





Mayor Beaven's letter to the Attorney General, which we published in yesterday's issue, is characteristic of the man. The Attorney General wrote the Mayor of Vic toria a purely business letter; the Mayor's reply is a political manifesto. It is evident from the first line to the last of Mayor Beaven's letter, that it is intended for political effect. The letter should properly have been addressed to the electors of Victoria.

Like most political manifestos from the same source, Mr. Beaven's letter is full of inaccurate and misleading statements and inuendos, which are calculated to produce

false impressions.

In the second sentence of his letter, he says: "I have no doubt inconvenience will arise in consequence of the interference with municipal affairs of irresponsible persons." The Mayor, of course, wishes the readers of his letter to believe that irrespon sible persons have interfered in municipa affairs. But such has not been the case. There has been no irresponsible or unauthorized or unwarranted interference with municipal affairs. Every official who has taken part in the stamping out of the smallpox is responsible to either the municipality or the Government for the way in which he performs his duties. As we showed, yesterday, the law in certain contingencies authorises the Government to interfere in the health affairs of municipalities. The officials appointed by the Government in those contingencies cannot, therefore, with any approach to truth, be said to be "irresponsible."

Mr. Beaven asserts that "the Board of Health and the Finance Committee are quite competent to attend to their duties." The law of the land assumes that when there is reason to apprehend the invasion of any contagious disease the Local Board of Health are not competent to cope with it. It is then the duty of the Board of Health to place itself under the direction of the Health Officer appointed by the Government, and to carry out the Orders-in-Council. Has the Local Board of Health attended to its duty in this respect? Is it not because it refuses to co-operate with the Health Officer that the difficulty between it and the Governmenth as arisen? Hence, if, as you say, the city is prepared to pay the expenses incurred by it "in due course," it would have paid the bills, upon presentation, out of the general taxes and ordinary revenue, instead of (as has been done) putting the applicants off upon the protext of passing a \$75 000 to n by-law for health purposes, none of which loan, even if passed by the rate-payers, could legally be applied in payment of the smallpox bills, so far incurred.

The city having repudiated its health obligation, it has been deemed in the public interest that the Government should advance, and pay the bils. The money expended in so doing will the collected from the city, under the rules.
