Why Not Open Dufferin-Street? Editor World: Is a public improvement of this kind to be the abject of rival aldermen of the East and West End? The public has had enough of this sort of thing. The conduct of the chairman of the Works Committee on a recent occasion well settled that the railways have no right to block up this street, and that the railways or somebody else is liable for damages in the way of deterioration of property which have taken place, and which are being perpetuated by the present state of affairs.

The Queen-street subway business has been a muddle and a fraud from the beginning. It is high time that the whole thing was taken up in a proper spirit and definitely settled.

The progress of the West End of the city, dependent upon Queen-street for its highway, is very prejudicially affected, and the natural course of travel from the water-front and from Exhibition Park to the northwest part of the city and the townships is destroyed by the blocking of Dufferin-street. A visitor to the locality must be struck with the withering effect which the state of affairs has produced. It is not to the interest of any part of the city that this should be continued. The ratepayers of Ward No. 6 have our sympathy in their efforts to remedy the situation, and we trust that they will not cease the agitation which they have commenced, and that the rest of the city will rally to their aid. There is nothing harder than to get the aldermen to right a wrong. PROGRESS.



THE NEW ILLUMINANT.

EXPERIMENTS WITH ACETYLENE AND THEIR RESULTS.

A Product of Great Power—An Illuminating Gas of Great Value From an Economic Point of View—Passed Through Heated Tubes it Produces Benzol—T. L. Wilson's Astonishing Discovery.

The astonishing announcement was made at a recent meeting of the Society of Chemical Industry that a powerful illuminating gas could be manufactured by a newly-discovered method...

The new illuminant is called acetylene. It has been known to the chemists for years, but the difficulty of its manufacture prevented them from utilizing it.

It remained for T. L. Wilson to discover a means by which the gas could be produced in sufficient quantities for practical purposes.

The strange results which followed its contact with the water immediately attracted Mr. Wilson's attention.

Here Mr. Wilson became interested and immediately began his investigations. He repeated the experiment, and found that the substance he had cast into the bucket was a substance called Calcic Carbide, containing forty parts by weight of calcium and twenty-four parts by weight of carbon.

From an economic point of view, this gas is of great value, for it has been found that it can be generated in a house as it is needed by a very simple apparatus.

Perhaps the most remarkable quality of the gas is the fact that it can be liquefied by pressure, and put in cans that can be tapped when the gas is needed.

It has been proposed by promoters of the enterprise to do away with gas piping through the streets, for they say that lamps can be made containing the

can be generated and consumed on the spot. The method may be a solution to the car-lighting problem, to which the elevated and surface railroad authorities have devoted considerable attention of late.

Mr. Adam, of the Boston Gas Company, of Boston, says:—"The question of the greatest importance to gas manufacturers is as to whether acetylene can be used to increase the power of common coal gas."

The gas cannot only be obtained in the gaseous and liquefied states, but also as a solid. The latter is most likely to be used for when cast upon the surface of liquid mercury it had the effect of freezing that element to a solid mass.
