



#### CONSTITUTION

(As Revised to August 1st, 1915)

#### ARTICLE I.

#### Name and Powers

SECTION 1. This body shail be known by the name, style and title of THE IMPERIAL COUNCIL OF THE ANCIENT ARABIC ORDER OF THE NOBLES OF THE MYSTIC SHRINE FOR NORTH AMERICA.

SEC. 2. It has power to enact Laws, Statutes and Regulations for the government of the whole Order; to issue Edicts; to amend or repeal the same; to grant dispensations and charters for holding Temples of the Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobies of the Mystic Shrine within its jurisdiction; and to amend or revoke the same. Its authority also extends to such Temples as may be organized under its dispensation or charters in foreign countries.

SEC. 3. It has the exclusive right to control all the subordinate Temples of the Order within i' risdiction. It may censure, suspend and erase Temples; and try, discipline, suspend or expel its members for violation and disobedience.

SEC. 4. It is the body to which air final appears shair be made.

#### ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The Imperial Council shall meet annually.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Representatives

SECTION 1. Representation in the Imperial Council shall be apportioned as follows: To every Temple there shall be one Representative, who must be a member of the Temple electing him. Each Temple shall be entitled to two Representatives when its membership reaches three hundred, three Representatives when its membership reaches six hundred, and four Representatives when its membership reaches one thousand; but no Temple shall be allowed more than four Representatives.

SEC. 2. The Representatives shall be chosen as follows: Each Tempie shall, at the regular annual election

of officers, elect by ballot and by a majority vote, such Representative or Representatives to the Imperiai Council as it shall be entitled to, and a certified record of such election shall be forwarded to the Imperial Recorder, which credentlai shall be countersigned by the Recorder of the Temple, who shall affix the Seal of the Temple thereto.

#### ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. The officers of the Imperial Council shall be as follows, viz.:

- I. Imperlai Potentate.
- II. Deputy Imperiai Potentate.
- III. Imperial Chief Rabban.
- IV. Imperial Assistant Rabban.
- V. Imperial High Priest and Prophet.
- VI. 4 Imperiai Orientai Guide.
- VII. Imperial Treasurer. VIII. Imperiai Recorder.
  - IX. Imperiai First Ceremonlai Master.
    - X. Imperial Second Ceremonial Master or Standard Bearer
  - XI. Imperiai Marshai.
- XII. Imperial Captain of the Guard.
- XIII. Imperial Outer Guard
- SEC. 3. The officers of the Imperial Council and of every subordinate Temple in the jurisdiction, before they enter upon the exercise of their respective duties. ehail take the following obligation:

"I, (name in fuil), do soiemniy promise and vow that I wiii falthfuliy, and to the best of my ability, discharge the dutiee of the office to which I have been elected, and that I wili etrictly conform to the requirements of the Constitution, Regulations and Edic's of the Imperial Council for North America."

#### ARTICLE X.

### Prerequisites for the Order

SECTION 1. No application for the Order shall be received unless the applicant is a regular Knight Tempiar in good standing in a Commandery, or a Thirty-second degree Mason in good etanding in a Concistory of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of the obedience of either of the Supreme Councils for the

Northern or for the Southern Masonic Jurisdiction of such Rite in the United States, and those Supreme Councils which are in amity with and recognized by them. Each application for the Order shell be made upon the form of petition provided by tue Imperial Councii. \* \* \* A Tempie cannot adopt a ruie requiring a candidate to be both Thirty-second degree Mason and Knight Tempiar.

#### ARTICLE III.

Mileage and Per Diem

SECTION i. Past Imperiai Potentat and Representatives shail be entitled to mileage t the rate of six cents per mile, one way, by the s' test available route from the location of their Temples to the place of session of the Imperial Council, and per diem expenses at the rate of fifteen dollars for each day they are in attendance at the session of the Imperial Council Such expenses are to be paid out of the general funcof the Imperial Council.

SEC. 2. The Imperial Treasurer shall pay each Representative entitied to mileage and per diem.

#### ARTICLE X.

SECTION 1. The Order of the Nobies of the Mystic Shrine shail not be conferred upon any one for a less sum than fifty (\$50) doilars; but Tempies may increase the amount if desired.

#### ARTICLE XI.

Fees and Revenues

SECTION 1. The revenue of the Imperial Council shail be derived from the following sources:

SEC. 2. Each subordinate Tempie shail pay to the Imperial Council the sum of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for each and every candidate receiving the

Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine within such Temple, which sum shall be forwarded immediately to the Imperial Recorder, who shall forthwith issue a diploma of the Imperial Council to each and every candidate.

The Imperial Recorder shall, upon the request of the Recorder of any Temple, issue to every member who joins a Temple hy affiliation a diploma, free of charge, upon the return to the Imperial Recorder of the diploma issued hy the Temple in which the affiliatee received the Order.

SEC. 3. Each subordinate Temple shall pay annually to the Imperial Council, in accordance with its membership, the following sum:

For 100 meinhers or less, fifteen dollars (\$15).

For all members over and above 100 members, fifteen cents for each member.

The dues shall accompany the annual return of every Temple to the Imperial Council.

#### ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The Ritual, as promulgated by the Imperial Council for the use of the Order in its jurisdiction, shall be adopted uniformly by every Temple, and no alterations or additions shall be made in the Ritual, except by authority of the Imperial Council, and every departure therefrom will be considered as an indignity to the same.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

Regalia, Emblems and Jewels

SECTION 1. The emhlems, jewels and costumes for every office in this Order, as promulgated by the Imperial Council in its Ritual, shall be strictly adhered to.

SEC. 2. The red Turkish Fez is adopted as a uniform style of head covering for all Nohles of the Mystic Shrine.

SEC. 3. The emhlems and jewels of the Mystic Shrine are the characteristic insignia of the Oriental nation from which the Order emanates. They are the Crescent, Pyramid, Sphinx Head, Panther-bodied Female Sphinx, the Urn, Sun, Moon, Stars, etc., and are used to decorate the Tombs, Banners, Draperies,

tic tal the ied nd Costumes, Regalia, etc. In mourning drapery, the combination is the Sun with Raye, Moon and Stars.

SEO. Crescent. The original and universal Emblematic Jewel is the Crescent, formed of two nails from a tiger's paw, united at their bases with a band of gold, and a ring at the base to suspend it as a charm or jewel, to be hung points downward. The gold band should be decorated with the Sphinx Head on one side, a Pyramid with the Urn upon it on the other; the name of the owner, and the date of bis receiving the Order, engraved upon the sides; and inside the circle "Allah" or God, and the motto of the Order, which is "Robur et Furor," and signifies "Strength and Fury." Every Noble of the Mystic Shrine is entitled to wear this Jewel. The combining of the emblems of other secret orders with the Jewel of the Shrine is deemed inappropriate, and is therefore prohibited. The combining of Masonic emblems with the Jewel is inappropriate and should not be so worn or combined.

SEC. 5. The wearing of the Fez and Jewel of the Order on occasions other than meetings of the Arabic Order, or gatherings of Shriners under the authority of some legal body of the Order, is ill-advised, and Potentates are expected to prevent such action by their members.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. The Imperial Recorder shall, at each annual session of the Imperial Council, announce the Color of the Card for the Visiting Certificate, and the color of the Ink with which it shall be printed for the following year. He shall also send to the Recorder of each Temple a notice of the announcement, and all Temples are hereby ordered to adopt the same.

#### ARTICLE XV.

Improper Circulars, Publications and Practices

SECTION I. The Imperial Council emphatically condemns all immoral and vulgar practices or allusions in the initiations of candidates, or in the printed notices issued by Temples to members of the Order.

The Potentate or Presiding Officer for the time being of each Temple shall be held personally responsible for not immediately arresting any attempt at vulgarity or obscenity.

No Potentate or Recorder of a Temple shall furnish to any one a list of names of the members of his Temple, for the purpose of having the members circularized for business purposes, nor shall any Temple issue appeals for aid to any Nobles not members of said Temple, unless they bear the indorsement of the Imperial Potentate.

#### CODE

#### ARTICLE II.

Jurisdiction of Temples

SECTION 1. The territorial jurisdiction of subordinate Temples, chartered by this Imperial Council, extends in all directions to one-half the distance, by a direct line, between itself and the nearest Temple; provided, that in no case can it extend beyond the limits of the State, Territory, or district in which it is located; provided, also, that Temples occupying the same State or Territory may agree upon concurrent jurisdiction within, or an equitable division of their territory, should they so desire. \* \*

- SEC. 2. A Temple shall not act upon a petition for initiation of anyone residing within the jurisdiction of another Temple without first obtaining permission of such Temple. It shall be competent in such cases for a Temple to waive its jurisdiction and permit another Temple to confer the Order upon one residing within its jurisdiction; and such authority shall be given only under the seal of the Temple so granting it. Temples having concurrent jurisdiction must notify each other of all petitions received. It shall be the duty of the Imperial Potentate to suspend the work of any Temple violating the provisions of this section until the next meeting of the Imperial Council.
- SEC. 3. A candidate having been elected in a Temple, it is within the power of that Temple to ask, under seal, another Temple to confer the Order upon the candidate as a compliment to the Temple making the request. \* \*
- SEC. 4. Each Temple is sovereign in its own jurisdiction whether under dispensation or chartered, and

isnd no applicant, actually resident in such jurisdiction, can apply elsewhere for the Order without the consent of the Temple. Where two Temples hold concurrent jurisdiction over territory, the consent of hoth will be necessary to enable an applicant of that jurisdiction to become a member of a Temple in any other jurisdiction. A Temple having received a petition from one possessing the necessary qualifications and having regularly elected the candidate, retains jurisdiction over him until initiation, no matter whether said candidate subsequently removes from its jurisdiction or not.

SEC. 6. Each Temple is sovereign in its own jurisdiction in all matters pertaining to the Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, and has jurisdiction for purposes of discipline over all sojourning Nohles. No organization of any kind using emhlems of the Order, or a title or titles, pronouncing it to be an organization of Shriners, shall he organized in the jurisdiction of a Temple except with the official sanction of said Temple.

An Arah Patrol or Shrine Band is part of the working corps of the Temple, and is under the control and authority of the Potentate.

In the annual parade of Temples of the Order at meetings of the Imperial Council, or in parades given under the auspices of suhordinate Temples of the Order, no one shall he permitted to participate in the parade hut members of the Order, uniformed hands, and male servants accompanying Temples.

No Temple shall organize or recognize in any way any hody of women, or men and women, calling itself an Oriental Shrinc, or purporting to he an Oriental Order, and to be composed of Nohles of the Mystic Shrine and female relatives of such, and making such relationship the prerequisite for membership in such hody.

The introduction in street parades of Novices or Nohles attired in grotesque or humiliating costumes or undignified dress of any kind is strictly prohibited.

#### ARTICLE III.

Subordinate Temples-How Constituted

SECTION 1. All regular subordinate bodies of the Ancient Arabic Order of the Nohles of the Mystic Shrine are termed Temples, and shall consist of the following officers:

A quorum in a Temple consists of seven members entitled to vote therein, including an officer entitled to open the body.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Enthronement

SECTION I. Previous to the enthronement of a Potentate-elect, the Imperial Council requires his assent to the following ordinances:

First. Do you solemnly vow, upon your honor, that you will exert your best endeavors to promote the true happiness of your hrother Nobles of the Mystic Shrine?

Second. That you will endeavor to promote the general good of the Order and preserve the solemnity of the ceremonies with profound respect and reverence?

Third. That you will not acknowledge or have intercourse with any Temple which does not work under constitutional authority as recognized by the Imperial Council?

Fourth. That you will ever maintain and support the authority of the Imperial Council for North America, and enforce obedience to its Constitution, Regulations and Edicts?

Do you suhmit to all these ordinances and promise to observe and practice them faithfully?

#### ARTICLE V.

#### Illustrious Potentate-Duties

SECTION 1. The Illustrious Potentate is specially charged to see that the By-Laws of his Temple are duly observed, as well as the Constitution, Regulations and Edicts of the Imperial Council; that accurate records are kept and just accounts rendered; that regular returns are made to the Imperial Council, and that the annual dues are promptly paid; and that no fewer than two stated sessions are held annually, of which one shall be held in December. He shall see that a copy of each printed notice issued by his Temple to its members shall be mailed to the Imperial Potentate as soon as the same is sent to the members of his Temple.

SEC. 2. Special sessions of a Temple may be called by the Illustrious Potentate at any time, due notice thereof being given to each member, stating the business to be considered, and no other business than that specified in the call or summons shall be transacted.

#### ARTICLE XI.

#### By-Laws

Each Temple is required to forward a copy of its By-Laws or any Amendments thereto to the imperial Council for approval and also when such approval has been received, to forward to the Imperial Council a copy of such By-Laws or the Amendments thereto, but no By-Laws, or Amendments thereto, of any Temple shall go into effect until after the same has been approved by the Imperial Council, provided that the Imperial Potentate may provisionally approve such By-Laws as amended thereto in the interim of the sessions of the Imperial Council.

#### ARTICLE XII.

#### Membership in Temples

SECTION 1. Any person applying for the Order to any Temple shall be an actual resident for at least six months of the jurisdiction of the Temple to which he applies. Actual residence is defined to mean the place where the applicant in good faith makes his home; any Temple of the Order may, however, receive and act upon the petition of one who is a resident of a Country, Territory or State wherein no Temple of the Order exists. Membership may be terminated by voluntary

demission upon payment of all indebtedness to the Temple, or by expulsion from the Order after due trial, and a vote of three-fourths of the members present when the vote is taken.

SEC. 2. A Noble can hold active membership in but one Temple. In order to retain membership in a Temple, a Noble must be in good standing in one or the other of the two prerequisite Masonic bodies, a Commandery of the Order of Knights Templar or a Consistory of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite bodies, and so long as he is in good standing in one or other bodies his membership in the Temple is not affected by any action of the other prerequisite body in depriving him of membership in that body.

No demit can be granted to a Noble accused of violation of the laws of the Order, pending his trial. No Temple can withhold a demit from a Noble who is free from charges and indebtedness to the Temple. A demit is a certificate that the Noble named therein is in good standing and of good repute and recommended as such to other Temples. A Temple may issue a duplicate demit to a Noble, but must satisfy itself that a Noble asking for it is still in good repute.

SEC. 3. Affiliation is a matter solely between the applicant and the Temple to which he applies. A Noble of the Mystic Shrine, holding a demit from a legal Temple, may present his petition to any Temple of the Order.

SEC. 4. A Noble of the Mystic Shrine, who, for any cause, is suspended or expelled by his Commandery or Consistory, stands suspended or expelled as the case may be, in his Temple. until restored to good standing in his Commandery or Consistory, when he shall be restored to good standing in his Temple without the vote of that body.

He shall not be charged with dues to the Temple during the period of his suspension.

SEC. 5. A member may be suspended for non-payment of dues, or suspended or expelled for conduct unbecoming a member of the Order.

To suspend for non-payment of dues, a majority vote only of the members present at any regular meeting shall be necessary, provider notice has been given to the delinquent member that he is in arrears, and an opportunity afforded him to be present.

ting to an For conduct unbecoming a member of the Order, it shall require a two-thirds vote of the members present to suspend membership, and a vote of three-fourths of the members present to expel a member at any regular meeting.

No member of any Temple can be suspended or expelled for conduct unbecoming a member, without formal charges being presented, notice served upon him, and an opportunity afforded him to be heard in his defence.

SEC. 6. Any Noble suspended or expelled by his Temple may be reinstated by such Temple on written petition and vote and by the same majority suspending or expelling him, and on payment of all arrears in case of suspension for non-payment of dues.

SEC. 7. An assessment levied by a Temple upon its members after due notice has been given the members that a vote would be taken on the proposition, and after the Temple has, by a majority vote, voted to make said assessment, is legal and binding upon the entire membership of the Temple. Said assessment should be paid in the same manner as the annual dues or other assessments of the Temple are paid.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

#### Honorary Members

SECTION 1. Honorary membership may be conferred by subordinate Temples upon any member of the Order, as a compliment, by a majority vote, but such membership confers no rights or privileges.

#### JURISDICTION



# HISTORICAL SKETCH

Es. Selamu Aieikum (Peace be with you) is the saiutation of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobies of the Mystic Shrine.

Some time—somewhere in t + dim, misty, uncertain past—the Shrine was evolved from the association of good men, banded together, to eradicate certain evils and to promote political and religious liberty.

Some attribute to the Shrine a definite beginning, and Nobie George L. Root, of Mohammed Tempie (to whom the Recorder is greatly indebted, and the same applies to Noble Harry G. Henly. Recorder of Ararat Tempie), in his new history of the Shrine, says that "The Order of Nobies of the Mystic Shrine was instituted by the Mohammedan Kalif Aber, the cousin-general and son-in-law of the Prophet Mohammed, in the year of the Hegira 25 (A.D. 644), at Mecca in Arabia."

No matter when or how the Shrine "siid" into being, it is here and Aliah be praised. It has been called the "Play House of Masonry," hut is founded upon the broader grounds of benevolence and charity, which is dispensed in the Biblical way: "Let not thy right hand know what thy left hand doeth."

Its social side is pronounced and its members are irresistibly drawn closer and made better by contact of men who have passed through the subline degrees of Masonry. Some of earth's most illustrious sons have crossed "the hot sands." The late Khedive of Egypt was a patron, the Earl of Eustae, Goethe, Lord Bacon, and thousands of other celebrities have been enrolled as members.

The legendary history of the Oriental Shrine (for the American branch is yet too young for legends) says that it was started as a political and religious Order destined to become a formidable power, and its mission was to aid the distressed, protect the innocent, overthrow fanaticism, obliterate intolerance, bring the guilty to justice, and perpetuate the welfare of mankind.

"Allah is God" of the Mohammedans and God of the Shriners. Yet in America the recognition is merely symbolical of "The one, true and living God," and even the Mohammedans never question private belief, for they have a maxim: "The interior belongs to God

The Fez is worn as a mark of learning. The Mohammedans west of the Nile, in A.D. 980, when the Crusades interrupted their annual pilgrimage to Mecca, journeyed to the City of Fez. There the college students wore red eaps, which were adopted by the pilgrims and, after the city, called Fez.

The Jewel is the Crescent formed of any substance, but preferably royal Bengal tiger claws, united at base with gold female Sphinx, Pyramid, Urn and Star, with motto, "Strength is Fury."

The Mohammedans, in great earavans, small companies and singly, mounted upon camels and afoot, made annual pilgrimages across the desert sands to Mccea, called Om el Kora (Mother of Towns). The law provided that all pilgrims travelling towards the city should wear the "Ihraim." It consisted of two pieces of cloth strips, one wrapped around the loins and the other thrown over the shoulders about the neck so as to leave the right arm uncovered. All other garments were laid aside. Any cloth or colour could be worn, but plain pure white was preferable. The law also provided that on reaching the city the Temple should first be visited before any pleasures were had.

There certain formal ceremonies were required, among which were solemn circuits about the building, salutations and kissing the black stone. Such are the traditions and abbreviated history of the Oriental Shrine.

The first Temple in North America was instituted September 26th, 1872, in New York, and named "Mecea" by the founders, Dr. Fleming and Wm. J. Florence, the popular comedian, who was initiated into the mysteries at an Egyptian Temple in Cairo, and other prominent Seottish and York Rite Masons.

The Imperial Council for North America was organized June 5th, 1876, "for the exercise of charity and the improvement of the mind, untrammelled by dogma," and meets annually in various portions of North America. These are the official gatherings of the Imperial Officers, Illustrious Potentates, Representatives and Nobles. Their escorts of Bands and Patrols unite in one grand pageant to do homage to the Imperial Potentate, when he opens the Imperial Council, at which laws are passed and edicts promulgated.

Campbell, Potentate of Afifi Temple, Tacoma, Wash., and constituted under Charter granted to Nobles Robert E. Brett, Edward E. Leason, George M. Perdue, Andrew F. Forbes, Charles G. Mills, Harry M. Grahame, Fred. C. Harridage, and George R. Moore, by Illustrious Noble G. W. Hazer, of Al Kader Temple, on August 15th, 1943.

The institution of Gizch Temple was not secared without some efforts on the part of the acover med Many times brief agitations for the organization of a Temple had been made, but nothing definite was accomplished until the early part of 1902, when a meeting was called for the purpose of considering the advisability of establishing a Temple of the Order in the city, at which the following Nobles were present: Robert E. Brett, Chas. G. Mills and George R. Moore, all of Rameses Temple; and Geo. M. Perdue, A. F. Forbes, H. M. Grahame, W. L. Challoner and E. E. Leason, of Afifi Temple. At this meeting it was resolved that a committee, consisting of Nobles Brett and Leason, be authorized to prepare and submit a petition to the Imperial Potentate for a Dispensation to form a Temple in this city, and that the name of Noble R. E. Brett be submitted as Potentate and that of E. E. Leason as Recorder. The Code of the Imperial Council provides that "Every Temple shall select an Arabic or Egyptian name," and to Noble Leason fell the honour of complying with this edict. Hc chose the name of "Gizeli," from one of the most ancient and remarkable of all the pyramids of Egypt; also from the fact of the absence of any Temple having a name beginning with the letter "G," which letter has a peculiar signification to the Craft, and so far, we are still the only Temple under that letter.

Application for the Dispensation was made, and it was granted by Illustrious Imperial Potentate Henry C. Akin, and Noble John G. Campbell, Potentate of Affi Temple of Tacoma, Wash., appointed Special Deputy to institute U.D. He notified Noble R. E. Brett of his appointment, and suggested August 16th, 1902, as a suitable date for the institution. The date being agreed upon, Noble John G. Campbell, accompanied by the full Divan of Affif Temple and visitors from other Temples, among whom were Noble Ben. Allan, of

Rameses Temple, Deputy Grand Master of Canada; I. R. Gifford, of Murat Temple; W. B. Norton, Olaff Bull, A. C. Bownan, O. R. Briggs, and some forty other Nobles from Afifi and sister Temples. Due proclamation of the institution having been made, the officers to serve were selected as follows:

In the report made to the Imperial Council which convened at Saratoga Springs, N.Y., by the Imperial Potentate, "He was pleased to say that he had heard nothing hut good reports of Gizeh Temple, and recommended that they be given a Charter," which suggestion met with approval of the Council, and the Charter was granted, and on August 15th, 1903, Gizeh Temple was constituted under Charter by Illustrious Noble G. W. Hazen, Special Deputy, appointed by Imperial Potentate George H. Green, the same officers that had served under Dispensation being elected to fill the same offices for the ensuing year under Charter.

The first Ceremonial Session of Gizeh Temple was held on Decembeer 18th, 1902, at which twenty-three Novices were received and escorted across the "hot sands," and the concensus of opinion of the visitors, of whom there were a large number, was that the session was a grand success. This reputation has been retained, each successive Potentate vicing to surpass the efforts of his predecessor. The social features of our Ceremonials have become famous.

Gizeh Temple has absolute jurisdiction over the Province of British Columbia and the Canadian Yukon, and is prepared at all times to administer to the needs of all Novices within its jurisdiction. Pilgrimages have been made on two occasions to Dawson, Y.T. (the Land of the Midnight Sun), and twice to Cranbrook, B.C. Prince Rupert, Vancouver and New Westminster have also received the "benefits" of Ceremonial Sessions.

The membership of Gizeh at the close of 1916 showed 609, which entitled us to three Representatives at the Imperial Session.

# BY-LAWS

#### PREAMBLE

Whereas it is the recognized prerogative of every Temple of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine to make such By-Laws as to them may seem meet and proper for their own government, provided they are not incompatible with the General Laws enacted by the Imperial Council, therefore the Nobles of this Temple have agreed to and adopted the following By-Laws:

#### ARTICLE I.

#### Name and Location

SECTION I. This Temple shall be known as "GIZER TEMPLE," of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, located at the City of Victoria, Province of British Columbia, Dominion of Canada, and held by virtue of a charter dated the Ninth (9th) day of July, A.D. 1903, and granted by the Imperial Council of the Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine for North America, from which it derives all its powers and privileges; the jurisdiction of Gizeh Temple being the Province of British Columbia and the Canadian Yukon.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### Sessions

Section I. The Annual Session shall be held at the City of Victoria during the month of December of each year, and other Regular Sessions may be called by the Illustrious Potentate whenever he may deem the same necessary.

Sec. 2. Special Sessions may be called by the Illustrious Potentate upon written request of twenty-five (25) members, setting forth the purpose for which such special session is called, and no other business shall be transacted at such special session.

SEC. 3. Special Ceremonial Sessions may be called by the Illustrious Potentate a: such time and place as

may be decided upon, but no other business than that of a ceremonial session shall be transacted at such ceremonial session.

SEC. 4. The hour for all meetings shall be 7.30 p.m., unless otherwise specified.

#### Quorum

SEC. 5. Seven members of this Temple, one of whom shall be an Illustrious Potentate or a Rabban, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

# Order of Business

SEC. 6. The order of business shall be:

1. Openlng;

2. Reading and confirming Minutes of last Session;

3. Reports of Committees;

4. New Business and Unfinished Business;

5. Receiving Visitors;

6. Receiving Petitions, Reports on same, and Balloting;

7. Conferring the Order;

8. Closing.

#### Voting

The decision upon any question is to be by a majority vote of the members present, except as otherwise provided by the Laws and Regulations of the Imperial Council.

# ARTICLE III.

# Officers

SECTION 1. The officers shall be:

I. Illustrious Potentate.

2. Chief Rabban.

3. Assistant Rabban.

4. High Priest and Prophet.

5. Oriental Guide.

6. Treasurer.

7. Recorder.

First Ceremonial Master.
 Second Ceremonial Master.

10. Director.

11. Marshal.

12. Captain of the Guard.

13. Outer Guard.

And the installations shall take place immediately or at the first session hereafter.

#### Elected

The first seven officers, together with the Representatives to the Imperial Council and an Executive Committee of three (3) members, shall be elected by ballot at the annual session by a majority of all votes cast.

#### Appointed

The other officers shall be appointed by the Illustrious Potentate.

#### Duties

SEC. 2. The duties of the officers of this Temple shall be those assigned to them in the Ritual and as traditionally appropriate to them, respectively, as also those defined in the Constitution and Regulations of the Imperial Council.

#### Duties of Treasurer

SEC. 3. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys from the Recorder; give his receipt therefor, and deposit same, as Treasurer, to the credit of Gizeh Temple in a chartered bank designated by the Executive Committee; and shall pay all bills on warrants drawn by the Recorder and countersigned by the Illustrious Potentate; he shall keep such books as the Illustrious Potentate shall direct, and render a written report at the annual session; he shall give a surety bond in such sum as the Executive Committee may require, the cost of such bond to be borne by the Temple, and shall receive for his services such salary as the Temple may, by resolution, direct.

#### Duties of Recorder

SEC. 4. The learner hall keep a record of the busine. The 'the learner had notices; assign a number to each had, and moneys due the Temple and pay the learner; attend to the correspondence, and affix same to such documents as may require it; he shall attend with his books and papers the sittings of the Auditor when required; he shall present a written report at the annual session of the transactions of his office, and perform such other duties—in accordance with the Constitution of the Imperial Council—as the Illustrious Potentate may direct, and shall deliver to his successor in office, or to such person or persons the Temple or Executive Committee may direct, all property of the

Temple in his possession; he shall give a surety bond in such sum as the Executive Committee may require, and shall receive for his services such salary as the Temple may, by resolution, direct.

#### Auditor

Sec. 5. At the annual session an Auditor shall be appointed, who shall examine the books and accounts of the Treasurer and Recorder, and report thereon to the Temple. For his services he shall receive compensation equal to one year's annual dues of the Temple.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Executive

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of seven members. The members of Gizeh Temple who shall, at the annual session, be elected to the office of Illustrious Potentate, Chief Rabban, Assistant Rabban and Recorder, respectively, shall, by virtue of such election, become members of the Executive Committee, together with three other members elected at the annual session.

# Duties of Executive

SEC. 2. The Illustrious Potentate shall be the chairman of the Executive Committee, and shall convene meetings when deemed necessary. The Committee is empowered to hire necessary help; provide appropriate entertainments; secure proper place for meetings, and shall have absolute control of all arrangements in connection with Ceremonial Sessions and refreshments; summons members before them for investigation of charges of non-payment of dues, or any violation of duty or decorum, and transact such other business as may be found necessary in the interim of sessions of the Temple.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### FEES AND DUES

#### Initiation

SECTION 1. The membership fee shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00), which shall cover the dues for the current year; twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) of which shall accompany the application petition, and the remainder of the fee shall be paid before the conferring of the Order.

#### Affiliation

SEC. 2. The fee for affiliation in this Temple shall be five dollars (\$5.00), and must accompany the application.

#### Annual Dues

Sec. 3. The annual dues shall be five dollars (\$5.00), payable before the Card is issued.

#### Membership

SEC. 4. Candidates for membership must posses the qualifications required by the Imperial Council, viz.: A regular Knight Templar in good standing in a Preceptory, or a Thirty-second Degree Mason in good standing in a Consistory of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of the obedience of the Supreme Council for the Dominion of Canada, whose Grand East is in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, or either of the Supreme Councils for the Northern or for the Southern Masonic jurisdiction of such Rite in the United States which are in amity with and recognized by them, and all petitions shall be as prescribed by the Imperial Council, and on a form supplied by the Recorder of this Temple.

SEC. 5. Every candidate for initiation must be proposed by at least two Nobles of this Temple, and if no objection is offered, the petition shall be referred by the Potentate to a committee of three Nobles of this Temple, who will report immediately, or at the next session of the Temple, as the Illustrious Potentate may designate. If the candidate is rejected the deposit shall be returned, but if elected and the candidate neglects to present himself for initiation within twelve months thereafter, the deposit may be declared forfeited to the Temple; provided, however, that if for reasons satisfactory to the Temple he was prevented from attending, the forfeiture may be waived by it.

Honorary membership in this Temple may be conferred upon any member in good standing in this Order, by a vote of those present at any annual session of this Temple. The rights and privileges of such membership shall be as set forth in the Constitution and Regulations of the Imperial Council, together with these By-Laws.

# Affiliation

SEC. 6.—The petition for affiliation shall be on the prescribed form supplied by the Recorder of this Temple, and must be accompanied by the petitioner's demit from

the Temple of which he was last a member, and the ballot shall be taken in the same manner as an application for initiation.

#### Active Membership

SEC. 7. A Noble can hold active membership in but one Temple. He must retain active membership in a Preceptory, Commandery or Consistory to retain such membership in the Temple. Voluntary non-affiliation in Preceptory, Commandery or Consistory for six months shall deprive him of membership in this Temple.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### Ballot on Candidates

SECTION 1. If upon balloting for a candidate, subsequent to a favourable report, three (3) black balls appear, another ballot shall immediately be taken; but no more. Upon the appearance of three (3) black balls a second time, the candidate shall be declared rejected and disqualified from making another application for thirteen (13) weeks.

#### Objection or Protest

SEC. 2. After a candidate has been declared elected any subsequent objection or protest must be presented to the Illustrious Potentate in writing, signed by at least three (3) members of this Temple and must stand. The fact that said objection has been made, but not the written objection itself, shall be entered upon the minutes, and shall have the same force and effect as a second unsuccessful ballot.

When balloting for candidates for initiation, before the result is announced by the Illustrious Potentate, the ballot box shall be presented to the Chief and Assistant Rabbans for inspection, who shall, when directed by the Illustrious Potentate, report their findings. The Illustrious Potentate shall examine the ballot and declare the applicant elected or rejected, in accordance with the Laws and Regulations of the Imperial Council.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### Auspension

SECTION 1. The suspension or expulsion of a Knight Templar by his Preceptory, or Commandery, or Thirty-second Degree S.P.R.S. by his Consistory, shall, ipso facto, cause his suspension or expulsion from this

Temple. His reinstatement by his Preceptory, Commandery or Consistory restores bim to his previous standing in the Temple, without vote of that body.

#### Arrears

SEC. 2. Any Noble of this Temple who shall be in arrears for dues for two (2) years shall be notified by the Recorder to pay his dues and if, after being thus notified, he remains in arrears, he may be suspended by the Temple for non-payment of dues.

#### Restoration of Membership

SEC. 3. Any Noble who has been suspended for non-payment of dues may be restored to membership upon making application by the same majority suspending him, and upon payment of all arrears at the time of his suspension.

Charges

SEC. 4. When a Noble is to be disciplined for any cause, other than non-payment of dues, it shall be done only upon written charges preferred by a Noble of this Temple at a regular session, or a special session called for the purpose of taking his conduct under consideration; such charges shall be referred to the Executive Committee for investigation, a copy of the charges being furnished the accused. The Executive Committee shall report their recommendations at a session of the Temple.

Membership Terminated

SEC. 5. Membership may be terminated by voluntary demission on payment of all indebtedness to the Temple; or by expulsion after due trial and vote of three-fourths of the members present at a session of the Temple when the vote is taken.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

# Fiscal Year Reports

SECTION 1. The fiscal year of Gizeh Temple shall be closed on the fifteenth (15th) of November of each year; the reports of the Illustrious Potentate, Treasurer and Recorder to be printed and distributed to members of Gizeh-Ten.ple five (5) days before the stated session.

#### ARTICLE IX.

Section 1. All Nobles hereafter created shall be presented with a Fez, the Diploma of the Imperial Council and the Visiting Card of the current year.

SEC. 2. The Temple shall not loan its funds to any of its members.

All appeals for charity shall be referred to the Executive Committee, with power to act.

SEC. 3. A majority of votes shall determine all questions not already provided for in these By-Laws, or by the Code and Constitution of the Imperial Council.

SEC. 4. In case of a tie, the presiding officer shall give the deciding vote.

Sec. 5. No appeal small lie to the session from the decision of the Illustrious Potentate or any matter already voted upon.

#### ARTICLE X.

#### Amendments

SECTION 1. Proposed amendents to these By-Laws shall be submitted in writing at a regular session of the Temple.

The entire section, or sections, to be amended must be fully written out as the same will read with the proposed to adment incorporated therein, and the same shall be stated upon the notice of the next annual session.

It shall require the consenting vote of two-thirds of the members present for adoption.
