The Supreme Law

It has always been recognized that the safety of the State is the supreme law, and conditions brought about by the Great War have extended in many directions the application of this principle. The railways in Great Britain have been taken over by the State. Factories have been comman deered for munition works, and other factories are being controlled and more than half the profits of the management turned into the revenue. Thousands of steam vessels, motor boats, motor roadsters and horses have also been seized and applied to the public need. The greed of those who control the meat trade was met by the British and French Governments commissioning the Board of Trade to enter into competition with them and commandeer many steamers which carry meats. 

Is Buttermilk a good food? Buttermilk does not have as much food value as whole milk, on account of the fat being removed. It is readily taken care of by the body, however, and is recommended by many physicians on account of the action of the lactic acid upon the putrifactive bacteria in the intestines. food more nutritious? The fireless cooker is one of the best labor-saving devices that has come to the house wife in recent years. It is especially good for cooking cereals, many of our vegetables which require long cooking, and tough cuts of meat which should be cooked at a low temperature in order to soften the connective tissues. Give the food value of bananas.

A banana has about the same amount of food as a slice of butter or nydrates food-producing energy. Bananas are often indigestible because they are eaten green, or at least underripe. When a banana is green the skin is thick and when the skin is removed there is a fuzzy substance on the outside. If this is stripped off and tasted it will be found to be quite bitter. This substance on the outside of the banana acts much as annin in tea does, and the banana under such conditions is not readily digested. To be thoroughly digestible a banana should have a thin skin and freckles on it. I do not mean by this that the banana should be overripe. It should be firm, for in a ripe banana the starch will have been con verted into sugar. The small childern should not be given bananas to eat unless the mother sees that they chew them very thoroughly. It is a good plan to slice the banana, serve i at the table with cream and some well oasted bread or hard crackers. In his way the banana will be thoroughly chewed and will not cause trouble



Under the auspicies of the W.C.T.U., another grand temperance rally was held in the Methodist College Hall, last night. The audience was large and representative. Amongst those on the platform were the W.C.T.U. officers, Revs. Dr. Jones, W. Cracknell, Whitemarsh, Atkinson, Thomas, and Paine, Brigadier Morehen, Capt. Cave, and Messrs. H. E. Cowan, W. White and A. W. Martin. A feature of the meeting was the singing of the White-Ribbon boys and girls, who oc-

cupied seats in the front row.

At the invitation of Mrs. Benedict, S. Sutherland, of St. Andrew's Church, presided. In his address, the chairman dwelt on the magnitude of the issue. He warned the audience against over-confidence on the one hand and discouragement on the other. The chief obstacle to be surmounted was the indifference of electors generally. That is what Napoleon called Constantinople. Because of its commanding position between Europe and Asia, it was the centre of Persian, Greek, Roman and Turkish ambition for many centuries. It was occupied by Constantine the Great in 330 A.D., who made it the capital of the Roman Empire, and changed its name to Constantinople, the city of Constantine. The crusaders occupied it in 1204 and held it until 1261. The Turks conquered it under Mohammed the second, in 1453, an event making the extinction of the Byzantine Empire. Since then it has constantly der Turkish dominion, largely because of the intense jealousy existing be-tween European powers. Constantiposition in warfare, commerce and trade that its possession is regarded of great international advantage. 

What We Owe to the Men

Who Keep Up Steam in Our Battleships.

Right down in the lull of the great battleship, securely shut down by water-tight doors, they see nothing of the fight. For them the thrill of battle comes in a sudden and stern increase of their strenuous duties. Yet let us never forget what we owe to the men whose work is so vitally essential to the success of every naval ac-

Their work is so heavy, indeed, that the men are divided into three watches so as to give them an eight hours' rest between their four hours' spells

Down in the engine-room there are steampines, filled with scalding water and sudden death, flooding the engineroom in an instant with biting, blinding, searing fog, somewhere above boiling point, for high pressure steam is hotter stuff than comes out of the spout of a kettle. A shell through the main steam pipes, and good-bye to

those who are near the damage. The engineer officer knows all this, and often has seen some of the things that can happen taking place on a small scale. While the gunners are working for all they are worth he watches the wheels go round, listens not to the

Scream of the Shells

of the hammer strokes of projectiles on armour-plate, but to the tell-tale songs of the complex mechanisms over which he presides with the coolness of a naval officer, the skill of a man of science, and the tenderness of a Red Cross nurse.

He never sees a shot go home: he never sees an enemy's flag pulled down in defeat. If all goes well, and the enemy runs or strikes, the engineer-commander hears all about it. at mess. If things go wrong, he feels it-quite unmistakably-in his per-

Get one unlucky shot into the engine-room, and it is up to him, so long as volition is left to him, to put that thing right, and he must now draw fires until there is not another thing he can do first. In battle, so long as

there is a dog's chance to do so, he Must Keep Steam Up

for steam is the breath of life to the 'ship, and he must take risks, when he is making repairs, that would give the landsman spasms. It may be remembered that a storm suddenly burst out at a time when quite a fleet of warships were anchored in the harbor of Apia. So fearful was the gale that six vessels were blown ashore and completely wrecked, The Calliope, however, cut her cable and steamed out in the teeth of the hurricane. and was the only ship that escaped that awful night. In spite of the gigantic sea that was running the stokers managed for hour aftter hour to keep up a full head of steam. So frightful was the fury of that blast that at times the vessel actually stood still, the full power of her engines barely equalling the tremendous pressure of the wind. It was only a few vards that she escaped the jagged coral rocks, and finally forced her way out into the comparative safety of the open sea. During the fearful strugle, down in the engine-room

The Scene Was an Inferno.

Men were flung from one side to the other, and many were badly bruised, burnt, or scalded. Yet they stuck to their work liike the heroes they were, and for eighteen hours on end contrived to keep up full stetam. At last the weather moderated, and they were able to run for Port Blair.

At the battle of the Falkland Islands the Kent, it is said, exceeded her contract speed by two knots. What this means can hardly be explained to anyone who is not familiar with an engine-room-especially the cramped engine-room of a warship.

Were a Little Previous

(New York "Times.") The American Germans have been sure, and more than sure, that the sinking of the "Arabic" was right and more than right, while they know beyond the shadow of a doubt that the act of the man who sank her wouldn't be critised at home, and that the repetition of it would not be forbidden. The German Germans of greatest authority, however, seem to have been certain only that if the "Arabic" was sunk by a submarine in the conditions which the American Germans held to be ful justification, then the commander of the submarine violated his instructions and imposed upon his Government the hard necessity to express a deep regret for his misbehavior. The situation thus created for the American Germans is truly a trying onethe more trying because, for those not ensnared therein, it constitutes almost if not quite the first "humor" of the war. Whatever the final action of the German Government may be, they are already in the deep hole of their own digging.
