The Archbishop of Ottawa, who was the first to take the oath, was followed by the other members of the cabinet.

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

TWO LBS. BUTTER BOUGHT A VOTE IN NORTH BRUCE, IT IS ALLEGED

Respondent Alexander McNeill, M.P., Filed Particulars Yesterday to the Number of Seventy-Five, Charging That the Usual Corrupt Practices Were Indulged In.

The record to be used in the North Bruce election trial was yesterday passed. The respondent, Mr. McNeill, M.P., filed particulars yesterday of the vote cast at the election to which he objected and which he asks be deducted from the total vote cast for the petitioner, E. Campbell. There are 75 distinct charges put forth against Mr. Campbell and his agents.

Mixing of Teams.
Charge No. 1 alleges that C. B. Bowman of Southampton, M.L.A. for North Bruce, an agent of the petitioner, did hire teams for the purpose of conveying voters.

Charge No. 2—That Offer, alias "Doc"
Cole of Southampton, also an agent, hired teams and that he was supplied with money therefor by Mr. Bowman.

Charges 3, 6, 7, and 8 charge "Doc" Cole
with paying 10d and traveling expenses to Macdonald McKay and Dan McKay from Stokely Bay to Southampton.

B. B. Miller, a stipendiary magistrate,
and an agent of the petitioner, is charged with hiring a boat from one George Golden of Stokely Bay for the purpose of conveying Dan and Malcolm McKay above mentioned.

It is alleged in charge 12 that the petitioner Campbell
employed George Brooks and David Parker, both of Warton, to vote for him or to refrain from voting.

Councilors Woodcock and Peggley moved a resolution that the Council do express its condolence and sorrow to the family of the late Mr. James Chester, who died on the 22nd inst., and that the Council do cause a copy of this resolution to be sent to the family.

Who the Warden Is.
Mr. James Chester, warden-elect, first entered the York County Council in 1876, and has held the seat ever since. He is a native of the county, and has been a member of the Council for 25 years.

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
