Kingston, Jan. 27 .- (Special-)-Donald McIntyre's meeting to-night was a great gathering, with no interrupters no unpleasantness at all. Premier Whitney came out broadfooted on several matters of policy, and Mr. Foy launched a sensation as to the methods in the crown lands department of the old adminis-

He wanted Kingston to just do its duty and act according to the dictate of its conscience on Monday. The speeches of Hon. Dr. Reaume and Hon. Mr. Foy pointed out the bad ways of the old government. Mr. Foy broached a case of stolen timber lands which promises to develop into a sensation.

PREMIER WHITNEY AT KINGSTON.

Mr. Whitney's speech showed how the iniquity of the numbered ballot had been put to an end by the new government; that the liquor laws were now being honestly enforced to the letter; common sense management of public institutions was showing enormous increase in revenue; pool rooms had been closed; the Temiskaming and Northern Railway was made a splendid paying proposition; no moneys or lands had been given to the railways by this government; the policy is to dispose of pulp wood privileges without secret bargains being necessary, and efforts will be made to right a great wrong in this connection by cancelling all agreements made by the old government where the conditions have not been carried out; the mining policy was also announced, and great praise was extended to Hon Frank Cochrane; the old government was denounced for its harsh treatment of Dr Mills, for years principal of the O.A.C at Guelph. 

MICE CAUSE PNEUMONIA

Account for Contagion and Presents Proofs.

New York, Jan. 29.—Pneumonia is due to mice, and not to the weather, according to Dr. E. Palier of this city. The nicrobe causing pneumonia, he says, is found in the mouths of nearly all healthy individuals, but does not acquire dangerous virulence until it passes thru a susceptible animal like the house mouse. He has proved his theory, he says, by experiments,
"Let us consider," said Dr. Paller,
"how mice cause pneumonia. In the
months of December, January, February and March there are usually many mice in houses, especially where plumbing is defective and which are in a gen-"Mice, as as well known, work them-selves, under sinks, and hence are mostly abundant in houses where the plumbing is not open, where there are many nooks and corners around the sinks. In trying to obtain mice for exsinks. In trying to obtain mice for experiments I learned from many person; that they are more abundant in the house in the winter and early spring. Young mice seem to be especially abundant in the month of March. "Now, young mice are particularly susceptible to the pneumonia bacillus. The young mice come into the rooms to look for food, and they can easily get inoculated with human sputum. Then they spread the virulent bacillus which they have developed, and thesa virulent bacilli may cause pneumonia in man either by inhalation or by inocculation thru some abrased surface."

Dr. Palier tells The Medical Record he has found two young dead mice which showed many virulent pneumonia bacilli in poorly ventilated rooms. Dr. Palier says, the virulent bacilli from infected mice multiply abundantly, and greatly increase the danger of pneumonia to the human beings in the house. "These germs from mice." Dr. Palier says, "lose their virulence after a time. Thus a person may breathe in germs whose virulence is well-nigh exhausted, and so have a mild case of pneumonia. And vice-versa."

Dr. Palier says he does not believe that pneumonia is spread by kissing. Nor does he believe that it is due to changes in the weather. Furthermore, the disease is not due to depression. Persons apparently in good health may suddenly develop pneumonia, whereas others who are very weak may not get it.


