properly develop the fisheries? There is no market for the output, or, to speak more correctly, the output could not reach the only available market, that of New England, without paying a tariff toll which would exhaust the profit; and even if it could do so, the Nova Scotia producer would not be permitted to bring back the articles he received in exchange—that is, in payment—without paying a toll on the Canadian side which would also take the cream of the profit. If the richest among us had to pay a tax of 25 or 30 per cent on every bushel of stuff he sold, and a tax of about the same amount on every pound of goods he obtained in return, how long could he stand it? This is precisely the position of the Nova Scotia miner, fisherman, and farmer. Protectionists tell us that when he disposes of his products in the American market after paying the United States duty, he can return home and buy Canadian-made goods without paying any duty. But in the first place, it is manifestly a great loss and inconvenience when a man has to buy and sell in two different markets; and, in the next place, when the Nova Scotian buys Western Canada manufactures he has to pay a heavier price than would be required for similar wares in New England. For, even supposing the Western Canada manufacturer could manufacture as cheaply as the others, it is obvious that the price to the Nova Scotian is augmented by railway charges for a very long haul, whereas if he were allowed to deal at the New England ports to which he carries his products, the transportation charge homeward on his own vessel, by the short water route, would be comparatively light.
This is why Nova Scotia is compelled to sacrifice her children to Uncle Sam. And Ontario is forced through the same causes to follow suit. We have a magnificent heritage, but the greed of a few and the blindness of the many stand in the way of its development, with the result that to Canada belongs the supremacy of being the only young country in the world which is being steadily drained of population.

Financially, as well as in every other respect, the Harvest Home was a success, upwards of ninety dollars being taken up. The committee of management and others who assisted in making the affair a success deserve the encomiums of the congregation. Weather was all that could be desired for such an occasion.

SEARLE THE WINNER.

The Kangaroo Defeats the Beaver in the Great International Boat-Race. LONDON, Sept. 9.—William O'Connor's effort to win the highest sculling honors of the world has failed, and an honest and worthy rival, Searle, has won the victory for Great Britain. The contest was decided under the most favorable conditions. It was a lovely September day, with bright sunshine, and the only drawback was a moderate head wind.

The betting the first thing this morning expressed the general feeling that the race would be a very close thing. En route to Putney a hundred and five to one hundred was freely offered on Searle. At Putney before the start O'Connor's friends came with a rush. After ovens had been taken O'Connor became the favorite at 100 to 80 against Searle, and this was the ruling quotation for the last ten minutes. Both men appeared a few minutes before the time appointed, each receiving a hearty greeting. Searle won the toss and chose the Surrey side. Very little delay was experienced in starting.

When word to go was given, like the wings of two great birds the oars flashed and the men were away, O'Connor gaining half a boat's length at the start. The water was smooth and the tide just at the ebb. For a hundred yards the nose of Searle's boat was only even with the Canadian's body. Then a great roar arose from the crowd as the Australian was seen to be creeping slowly up on the other. O'Connor realized it and put forth his best efforts, but in vain. In another hundred yards his young antagonist was even with him, and then for twice that distance both strained every nerve. The pace was the most rapid ever rowed, as was proved by the circumstance that the Australian beat the record at Hammersmith Bridge, half the distance, by four seconds, when he led O'Connor by a length and a half.

It was Searle's race after that. The knowing ones feared that the Canadian had lost his nerve, when, as Searle began to draw away from him at the end of the first mile, he kept glancing across at his opponent, and when he missed a stroke with his right oar and caught a cramp the spectators delightedly applauded Searle, who rowed steadily from start to finish without any indication of nervousness. From Hammersmith Bridge the Australian continued to increase the distance between the two boats, and O'Connor could not be seen to be nearly spent. A great many of the spectators did not expect to see him finish the race, but he stuck to his oars pluckily, though his strokes were uneven and his strength momentarily failing. At the bridge at Barnes the Australian was six lengths in the lead, and O'Connor was so nearly played that before the line was crossed his opponent had increased the distance to 10 lengths. The opinion of professional and non-professional spectators was that it was a good race fairly won.

The first mile was done in 4:53, Searle then rowing 32 strokes to O'Connor's 33. At Hammersmith Bridge Searle's time was 8:58 and O'Connor's 8:44, when the pace told on both, and O'Connor slackened down to 28 strokes to the other's 30. Searle's time at the finish was 22 minutes 42 seconds, and O'Connor's 23 minutes 2 seconds.

BEATEN BY HALF A MINUTE. LONDON, Sept. 9.—Searle wins by ten lengths in 22:42; O'Connor half a minute behind.

Searle's measurements are:—Height, 5 feet 10 1/2 inches; chest, 41 1/2 in.; biceps, 13 1/2 in.; forearm, 11 in.; thigh, 22 1/2 in.; calf, 16 in. He scales 11 st. 10 lb., rows with 7 1/2 in. height of seat, 13 1/2 in. height of outrigger and 4 feet 8 1/2 in. spread of rowlocks. He is 23 years of age, and a good-looking youth of the fair English type.
