## TELEGRAPH ANALGAMA-TION.

On Saturday, last in the Superior Court On Saturday, last in the Superior Court, Montreal, Mr. Justice Pariszu deliv-ered jadgment on the application for an injenction fortidding the Montreal Telegraph Company to enter unto a con-tract with the Great North Western and Western Union companies. He granted the injunction. A meeting of the chare-bolders of the Company was held on Saturday, when the President, Sir House Attan, submitted a report, which re-viewed the recent negotiations which had resulted in the proposed amalgamation. Sir Hoon expressed himself two unable to the movement, provided legal difficulties could be cleared up, that the time of lease be reduced, that no rise in rates take place, that arrange ments be made for payment for stores, and that the securities be made estisfactory. The quarter's revenue is made up as follows: Customs, £4,587,000; excise, £2,865,000; stamps, £3,015,000; laud tax and house

tax, £2,005,000 , post office, £1,760,000 telegraph service, £405,000 ; Crown lands, £80,000; interest on advances £361,240, and miscellaneous, £1.157,728 Of these items the following show increases as compared with the quarter ended June 30th last year Customs, increase, £108,000, stamps, £100,000; land tax, etc. £20,000, property and income tax, £375,000, post office, £12,-000, interest on advances, £1,400 Three items oxhibit a decrease, viz. Excise, £425,000, telegraphs, £5,000, and miscellaneous, £54,670 Thus, the largest increase is in income tax; and the chief decrease is in excise. revenue for the year, which amounts to £85,181,198, as compared with that for the year ended June 30th, 1880, shows a net increase of £2,219,135




