- An Ontario country merchant in renewing his subscription is moved to utter so genuine a complaint against the Grange system, and describes so well its operation, that we are glad to quote his letter entire, as follows: "Enclosed please find my subscription for current year. It would have been sent before but business here has not got the 'boom' that other places are claiming to have. The fact is that 'cash stores' are more injured by the Grange lodges than 'credit stores' are. The Grangers appear to absorb all the cash customers, and no matter how low goods may be offered the Grange still draws them. At the same time I belicve the Grangers are imposed upon by their ngents. They can buy sugars and some few staples under the regtilar wholesale prices, while the price is piled on to other artioles, of which they have not a business knowledge, either as to quality or price. One year since 1 was doing a good fiuir trade; profits were small and expenses light, but I was making something. Since that lime tro

Granges lave been organized in this township, each une abont three miles distant in different directions, and now a third one is to open about one mile distant. The two ilready organized have taken all my best customers, so that I have not much to fear from a third. But it does seem hardly fair to have to compete with people that pay neither rent, nor thes, freight or insurance, clerical belp or advortising bills-but they are not usually long-lived, and I suppose we must wait patiently until they die a natural death." Our correspondent is evidently a phitosopher, and we like the grim humor of his reference to a third Grange about to state in his locality. The point to whieh wo wond direct special attention is that the business of the Granges is ever likely to jrove unprotitable to the farmers through the ridvantage taken of the ignorance of agents with regard to special lines of goods. The fict that the Granges are habitually short-liyed is the true gutgrowth of

## THE BYSTANDER.

## National polick.

We are greatly mistaken if the ministerial readers of The Bystander's remarls on the National Policy have not more than once exclaimed with some bitterness, save us from our friends. Under the caption of "National Policy" the learned essayist has noticed a great variety of subjects, including National Currency, A Future Nation, Evils of Taxation, Protection and Free Trade, Peace and Good-will among Nations, Imperial Aggrandizement, A Comparison between Sir Leonard Tilley and the Caliph Faroun Alraschid, Complaints of Increased Taxation, Commercial Union with the United States, Reciprocity, Hardship of the Tariff, Sir Alexander Galt's Mission, Imperialism, the Delegation of Farmers, the North-West Territory, British Columbia and the Pacific Kailway, Sir John Macdonald's unfortunate election for Victoria, Impatience of West Joronto to open her arms to Sir John. It must be borne in mind that The Bystander writes on these various subjects " under protest," having long since made a forecast that the United States must no longer be treated commercially as a foreign nation. How long it would
be possible to maintain commercial union and political disunion we are not specitically told on this occasion, but we have already had forecasts enough on that subject. We are assured by "the Bystander that any hope of reciprocity " will prove unfounded." On the same high authority we are told that to a measure "such as "would abolish the customs line and "constitute a commercial union we belicoe "the people of the United States are "perfectly ready to accede." It might reasonably be expected that some reason would be given for a belief on the faith of which we are invited to take a most important step. We have already had experience that the negotiation of a treaty with the Executive Government of the United States is no security for its adoption, but we apprehend that the mere belief of The Bystander would be a still worse security. But let us, merely for the sake of argument, assume that we could obtain commercial union, which is 'lhe Bystander's panacea for all our evils, and what would be the consequence? He has told us elsewhere that "every increase of taxation is an evil," and he camnot be ignorant of the enommous taxation of the United States. If he will only refer to Maclean's 'Marif' liand Book, he will find that the duties on some des. criptions of cotton goods, are 50,50 and 60 per cent. ; on iron manufactures, 35,45 and 50 per cent.; on silks and velvets, 60 per cent.; on woollens, 60 , 65 and 65 per cent. The prosperity of our manufacturers is to be assured by exposing them to the competition of a country in which " manufactures are now highly specialized, "and without a large markel they cannot. "succeed, while some are so costly and "scientific that only a great and wealthy "country can be their seat." Canadi, it is said, camnot produce "high-class printing presses," but, if she were under a commercial union, she would probably not produce low class, and little of any other manufacture.

## NATLONAL Curmencr.

We own that we are not very clear as to the precise inference to be drawn from The Bystander's remarks on the "national currency." It may be his illea that the national policy has been played out, and that a new cry is desimble: What else can be the meaning of the passage: "it "is probable that, if mother general elee"tion were held now, the lesson would be "read again, for the national currency " movement would certainly excreise an "influence; some think it might even "turn the scale?" Has, then, the scale already turned reversely since the day when the people "forsook in great num-
"bers party allegiance to vote for their "material interests?" Surely if the people think as they did when "the national policy swept the country" thero is no occasion for a national currency movement to turn the scalo; but we learn that The Bystander is of opinion that inconvertible paper money is a measure the object of which is "the material interests of the people!"

## a Namon.

We shall quote the short but pithy notice of the future nation in full. "Na"tional is at all events the adjective cor"responding to nation ; and if the trea. "son-axe can cut between the adjective "aud substantive the edge must be very " keen." So much for the name " national policy" adopted by the ministerialists.

## bevis of taxation.

We have already noticed the complaint of the duty on "high-class printing presses." What is snid of coal is very much what the Globe has been telling The Bystander for months ; and, although there is a good deal of truth in it, the ministry will not the less cry out, save us from our friends. The coal tax to Ontario "is an "unmixed evil, and is not unlikely to "prove fatal to the whole arrangement."
protegtiox ayd prie trade.
The leamed essayisi declares that the people of England "are not free traders themselves." If the meaning of the term free trade be a complete exemption from customs duties, of course they are not, but if it simply means duties which are not protective of domestic industries, then free trade has been carried into complete effect. There is no such thing known in England as a consumer paying for any article that he may wish to purchase more than its cost price, with the duty, which goes into the treasury. When The Bystander complains of the taxes levied under the present tariff on coal, for example, he means that all the consumers of coal are made to pay a duty, so as to enhance the price for the benefit of the colliers of Nova Scotia. That is the result of protection. There is no duty levied in England which has a similar effect. Of the six principal articles of import five are free of duty, and the sixth, tei, not being produced in England, is not protective. As to the comparative merits of direct taxation and a revenue raised by customs and excise duties much might be said, but the discussion would be fruitless.
peace and good-will among nations.
This subject is only noticed to call attention to the rancorous anti-British
feeling of The Bystander, which is manifested on every page of his essay. "Nothing will keep the world right but righteousness," and " let righteousness prevail in the councils of England," are sentiments which a British subject might be expected to furnish mather to other mations than to his own, especially as his own is precisely the one which least requites such alvice.

This suiject was fully treatel in our last issue, for the aceusation is founded solely on the interference of the Imperial (sovermment in our public works ; and, if the charge were really as true tis it is the reverse, the chiel blame would rest on our own ministers and our own Parliament.

The liystander admits that Sir Leomand Tilley "has been very properly making a tour of commertial inspection," but we are told that the Cali,h "made his tour of inspection in disguise," from which the obvious inference is that Sir Leomar should have done thkewise.

## ste Absxavomet gatars misums.

It is admitted that Sir Alexander (and " lias been distinguisbed as a champion of "anadian self-govermment," but so little eonfidence does the Bystander repose in bim that there may be "need of " watchfuincss to prevent Camadian ques"tions being settled in the purliens of "Downing street. And this because "the chiefs of our govemment have been "drinking [mperialism at the fountain."
We candidly confess that we are ignorant of the precise meaning of the term " Imperialism," as applied to Inglish politics. It is, we believe, synongmous with "Jingoism," and we are clsewhere told that the late Ioln Arthur Roebuck was an "Ulter Jingo," and that Sheftield is "an outpost of Jingoism in the North." We are unaware of any attempt to change the constitution of Great Batitin and Ireland, and we have alwas maderstood that "Imperialism" was a system of govermment adopted in dependencies of the Empire, in which the people were not fit for selfgovemment. The late Lord Macaulay was the most eloguent advocate of haperiatism that we are aware of.

## 

We frankly acknowledge that if we held the Bystanter's views as to the manifest destiny of Camada we should sub. scribe to all he has said about our Westen Provinces. It would be unprofitable and wholly useless to discuss our policy regarding those territories with one who not only believes that the whole Domin-
ion will be absorbed in the neighboring republic, but who does not believe that the North-West, "when it is out of leading strings," will continue its connection with us. Jt is satisfactory to have an admission that it was "a happy day in our "anuals" when the remresentatives of English famers came to see Canada.

## sif some mamoxato and meroma.

The paragraph on this subject is the unkindest cut of all. British Columbia " is not yet momally in the Confederation." She is treating Canala "as an alverse "party, whom she is trying to hold to the "terms of a ruinons bargain," and it is consequently "unfortumate," that the Prime Minister should sit for a constituency in sucha Province. Considering that "the rumous bargain" has been matified by I'arliament, and that the leaders of both the political parties are pledged to carry it out, and moreover considering that British Columbia is represented in the Dominion Parliament, we fail to comprehend what process is to be adopted in orter to bring her "morally" into the Confederation. However, The Bystander has mate the notable discovery that Sir Johm Macdonali's constitueney is "not only in the "moons," but "it is in the domain of the "plainefl in a suit for a prodigious sum "in which we are the defendants." It is no wonder that The Bystander wants Sir John in West Toronto, but we may be permitted to doubt whether that constituency would be a lamworth or a Tiverton "or the safest and quietest" that couk be found.

## TILE FARMERS AND THE LOAN socherles.

The fable of the boy and the nuts illustrates the present condition of a great many of the farmers of Ontario in thoir relation to the Lom Societies. The existence of these institutions, while largely promoting the agricultural development of the country, has of late years tempted the farmers beyond their usual prudence. Everyboly knows the farmer's disposition to regard a long time debt as no debt at all, a happy condition which, however, he shares here and there with the mercantile classes, and the Loan Society is extremely lenient in this respect-as long as he pays the interest.

The state of aftiars among a large number of Ontario farmers to day is far from encouraging. In their greed for more land, through areless habits, or extravagance, they have placed themselves in the condition simply of tenants on their own farms. The man who borrows $\$ 2,000$ from the Loan Society, or from
some prudent, thrifty neighbor (the nucleus of a future Loan Company) is simply paying a fair rent, in the shape of interest, for his farm, and he has examples in plenty to prove that cases are not frequent where it has been found possible to save much money on rented farms; or in case of incumbrance, where there has been much laid by as a sinking fund towards the payment of the principal due the Loan Society. Not only this; overy country storekeeper knows how difficult it is even in seasous of fair crops to collect his account from owners of farms thus encumbered, who must first of all provide for the payment of interest.

Under such circumstances it requires litile foresight to predict the future of the agricultural classes in Ontario. The tendency is slowly but.surely towards large holdings, and a system of farm rents which becomes more threatening every year according as the land is deprived of its original strength and fertility. The winter seasons are also becoming less and less profitable to the farmer according as the country becomes clearod of wood. In former years he found employment in preparing and hauling wood or logs for market or mill, and in that manner often realized more than from his crops; now this source of revenue is almost entirely gone, and he deems himself fortmate if he has preserved sufficient wood for domestic use.

Instead of adding to his acreage it were much better for the firmer who is in debl to the Loan Society to dispose of part of what he already holds and pay of his mortgage. By devoting his exclusive attention to what he may safely call his own, he can realize more than is now possible with such a yearly load of interest to pay, besides being free from the danger of los. ing all in the end. The covotous boy, who, huving put his hand into the jar containing nuts, could not withdraw a whole handful, fainly illustrates the case of many of our Ontario farmers, who by grasping at too much may lose all.

## TIIE BOARD OF TRADE.

We noticed in our last number that the annual meeting of the Board of Trade was held on the 13 th inst. The President, Mr. Ilenry Iyman, delivered an interestingaddress in which he noticed some of the principal events that have occurred since the organization of the society, fifty.two years ago. Among the subjects to which the President thought the attention of Parliament should be directed was the system of banking; and he intimated an opinion that the American system was
worthy of commendation as supplying a currevey which passes at par throughout the republic, and which is guaranteed by the Govermment.

The currency question will, in all probability, engage the consideration of Parliament during the next session, but Mr. Lyman does not seem, so fir as we could judge from his remarks, to have given a thoughtful consideration to the subject. 'Lhe currency question must be considered from two points of view, vi\%, what is theoretically right, and what is practicable. When the Americansystem was inaugumted, the Government was in urgem distress, and to create a maket for its bonds it procured the passage of a law unter which banks might obtain notes guaranteed by (iovernment on the deposit of bonds. At present all the national notes are secured by Government bonds, and we admit that the security is preferable to unsecured bank issues. What, however, we maintain is this, that, if it be admitted that Government bonds must be held as security for all the notes, which are required by the public to transact their ordinary business, then the prolit of the circulation should go to the public, and not to the banks. A part from the principle, which; hovever, seems perfectly sound, it is much better that there should be one carrency than the issues of a number of banks. We maintain that, if it be once admitted that the paper currency shoukd be secured by londs of the Govermment, it should be issued by the Govermment and for the benefit of the public. Theoretically we consider that the very best possible praper currency is a Government issue redeemable in gold on demand.
There are, however, practical dilliculties in the way, which we should have thought would have occurred to such an experienced business man as Mr. Jyman. The liabilities of the banks at the present time for circulation are very large. Let us, for our present purpose, assume them at fifteen millions of dollars, exclusive of the gold or Dominion notes held for their re demption. The assets held against these liabilities are bills discounted, and, if the notes were called in and new ones issued, based on government securities, whether issued by the Governmsit direct, or through the medium of the banks, as Mr. lyman proposes, the banks wotild have to enforce prompt payment of the fifteen millions of dollars, which we have assumed as the present issue. The consequence to the debtors of the banks, it is needless to observe, would be most disastrons, and yet we have not noticed in any of the articles, in which the subject has been discussed, that the practical difficulty that
we have just noliced has been even considered.

Mr . Menshaw bronglat up the subject of the port charges, which he treated with great ability. IIs remarks on towage and pilotage deserve all possible consideration. The St. Lawrence improvements have always been a troublesome question to deal with, and it is one, we fear, on which it will be diffealt to secure a concurrence of opinion between Montreal and Quebec.

With regard to lieciprocal Free Trade we must leave the suhject in the Inands of Congress. After the atter failure of the latst negotiation in 1874 it would be worse than useless to make any fresh attempt until the time comes for the renewal of the fishery treaty which is not far distant. "ihere were somo other subjects noticed at the mecting to which we may take other opportumities of directing attention.
Since writing the foregoing the adjouned meeting has taken place, and shall receive attention in our next issue.

## TITE POLTICAL IECONOMY CLUR.

This society has held another meeting, and although the reports of the diseussion, which took place after the dinner, which, accorling to Paris usage, preceded it, nre very meagre, we have derived sulficient information from them to enable us to hazard an opinion, although we confess that we do so with fear and trembling. The number present, so far as we can judge, was under fifty, and there was one sulyect on which there secms to have been nerfect unasimity, vi\%, the right of free discussion. One would imagine, after reading the remarks of the various speakers, that some proposition had been made to stifie discassion; or at least to send Govermment reporters to note down every treasonable expression that should fall from the openly avowed advocates of separation from the Crown of Great Britain. That there are members of the club, who hold views inconsistent with their allegiance, is as notorious as that there are others who would repudiate such views. Unfortumately for the clab, its chief promoter had recently paid a visit to Washington, aecredited by himself to amounce to members of Congress that an important demonstration against Britisli comection was abont to be made. There is no mystery about the name of this agent, who has announced through the press that he is about to publish a monthly review, devoted to Canadian emancipation. Surrombing the advertisement are the mottoes: "The Dominion of Canada has all the elements of
national greatness, -let us be a free poople," "Canada expects every man to do his duty," "The commercial union of Canada with the United States means everlasting peace and prosperity." Mr. Joseph Permult, the gentleman designated, is either the founder of the Political Economy Club, or the joint founder wilh the Rev. Mr. Bray, and they and their lel-low-members appen to be vory indignant that any one should presume even to criticise their utterances.

It is really not a littlo amusing to find these gentlemen, some of whom make no secret whaterer of their disloyalty to the Crown, complaining that they are denied the right of frec discussion. As they ons and all, loyal and disloyal, harped upon the same string, and as there has not been a single suggestion marle that their meetings should be interfered with, or their liberty of speech enrtailed, we can draw no other conclusion than that theso liberals par excellence really desire to muzale the press and tosilence all those whomay happen to diappprove of their proceedings. We regret very much that the political jourmals on both sides have endeavored to fasten a certain smount of respousibility on the recognized political parties for the conduct of members of the club, on ancount of their former political leanings. We are, moreover, quite ready to admil that there wns at first some mis. understanling as to the object of the chab, which arose from the Jnown proclivities of Mr. Permalt and others. The first subject for cliscussion was one on which r wille difference of opinion exists among men who are thoroughly loyal to the Crown, and the stme remarlimay be made regarding other sulujects which have been mentioned in the programme. How far it is wise for gentlemen, who are themselves thoroughly loyal, to join a chab in which questions involving separation from the Crown of Great Britain are to be discussed is a question which we are quite willing to leave to their own judgment, and we shall simply exereise our right to criticiso freely the sentiments expressed by individual members, recognizing the justice of Mr. Kerr's cham that the club should not be held responsible for the opinions of the individual members.

We must confess that we take exception to the title of the club. Wo hesitate to express any opinion as to what viev France, since its last revolution, may tako of the science of political economy, but wo are still living untler the Bricish Crown, and words have a known signification which we naturally ascribe to them. Writerson political economy profess to investignte the nature of wealth and the laws of its
production and distribution. An eminent writer on the subject, Mr. Macculloch, has dwelt on the distinction between enquiries on this subject and those on the creed and laws of a people, which, he says, "are essentially difterent, and have never "been supposed to be otherwise." The misnomer may have taken in others, as well as Mr. Bouthillier, bot now that it is understood that the chief object of the Political Economy Club is to discuss sub. jects which would never be taught by a professor of the science, the tille can do no great harm.

After the members had exhansted the subject on which they were all of one mind, viz, the presumption of the press in venturing to criticise their proceedings, they took up the question of the day, viz., legislative union, and, as might have been expected, there were wide differences of opinion. Mrr. Jos. Pervantt is not reported as having taken part in the discussion, indeed nothing ean be more absumd than the idea of the adrocates of amexation taking part in a discussion as to whether the Provincial Legislatures otight to be abolished or not. The Canitdian Spectator, whose editor is a prominent member of the club, annomees that "only "fow "members" of the forty odl "appear to "have such ideas mained and realy for "public utterance; " but he proeeds to declare that "there is a feeling of tissa"tisfaction abroad, and what the end will "be no one can mecisely tell," and then asks, "is it a determined amb settled Bri"tish connection?" Mr. Permult must have laughed in his sleeve as he fistened to the discussion regarding legislative union, and to the difference of opinion between Mr. Kerr and Mr. 'Trenholme on one side, and Mr. David and Mr. 'Tremblay on the other, satisfied as he was that he had his own " ideas matured and ready for public utterance." Wa shall keep our eye on this socicty or club, and shall not be deterred by any abuse its members many hurl against the press, from vindicat. ing its privileges to criticise freely those who engage in stich diseussions as have been promised in the programme.

## IUMBER TRADE REVITEW FOR 1 STG.

## (From Messrs. Corbray y, Routh's lichurt).

The year 1879 opened with the gloomiest prospects. Stocks af manufticturing and consuming points were larger than the year previous; intense depression in trade was well-nigh universal, and falling prices, even from the extreme low rates then prevailing, was the constant record of new business. Reaction had been looked for confidently through three seasons past,
but, as year after year each one appeared more depressed than its immediate predecessor, manufacturers began almost to doubt whether there would ever be a return of genuine activity. So often had hopes and speculations for a rise proverl abortive that $3 \$ 79$ found all thoroughly tired of looking forward for any such change, but rearly to sell without bargaining to the first found purchnser ; indeed, during the first half of the yeur sales on any terns were most diffcult to effect. During this period not a few buyers from the United States appeared in the market, but, habituated to having their own way, they took advantage of the situation to make ruinously low offers on the independent principle of take it or leave it, and these were, so to speak, always accepted. In England, except for sorting-up lots, sacrificed lots, or that which was virtually about the same thing, consignment lots, there was practically no market.

Towards the latter part of the summer the recovery of trade in the United States began to send on more urgent buyers. Quality now seemed not so much an object as quantity, and not infrequently, in order to decide a transacion, an advance on previous quotations would be volum. tarily offered. Manufachurers in turn were not slow to take advantage of the changed situation, and introluced further advances which hat to be paid to move stocks in the fall. Quebec houses also showed willingmess to buy for shipment, though at about old prices. In time pretty much everything in timber and deals was picked up, so that now but little either in deals or sawn lumber is in manufacturers' hands. 'The guantity of deals, both pine and spruce, at Quebec is estimated about hall an average stock.
Square timber in first hands is reckoned about one-tenth the usual anmual protuction, white the new supply is pliced at about one-lifth the ordinary cai. The entire stock at Quebec is heary-about two years' supply, if counted in feet-but is largely common and old, having remained in the coves for two years or more.
The year closes with great animation, lively competition amongst all classes of buyers, strong and advancing prices. The English market it asust be admitted seems slow to recognize the change that has taken place and rightly apprecinte the new position, but they are to this " manner hown" and are proverbial for waiting mtil the last moment, when stocks are nemly exhausted, and then rushing in blindly to secure a share.
The cut of pine logs for 1880 is heavy. Prices must determine whether it is destined for the English or American
markets. The shipments of pille deals wero rather larger than the previous year, owing to heary stock wintering over, from 1878, but all passed out of manufacturers, hands at $\$ 80$ to $\$ 85$, and $\$ 50$ to $\$ 55$, and $\$ 23$ to $\$ 27$, according to clanacter and specification, pei Quebee standard (2,750 feet, B. M.) for fizt, second and third gualities respectively. Sales have already been made fixing present prices for new cuts at about \$100, $\$ 67$ and $\$ 33$. Pine boards did well towards the fall, ohanging hands quite freely and inducing no lithle excitement amongst United States buyers to secure all they could before the close of navigation.

The cat of spruce lags will be rather less than an average, though considerably larger than for 187 S . Spruce dials, which have ranged from $\$ 30$ to $\$ 33,510$ to $\$ 20$, and $\$ 16$ to $\$ 18$ for the three qualities respectively, have been contracted for ont of the new cutat $\$ 34$ to $\$ 36,525$ to 807 , and $\$ 18$ to $\$ 20$. There was a special flumy in spunce boards in the frll, owing to eager and continued American huying, the effect of which was that in October fourth quality and culle sold at the sime prices realized for good stooks in August, namely, \$6 to $\$ 6.50$ per thousand feet, B.M. Mem lock, though plentiful and cheap, and for some uses superior either to pine or spruce, is much neglected.

We append a table of the exports from the St. lawrence for three years past, by which comparison may be made at a glance, and also a statement of spring amd fall freight rates for 1870, essential to an understanding of the year's business.


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## COMMERCLAL IRAVELLERS.

There are nearly two thousnnd commercial travellers in Canacaregisteredasmem. bers of the associations in Montreal and Toronto. Besides these there are a great many travellers from the United States and Great Britain who visil our wholesale merchants, although occasionally some of these, after supplying the jobber, will call upon the large retailer also, and sell him at the same price. With such a large amy in the field attacking the retailer on every side, mearly all the year round, it is scarcely to be wondered at that the patience of the expected buyer should sometimes give way, and that the traveller should occasionally have his card rudely flung at him by the merchant whose time has perhaps been occupied during the greater part of every day for a week past looking at samples, or whose orders have alleady been sent in.

At a recent meeting of the association in this city muel stress was laid by ore of the speakers (already referred to in a recent issue) upon the desirability of a general feeling of brotherhood among the members. Those who have met in one small town a half dozen brother members in the same line, staying at the same hotel, all intent upon selling the same one or two good firms in the place, know how often this feeling is brought into requisition. No one but a traveller knows anything of the shifts and efforts to do their best for their employers combined with a gentlemanly forbearance towards a competitor, which they are obliged to study and putinto frequent practice. The successful traveller must be possessed in no ordinary degree of goodness of hemrt, tuct and a gentlemanly demeanor, Tho man who does not possess these qualities, however energetic he may be, had better stay at home. We remember hearing a prominent wholesale merchant, one who had been himself a successful thaveller, say; "Show me the man who is discourteous to all except customers, and rest assured he is still suffering from the shabs he received in former days himself when on the road." Those who know most of these future merchants of Canada will never treat them with discourtesy. Their efforts to please their employers, to excel in their calling, should be nlways remem-
hered by those they visit, and if they cannot always treat them to an "order," they can at least always treat them with that courtesy which has well been said to be the cheapest exercise of virtue,--it costs even less than rudeness.

Wembrs and Meashmes Regumations.-The following new regulations concerning the inspection of weights and measares, in addition to the regulations established by the Urder-inGouncil of $I 4$ th of Augist last, bave been untroidably crowded out of our late isanes:
E. Verification and stamping of weights, mensures and weighing machines on he premises of the mandacturer and their removal therefrom.

1st. For the first verification and stamping of weights, measures and weighing machincs at the phace where they are mannhermed, the fees may be paid at once or payment may be prasiponed at the option of the mannfacturer on the following conditions:-
(a.) The article shall bear the name of the maker and a consecutive "shop namber" or wher marks whereby it may be desighated for identifintion with the eerificate of veriticatLioni;
(b.) The rerification and stamping may take phate before the articles are packed for removat, and at that state of completon at which they are finally adjusted by the manafictarer or at such future time as may be convenient;
(c.) If the manufactirer piys the tees at once, the ordinary black stamp expressing the tomotht of strelt fees is to be aifived to the eertiliente of rerification, and such certificate must he $1^{\text {mecked }}$ with, or otherwise attached to the article to which it relates so as to accompany it;
(d.) If the manuticturer elects to postpone the piament of the lees, a special red stamp ja to be atuehed to the curtificate of verifieation umon which the nmount of fees will not be stated, but the amount will be stated in the certiticate as usual. Thisecertificate must also be packed with or attached to the artiche to which it relates so as to accompany it;
(e.) When articles verified and stimped as above provided are packed, the packatges contatining them must bear on the outside-
(1) a duplicate of the "shop number" or olher mark by which the noticle contained in it is identified.
(2) The Words "Fees paid" or "lees unpaid" as the case may les.
2. Aricles veritied and stamped as above provided may be taken tor use ia trade or may pass from the premises of the manufitcturer to the premises of deaters in such articles or from the premises of one dealer in such articies to the gremises of another, lut:-
3. Sieh articles as are accompanied by a certilieate bearing a red stamp, or which are not accompanied by noy centifate wherein they are itentitied, will he subject to reveritication and to the pmyment of fees on the dirst ocension on which they are found in use for trade purposes by an finquectur or Inspector's assistant.
4. When in manutacturer of weights, measures or weighing minchines desires to remove any of the products of his manufactory to the premises of nuy deater in such artiches without summitting ihem for veritication, he may do so on the following combitions:
(a.) They shall lear the name of the naker and at consecative "shop number," or some other matks by which the articles may be adentitied;
(b.) If packed, the prehage shall bear the shop number or other marks by which the articles many be dentified, the name of the manufacturer and the word "tminspected;"
(c.) The manafictiver shall nutity the fnspector of the division from which the uninspected articles ure sent, of such removal on $a$ form which will be suppied by the depariment.
F. Weights, measures and weighing machines
imported into Cinada are to be deall with as follows:-

1. The Collector of Customs at the ports where such :erticles are innored will notify the nenrest Inspector or Assistant laspector of weights and measures of the enter for consumption of any weights, measturs, or weighing machines at his port, whel notice will stite the nimber atad deseriguion of such ariches as int roiced, and the manes and residence of the

2 . So loug as such weticles remetn in the original packitres they may be removed from the Custom house or trom a Unswoms warehouse to the premises of the importer, and from the promises of one dealer in suchartieles to we premises of another without inspection, on the tollowing conditions:
(a) When any such goods are nbout to be remuved the owner sham notidy the nearest haspector of Weights and Mensures or $A$ ssistant, on a form suppled by the bepartment, of the mamber and descripion of sadi artuele to be removed;
( $b$ ) The packnges containing the articles removed shatl be legribly matked with the words "Weights," "Mcosures" or "Weighing Machanes," its the case may be, and the word " min"pected."
2. When any weights, measures or weighing machines are mported for direct delivery to a person who intends to use them for purpuses or trade, they must be seat direct from the Uustom house at which they are entered for comsthattion to the oflice of the laspector or Assistant Insbuetor of veights and measures nearest to the Gustom Honse or nemest to the person to whom they dre to be delivered for made parposes as may be most convenient, and there veritied and stamped betore they are delivered to the purty by whon they are to be used ia trade.
3. If an importer of, or deater in weights, mensures or whering mathines desires bo send may such article from his warchouse betore it lus been verified, direce to amy person who intends 10 use it fur trade, he may do so, provided such archagements ate made as will chase tho article to be taken to the oflice of the Inspector or Assistan haspector of weirghts and metsures benrest to the phace where it is to be hseat, at which oftice it hust be verified before it is delivered for ase for trade purposes.
G. Nothing in the supplementary regulations nor in any previous regalations is to be constued as preventing the impertation, manasiacthre or the remorat of and setting up, before they are veritied; of bormant scates or Weighbridges of any description coming withat the regurements of the law but which cannot be used nor properly veriled until they are plated on a fixed foundation. Bat the use of such weighing machiaes for tade purjoses is illegal until they have been verified and stamped.
H. 1st. Iron weighis of the denomination of half it pound or unfer maty be almitted to verifiention proxded they ure of such sabstance that a solt metal plag, on which the stamp may be inmpessed, can he securely tixed therein inut When such soft metal phitg is so fixed in them by the partues whopresent then for verification. But:-

2nol. When any iron weight is presented for verification, or wen any shen weight is found in use from which a soft metal plug has buen in use from whin at soft metal plug hat been
lost, it shatl not be adjusted or restamped nutil the hole in whel the pheg was inserted has in the presence of the fisjiector becon entarged at the botiom so that the expansion of the leal used for thlonsting it will greventitsinhsequently falling out.

The Sand Biast.-Among the wonderfol and usefol inventions of the times is the cummon sund-blast. Suppose you desire to letter a piece of marble for a gravestone; you cover the stone with a sheet of wax no thicker than a wafer, then cut in the wax the name, date, etc., leaviug the marble exposed. Now pass it under the blast, and the wax will not be injured at
ail, but the sand will eut letters deep in the stone. Or, if you desire raised $1 \cdot t$ tris, a flower or other emblem, cut the leters, flowers, ele., in the wax and stick them unon the stove; then pass the stone muler the batst, and the sund will cut it away, Remove the wax and you have the raised letiers. Pake a piece of Frenels plate ghas, saty two feet by six, and cover it with fine lace; pros it under the blast, and not a threal of the hace will be injured, but the sand will cat deep into the glass wherever it is not covered by the lace. Now remore the lace and you have every delicate and beatiful figure raised upon the ghass. In this way beantiful figures of all kinds are ent in the glass, aml at a small expense. The workmen can hold their hands under the bast withont hurm, even when it is rapidly cuthing away the hardest glass, iron ou stone, but they must look out for finger mals for they will be whitled off right hastily. If they put on steel thimbles to proteet the nails it will do ittule good, for the snad will soon whitte them away, but if they wapa piece of soft cotton aromed them they are sale. You will at once sce the philosophy of it. The sinnt whittes away and destroys ang hard substance, even glass, buitoes not affect substances that are soft and yielding, like wax, cotton or the lace or cren the human haturt.

It will be observed that since the prosperous year 18\%, when failures were only ahont 50 per cent. and limbilities less than 30 per cent. of their subsequent average, the changes, one year with mother, have not been very marked, the greatest variation being in 1STR, when the failures sud liabilities were abont 10 per cent. below the average for the five years of sigual depression. The year 1879 stibligures, $a$. it has done in prior tables, as the most disnstrous of all, but from this very cireum-hance it is possible to extract comfart on betier gromats, we trust, than that "the darkest hour is jusi before dawn.". The course aud weult of commereial endeavor in Carada are cerlainly regnated by jocidents and conditions very different from those prevailing in the United States, but the genema laws of trade operate alike in both comentries, and to the extent that these ming be deemed to enter intos the probl $\cdot m$ it would seem profitable to compare statistics. We give the following latble, then, of United States fatures for the same six years in order to point out the
extriordimary rebound from depression after 157s, the year which in the commercia' history of that conntry oerupies like untown 1 prominence with that of 1879 in Camada:

- A meeling of the slumeholders of the Mechanics Bank, called to receive the report of the committe previously appointed to gather information as to the practicability and udris: ability of making an offer to the creditors of the Bank, was lind in this city on Friday last, hoout fifty persons, comprising those most largely interested, heing present. The report may be epitomired as follows : nearly one half the shareholders are matble either to meet the donde liablity or contribute to the parchase of the estate; a considerable number of those able to pry dechare the intention of contesting at law the question of liatility, if pressed ; the majurity of solvent shmeholdersex!mess willingness to contribute under the double liability clatese if upplied only to reduced stock; the committee had suggestively submitied an olfier of 575,000 eash, or $\$ 90,000$, one-third eash, one-third sis months and one-third twelve months, the fatter proposition equal tombout 25 conts on the dol. lar of all litbilities, before an informal meening of harge ereditors, including representatives of the binks, and in response thereto a nearly unanimous approval of the minciple of compromise was obtained, though views as w the Galue of the assers, or a fair offer for them, varied from 334 cents thwards ; a forma! meeting of ereditors was called for the $2 S t h$ inst. to consider the matter more fully, and meanwhite the committee undertakes to consult with sharehalders, and, if possible, secure authority to make a better offer. The report was adopted and the committee instructer to continue their labors, when the meeting adjournen subject to call of the chaitman.
- The heary verdict rentered in the ase of Mefaten rs. the Canala Central Railway at the sitting of the Assize Court in Toronto, on the lfth inst., by which the plaintill was ndjudged $\$ 100,000$ dimuges, should, and doubtless wili have, the effect of securing added caution in the genema management of engines on Gamadian railways. The presiding Judge revinwed the evilence very fully in his charge, and entthinly left the case in the hands of the jury free. from all intimation of bias or opinion adverse to the Company. The evidence was not so much confliceing as lacking in directness with regard to the manner in which the fire originated by which Mctaren's lumber was consumed, but the probabilities that a live coal from the passing engine was the true cause appeared.

That the casmalty was brouglit on log contributive neglect titurh fature to ado.t the fall preatations contemplated by statate on the part of the Company was more elearty established, since the escape of live conls had before been noticed and brunght the the altation of the company, whout intucing needed retorm in the way of a more secure bonnet and smalle mosh such as in use on other roads. No inmediate ner'ee' of duty $w$ is, however, proved aghinst the employees. The defendants ate to move for a new trita, nor is it to be supposed that the verdiet rendered will be acepted until every resonce of litigation is axhamed.
- The total importations of matw silk into the Uuited Siates hist yeat were 15,700 Untes. Uf these, 1,500 bales, or one-tenth of the whole were for Bolding Bros. \& Go, of New York, of which the firm of beldinge, Panl \& Ca. of his city is a branch. The Messra. Belling bave branclies a'so in Chiengo, San Francisco, St. Louis and other places. Ffforts recently mate to establish a mother silk thread fictory in Montreal have, we noderstand, been abnato med. The intending stockholders having made diligent inquiries found that the representations wade them were not all couledr de rove. Jhe low price at which these goods are oflred, owing to fureign comperition, preelade retsomable prospects that the enterprise cond be made to pay in such a limited market; mo we funcy few perans witl be found Quixotic mongito risk thein eupimat in such a scheme, especinlly in a lmsinese of which they know litle or no, thing, and where they must be entirely at the fucrey of the projector, who, whatever other qualifications he may posecss, should give some substantial persomal froof that his statistics and expectations are not altogether chimetical.
- Governor James D. Westcott, the last of the southern politieal exiles who took refnge in Montreal during the war of the Rebellion in the United States, 1 'ed in this city on the 19 m inst., at the age of 70, Feve frequenters of the Si. Lawrence Hall white it was yet our only firsiclass hotel, failed to recognize the "old grovernor" whose keen intellect and sham, thougl often conse wit made lim the dread of many of his young nort hem fellow-combrymen whose acquaintance with many of the sulijects he discussed was merely historical. He belonged to the old school represented in the last. generation hy Clay, Calhom, Webster, de., and whs first Senntor of Florida, of which State he afterwads became Governor. His exile for some years past was altogether volur-- ary. After the amnesty granted him by the United Sutes Cabitet be made a few short visits io his relatives in New Iutk and Philtdelphin, but the alcered condition of aflats suited him ns hitle as they did Rip Van Wiakle, and he preferred to spend his declining yents in Ganala among those who knew him in brighter days, when the hearts of the lithe southern element in Montrent bent high with hope, and where he could, undisturbed by realities, brod over fatheied wrongs and indulge his cherished remembrances of the past. The inflexibe old gentleman retained his nomial frobuties to the very last.

tract. In past sensons, says the wholesaler, sules made enrly in the yent were measurably suliject to the hater derelopiments of the markef, since, if prices declined, as was their wont, some misundersumding would arise or some hitch ocent ly which the transaction would be rendered abortive. Within a day or two, however, the situntion has bettered. Colder weather is advised, and a consequenthurdening in prices and improremient in tone. The fite of shipmenta on the way is about the only matter of real intorest in
the market, and this is admitted to hinge largely upon the weather for the next three or four weeks. Oleomargarine is coustantly at.encting more and more notice as an element of confusion to the butter marke, and is coming to be regarded with something of the dread in which gas compmies are known to hold Edison and electricity. No butter speculator now dares omit the possible effects of oleomargarine from his calcalations, and yet he cannot satisfiactorily include it, for the reason that it is nan noknown quantity of which he has but little experimental knowledge. In this didemma the butter trade now finds itself. Mild weather, however, we understand, is reglisite for the successfill manufincture of oleomargarine, so that just now a prot racted cold spell would havor the interests of holders of butter in every way. We learn of no new dealings in this market, and prices are unchanged. Gheose-All surface indications favor the views and interests of holders. Liverpool is steadily advancing, and actund dealings are constantly reported wish indiente that the pabtic cable quotations do not fully represent the strengh of the market. We are ndvied of further sakes of July make at css., when ret the cable had not passed that boint tor falt makes, and sales of fall make at 72 s ., when yet the bighest puhtic cable figure was 70 s . The explanation of this we believe to be that the price has reached a point calendated to atonse hie fears of holders lest an unduc excitement should ensuc, carrying prices up suddenly and so checking consumption, throwing the maket into confusion and distoncerting their plans. it would seem to be the the interest of holders that prices shonlal be kept down for a season, and dombless they we moner aleased than otherwise to linve a luwer eable than the facts might warrant. The question as to the point at. Which price will ma erially effect consumption is dally becoming a moite interesting ind serious one. An expromenced deater hohls the opinion that up to 7ös. no such effect need be looked for, since established retail priees will nermit grocers oo make a protit ip to that figure, whongh, of course, ingreally dimiaished one. Beyond that poini very likely a slump falling of in demand would at once fake phace, and if so the market would be quite unset, and its future course involved in every unembinty. The situation may be summed up as pointing to yet higher prices, but with breakers ahead if the upward course is long continued. Cable now stands at 72 s .
Smbd.-Since our last the market for clover lus been weaker, and considerable quantities have been offered by sample. Hoiders are now asking S4.75 to S. 5.50, F.O.B. at several points in Ontario, and a few carlots have been taken for shipment at these rates. In limothy there is nothing doing. The market is still bate of seed, and prices are entirely nominal.

Wixes and Liquons.-A quiet business only is doing. The marised for brandies loses nothing in strength, nud dealers conlidently speak of higher prices as one of the certainties of the future. The total failure of the vintage of '79 must have yet more marked effeets, $i t$ is chaimed, as consumption reduces stocks, earlier vintages being held as fancy stock at faney prices. It is expected that further advances will reduce consumption materially, hut there is a certain large demand not to be inflienced by prices, and this will serve in time to estnblish higher rates. Gins are searce, and will remain so until the opeating of the hurbor, freight rates being a barrier to present importation beyond absolute requirements. The agent of the Bollinger Ohamprene, Mr. Jas. Guest. has been ndvised of an advance equal to $\$ 1.25$ ner case, and has chmoged lis list price conformably thereto, the new quotation being, for quarts, \$25.75 to new 91
$\$ 26.25$.

Wool.-A stendy fair business is reported in domestic wool at unchanged prices. The usun post-holidny lull is hardly yet over, but is expeeted soon to give place to a more netive demand on the purt of consumpers
