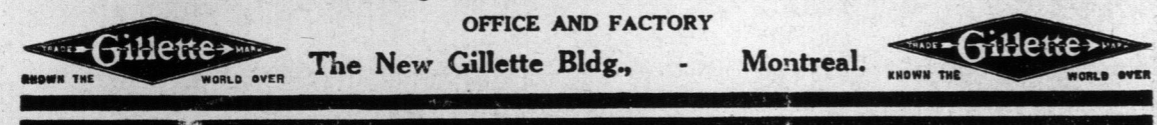

"She thinks as much about my pleasure as her own; I really think she thinks more about it, and not mine only."

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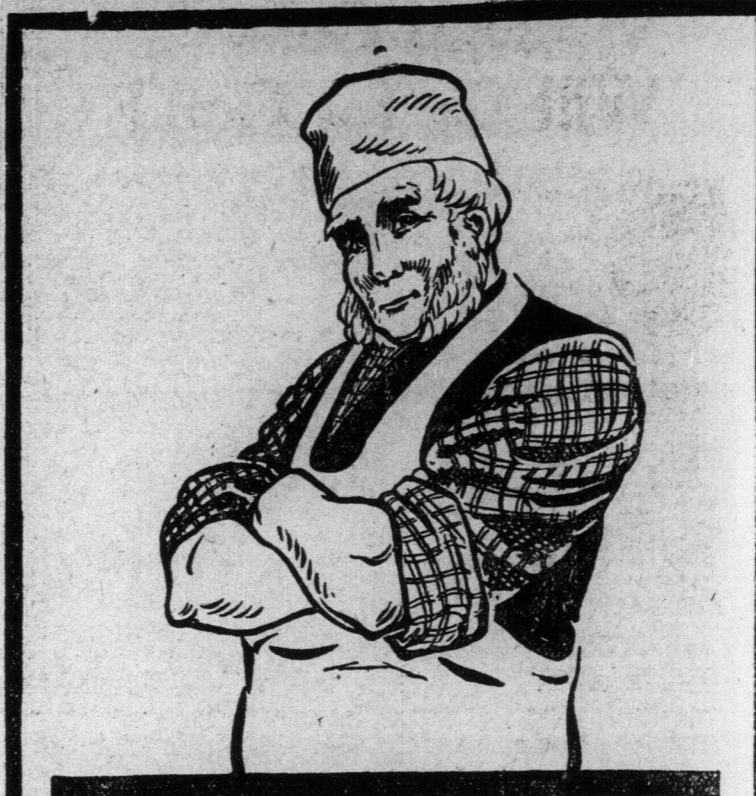
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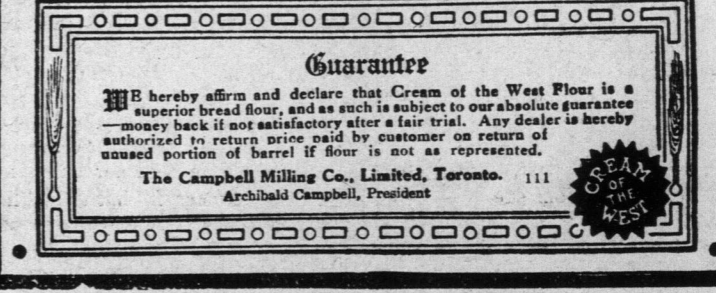

Lady Sykes' Wild Career

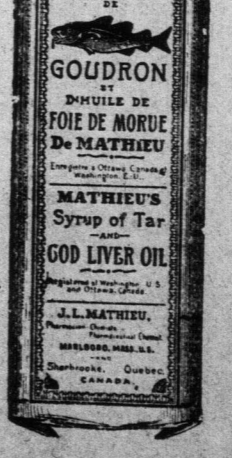
WENT THE PACE WHEN YOUNG. Her Extravagant Habits Did Not Go So Well With Her Husband's Penuriousness.

Crystal buttons are, according to the latest fad, sewn on the thick colored silk to match the collar of the decorated vest.


In some cases the head is almost completely swathed in fine black tulle as a headdress, tiny curls peeping from beneath.

Two hundred and seventy-nine years ago this month Capt. John Smith, English adventurer, died in London in the fifty-second year of his age. He has earned a proud place in history as the inventor of the Smith family, which, according to the census of 1910, comprises three-fourths of the population and brains of this country. He was the first of 4,700,844 John Smiths now appearing in the telephone directories, by actual count, and nobody who runs for office under the primary system should forget it. Powhatan was deeply affected and gave Capt. Smith to Pocahontas as a birthday present. Pocahontas hinted around quite a little about a church wedding, but while esteeming her highly as a friend Capt. "Puff" Signalling Proposed.

A Boston Writer's Idea, for Use by Aviator.

London, June 10.—James Means, writing in the magazine Nature, from Boston urges that methods of visual aerial signalling be not neglected, as in the event of war the enemy may deliberately disturb or prevent communication by wireless telegraphy. For aerial scouting and other purposes, Mr. Means suggests "puff" signalling as a simple and trustworthy method. "By this method," he says, "coloring matter is intermittently injected into the exhaust tube of the flying machine motor from a pipe. This is emitted in large and small puffs resembling very black smoke, whose durations correspond to the dashes and dots of the Morse code."

May Resign at End of Year.

London, June 10.—The Manchester Guardian newspaper says it is rumored that His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, may not wish to retain the Governor-Generalship of Canada beyond the end of the present year. No definite decision has yet been come to, the newspaper adds, nor has the illness of H. R. H. the Duchess of Connaught anything to do with the step, which, it is understood, is due to an entirely private arrangement made several months ago.

If His Royal Highness retires he will be succeeded by Lord Dudley, who recently retired as Governor-General of Australia. Before offering him this appointment the British government had decided that on the occurrence of a vacancy in the governorships of India or Canada, Lord Dudley should be asked to accept it.

London, June 10.—Frederick Haverly, a settlement worker of Kentish-town, North London, tells a remarkable story in the Express of kidnapping and branding.

He says he was lured into an automobile by two men, who drugged him. When he awoke he was in a cellar, tied hand and foot. He was taken upstairs to a room, where a number of men in black hoods tried to make him retract certain statements.

They tortured him with a flexible brand of steel around his head and branded his forehead with the letter "H" for heretic.

He was afterwards liberated in a fainting condition and found himself on the highroad near Barnet.

That Appeal to Caesar.

THE CAESAR APPEALED TO WAS THE GOVERNOR AND NOT THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES.

In last evening's Chronicle appears an apparently inspired article in which an attempt is made to throw the odium of delay of the decision of the Morison Memorials on the President of the Fishermen's Union. This is a most improper and unfair imputation. The delay is solely due to the course pursued by His Excellency the Governor, either with or without the advice of his Ministers. It is stated that the President of the F. P. U. in the first Memorial appealed to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. He did nothing of the kind. The submission of the question to the Secretary of State was solely at the initiative of His Excellency. The appeal in the first Memorial was strictly to the Governor. In proof of this we ask our readers to peruse the following extracts from that Memorial:—

"MEMORIAL.
To His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams, Knight Commander of the Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

May it Please Your Excellency—
As President of the Fishermen's Protective Union in this Colony, an incorporated body, consisting of several thousand of the electors, I beg to bring under your notice a matter that affects their interests as well as the honour of the offices held under Your Excellency by the Hon. Donald Morison.

I will as briefly as possible group for the information of Your Excellency the facts as borne out by public records and other documents, copies of which I forward with this letter. The original of these documents with one exception have been placed in my custody temporarily, and if Your Excellency desires I will produce them for your inspection immediately. The exception is of the agreement of Feb. 16th, 1910. It is a copy of a copy handed to me by one of the parties to the agreement, but it is referred to in other originals."

It will be observed (1) the Memorial is addressed to His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams, and not to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies. If the Memorial had been an appeal to the Caesar at the Colonial Office it would have been addressed to him, with a covering letter, praying the Governor to transmit the reference to the Secretary of State for his decision. There was no such covering letter, nor is there one single sentence in the whole Memorial asking the Secretary of State to express

an opinion, exercise a discretion, or give a decision.
(2) The attention of His Excellency the Governor and not that of the Secretary of State was called to certain matters by the express words of the Memorial. Here they are:—
"I beg to bring under your notice."
"I will as briefly as possible group for the information of Your Excellency."
"If Your Excellency desires I will produce them for your inspection immediately."
"The fact in itself that a Minister of the Crown and his associates in the Company should obtain possession of such a vast concession from the Executive is inconsistent with the honour of a Minister of the Crown, and with the duty which the Hon. Donald Morison owes to Your Excellency as a member of the Ministry of Your Excellency, and to the public as a trustee of the public domain."
"As further bearing upon this subject, I direct the attention of Your Excellency to the fact that the Crown Lands Act of 1903 required that," &c.
"The public records to which I have referred and the documents of which I enclose copies afford proof of the transactions to which I direct the attention of Your Excellency."
"As President of the Fishermen's Protective Union, representing a very large number of the electors, I most respectfully enter a strong protest against the Hon. Donald Morison continuing any longer a member of Your Excellency's Council and holding offices of emolument from the Crown."
It will be observed that in all these extracts the matter is drawn to the attention of His Excellency the Governor, and not to the attention of the Secretary of State for the Colonies. The protest is made to the Governor and not to the Secretary of State.
"I confidently approach Your Excellency in this matter, prompted by a desire to serve the public welfare, and believing it my duty to act as I have done in the premises."
The President says he confidently approached His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams and not the Right Hon. L. Harcourt.
We have shown by these extracts from the Memorial, and from the fact that there are no such references to the Secretary of State, that His Excellency was prayed to exercise his judgment and not to be a mere transmitter of a Memorial to England. It is true he was also asked to transmit a copy home. Here are the words:
"I pray that Your Excellency may be pleased to forward a copy of this communication to the Secretary of State for the Colonies."
But this was merely subsidiary to the other more important functions he was asked to perform. The Memorial was not addressed to Secretary Harcourt, because that gentleman does not hold the Commission of the Governor of Newfoundland. He can neither exercise the functions of the Governor nor dismiss a Minister. This can be done by the Governor and not by the Secretary of State. The latter gentleman can give an opinion if it is asked for by the Governor, just as the Governor can ask for the

A Royal Commission Scid to Be Coming.

We heard a report to-day that a Royal Commission will shortly come out to Newfoundland. It was not stated on what matters the Commission would sit, or whether it was the Royal Commission which has been appointed to investigate the resources of the Empire. It would be a welcome move if it was a Royal Commission of the kind advocated by the Evening Telegram in March, 1911, and endorsed by Sir Robert Bond in a letter published in the Evening Telegram. This was for a searching investigation by an impartial Commission, appointed imperially, into the workings of the Crown Lands Department since the General Election, or since 1900, if the Government wished.

Unsold Fish Coming Back
We understand that a schooner is returning from the Mediterranean with 3,000 qtls. of fish, which was shipped from here in March past. It was Labrador fish, and the markets being slack it could not be sold. This will be a great loss to the owner. In this connection we are sorry to learn that there is more Labrador fish still in Spain unsold. This resulted from the fact that the markets were overstocked, the consumption being poorer than usual during the Lenten season. A deal of fish was shipped down there from Greece and also came to Italy which could not be sold in the former market, and this helped to congest both the Spanish and Italian markets. Part of the Ocean Ranger's cargo of Labrador fish is still at Genoa unsold, and there are also some packages left at Leghorn, and this will be put in cold storage to save it. There is also a part cargo of shore fish unsold in Naples, and this was shipped by a northern business firm. Similarly there is a part cargo at Alicante shipped by a St. John's merchant from a northern port. All this fish would aggregate several thousand quintals.

The shipping disasters which the promoters have in mind are those connected with the loss of the sealing steamer Erna, and with the loss of the Anreola, Reliance, Beatrice, Dorothy Louise, Arkansas and Grace. The need of taking steps to provide a relief fund has already been advocated in the press, but the inauguration of such a fund was postponed until L. President of the Board of Trade was in a position to take up the matter. The public will be glad to learn that Mr. Fearn has taken the first steps, and we have no doubt that a goodly gathering of sympathisers, supporters and workers will be found in the Board of Trade room next Tuesday afternoon.

Special Religious Services.

Yesterday being the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus special religious services were held in the R. C. Cathedral. At 10 a.m. a Solemn High Mass was sung after which there was a procession of the Blessed Sacrament through the spacious edifice. His Grace the Archbishop bearing the monstrance which contained the Sacred Host.

At 7.30 p.m. yesterday there was Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament during which the choir of boys of St. Patrick's Hall and the regular Cathedral choir beautifully rendered the "Tantum Ergo" and "O Salutaris." The High Altar was beautifully ornamented, and each service large congregations attended, while all through the day many people worshipped before the altar.

Steer's Cove.

The condition of Steer's Cove is one that demands special attention. The cove is filled with silt, and even at high tide the fishing boats and craft which moor there can barely get water enough to float them. But the worst part of the story remains to be told. At low tide the stench is awful. A sewer has its outlet in the Cove and people who have business there cut it as short as possible to avoid breathing the polluted air. There is a fish market in this place where several boats' crews dispose of their catch to citizens, and the consumption of such food, which often lays for hours in the market, cannot but be dangerous to the health of those who use it. When the net dredge comes it should be used in this cove immediately.

Ottawa, June 7.—There has been some controversy in the capital as to the actual flag of Canada. The matter is settled by the following despatch received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught:—"Sir,—I have the honour to transmit to Your Royal Highness a copy of a letter in regard to the flag, which should be used by private persons who are British subjects. I should be glad if you would be good enough to cause the public to be informed that the Union flag is the national flag of Canada, as of all other parts of His Majesty's dominions, and may be flown on land by all British subjects and that the red ensign with the arms of the Dominion of Canada in the flag is intended to be used only by Canadian merchant vessels."

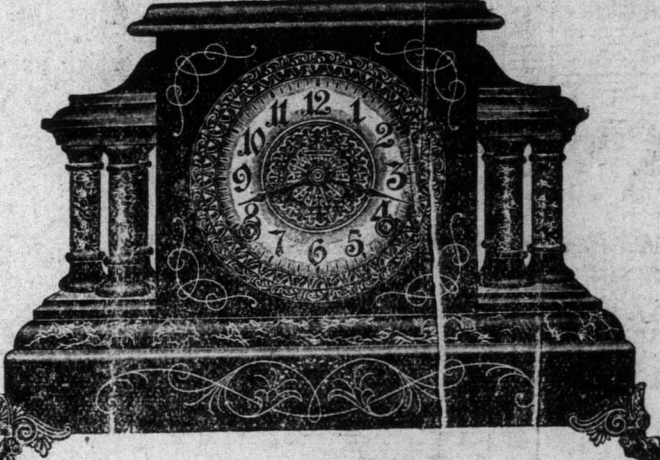

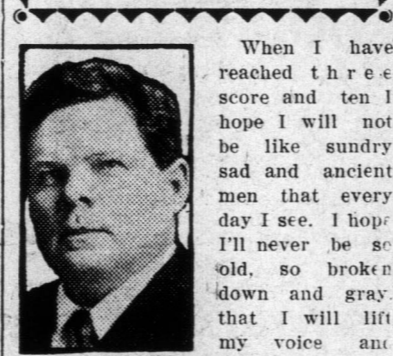

They had hardly entered the rapids when the canoe turned over, throwing the four persons into the water.

The swiftly rushing waters swept the canoe down stream out of the reach of the young people in the water. Smythe and his sister went down together. Kimball caught hold of Miss Ellis and tried to reach the river bank. Their cries for help attracted the attention of Richards and he rushed to the river. Kimball was within only a short distance of the bank when he lost his hold on Miss Ellis and she disappeared from view. Richards waded out into the water a few feet and caught hold of the young man. He was unconscious and was in a serious condition to-night.

A large crowd went to the scene when informed of the accident. Irons were secured and the river bed was dragged for the bodies, but at dark none had been recovered. The river is very high and it is considered doubtful whether any of the bodies will be found.
