A Story in Stone.

The story of the Earth's past should be of interest to the present dwellers on its surface; even as some of them delight to know the successive steps by which savage hordes of German forest dwellers became the highly civilized and polished nations that speak the English tongue.

The Earth contains within its crust the records of the vicissitudes through which it has passed, and to give an outline of this story in stone, so far as relates to the animals that have lived on its surface, the accompanying set of fossils has been

arranged.

As there have been stages of progress in the history and condition of the English people, so in past time certain races of animals have been dominant on the earth. The very earliest stages, like those of the history of various nations, are lost in the obscurity of the past, but when animals began to have hard parts to their bodies then the remains of their skeletons give a clue to their nature—because these remains can be compared with those of animals now living.

The marginal numbers give the comparative length of time of the different ages, from which it will be seen that man has ruled this earth but a very short time.

Various estimates have been made as to the length of time that elapsed in these several ages. These estimates are based on the amount of material worn from the surface of a country and carried to the sea by its rivers to make new geological deposits—on

the rate of wearing of river valleys, as in Niagara Falls—on the rate of annual growth of Corals &c. A moderate estimate is that which concludes that each unit of the geological time ratio is equal to about five millions of years—and that man has inhabited the earth for one five hundredth part of a time ratio. Whatever may be the value of these ratios, it is certain that many, many years have elapsed since Sea-worms were lords of Creation.

A Story in Stone. Cont'd.

Though the Ordovician age was a time when Molluscs came into prominence, it was equally a time for trilobites. In this view it will be seen that the history of animated beings on this earth may be divided into two grand stages—the time when Articulate or jointed animals (with an external skeleton) ruled, and that wherein the Vertebrated or animals with a backbone (internal skeleton) had pre-eminence.

Further, it will be seen that in each of these great stages of the earth's history there was a progression from marine, free-roving animals, first to animals inhabiting shallow waters and shores, and then to those that were strictly terrestrial; and that geologic time for these too great stages of zoeic history appears to be about equally divided (but no doubt when better known the preponderance of time will be found to lie in the earlier ages.

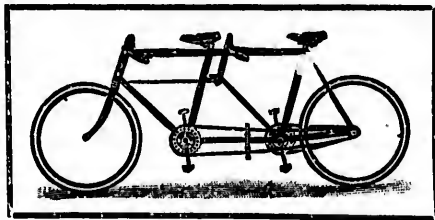

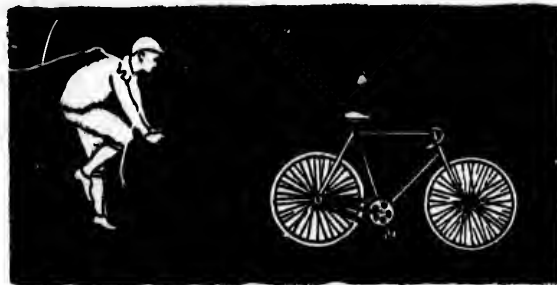
