Ottawa, June 27.—(Special.)—The

### TORONTO NEEDS A CHARTER.

Toronto has never had fair treatment from the Ontario Legislature. The city needs it difficult to get along under the conditions that have been imposed upon it by the Legislature to cover the largest, as well as the smallest, city in the province. Toronto occupies a different position from all the other municipalities. In regard to population no other city in Ontario is so crowded with it. It occupies a unique position in the province, and its advantages under which it labors in this respect the Legislature makes no effort to help the city out of the difficulties which confront it from time to time. The municipal council in the province gets more consideration from the Legislature than does the city of Toronto. This city should undoubtedly have a charter of its own. Montreal is governed under a charter obtained a couple of years ago. The necessities of the city demand a special charter. We are constantly running to the Legislature for power to deal with matters which are exclusively of local concern, and which should be settled by the city itself, independently altogether of the Legislature. The city should be empowered to make its own laws, and the Legislature should give no assistance in helping the city out of its difficulties. On the contrary, the members from the rural sections seem to take no little pleasure in opposing the wishes of Toronto. Any private corporation would more judiciously with the Legislature than the city of Toronto. Nor is there any likelihood that our position will be bettered until we have a charter of our own. Just exactly the same has been the case with the city of Montreal. It is in a position to say, "I am drafting a charter, and I am drafting a preliminary investigation and study. Nothing would help me so much to convince the Legislature of the necessity of a charter for Toronto as to see the changes in the plans of the city for the past twenty years. Such an inquiry would disclose the defects of the present system and suggest remedies for a new constitution. This suggestion is made by Mr. Goldwin Smith in a communication which appears in this issue. The World heartily endorses the idea. But we can make no headway in this or any other direction until some of our representative citizens come forward and urge the Council or the Government to make a move in this direction. Municipal reform will not come of itself. A civic organization of some kind is absolutely necessary to set the machinery in motion. Everything leads up to the formation of a municipal league in which leading business and financial interests of the city would be represented. The World again asks who will be the first to set the ball rolling.
