CENTRAL BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

MERTING OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

LEGISLATIVE COJNOIL CHAMBER, }
Halifax, April 27th, 1882.

Present: David Matheson, President; I. Longworth, Truro; Hon. H. F. Macdougall, Christians Island; Col. W. E. Starratt, Paradise; Prof. Lawson, Sec'y.

The Secretary presented Prize Lists and Regulations, with relative communications, from secretaries of committees who had undertaken to carry out District Exhibitions, under the Provincial and District Exhibition Act of 1881, in the several agricultural districts of the Province, as follows:—

District No. 1—Counties of Halifax and Lunenburg. Exhibition proposed to be held at Lunenburg, from 3rd to 5th

District No. 2—King's, Annapolis and Queen's Counties. Two Exhibitions to be held in this district, in accordance with recommendation of Agricultural Committee approved by House of Assembly, viz., one Exhibition for King's and Annapolis, and one for Queen's County. The first proposed to be held at Annapolis Royal, 2nd to 5th October, and that for Queen's at Liverpool, 3rd to 5th October.

District No. 3—Counties of Digby, Shelburne and Yarmouth. Exhibition proposed to be held at Yarmouth, 11th to 13th October.

District No. 4—Counties of Hants, Colchester and Cumberland. Exhibition proposed to be held at Truro, 3rd to 6th October. District No. 5—Counties of Pictou, Antigonish and Guysborough. Exhibition proposed to be held at Antigonish, 10th to 12th October.

10th to 12th October.

District No. 6—Counties of Cape Breton, Richmond, Inverness and Victoria. Exhibition proposed to be held at North Sydney, 9th to 12th October.

Col. Blair, M.P.P., attended the meeting on behalf of District No. 4, being Chairman of the Exhibition Committee of that district.

The Prize List and Regulations of the Exhibition of District No. 4 were first taken up. Having been read and examined in detail several amendments upon the Regulations and additions to the Prize List were suggested and noted. This work occupied the Committee till one o'clock, when they adjourned.

2.30 P. M.

Business resumed. Present: Messrs. Matheson, Longworth, Macdougall, Starratt, Lawson.

Hon. H. F. Macdougall, M.P.P., read a letter from John R. Craig, Brampton, Ont., announcing the importation of thirteen superior Short Horn cattle, six bulls and seven cows, from the herd of the Rt. Hon. Lord Polwarth, Scotland, which have just passed quarantine, and recommending them to the attention of the Board.

The Secretary read a letter from Messrs. Creelman & Gunn, in reference to a proposed sale of thorough-bred cattle at Truro, respecting which explanations were given by Mr. Longworth, who un-

dertook to advise with the auctioneers on the subject.

On motion of Mr. Longworth,-

Rescleed, That, having examined the Prize List and Regulations of the District Exhibition proposed to be held at Truro for District No. 4, and made certain alterations thereon which meet with the approval of the Chairman of the District Committee, the Executive Committee of the Board approve of said Prize List and Regulations as now amended, and direct the same to be transmitted to the Hon. Provincial Secretary for submission to the Governor-in-Council for approval and sanction, in terms of the Act.

His Worship Mayor Fraser was introduced to the meeting, and invited the members of the Board to attend the presentation of the Address of the City Corporation to the Hon. Judge Jackson, U.S. Consul,—for which purpose they adjourned. Thereafter business was resumed, when the Prize List and Regulations of the Exhibition of District No. 6 were considered in detail. The Committee then a journed.

April 28th, 1882.

Business resumed at ten o'clock this morning. Same members present.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the Lunenburg Exhibition Committee, correcting a mistake in the date of the Exhibition in District No. 1.

The Committee proceeded to the examination of the Prize Lists and Regulations of District Exhibitions.

Moved by Col. Starratt, seconded by Mr. Longworth, and passed,—

That the Prize List and Regulations of the District Exhibition proposed to be held at

Annapolis, as now amended, be approved of, with the provise that the proportion of grant for such Exhibition shall be calculated for the section of two Counties only, in accordance with the arrangement for a separate Exhibition in Queen's, recommended by the Agricultural Committee, sanctioned by House of Assembly, and previously approved of by the Board.

The Prize List and Regulations being for a section of District No. 2 were directed to be sent to the Hon. Provincial Secretary, with special note of this modification, for sanction by His Honor the Governor-in-Council.

Moved by Mr. Longworth, seconded by Col. Starratt, and passed,—

That the Prize List and Regulations of the Exhibition Committee of District No. 1, of Exhibition to be held at Lunenburg, as amended, and with change of date, be approved of, and transmitted to the Hon. Provincial Secretary, for sanction by His Honor the Governor-in-Council.

Moved by Col. Starratt, seconded by Hcn. Mr. Macdougall, and passed,—

That the Prize List and Regulations of the Exhibition Committee of the proposed Liverpool Sectional District Exhibition of District No. 2, as modified, be approved of, with the proviso, that the proportion of grant for such Exhibition shall be calculated for one County only, as sanctioned by House of Assembly; further that said Prize List and Regulations be transmitted to the Hon. Provincial Secretary, for submission to His Honor the Governor-in-Council.

Moved by Col. Starmtt, seconded by Mr. Longworth, and passed,—

That the Prize List and Regulations of the Exhibition proposed to be held at Antigonish for District No. 5, as now amended, be approved of, and transmitted to the Hon. Provincial Secretary, for sanction by His Honor the Governor-in-Conneil.

The Hon. Mr. Macdougall moved,-

That the Prize List and Regulations of Exhibition at North Sydney for District No. 6, as now amended, be approved of, and transmitted to the Hon. Provincial Secretary, for sanction of His Honor the Governor-in-Council.

Seconded by Mr. Longworth, and passed.

Moved by Hon. Mr. Macdongall, seconded by Col. Starratt, and resolved,-

That the Prize List and Regulations of District Exhibition proposed to be held at Yarmouth by the Agricultural Society of that County, for District No. 3, as now amended, be approved, and transmitted to His Honor the Governor-in-Council for sanction.

The Legislative Grant of \$4000 will be appropriated in aid of District Ethibitions in accordance with the provisions of the Act, as follows:

Col. Starratt, Representative of District No. 2, gave notice of the formation of a new Agricultural Society in King's County.

Longworth, Representative of District No 4, gave notice of a new Agricultural Society in Cumberland (Mapleton).

A bill of expenses in connection with quarantining of cattle was submitted, examined, approved of, and authorised to be paid.

The Committee resolved to ask for an audience of the members of Government to present the Prize Lists and Regulations of District Exhibitions, to afford any necessary explanations thereof, and to bring under their notice the following matters which require prompt attention, and cannot well be delayed for a meeting of the full Board:

The Agricultural Committee of the House of Assembly, in their Report, "recommend that the Government empower the Central Board to pay from the Stock Farm fund the amount applied for as bonus on Horses imported during 1881, and in succeeding years to authorize the Board to pay an amount mot to exceed \$800 in any one year, on the purchase price of importations as recommended in the additional Report presented by this [House] Committee during the session of 1881; and the House Committee further recommend the Government to pass a bill, if necessary, to give effect to the above recommendation, and that regulations be provided.

Several applications for bonuses on Horses having been sent to the Board last year, and others during the present season, the Board are desirous of receiving instructions from, and sanction of, the Government, to enable them to take effective measures to carry out the views of the Assembly's Committee, so far as the Covernment may deem it proper to do 4) at the present time. The balance of 'ne Stock Farm fund not being available for the purpose of paying bonuses at present, in consequence of the stock last imported having been sold on endorsed notes, an advance by the Government will be required to meet the payment of such bonuses on Horses as may be authorThe Legislative Assembly's Committee in view of "a very urgent want of improvement on our flocks of sheep, which "cannot be supplied without importation," recommend that grants be made to each "Society or Societies in each District as "may subscribe and pay up a fund for making such importation. That these "grants shall be 50 per cent. of the "amounts so paid up, providing however," that no district shall receive more than "one hundred dollars for each county "contained therein;" and "that a special "grant not to exceed \$1800 Le made."

The Board having received enquiries in regard to this recommendation, the Executive Committee respectfully request instructions or information from the Government as to what steps are to be taken to give it effect.

The remarkable success of the recent sale of Polled Angus Cattle, and the enquiries subsequently received by the Board for more, have shown that this breed is already highly appreciated in the Province, and the Board would have naturally asked the Government to authorise another importation, but for the recommendation of the Agricultural Committee of the House of Assembly, who reported: "We recommend strongly that "the Central Board be not allowed to "make any further importation of stock."

The desire for an additional importation of Polled Augus Cattle this season is so great that one gentleman (a purchaser at the recent sale) has offered to personally share with the Board the financial responsibility, to the extent of one thousand dollars, of another importa-As the arrangement, if entered into, will greatly lessen the risk to the Province, and as the altered circumstances are such as were probably not forseen when the Committee's Report was made, the Board would respectfully request the Government to consider the propriety of authorising the Board to make a joint importation without delay, in terms of the offer made by hon. W. J. Stairs, and to advance to the Board a sum of \$2000 or \$3000 for this purpose, to be repaid from the sale of the stock, minus the rateable proportion of loss, if any.

JERSEY STOCK.

This breed of cattle is growing deservedly popular in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and our farmers and breeders, who have hitherto rather neglected them, are beginning to discover the true merits of this really profitable stock. For years past the Jersey has been successfully bred in Ontario and Quebec, and, as far as Nova Scotia is concerned, the County of Yarmouth has brought out a goodly number of remarkably fine animals. Several small, but very nice herds may be found scattered throughout Nova Scotia, but the matter of systematic breeding from the best of block, with a view to producing excellence in quality, does not seem to have occurred the earnest attention of our agricultural societies and individual farmers that it should have done. However, the Jersey exhibit at the Dominion Exhibition held in Halifax last autumn was sufficient to convince even a casual observer, much more an experienced eye, that points both of beauty and value are to be obtained by a little ordinary care and good judgment. It is no more difficult or expensive to raise a pure bred Jersey heifer, worth from eighty to a hundred and forty dollars at a year old, than it is to raise a scrub animal worth perhaps from twenty-

of its life. Jersey cattle, as a rule, are exceedingly tractable and gentle, mature early in life, and remain vigorous breeders until quite late.

The three prominent herds in Nova Scotic are owned by C. E. Brown of Yarmouth, E. Blanchard of Truro, and G. W. Boggs of Bedford, and in these herds may be seen as fine stock as can be found anywhere. In the March number of the Farmer's Advocate, in an article entitled "The Jersey in the United States and Canada," several remarkable cows are mentioned, such as "Eurotas,"
"Jersey Belle of Scituate," "Couch,"
"Lily," &c., whose fame is vorld-wide;
also "Marjoram," lately owned by Mr.
R. H. Stephens, of St. Lambert, P. Q., a sixteen pound cow, the dam of "Stoke Pogis 3rd," whose excellent blood is so thoroughly impregnated in nearly all the Jerseys owned by Mr. Boggs of Bedford. As soon as our farmers begin to see why Jersey cows are the most profitable cows they can handle, much greater attention will be attracted towards them, and justly too, for generally speaking, their cream is all butter, and their butter is all gold. A very good evidence of the estimation in which the pure blooded Jersey is held in the United States, is the fact that the Hord Register, established only a very tew years ago, numbers now (in females)

and in males, well up towards that point. It is evident that at no very distant day the Jersey will be, in Nova Scotia, the Dairyman's cow.

MR. R. W. STARR, Starr's Point, Cornwallis, has some very fine pure Berkshire Pigs, including two six months old Boars, and a splendid litter of eight dropped 1st April, which he will all. The sow is out of Dr. Hamilton's sow by into Rev. H. P. Almon's boar. The boar, sire of the above-mentioned litter, was got in St. John, Oct., 1880, from Mr. Burpee, Sunbury. The sire and data have both taken firsts.

Our columns to-day contain many instructive communications on the subject of Agricultural Education; and they could not be better filled. It is generally recognised by enlightened persons that the future of farming depends in no small degree on the better education of both farmers and their labourers. American farming enjoys the great advantage of an unexhausted soil and freedom from many srammels-such, e. g., as extortionate landlords !--yet America, with all its boasted chances, is more eager for education than any other country. The best educational institutions of the agricultural kind are in the United States. five to fifty dollars at the very best time considerably above thirteen thousand, The next best are said to be in Ireland.

England, to say the least, is awakening to the necessity for better agricultural education; while Scotland, the pioneer of so many enterprises and the country whose boast has been "high education and "plain living" -- small means being often associated with culture-Scotland alone, judging from the reports of various committees of the Highland Society at its recent annual meeting, seems for the moment to despond.

In the report of the Special Committee on Scientific Education, which was read at that meeting, the active steps that had been taken by the Committeenredescribed. Among other things, they had submitted to the farmers of Scotland a number of questions on the practical method by which the spread of education might be secured, asking a number of particular questions on points of very great interest and importance, and inviting general suggestions in addition. It is surprising that efforts of this kind should have met with such a cold reception. Among the questions were several relating to experiments which the Committee rightly thought might be instituted and placed under properly qualified management.

Nothing is more desirable at the present time than the better training and teaching of every class of farmers, small and large, stock farmers, corn growers, graziers, flockmasters, and all others, in the use and comparative value of different kinds of fertilizers and feeding stuffs. These are the raw materials of agricultural produce, and, we do not hesitate to add, that few of us understand the best methods of working up these materials into the most saleable products. All who read the papers, pamphlets, and lectures by which Mr. Lawes has long endeavoured to impart his knowledge to others, have observed that he places a higher value on the manure derived from the consumption of decorticated cotton cake than on that from linseed cake. His opinion, founded on analysis, might be tested by a few simple trials on any farm, with little or no expense; and similar knowledge, of the greatest practical im portance, in reference to the value of other feeding stuffs-maize, barley, wheat, &c .- and in reference to the value of the residuum of each, might be as easily acquired.

At the same meeting where this surprising indifference appeared in a race so shrewd as our neighbours beyond the Tweed have usually shown themselves to bo, the need for field trials, "experimental stations," and scientific education, was asserted in the most striking manmer by a report from another of the Highland Society's Committees. Society contributes \$1250 annually towards the expenses incurred by the analytical associations of Scotland in the

analysis of manures and feeding stuffs, and the result has been that trandulent manures and foods have been shown up in Scotland, as they have been frequently in England by the prosecutions undertaken by the Royal Agricultural Society. No one can deny the practical utility of arresting the sale of manues that are offered on the market and largely sold at several pounds per ton more than their value. Even in that highly educated country there are numbers of farmers too ignorant to avail themselves of analysis, or even to confine themselves to those very many respectable merchants in whose hands they would be perfectly safe. -London Agricultural Gazette.

THE results of the sale of Polled Augus Cattle imported by the Board under authority of the Provincial Government, showed unmistakably that the Board had correctly guaged public opinion and the real wants of the country in undertaking the importation. Since the sale, additional pooof of this has been afforded by an offer to purchase more animals of the same kind at the same rates, if the Board will import them. The Board, however, has no authority to import at present.
