"While we will do all in our power for the high schools the pupils in the public schools must be convinced, and should not be compelled to take up a curriculum leading to the high school," he said.

CORRECT SHIPPING EVILS OBJECT OF HEPBURN BILL

Railroad Rate Measure Reported to U.S. Congress Amends Interstate Commerce Law.

Washington, D.C., Jan. 27.—Chairman Hepburn to-day reported to the house his railroad rate bill. The report is a comprehensive explanation of the measure. It is the product of several years' consideration by the committee. The necessity for the proposed legislation is stated to be emphasized by the demand which shippers have been making for years. The object of the bill is simply to amend the present interstate commerce law which has been in force for twenty years. These

No attempt is made to give the commission power to readjust freight classification, a power which Mr. Hepburn says his committee considers a very much greater power over rates than that given in the bill, as under the measure the initiative in rate making is given to the commission. But under a grant of power to establish a system of freight classification, the commission would have authority to take the initiative. Little complaint, it is said, has been heard against classification.

Correct Shipping Evils.

In attempting to correct the shipping evils, the bill provides first a broader definition of the words "railroad" and "transportation," so as to include within the jurisdiction of the commission the regulation of switches, private cars and the terminal charges.

Being charges are required to be included in the published tariff schedule and thirty days' notice is required to be given before any change is made in such schedules. This latter requirement is to obviate what is known as "cold-in-the-hand" rates, which is a complaint the commission is given authority to find a conclusion, instead of "cold-in-the-hand" facts and conclusions. Facts are to be included in the findings only when damages are to be awarded.

It is section 4 of the bill which confers power on the commission to establish a rate or to declare what shall be a proper charge in a certain instance. The report states in this connection that none of its members think it wise that authority to take the initiative in rate-making should be conferred upon it.

MICE CAUSE PNEUMONIA NOT WEATHER OR KISSES

New York Doctor Has New Theory to Account for Contagion and Presents Proofs.

New York, Jan. 28.—Pneumonia is due to mice and not to the weather, according to Dr. E. P. Falter of this city. The microbe causing pneumonia, he says, is found in the mouths of nearly all healthy individuals, but does not acquire dangerous virulence until it passes through a susceptible animal like the house mouse. He has proved his theory, he says, by experiments.

"Let us consider," said Dr. Falter, "how mice cause pneumonia. In the months of December, January, February and March there are usually many mice in houses, especially where plumbing is defective and which are in a generally poor sanitary condition.

"Mice, as is well known, work themselves under sinks and hence are mostly abundant in houses where there are plumbers in open, where there are many nooks and corners around the sinks. In such places mice are usually found in the winter and early spring. Young mice seem to be especially abundant in the month of March, and are particularly susceptible to the pneumonia bacillus. The young mice come into the rooms to look for food, and they can easily get inoculated with human sputum. Then they spread the virulent bacillus in man either by inhalation or by ingestion through some abraded surface."

Dr. Falter tells The Medical Record that he has found twenty young dead mice which he had found many virulent pneumonia bacilli in poorly ventilated rooms. Dr. Falter says, the virulent bacilli from infected mice multiply abundantly, and greatly increase the danger of pneumonia to the human beings in the house.

"These germs from mice," Dr. Falter says, "lose their virulence after a time. Thus a person may breathe in the germs whose virulence is well-nigh exhausted, and so have a mild case of pneumonia. And vice-versa."

Dr. Falter says he does not believe that pneumonia is spread by kissing. Nor does he believe that it is due to changes in the weather. Furthermore, the disease is not due to depression. Persons apparently in good health may suddenly develop pneumonia, whereas it is expected the new theory will raise the price of house cats.
