

noney loaned to him. The defendant, in his statement of lefence, made a counter claim that the plaintiff owed him £300, this being his commission for four years, at £75 per year, while he was in the employ of the plaintiff.

Mr. H. W. Reece, K.C., Solicitor General, instructed by Mr. Stanley Patterson, solicitor, appeared for the plaintiff. Defendant was represented by Mr. E. Keith Walcott, Barrister-ataw, associated with Mr. E. R. L. Ward. Harrister-at-law, and instructed by

Mr. W. St. Clair Hutchinson, solicitor. After evidence for both sides had been heard, Counsel on both sides then addressed the Court and His Honor summed up.

The jury retired for about 15 minites to consider their verdict, and on their return to Court found that the £300 claimed by the defendant was due him by the plaintiff. They were of opinion that the plaintiff had agreed to pay the defendant a sum of £25 monthly and the £75 commission \$100 Vacation Prize claimed for each year.

Judgment was accordingly entered for the defendant and for the amount of the counter-claim with costs

Report of Lecture

A STANDARD FOR THE PROPER.

Millions Now Living Will Nover Die. At the Victoria Hall at 7 p.m. Sunday evening, Mr. A. Horwood, one of the speakers of the International Bible Students Association, discussed the proposition that what the people noed at this time is a standard to which they can rally and to which

they will devote their lives and that

such a standard is now in our midst.

The speaker said: It must be very apparent that with the League of Nations is an admitted failure even by the ones that originated it and with some seventy nations of different resources different languages and different ideals each striving to solve its own problems to the best advantage there is nothing that the world more needs than just such a standard. The Prophet Isaiah indicates just what the standard for the people will be when he says to some: go through, go through the gates, prepare ye the way of the people, cast up cast up the highway, gather out the stones, lift up a standard for the people. Behold the Lord hath proclaimed unto the end of the world say ye to the daughter of Zion. Behold thy salvation cometh, behold his reward is with him and his work before him (Isa. 62:10-11).

What are those gates through which some are to go and as a consequence a standard is to be lifted up for the people? And who are these who are to pass through them? The succeeding verse says that "they shall call them a holy people the redeemed of the Lord" and we thus identify them as the church of this gospel age. The gates are gates of consecration and anointing of the spirit and faithfulness even unto death.

It is a mistaken idea that any general way for the people has yet been prepared. Of all the people on the earth, two thirds have never even heard of the only name given under Heaven and amongst men whereby we must be saved. It is obvious then that if any way of salvation is to open for these it must be in the fu-

The scriptures show over and over again that the people are to have their eternal interests well guarded. They are to have the chance to choose for themsedves whether they will have "life and good" or "death and svil"; tears are to be wiped away from off all faces. They are to sit every man under his own vine and fig tree with neither visible nor inwisible foes of any kind to molest their happiness. They are to dwell safely, and in confidence they are to have peace and quiet and assurance forever with all oppressors forever gone. They are to have the pure truth comfort for their past sorrows and everlasting joy and gladness for their future inheritance. They are to love their neighbours as themselves, to be protected from falling into er ror, to be instructed fully in the ways of righeousness, to understand the scriptures as one man, and together to see the proud abased the lowly exalted, the crooked things straightened out, and the rough places in life made smooth.

They are to be released from sickness. They are to have their sins forgiven. They are to see the Salvation of God. They are to be led up over the Highway of Holiness. They are to be made all righteous and they are to know the Lord from the least even unto the greatest. There is to be adoration of God in every heart; there are to be grander opportunities for worshiping Him than earth has ever yet seen. Goodness and prosperity are to be on every side and every knee is gladly to bow and every tongue is gladly to confess the love and mercy and power of God.

All these things are definitely promised in the scriptures as coming to the people in the age now opening up. The way for them is in process of preparation. The highway is in process of being cast up. We may even identify some of the stumbling plones that are being gathered out.

How hany honest men have stumbled here not being able to see how a God of nfinite wisdom could have planned to badly, nor how a Ged of love could have been so unloving Lor how a God of justice could have been so unjust as to consent to such an arrangement A great relief comes to these men now as they find that the scriptures countenance no such unwise, unjust and unloving plan. Now they find hat the words supposed to teach this convey no such thought and the paribles and dark sayings of our Lord supposed to sanction it all, all commg to be clearly understood and to save no such meaning.





In these experiments he found that if the amount of air normally inside the submerged part of a floating ves sel could be imprisoned, no matter how much water were then poured into the hull, it would not sink.

> In all the history of aviation there have been few more heroic figures than that of Lieut, R. S. Booth, daring young commander of the runaway R-33, the huge British dirigible that recently broke away from its mooringsing-mast at Pulham, England, His battered ship floundering helplessly in the teeth of a hurricane, he struggled along the top of the big bag, inspected the damage and directed repairs.

Two minutes after the R-33 had torn away the cup of her mooringmast, her engines were going and her crew of 21 men was heading her into the wind. For 30 hours, across the North Sea to Holland and back, they waged a desperate battle with the storm. Finally, after nerveracking adventures that recalled the experiences of the crew of the American airship, Shenandoah, when she broke away from her mast at Lakehurst, N.J., in January, 1924, the dirigible was brought safely home
