Three hundred men (300) are required immediately and sixty (60) men additional per month. The need for these men is set forth in the despatch received Tuesday, April 9th, from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, which reads as follows:—

"April 9th.—Statement has been received from Army Council to the effect that the Newfoundland Regiment in France is now short of the authorized War Establishment by 170 men, and that the number of 170 men, and 170 men, men under training in England is not sufficient to make up this deficit. Since very heavy fighting must be anticipated, at least 300 men will be required from Newfoundland as early as possible in order to bring early as possible in order to bring the Battalion up to strength and an additional sixty men per month will be required to maintain it in the

H. M. Government trust that your Government will be able to supply these men. (Signed) LONG." Conscription prevails throughout Canada and the United States, and Newfoundlanders in Canada are being conscripted.
