





Unsold Fish Coming Back

eturning from the Mediterranean with 3,000 qtls. of fish, which was shipped from here in March past. It was Labrador fish, and the markets being slack it could not be sold. This will be a great loss to the owner. In this connection we are sorry to learn that there is more Labrador fish still in Spain unsold. This resulted from the fact that the markets were overstocked, the consumption being poorer than usual during the Lenten season. A deal of fish was shipped down there from Greece and also came to Italy which could not be sold in the former market, and this helped o congest both the Spanish and Italan markets. Part of the Ocean Ranger's cargo of Labrador fish is still at Genoa unsold, and there are lso some packages left at Leghorn. and this will be put in cold storage to save it. There is also a part cargo of shore fish unsold in Naples, and this was shipped by a northern business firm. Similarly there is a part cargo at Alicante shipped by a St. John's merchant from a northern outport. All this fish would aggregate several thousand quintals.




