



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
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
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
# SPADEAU.

NATURAL MINERAL WATER  
FROM  
WILMOT SPA SPRINGS.

HISTORICAL SKETCH AND ACCOUNT OF ITS  
CURATIVE PROPERTIES.

## THE WILMOT SPA SPRINGS

ARE located in the Township of Wilmot, Annapolis County, Nova Scotia, about two miles north of Middleton, on the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, near the foot of the range of hills known as the North Mountain, about thirty miles from the old historic town of Annapolis Royal, and one hundred miles from Halifax, in the centre of the great fruit-growing district, *the Annapolis Valley*. It is easily reached from all points by railway and steamboat. The Springs are grouped in the midst of a park of five acres in extent of primeval forest. Pine, hemlock, spruce, maple, birch and beech, rear their monster forms in close order to the height of one hundred feet, where they have flung from their massive tops the storms of centuries. Here, in the dense shade, bubble up these hygean waters for the healing of the nations. In the most oppressive heat of summer the balsam-laden air is always cool, and the invalid who cannot seek the seashore to enjoy the salt breeze can find here most delicious respite from summer's excessive heat.



Well has one of our living poets, Mrs. M. J. K. Lawson, described the beauty of this beautiful region:—

"Up the darling mountains,  
Draped with light and shade,  
There a broad patch of woodland,  
And here a cultura glade.

Farmsteads by crag and glacie,  
Green pastures white with sheep,  
The brownish cattle grazing,  
With glossy calves asleep.


The orchards wear their glory,  
Beneath the plum-tree's purple crest  
Golden apples, the apples,  
In gold and crimson streak.

There, in the Sylvan grove,  
The soft sea Waters shine,

THE SPA SPRINGS House, but just completed ready for guests, is an excellent Summer Resort. It is three stories in height, including Mansard roof, and has ample piazzas. It will accommodate about one hundred guests. The rooms are airy, and all the appointments are of the first class. An ample bath-house is provided with hot, cold and shower baths of the water from the Spadeau Spring. Good livery horses are always at the service of the guests. The drives in all directions are very fine. Only five miles away rolls the Bay of Fundy with its wonderful tides and bracing sea air. Mountain and dale are beautifully interwoven.



### HISTORICAL ACCOUNT OF THE WILMOT SPA SPRINGS.

For ages before Nova Scotia was settled by the French or Anglo-Saxon, the mineral waters from the group of springs known as the Wilmot Spa Springs were highly prized by the Micmac Indians for their curative qualities, and the mud from the outlet of these Springs, saturated with the water, is by the remnant of these people believed to be of wondrous healing power in cutaneous diseases. Experiment and experience have proven that their faith is well founded. The Wilmot Spa Springs were known before the opening of the present century, by the proprietor, Farefield Woodbury. Their medical value became known about the year 1817. The surrounding country being sparsely settled, the news spread slowly; but as their curative properties became known, visitors were attracted, until in 1830 all the farm-houses within reach of the Spa were filled to overflowing each summer. The absolute demand for better accommodation prompted the proprietor of the Springs to erect a Hotel of proportions to meet the demand. Visitors of all classes visited the Hotel, and, from the register of fifty years ago, we see the signatures of many of the prominent men of the period from our own Province and the United States. The testimonials received from that time to the present are certainly enough to convince all of the remarkable virtues of these waters as a remedy for numerous of theills to which such is heir.

Quoting from an old manuscript of the Rev G. Robertson, Doctor of Wilmot, N. S., under whose personal notice came a large number of the cures which were effected in the years gone by, he writes of the Springs:

"Their medical properties, which are both powerful and efficient, remained undiscovered until about 1817 to 1820, when some gentlemen who had visited several watering places in Great Britain, and had examined Wilmot Spa Spring, suggested the probability that the latter might contain certain of those healing virtues which are found to result from the use of Spa water. Accordingly, their effect was tried in a series of experiments, first upon children who had been suffering from the diseases which are commonly peculiar to their years, and



afterwards on persons of all ages who were troubled with various kinds of ailments. In all these experiments the issue seemed to answer the anticipations of those concerned, always proving favorable. As might be expected from such favorable results, the waters of the Springs rose gradually in estimation and repute, and promise to afford not only the means of curing many diseases, but a delightful resort to those who may wish to enjoy for a time some relaxation from the duties of their business or profession."

The above is under date of 1832.

Since that time the Wilmot Spa Springs have been visited by thousands of people who have been benefitted by drinking the waters, and numerous are the certificates bearing testimony to their value.

The fact that the former owners for a number of years have taken no pains to make the value of the Springs known, and all the visitors that could be accommodated in the village have come without solicitation, accounts for the comparatively select number who are aware that the Wilmot Spa Springs and



#### THE PHYSIOLOGICAL ACTION OF SPADEAU.
